Whirlwinds open the season by defeating Crosbyton last night at 8 o'clock. The Whirlwinds usually beat the teams they always find a challenging team for.

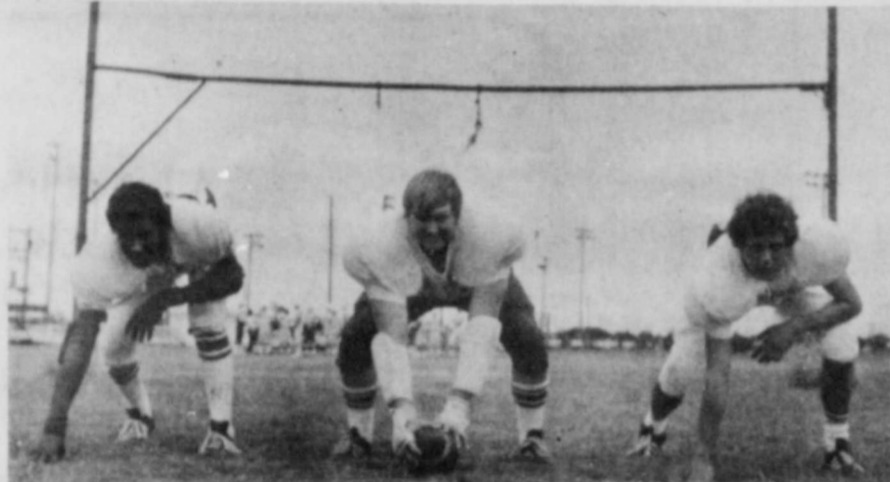
Crosbyton the "Winds" team with an awesome offense move up to AA.

An Editorial

The Commissioners Should Vote "Yes"

The agenda for the county commissioner's court that will be meeting on Monday includes a request by the Migrant Health Office for \$2,000 a year.

This newspaper feels that the county commissioners should vote "yes" when this request comes up for vote Monday. We feel that after we have investigated the services of the health center evaluated what the situation would be without its office in our county, that it is one of the most important services in our county.

For eight and a half years it has taken care of required school immunizations, public TB testing, public blood pressure testing, public diabetes testing, gives Day Care children physicals, assists school nurses, gives blood tests and sponsors the WIC program (nutritional food program for housewives, infants and children).

For eight and a half years this health service has been federally funded, it costs \$20 to \$30,000 just to set up such an office. It employs four persons.

This office took care of some 700 persons in August.

Now, the health office wants to expand its services, it will be moving into the former Federal Land Bank building which has the advantage of more space and is located on the ground level. With this expansion comes the services of a medical doctor two times a week.

We feel that although the county has given free office space for the health office since it began, it should continue to help the office continue its service in the future because:

1. It was much more expensive to aid the people who needed health service before the government funded office opened and began to serve the people.

2. This is a needed service in our county and not entirely a free service...EVERYONE PAYS SOMETHING.

3. The \$2,000 a year is just a drop in the bucket to what it would cost to take care of these people if the county tax payer had to maintain a county health office.

Reed Ford Sales Sponsors PP&K Contest

Local youngsters will be "dusting off" their footballs and loosening up their throwing arm soon for the 1975 Punt, Pass & Kick competition.

This year the local level of PP&K will be co-sponsored by Reed Ford Sales in conjunction with participating Ford Dealers in the area.

Nationally PP&K is celebrating its 15th anniversary. It is sponsored by the Ford Dealers of America in cooperation with the National Football League. 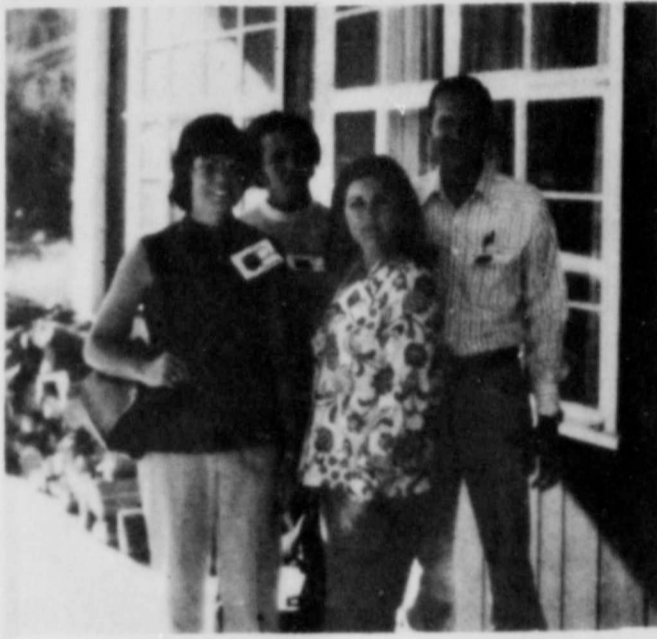

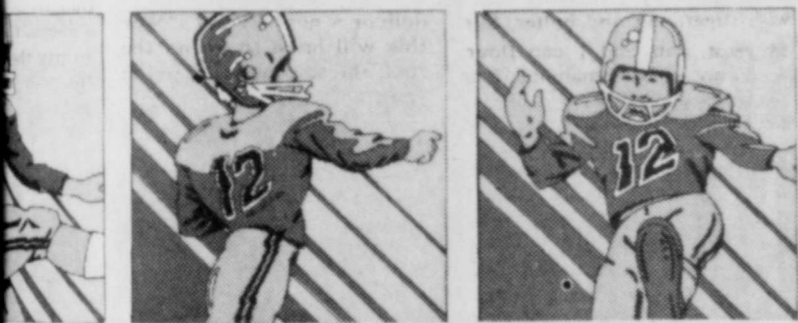

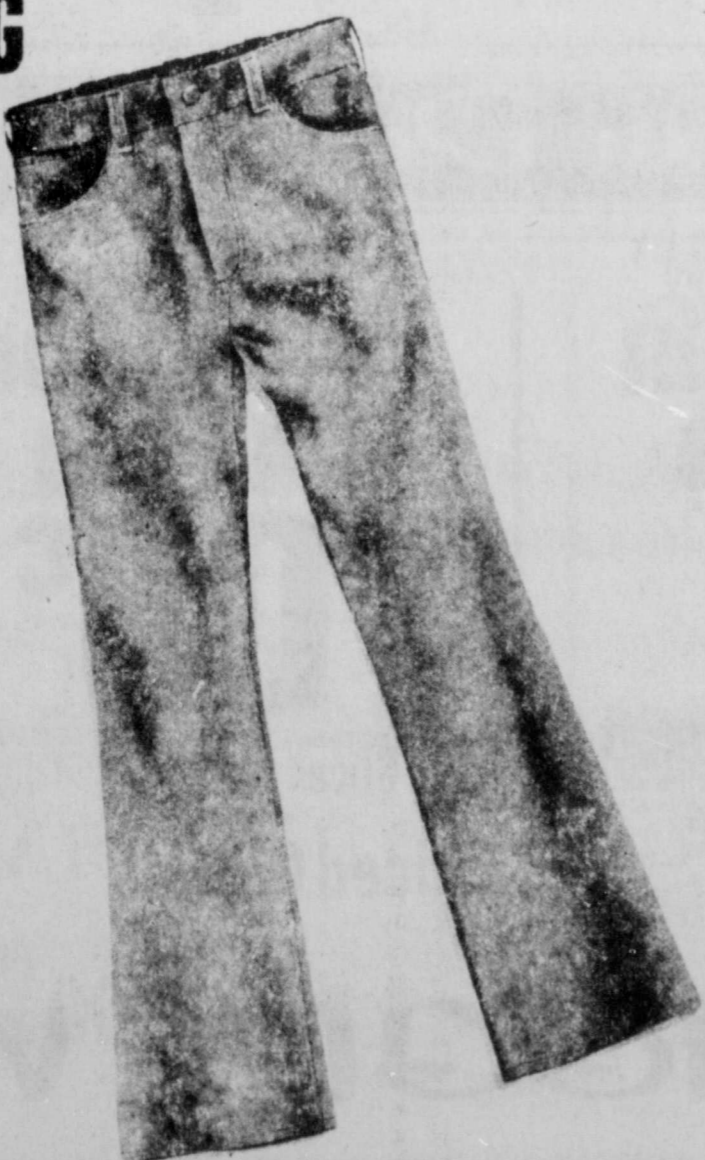

Hunting Forecast Good

Summer department game wardens throughout the Panhandle and South Plains came up with these outlooks: According to Game Warden Calvin Tow, the Dalhart area of the Texas Panhandle should furnish above-average hunting opportunities for doves with good shooting both in the grain fields and

at the watering holes. East around Perryton and down to Canadian, water holes are full and Game Warden Bill Rogers looks for better hunting in the grain fields. Dove have not flocked together and the dove will stay as long as the cold fronts do not reach into the Panhandle.

Off the caprock along the eastern counties near Matar, dove prospects look average according to Game Warden Ronnie Vandiver. The grain in this area is late this year due to the necessity of replanting and a normal number of doves have been observed. The same conditions hold true for the remainder of the South Plains with an average crop of dove being reported by Game Warden

Rue Gambol at Snyder. Heavy rains in the area could affect the water hole shooting. Commercial sunflower fields estimated at 300,000 acres should furnish excellent shooting opportunities as soon as the seed crop is harvested. All P&WD personnel contacted about dove populations indicated the 1975 season should be better than 1974 when drought and low

yield grain crops hurt the dove. The approaching dove season will be affected more by the unpredictable cold fronts that cross the plains of Texas in late August and September. Dove hunters are keeping their fingers crossed concerning the weather and shotguns oiled as the Sept. 1 season draws near. Dove season in the north zone of Texas which includes

all of the high plains is Sept. 1 through Oct. 30, 1975, with the usual bag and possession limits of 10 and 20 birds respectively. Ptosis of one or both eye lids, blurred vision due to difficult focus, or actual diplopia are the most frequent early signs and symptoms. Slurring, nasal tones, jaw weakness, and fatigue on chewing may occur early in more severe cases. Many complain of arm fatigue on reaching up, as in care of hair or in shaving. Legs tire on stairs or short walks and may collapse without warning.

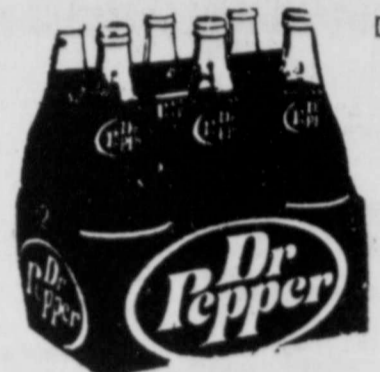
