Community Improvement And Beautification Week June 16-21

More than 50 civic clubs, local businesses, and youth organizations have pledged their support and efforts in the 1975 Community Improvement and Beautification program set for June 16-21 in Floydada. The campaign, spearheaded by the Civic Improvement Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, is planned as a total community effort to imporve the physical appearance and the environmental condition of the community.

Activities scheduled for June 16-21: Business

The Civic Improvement Committee has organized local businesses on each business block to make improvements on their own property. Each block is headed by a captain who contacts each retail owner and enlists his cooperation to fix-up his business.

Local Officials and Agencies City officials have pledged their cooperation by offering their services in making special trash container pickups, and will haul large amounts of brush and refuse away at no charge. With approval of the owner, the City will demolish and remove old buildings.

The Floydada Volunteer Fire Dept. will landscape the area east of the Fire

The Texas Highway Dept. (Floydada office) will mow all highway entrance medians and sidings leading into Floydada. The Highway Dept. is also in the process of repainting the front of their office building.

The Floydada Chamber of Commerce will repaint and repair the Chamber office, as well as cut the weeds behind their property

Clubs and Civic Organizations The Floydada Kiwanis, Rotary, and Lions Clubs will be presented a program on Store Front Modernization by the Community Development Team of South Western Public Service Co. in Amarillo. Each organization will also plan club projects for the

The Women's Division of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce will present a special 'Most Improved -Yard of the Week" award in its annual summer program for the residential neighborhoods in Floydada. The Women's division also plans to do a landscaping project.

The Floydada Multi-purpose Service Center (formerly Community Action Center) will be working with the youth attending its Summer program to clean-up and pick-up litter in the Della Plains School vicinity.

The Floyd County Museum Association plans to purchase American Flags to be displayed in front of the Museum. The First United Methodist Church Youth will assist elderly or handicapped citizens in Floydada to beautify their own property by helping to clean-up and improve their residences.

temperatures last week, Floyd folk received a welcome relief from heat and dry weather as a weak cold front set off welcome rains Monday and Tuesday nights.

Every farmer in the county was extremely happy with the rainfall except one or two wheat farmers, who were anxious to get on with the wheat

Most all row crops are up . . . and the iming of the rainfall was perfect.

The south part of the county received an inch and a half Monday night and three quarters of an inch Tuesday night. The McCoy area reported one and a half inches for the two nights of rain. Four miles south of Floydada .7 was reported on Monday night and .75 on Tuesday night.

East of Floydada rainfall Monday night was reported at 1.5 inches. Dougherty and Lakeview areas received 1.25 the two rains. Only .3 was reported in the northeast part of the county Monday night and .1 on Tuesday night. Only thing slowing up the wheat harvest is the lack of combines in this area.

The Sandhill area reported a total of an inch for the two nights.

The official rain gauge in Floydada showed a total of 1.35 inches of rainfall for the two nights.

Rainfall Monday and Tuesday nights in the Lockney area totaled from an inch and a half to over two inches. The total was about an inch and a half in the city. Providence received a reported one and a half inches Monday night and another three-tenths Tuesday. Herman King in the Lone Star Community reported an inch and a half Monday and an additional half inch Tuesday. At Sterley, three-quarters of an inch was reported Monday and four-tenths

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Feed Grains Council On Poland Project

LUBBOCK - Officials of the U.S. Feed Grains Council, currently touring Eastern Europe, have finalized plans for a waste and grain usuage project in Poland and a nutrition seminar in Austria, each designed to increase demand for U.S. feed grains.

Representing the council are chairman Elbert Harp of Abernathy, Tex., president Darwin Stolte of Washington, D.C. and consultant John Baumgardner, animal science professor at Texas Tech Unviersity in Lubbock.

Specifications for the livestock production research project in Poland will be provided by the council, which will oversee its operation along with the Polish Ministry of Agricul-

While touring other council facilities in Poland, the USFGC executives met with officials of Rolinpex, the

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pany which is responsible for buying all the grain imported into Poland. Baumgardner was expected to spend several days in Poland, encouraging the use of feed grains such as grain sorghum in place of poor condition corn, which has been the subject of quality complaints recently.

Prior leaving to Poland, Harp and Stolte attended the U.S. Food Show in Warsaw. The program, sonsored by the U.S. attache, attracted more than 300 key Polish agricultural leaders to view and sample U.S. food products.

According to Harp, the food was semi-prepared or prepared, ready for serving, and included everything from grapefruit to cereal.

During a stop in Vienna, the council officials finalized plans for a livestock nutrition seminar to be conducted there later this year. Agricultural leaders from throughout Eastern and Western European countries and Russia are expected to participate.

Harp is executive director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, which was instrumental in the formation of the U.S. Feed Grains Council, and the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, both headquartered in Lub-

The council is composed of commodity organizations and agribusiness groups working through the Foreign Agricultural Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Its purpose is to increase dollar sales abroad of U.S. feed grains and to provide an effective network for world market development.

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
