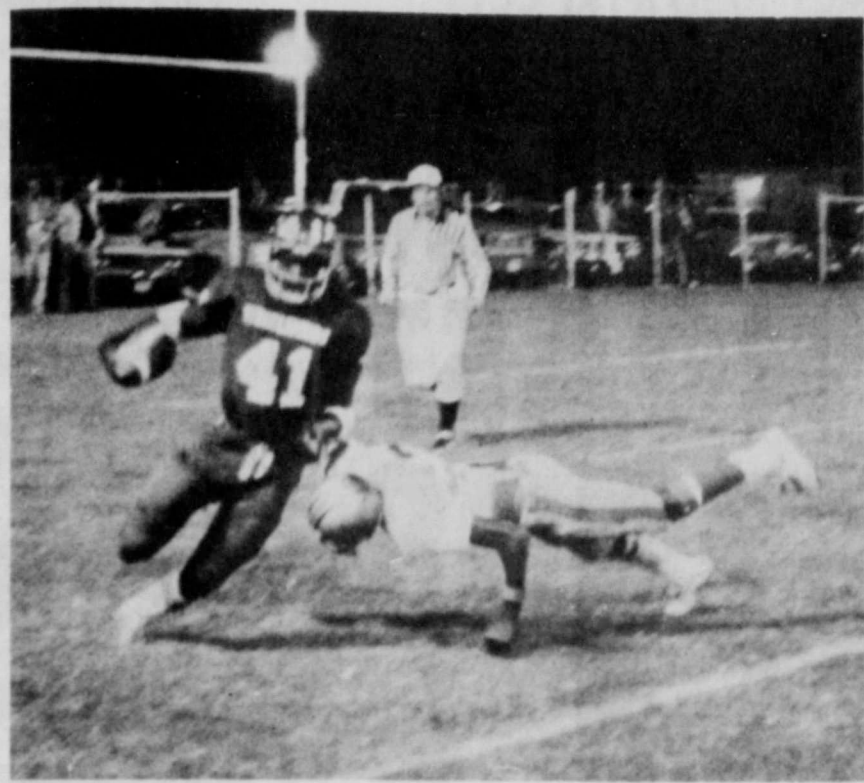


How Sweet It Is!

crashed through three Lockney tacklers, down the sideline for a beautiful 74 yard run and a TD. Micky did and the score was 16-0 with 3:23 left in the second quarter.

As the first half ended Womack had just made a good 18 yard run.

THIRD QUARTER

Elton took the Longhorn kick-off back to the Longhorn 42... he almost broke for a TD. Second play Womack has a pass intercepted and this put the Longhorns in good field position to begin their only scoring drive. Mark Sherman carried the ball five times, suffered an injury and the ball was on the Whirlwind 14 yard line. Clint Ridley made the first down and Bernie tossed the TD pass to Todd Dipprey right across the middle from 12 yards out. The two points extra were a repeat performance from Bernie to Todd right across the middle.

The score was 16-8 with 8:36 left in the third quarter... and Floydada fans were beginning to wonder how long their lead would last.

They soon had some assurance that their lead would get better. First play after the kick-off Kelvin crashes off right tackle, nearly goes down, gets his balance... blasts off for 71 yards and another TD with 8:22 left in the third quarter. A pass from Greg Goen to Kelvin was no good for the extra points. The score was 22-8.

It looked like Longhorn Roland Bennett would run the ball all the way back, after Micky's kick-off, but he was finally pulled down on the 'Wind 11 yard line. The Longhorns took a costly 15 yard penalty that eliminated the good run and put them back on their own ten yard line. The Longhorns couldn't move the ball and Bernie punted a 34 yarder.

The 'Winds had the ball on the Longhorn 46. Jones, Kelvin, Minnett,

Womack moved the ball down to the two, where Jones blasted through the middle for the TD. Micky did and the score was 29-8 with 1:21 left in the third quarter.

The Longhorns made one first down on a pass play as the quarter ended.

FOURTH QUARTER

Bernie punted a high 23 yarder as the fourth quarter began. First play Kelvin decides to create some more excitement... a 58 yard TD run this time. Micky did and Floydada led 36-8 with 11:44 left in the game.

Lockney began to make its pass plays click, made five first downs, then fumbled the ball on the 'Wind eight yard line.

Floydada couldn't go and Womack punted a 36 yarder to relieve the pressure.

Second Longhorn play and Kelvin recovered another Lockney fumble on the Lockney 40. Think Coach Wilson sidelined Kelvin at this point for a well deserved rest.

Floydada couldn't go, took some penalties and finally Womack punted a 54 yarder that just rolled and rolled.

The ball was on the Lockney 10. Longhorns tried one pass that was incomplete, then Whirlwind Danny Colston intercepted the next pass putting Floydada in good scoring position on the Longhorn 10. Micky made three, then Womack threw a pass across the middle to Elton... who juggled it, finally pulled it in for the last TD of the game. Micky did and the score was 43-8 with 0:45 left in the game. Lockney made one first down via a long pass and the game was over.

PROGRESS REPORTS

Development Company Meeting

New Floydada Development Company president O. M. Watson, Jr. presided over the first meeting of the Company in its new physical year in the First National Bank community room Thursday afternoon.

Watson passed out working plans for the new year to each person present then asked for progress reports.

David Kirk reported that plans were being completed in order to let contract for building 16 new apartments in Floydada. Watson thanked Kirk for his work on the project... also committee members Gene Ehler and John K. West.

Bill Hale reported that all survey work has been completed and agreement reached with Mrs. Ophelia Goen for purchase of a little over 73 acres of land on the southeast edge of Floydada for an industrial park and 20 acres of the 73 to be given to Texas A&M Training School.

Kinder Farris said he had met with four men who have agreed to build a 30 unit motel just west of Reed Ford Sales on the Ralls highway and preliminary plans are being made. On this committee are Hale, Alton Higginbotham, Jim Willson, Jr., and Doug Frazier.

Coach's Comments

"Of course I was just pleased beyond words with our victory over Lockney..." opening remark of Whirlwind Coach L. G. Wilson.

Wilson had nothing but praise for running back Kelvin Ratliff, who set an individual back running record since Coach Wilson has been in Floydada... over 300 yards.

"Ricky Carthel, Monte Williams, Randy Duke, Steve Moore and Kelvin" were just terrific as they crashed through and sacked the Longhorn quarterback time after time," he continued.

Coach Wilson was also highly pleased with the "footwork" of Micky Minnett who kicked a 33 yard field goal, and did a good job of kicking off and making those PATs.

"Leslie Soto really helped our offensive line... playing all the first half and some of the second half... we didn't hurt his knee... and he can see more action next week," the coach added.

Although the coach noted a few mistakes, he felt this was the first game the team was really "revved up"... he felt Lockney was set to stop a passing game and let the 'Wind ground offense get loose.

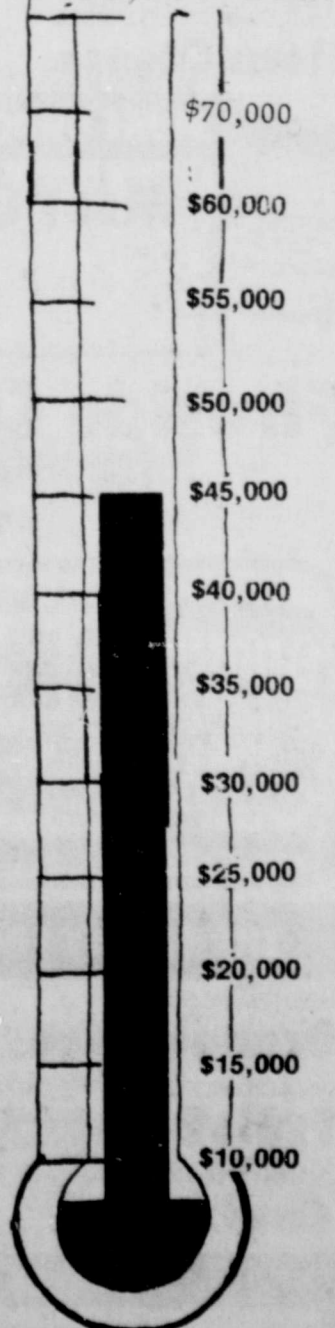
He felt that Idalou probably beat state ranked Tulia because Tulia was probably looking ahead to the Floydada game which comes up in Tulia Friday night.

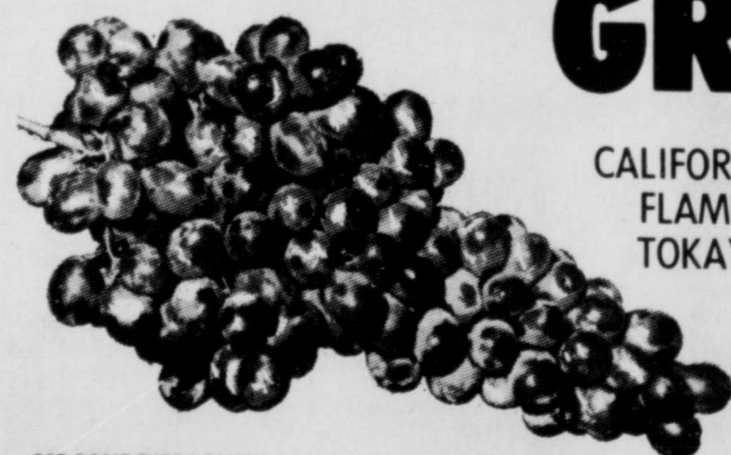

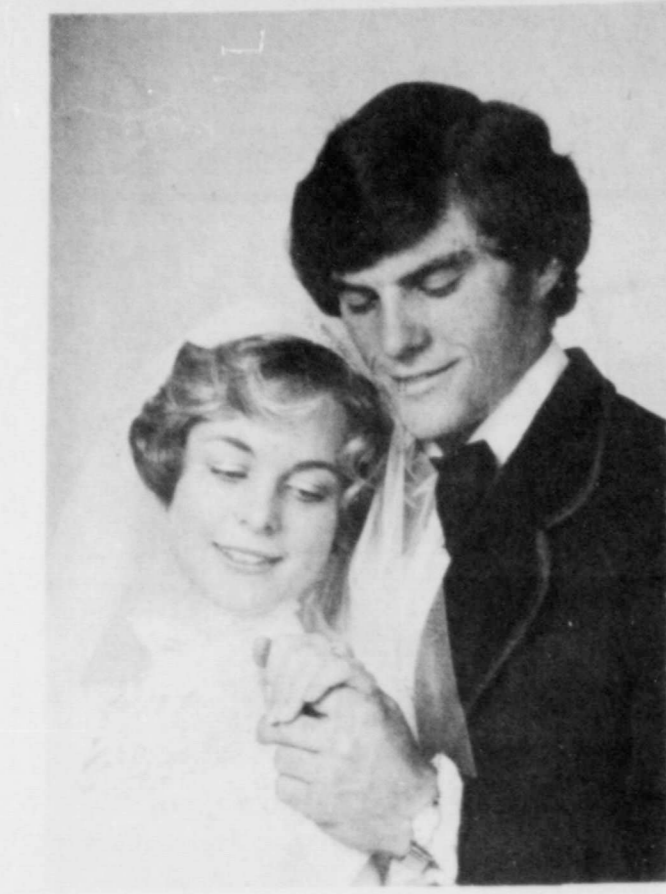

its defense at halftime and shut down Tulia's offense.

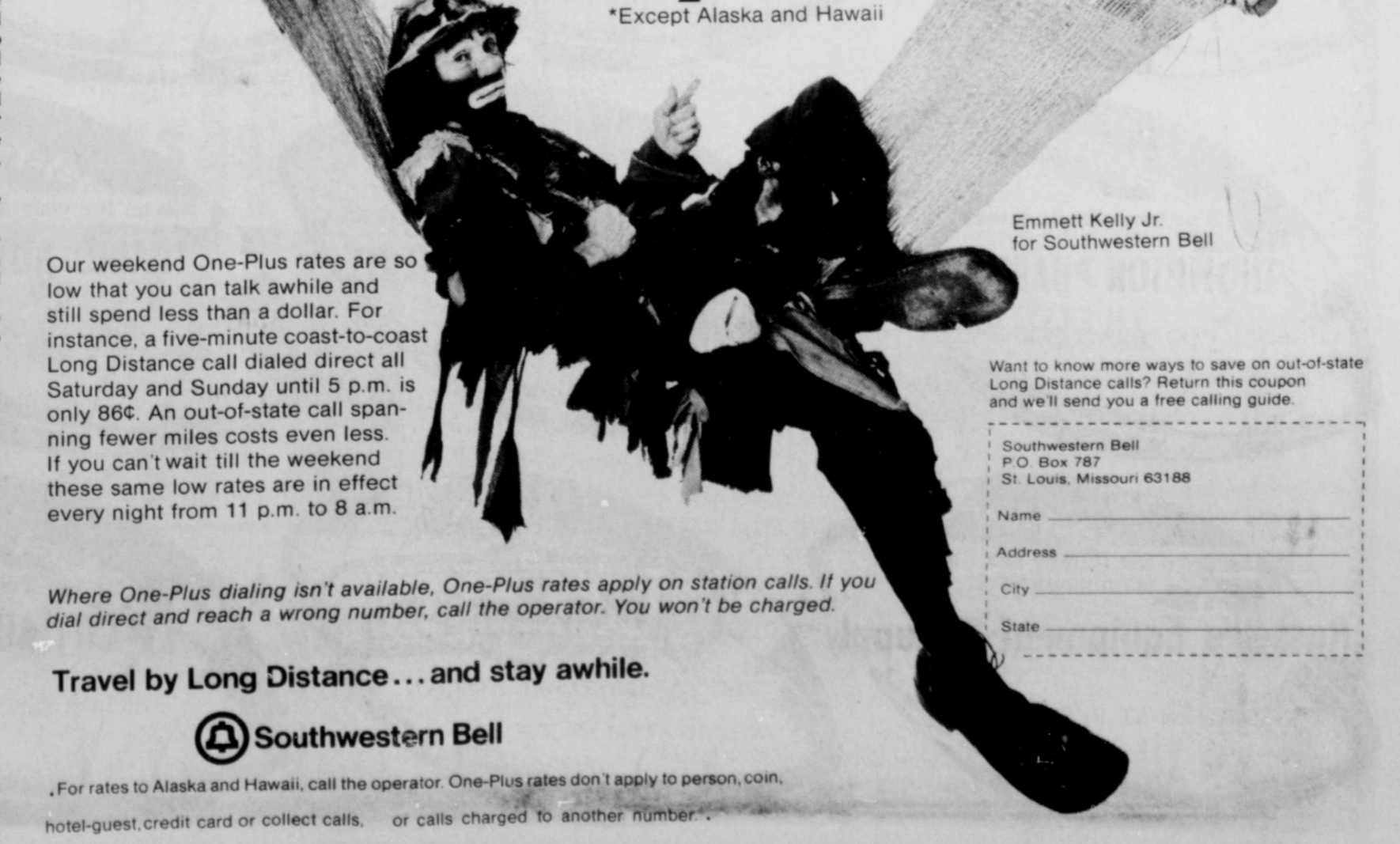
Tennis Club Play Day Tuesday

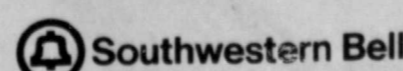

Wheat Price Drop Due Export Moratorium

The market value of the Texas wheat crop dropped 17 million dollars Monday in a 14 cent per bushel decline as a direct result of the export restriction to the USSR not having been lifted by President Ford Friday even in the wake of unprecedented record

breaking crop forecast. This brings the farm price of wheat today a full 85 cents per bushel below the level on this date a year ago and pushes "low prices" to the forefront as the number one farm problem, even over soaring fuel and machinery costs," according to Bill

Nelson, Executive Vice President of the Texas Wheat Producers Association in comments to members of the Food & Fiber Committee of Water, Inc. meeting in Plainview yesterday. In reference to the President's weekend state-

ment that the delay in promised lifting of the embargo when the October 11 crop report was out was due to "Good Ole' Yankee Horse Trading" on a better Oil-Grain deal, Nelson said that "Southerners, like the Texas wheat producers know first-hand about 'Yankee' horse trading—it cost them their Plantations just over a hundred years ago. Farmers can ill afford these carpetbagger-type techniques of depressing agricultural prices of farmers for the gain of others while our customer turn to others for their needs—such as the Russian purchases from Canada and Australia this week."

strengthen attempts to convert recent short-term purchases into long-term markets and profits for Texas and U. S. producers. Through its President, Leo Witkowski of Hereford, the Texas Wheat Producers Association has advised the President of these losses and again called for immediate lifting of the export ban.

Further, the Chairman of the Texas Wheat Producers Board, Mr. Dwight Hamilton of Olney, has been named as the only producer nationwide to be a member of a three-man trade team leaving Saturday October 18, for a three week wheat market development mission to Poland, East Germany and several Western European wheat buying countries. Farm Taxes And Exemptions In The Proposed State Constitution

and was chairman of the Agricultural Committee. In addition to his work with GSPA, Jones currently farms and is active with Plains Cotton Growers, High Plains Research Foundation and Texas Farm Bureau.

FARM SALES TAX EXEMPTION
Jones explained that approval of the finance article will exempt from sales tax farm machinery, feed, seed, fertilizer and parts. These exemptions are not presently included in the constitution. The items are exempted in the sales tax law but could not be removed by any future legislature.

TAX VALUATION OF FARM AND RANCH LAND
Another vital area to

Texas farmers deals with land tax valuation, Jones said. "Under the present constitution, land value for tax purposes must be determined by the most recent sales of land in the same area. This simply means that land speculators may establish values so high that taxes in many areas will exceed the farm or ranch gross income of the land itself," Jones said.

"If Proposition 5 is approved, it will assure that farm and ranch land tax value shall be based on its net income capacity. This will give the farmers and ranchers the same consideration that oil companies, life insurance companies and banks have on their buildings," he added.

Proposition 5 provides that the legislature shall establish separate formulas for appraising farm and ranch land.

Jones explained that the proposed change would place emphasis on the net profit of farms and ranches instead of their market value.

The legislature has already enacted a formula that would establish the net income of a farm or ranch as a basis for its taxable value. It provides that the five year average net income shall establish this basis, but this net income value shall not exceed the fair market value.

"I believe that the net income valuation for the individual farm or ranch will protect the farmer or rancher from excessive taxation," Jones said.

Proposition 5 also authorizes property tax exemptions for those over 65 years of age (\$3,000) and exemptions for veteran and other nonprofit organizations. It states that refundable assessments voted by marine food and agricultural producers shall not be classified as taxes.

In addition to the specific items of sales tax exemptions and favorable tax valuation of farm and ranch land, Jones said that Proposition 5 does not delegate any new authority to the legislature.

"In fact, it is more restrictive than the present constitution," he said.

USDA Amends Requirements Pork Sausage

AUSTIN—The number of hogs and pigs on Texas farms as of September 1 shows a decrease of 8 percent from the same period last year. At the same time, nationwide figures show a decrease of 17 percent.

As a result of both current and projected shortages of pork, federal meat inspection regulations for certain pork products have temporarily been amended by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"This is being done to assure consumers an uninterrupted supply of certain cooked sausages and similar products containing pork," Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said.

The amendment became effective September 17 and will expire July 1, 1975, when pork supplies are expected to improve.

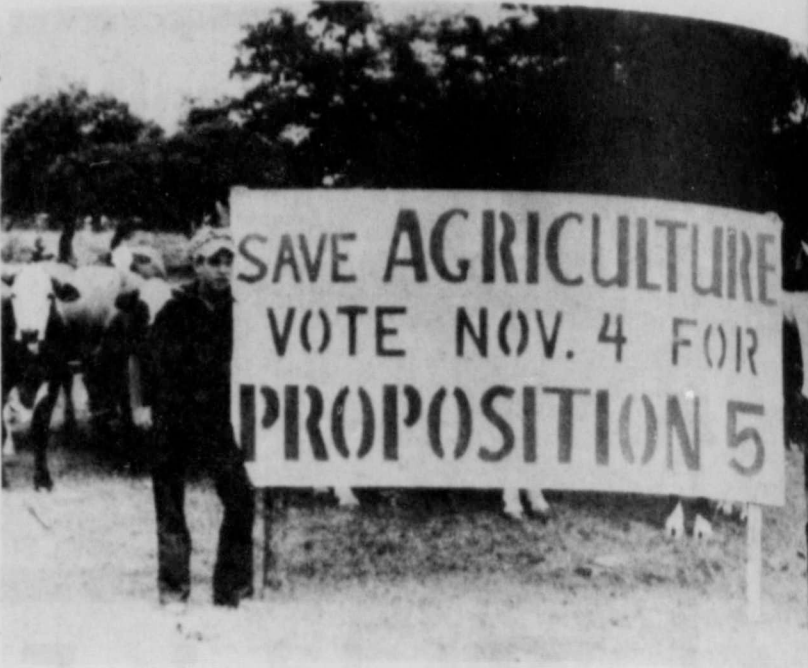
During that time, products containing two kinds of meat as the main ingredients, one of which is pork, and currently labeled

in the ingredient statement as "Beef and Pork" or "Pork and Beef" may be formulated with not less than ten percent pork.

Normally, in order to be listed as "Beef and Pork" or "Pork and Beef" neither of the two meats could be less than 30 percent of the total meat.

However, the total amount of meat in the product will not be changed since beef must be substituted for any portion of pork eliminated from the formula.

Taxpayers Support Proposition Five

Using the phrase "Save Agriculture" as their theme, a large group of Texas farm and ranch land owners have formed a political committee to push for the adoption of Proposition Five in the Constitutional election on November 4th.

Dripping Springs rancher Laverne Odell is campaign chairman of the Committee to Support Proposition Five. The Committee is now seeking the support of all Texas landowners concerned with rising property taxes and of all citizens concerned with saving Texas agriculture.

Proposition Five is the proposed Finance Article of the Texas Constitution. If adopted by the voters on November 4, Proposition Five and the implementing Act, House Bill 1535, would require that Texas farm and ranch land be taxed according to how much income it would produce. Under the new law, there would not be restrictions to prevent farmers and ranchers from qualifying as under the existing constitution. According to Odell, if agricultural land continues to be taxed at its speculative value, as most such land is under the present Constitution, most farmers and ranchers will be forced to sell their land to real estate developers who will remove the land from agricultural use. As a result, Odell fears that "One of these days we'll wake up and not have anything to eat."

Thus, he says, all Texans have something at stake in Proposition Five.

A 1966 amendment to Texas present constitution was intended to provide some tax relief to Texas landowners but, states Odell, has failed to do so because of the difficulties involved in qualifying under the present constitution does not spell out how qualified land is to be appraised.

Odell's group has posted 35 signs like the one

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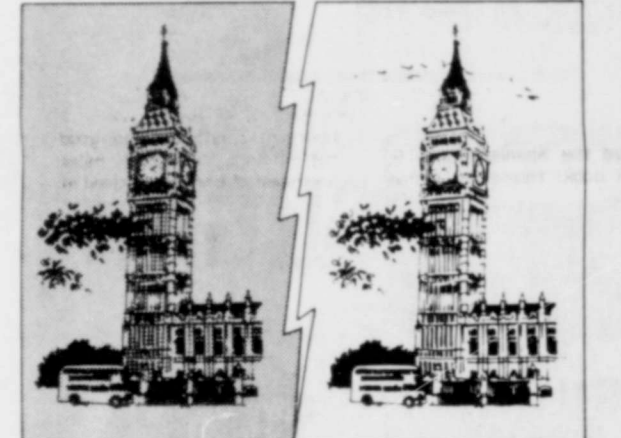

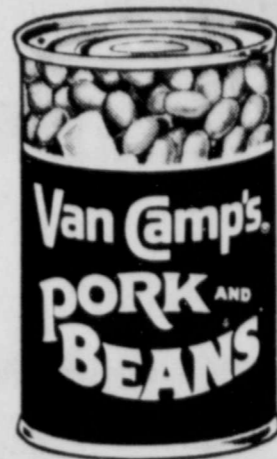

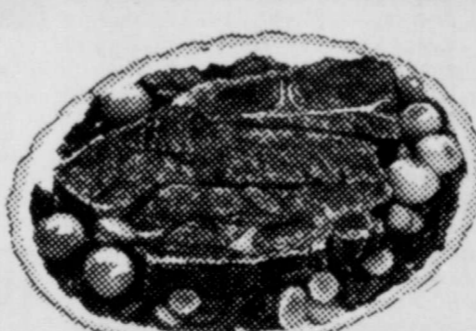
