

Officially, Floydada received 4.1 inches on Sunday night and 1.9 on Monday night. The total rainfall for the year is 10.89. Of this amount 7.55 came in June.

The Harmony community received about an inch of rain Sunday and Monday nights and no hail to speak of. Ray Cook who lives in the Hillcrest Community north of Dougherty received 21/2 inches of rain Sunday and Monday night and no hail.

Wayne Poteet got a lot of hail Sunday night . . . about three miles

northeast of Floydada. Dougherty received 1.5 inches Monday night and no hail.

Cotton Lost A Floydada ginner estimated that some 3,000 acres of cotton were hailed out in the south part of the county.

He said he thought farmers would replant soybeans, or sunflowers on hailed out cotton land. It is hard to plant grain sorghum after cotton "Treflan" treated soil unless it is planted deep.

One elevator operator said there was no contract available to sell sunflower seeds except those taken out earlier this year . . . and he had heard the open market might not be over nine cents a

One farmer said that "since we don't have many onions . . . the onion prices looks terrific."

J.E. Waller, who lives on the Crosby County line received 21/2 inches of rain and no hail.

On the good side of the ledger, most of the wheat was harvested, much of the wheat land had been plowed and the moisture was good. One farmer's wife said, "we were hailed out . . . but there are things worse, like getting killed in a tornado.

There are moisture benefits . there is lake water to be pumped on crops later this summer.

The South Plains community received no hail and a little over two inches of rain Sunday and Monday

E. J. Kinslow, who lives about five miles north of South Plains reported a tool house blown over in the storm.

A strip of hail about two to three miles wide, following the Plainview Lockney highway and moving southeast destroyed crops and caused property damage all along its course Sunday evening. The hail was described as "devastating." Windows were broken on the north side of homes including those of Lonnie Scott, Oscar Golden, J.R. Belt and Loyd Duvall, all along the highway east of Aiken toward Lockney. A cow belonging to Golden was killed in the storm. Duvall reported 1.8" of rain Sunday.

Grant Teaff Coming To Floydada

Winning the Southwest Conference championship, putting Baylor into the Cotton Bowl for the first time and being acclaimed as consensus National Football Coach of the Year and unanimous Southwest Conference Coach of the Year makes one wonder just what Grant Teaff will do for an encore.

The dynamic young mentor has accomplished miracles in his three years at the Baptist helm, taking over as a relatively unknown at a school that was admittedly at low tide in the

football world. The first year Teaff stunned the Southwest by posting a 5-6 record and being acclaimed Southwest Coach of the Year. In 1973 the Bruins suffered unsurmountable injuries and bad

bounces and wound up 2-9. This year the Bears were picked last in the pre-season poll and became the darlings of the nation as they made the impossible dream come true with the first Southwest Conference championship in 50 years and the first Cotton Bowl berth ever.

Teaff's climb to the top of the nation's coaching ranks, as attested by his being selected head coach of the South squad in the 1973 Blue-Gray All Star Game and head coach of the West squad in the 1975 All American Game. At 25, he was the youngest college

head coach in the country at his alma mater, McMurray College. Taking over a team that had been at the bottom of the small college ranks, Teaff posted three strong seasons before the school dropped scholarships. A lesser person would have jumped the ship, but Teaff felt an obligation to the youngsters he had recruited and stayed three more seasons until he was able to get a scholarship program reinstated.

In 1966 he was hired as assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Texas Tech and brought in many of the players who represented the Red Raiders in bowl appearances. In 1969 he undertook another

challenge, moving to Angelo State University where the football program was at low ebb. He had consecutive 6-4 seasons, then moved to a 7-3, including win over National NAIA champion Texas A&I when the Baylor opportunity presented itself, and he moved to Waco for another rebuilding

Teaff is one of the nation's most sought-after speakers, traveling from coast to coast to share his Christian testimony and love for Baylor University in highly - motivating speeches to the youth of the land and at the nation's top football clinics where

Details of the Tragedy SILVERTON - A farmer making a routine check of his crops Monday morning discovered the battered bodies of three of his neighbors killed by a tornado late Sunday.

The grim discovery of the bodies of Leland Hugh Wood, his wife and child on their ranch 12 miles northeast of here, came 12 hours after the death-dealing twister dipped from ominous thunderstorms and levelled the family's ranch home, a barn and a corral.

The body of Wood, 25, active civic leader and rancher, was found lying in a PARDON MY BLOOPER his house in nearby Barrel Creek Canyon. His 11-month-old sen's but 11ravine among the rubble of remains of the house.

Mrs. Rita Wood, also 25, was found slumped in a pickup truck about a mile from the ranch. The truck was in a barrow ditch.

Justic of the Peace Johnny Lanham, who pronounced the victims dead at the scene, theorized that Mrs. Wood, critically injured by flying debris, was attempting to obtain help but died driving the truck.

"We don't know really what happened . . . really have to use our imagination, but it looks like she must have been driving for help," Lanham said.

The discovery of the death and destruction was made by farmer Glen Lindsey, who farms land adjoining the Wood's Barrel Creek

As he was surveying his crops to see how much rain fell Sunday night, he noticed the levelled ranch house of his neighbor.

Driving to the scene, he apparently passed the Wood's pickup. After finding testimony to the thunder-

Wood and little Ky, he drove back down the dirt road and found Mrs. Wood in the pickup.

As the turbulent weather moved into the Silverton area about 8 p.m. Sunday, Lindsey told officials he was watching the clouds but didn't see any funnel clouds. Clocks found near the

Wood's home were stopepd at 8:24 (p.m. Sunday). About 40 minutes earlier, Hall County sheriff's deputies confirmed two tornadoes touched down north of Turkey. Officials believe the killer twister probably was one of those sighted near

Turkey. Heavy rains and hail pounded both Hall and Briscoe Counties shortly before sundown Sunday. Late Monday, volunteers

continued to search through the Barrel Creek Canyon, seeking belongings of the victims.

A house west of the Wood's residence was moved off of it's foundation. And a rain gauge tacked to an undamaged picket

fence near the Wood's demolished house registered Funeral services were .50 of an inch of rain, mute

storm which spawned both needed rain and death.

55 MPH Speed Limit 120 More Days

LUBBOCK - The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission today acted to extend the 55-mileper hour speed limit in Texas for another 120 days.

The Legislature, in special session in December 1973, required the commission to review circumstances affecting the speed limit each 120

An amendment passed by the 64th Legislature this year extended the requirement for as long as the national maximum speed limit of 55 miles per hour is in effect.

The commission's action today extended the 55-mileper hour speed limit in Texas for an additional 120 days beginning July 30.





More Hail Plagues South Plains Farmers

LUBBOCK - After a short two-week lull, cropdamaging hail storms are agin pounding portions of the South Plains. This time most of the storm activity appeared to be centered north of Lubbock.

Several thousand acres of crops were damaged in Floyd, Hale and Lubbock counties Monday night, accoridng to Dr. James Supak, area agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The most miles wide from northeast of Petersburg nearly to Aiken. passed north of Cone, and finally dissipated in northwest Crosby County. A smaller but nonetheless damaging storm was reported in the Abernathy vicinity.

Supak said early reports from Bailey County indicate a severe hail and rain storn caused considerable damage to crops northeast of Muleshoe Tuesday night.

"Due to the late date, cotton destroyed by these storms will have to be replaced with alternative crops," the agronomist said. Producers are urged to carefully evaluate the condition of their crops before making the crucial decision

"As we said before, don't make your final decision the morning after the storm. Wait at least two or three days to evaluate the prospects for recovery. Run a sandfighter or rotary hoe as soon as possible to prevent further damage by

blowing sand." Reports from the storm-hit areas indicate that hail stones were generally large. Frequently, these do less overall damage to cotton than smaller stones which, when combined with driving winds, literally peel both bark and leaves from cotton

Supak advised producers to check the plants carefully. If portions of leaves still remain on the plants and the stems are not broken they will probably recover quicly. Even if leaf defoliation was nearly complete, as long as the bark on the stems is intact below functional buds, the plants will recover.

Research by Texas Agricultural Experiment Station scientists has shown a stand of cotton averaging two plants per foot (about 26,000 plants per acre) has the potential to produce as much cotton as a normal stand, provided there are no long skips, Supak explains.

"This damage will further delay an already late crop and cut into the yield potential and fiber quality," he added. "From an economic viewpoint, however, salvaging what remains of the present cotton crop is probably the best alternative open to the producer.

"A lot of corn, most of it in the 6 to 14-leaf stages, was also damaged by these storms. Generally, the younger corn will stand a etter chance of recovering than that in the more advanced stages. At the six-leaf stage, the growing point is still at or slightly above the soil surface and relatively safe from injury.

Even complete defoliation and light stand losses (10 to 15 percent) at this stage generally don't reduce yields over 10 percent if growing conditions for the rest of the season remain favorable.'

At the eight-leaf stage, the growing point is usually two to three inches above the soil surface and more susceptible to damage. Plants in which the stems were cut or bruised by large hail stones below the growing point may not recover. Removal of the major potion of the leaves at this stage often results in 10 to 20 percent reduction in grain yield. Yield losses are further complicated by stand losses; a 25 percent reduction in stand could increase losses an additional 10 to 15 percent, the Extension specialist said.

By the 10 to 14-leaf stage, ear shoots are starting to develop on the six to eight nodes above ground, and the growing point is well above the soil surface. Plants badly bruised or broken over below the growing point will not recover. Loss of functional leaves at these stages becomes more critical. Research at Iowa State has shown that leaf loss of 50, 74 and 100 percent rends to cut yeilds approximately 20, 45, and 75 percent, respectively. A 30-percent stand loss could add another 10 percent to the yield loss figure.

Supak said the final yields will be largely determined by the growing conditions and care the damaged crop received during the season. Maintaining an adequate moisture supply is perhaps the most essential (and costly) input factor which the producer can provide.

Although more tolerant to hail than cotton or corn, sunflowers also susstained damage from these storms, he added. Stages of development of this crop presently range from four to six leaves to late bud (plants are beginning to exhibit the yellow ray petals). Damage ranged from partial or complete leaf defoliation to bruised and broken stems to some stand loss resulting from destruction of the bud or stalk breakage below the

Very little information is available about influence of hail damage on sunflower yields on the South Plains. However, guidelines used by insurance hail adjustors in the Red River Valley of Minnesota and North Dakota may be fairly applicable for this area also.

As with other crops, damage in the early stages of growth has the least severe effect on yield. For example, at the six to nine-leaf stage, 50 and 100 percent defoliation generally results in yield losses of approximately 10 and 40 percent, respectively. At fully leaved and bud stages, however, 50 and 100 percent defoliation results in about 20 and 80 percent yeild

losses, respectively. Stand losses also contribute to yield losses, Supak emphasized. Each one percent loss in stand cuts yields about 0.4 percent. In other words, if 10 out of 100 plants are killed, yields will be cut four percent.

"With sunflowers, bent, severely bruised and broken stems have an amazing ability to recover. Frequent ly a knot develops around the wound and the plant forms an "elbow" and bends back up toward the sun. Unfortunately, not all plants will recover in this manner, especially in the later stages of development. From the four-leaf to the fully leaved stages, about four out of five plants may be expected to recover. At the later stages (early bud to mid-bloom), only two to three out of five will survive," Supak ex-

In evaluating hail damage to sunflowers, producers should determine stage of development, degree of defoliation, direct stand reduction and stem damage. he said. If half the leaves are destroyed, they should figure a 10-percent loss for plants with four to six leaves and 20 percent for those in the bud stage. With total defoliation, estimate losses at 40 and 80 percent respectively for growth stages. Add to this the approximate stand losses (both direct and those due to stem damage) to estimate total yield reduction

The sorghum crop is expected to suffer the least damage from the storms. This is due partly to its inherent ability to tolerate this type of damage and partly to its ability to recover rapidly. From emergence to the time the sorghum plants display 7 to 10 fully extended leaves, the terminal bud of the plant is located at or near the soil surface. A hail storm during this stage of development may strip leaves, but because of its rather protected position, the terminal bud is seldom injured. If approximately 75 percent of the plants survive, replanting is unnecessary as tillering will compensate for the reduced stand.

Supak said hail damage during the 7 to 10-leaf stage will, however, have detrimental effects on yields. Research conducted at Panhandle State College in Goodwell, Okla., has shown that when 25, 50 and 100 percent of the leaves are destroyed during this vegetative growth stage, grain yeilds are reduced by 8, 10 and 24 percent, respectively, he reported. In addition, the plant's susceptibility to disease and insects (especially the sorghum midge) is increased by reduced vigor and delayed maturity. Replanting will not necessarily alleviate these pitfalls since the faster maturing hybrids generally have lesser yield potentials and are also susceptible to midge damage if planted late in the season.

Following the 7 to 10 - leaf stage, the sorghum plants enter the reproductive growth stage and hail damage becomes a more serious problem. A severe storm not only destroys leaves but may also damage or destroy the head in its formative stages. Still, recovery tends to be rapid. Plants with injury to the growning point or forming heads develop tillers from auxiliary buds at the uppermost non - damaged joints and these will eventually form heads.




