

Floyd County Championship At Stake

Maybe District !

Number 99 in state rankings (Lockney) defeated number 2 (Floydada) in state rankings last year and Floydada fans still haven't got over it. Lockney's 13-7 victory over the mighty Whirlwinds put the 'Winds into a 9-1 season and a three-way tie for the district championship.

"Remember the Alamo" that old saying doesn't amount to much in comparison to Floydada's battle cry of "remember last year in Lockney." No doubt about it the Mean Green will be out to avenge last year and begin district play with a 1-0 rating.

The kick-off is in Wester Field at 7:30 p.m.

For this season the Longhorns are 4-1 The Whirlwinds 2-3-1.

For comparison, Lockney like Floydada only scored one touchdown against Olton . . . Lockney 6, Olton 29. Floydada's loss to Olton was 32-7.

Floydada beat Crosbyton 41-0, Lockney barely got by the Chiefs 17-13. Lockney beat Frenshup 20-6, Kress 46-0 and last week beat Dimmitt 36-14.

The Longhorns compiled an awesome offense record in the Dimmitt

game . . . some 500 yards.

Lockney's left halfback Mark Sherman has made a total of 48 points for the Longhorn's high scorer. He rushed for 197 yards in the Dimmitt game.

Flanker Roland Bennett got a total of 105 yards in the Dimmitt game.

Quarterback Bernie Ford is a good passer and also a good ball carrier. Lockney gained some 98 yards via the air in the Dimmitt game.

Nine lettermen, including six offensive and six defensive who participated in the bi-district game against Olton last year returned to Longhorn coach Jim Warren's team this year.

Ford likes to throw passes to Dipprey and Bennett.

Other veterans include defensive end Todd Dipprey, Tackle Gregg Taylor (6-2, 230) and guard Joe Tijerina (6-0, 190).

Floyd Farmers Fight Export Moratorium

Over 100 Floyd farmers have signed a page advertisement in this edition of the Hesperian pledging their agreement with the Grain Sorghum Producers Association to hold their grain off the market until the President of the United States releases the export moratorium on grain.

Copies of the page will be sent by Producers Cooperative Elevators to both state and national officials to register Floyd farmer's unhappiness with the moratorium.

GSPA president A. W. "Dub" Anthony, Jr. of Friona, Texas stated, "It is time for the American producers to start speaking the only language the White House apparently understands... boycott!"

The page of signatures appears on page four of the second section.

The grain farmer feels that he is being used as a political football during the harvest season . . . if the export moratorium is not lifted, the U. S. farmers will lose billions of dollars.

The farmers say they listened . . . and obeyed when the Ford administration asked them to plant enough grain to feed the world. For their trouble, they say they're left to bear the burden of surplus inventories. American farmers increased their harvested acres of wheat from 65.5 million acres last year to an estimated 68.9 million acres this year, while soybean production is up from 52.5 million to 53.5 million and corn is up 1.6 million — all in anticipation of increased world demand.

With a bumper crop in the field and restricted export markets, the United States agricultural economy and individual farmers are going to be hurt unless this moratorium is lifted immediately.

In a few weeks, the farmers say they will be forced to sell their grain at market, possibly at prices that won't be enough to meet their costs.

Council Raises Rates Salaries

The city council raised rates and salaries at its regular monthly meeting Monday night. Electrical rates were raised 10 percent taking effect with the February billing and employee salaries were raised 5 percent beginning December 1.

The council increased the utility "turn on" charge for delinquent accounts from \$3.00 to \$5.00 and upped the residential sewer rate from a \$1.00 minimum to \$2.50.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business the council turned down bids on a crane over the V-12 engine because they were too high.

Set the curfew time at 12 midnight Sunday through Thursday and 1 a.m. on Friday and Saturday nights.

Agreed to let bids for a 1976 model police car.

Agreed to sell a Ford truck chassis, a chain flailer, one Ford shredder and a 1963 Ford station wagon.

Okayed warrants from the First National Bank for \$6,000, payable in five years or before to put in underground electrical wiring in the Texas Addition.

Instructed city manager Bill Feuerbacher to start looking for a full time tax assessor-collector for the city and Mackenzie water authority tax department.

And visited with Chamber president Tommy Farris and Chamber manager Doug Frazier about creating a motel and hotel room occupancy tax to finance a tourist brochure.

School Board Handles Light Agenda

Although it was a light . . . or short agenda, some heavy subjects were discussed by the Floydada school board at its regular monthly meeting Tuesday night.

Dana Galloway visited the board and said he had left a \$350 Elkhart saxophone with the band department to sell for him. He reported the saxophone was stolen from the band hall back in July, but was only reported to the police about October 1.

Galloway said he was not to pay a commission to the band department for selling the instrument, but he felt the band officials were negligent in not reporting the burglary to the police sooner so it might be found in area hook shops. The board told Galloway it would discuss his request that the school pay for the saxophone and would tell him its decision later.

After Galloway had left the board meeting, president of the board Thomas Warren suggested that Superintendent Baker add a policy to the school's policy book whereby the school would not be responsible for personal items stolen on the school premises.

In other business, Baker told the board that the State Attorney General's ruling that students cannot be required to buy workbooks and rent uniforms would require policy changes in the Floydada school system.

The board agreed to allow the band parents to put up lights on the northwest area of the Junior High School so the band can practice marching at night. The band parents are to pay for the lights and installation, the school will pay the electricity bill if the lights are turned off when practice is finished.

The board employed Ron Pingelton to teach two classes of PE at high school each day.

All board members were present and business manager Claude Estes made the monthly financial report. Estes said tax money income was better than this time last year.

UNTIL EXPORT RESTRICTIONS ARE REMOVED

GSPA seeks farmer moratorium

A call for curtailment of any further grain sales by producers has been launched by Grain Sorghum Producers Association following an announcement by the U.S. State Department that the embargo on grain sales to Russia would be extended to other Eastern European countries, including Poland.

GSPA president A.W. "Dub" Anthony, Jr. of Friona, Tex., stated, "It is time for the American producers to start speaking the only language the White House apparently understands--boycott." Anthony called on all grain producers to join in the moratorium.

It should be the decision of all farmers not to sell any more grain until the administration gives complete and unqualified assurance that the American farmer has free access to all markets including Russia for the 1975 crop or until farmers are able to sell their grain for full parity, according to the GSPA official. The current parity on grain sorghum is \$5.16 cwt. Corn parity is \$3.07 per bushel.

Anthony stated, "Producers were given assurance at planting and also at the time of the farm bill veto that we would have free access to all world markets. The current embargo on sales to Russia is a complete reversal of these assurances and farmers should react by stopping all sales of grain until these requirements are met. It is time the administration and American consumers alike be concerned about farmer's problems."

Anthony said, "It is also time that the American consumers see whether the labor unions or the U.S. farmers control the food supply of this country. We have 'cooled it' long enough. At present, this is our only chance of making the farmers' views known."

Elbert Harp, GSPA executive director, recently telegraphed Pres. Ford and Agriculture Secretary Butz, urging them to remove export restrictions.

A White House official responded to the GSPA telegram via letter, but Harp said the response was "less than satisfactory."

The letter said, in part, "We believe additional sales to the USSR will be made but we cannot say exactly how much until we have more precise information on the size of the 1975 U.S. grain crop. Such additional purchases will be considered in terms of the interest of all Americans, farmers and consumers alike."
