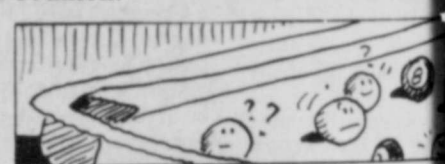
## WHAT A SHARK

## Archeological Field School Research

### In White River Canyon June 14-21

The 14th Texas Archeological Society field school will be engaged in an archeological research project in the White River Canyon at the Floydada Country Club from June 14th through June 21st. Over two hundred members of the Society from all parts of Texas and members from Louisiana, Kansas, and California will participate. The archeologist in charge is Dr. S. Alan Skinner of Southern Methodist University assisted by Joe T. Bagot and Barbara Burger also of Southern Methodist University and Roberta Speer of the Killgore Research Center of West Texas State University.

The field school is designed to meet a twofold need. Training of amateur archeologists in proper field techniques and preservation of historic and prehistoric sites is the primary function. Probing the unknown past is of secondary importance.

The Floydada Country Club Site presents an interesting research problem since there is concrete evidence of various Indian groups occupying the site at the same time or at approximately the same time from about 1000 AD to 1874 when Col. Mackenzie drove the Comanches from the area. Excavations will probably expose Indian occupation predating the

time of Christ. It is hoped that the life styles and patterns of activity will reveal secrets of the little known prehistoric people of our area.

Each evening at 8:00 p.m. there will be lectures by experts in the various aspects of our history and prehistory. The public is invited to attend these lectures. The schedule of lectures is as follows:

June 14th, Saturday — Dr. Ernest Wallace, Texas Tech University, "Historic Indian Occupation of the Southern Plains."

June 15th, Sunday — Dr. Jim Hanson, Panhandle Plains Museum, "The Historic Indians and Trade Goods."

June 16th, Monday — Mr. Eddie Guffee, Wayland College, "Comanchero Occupation at the Edge of the Caprock."

June 17th, Tuesday — Charles and Eileen Johnson, Texas Tech Museum, "The Lubbock Lake Site Excavations."

June 19th, Thursday — Dr. Jack T. Hughes, West Texas State University, "The Rex Rogers Bison Kill and Excavations at Mackenzie Reservoir."

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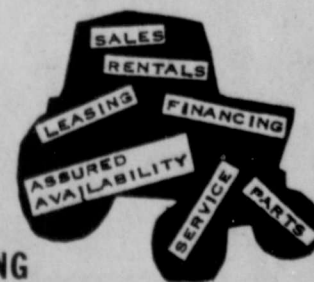

## Chamber Of Commerce Status Change For Natural Gas

**RESOLUTION**  
STATE OF TEXAS, COUNTY OF FLOYD, KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

THAT WHEREAS, natural gas has been used as a fuel for irrigation engines in the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas for a number of years, and is and has been the most economical fuel available; and

WHEREAS, natural gas is transported to more than fifty thousand (50,000) irrigation wells in the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas by a large network of underground pipelines, many of which have been laid by the irrigation farmers themselves at an average cost of approximately ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,000.00) per well; and

WHEREAS, the irrigation belt in the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas produces an astronomical amount of food and fiber which could not and would not be produced but for irrigation and the use of natural gas as a fuel to power the irrigation engines in the area; and

WHEREAS, there is no other fuel available in sufficient quantities to furnish the power for such irrigation engines, and even if such fuel were available, there is not available equipment to handle the transportation, storage and use of any alternate fuel even if the same were available in sufficient quantities; and

WHEREAS, the entire irrigation belt is dependent upon the availability and use of natural gas, and in the event it became impossible for any reason to secure natural gas for irrigation, it would be impossible to irrigate the said area, which would result in a tremendous economic loss, not only to the area, but to the entire nation, and would be extremely detrimental to the total economy of the nation; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Power Commission, on December 19, 1974,

rendered an Opinion in being Opinion 897-A,

the priority of irrigation 2 commercial priority industrial priority, which practical purposes make unavailable for irrigation.

WHEREAS, such action of the Federal Power constitutes a serious threat to the total economy and to the economy of such reclassification as Federal Power Commission the notice or knowledge of the area, and with notice that such reclassification being proposed or without the farmers of an opportunity to be heard or manner or present testimony to the Commission inevitable result that would be hurt and affected by the said reclassification deprived of the use of irrigation fuel without fuel available, which result in reducing the dryland farming operation.

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## Feed Grains Council On Poland Project

LUBBOCK — Officials of the U.S. Feed Grains Council, currently touring Eastern Europe, have finalized plans for a waste and grain usage project in Poland and a nutrition seminar in Austria, each designed to increase demand for U.S. feed grains.

Representing the council are chairman Elbert Harp of Abilene, Tex., president Darwin Stoltz of Washington, D.C. and consultant John Baumgardner, animal science professor at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

Specifications for the livestock production research project in Poland will be provided by the council, which will oversee its operation along with the Polish Ministry of Agriculture.

While touring other council facilities in Poland, the USFGC executives met with officials of Rolinex, the

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government trading company which is responsible for buying all the grain imported into Poland. Baumgardner was expected to spend several days in Poland, encouraging the use of feed grains such as grain sorghum in place of poor condition corn, which has been the subject of quality complaints recently.

Prior to leaving Poland, Harp and Stoltz attended the U.S. Food Show in Warsaw. The program, sponsored by the U.S. attaché, attracted more than 300 key Polish agricultural leaders to view and sample U.S. food products.

According to Harp, the food was semi-prepared or prepared, ready for serving, and included everything from grapefruit to cereal.

During a stop in Vienna, the council officials finalized plans for a livestock nutrition seminar to be conducted there later this year. Agricultural leaders from throughout Eastern and Western European countries and Russia are expected to participate.

Harp is executive director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, which was instrumental in the formation of the U.S. Feed Grains Council, and the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, both headquartered in Lubbock.

The council is composed of commodity organizations and agribusiness groups working through the Foreign Agricultural Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Its purpose is to increase dollar sales abroad of U.S. feed grains and to provide an effective network for world market development.

## What One Person Can Do

Until recently, Alice Johnson was "just the school custodian" of Davy Crockett Junior High School in Channelview, Texas. For 18 years, the 63-year-old woman has swept the halls and kept the schoolrooms tidy. Now school officials have decided to name the town's new junior high school after her.

"I couldn't say anything," Mrs. Johnson recounts. "I just stood there and looked at them. Imagine naming a school after a broom pusher. I thought they would name it after someone important, someone more deserving."

But both school board members and students thought there was no one more deserving than Alice Johnson.

"Mrs. Johnson is a lady who has given personal attention to the kids and taken pride in our junior high school," said the board's vice-president. "She helps handicapped children get through the halls. She's an unsung hero who makes things click."

The students agree. "If you've ever got a problem you can talk it out with her," said a seventh grader. "And she makes us pick up trash and clean up our lockers."
