Services for Mrs. John Barton Jarnagin, 93, a resident of the Floydada Nursing Home, will be conducted today (Thursday) at 2:30 p.m. in the First Christian Church in Floydada. Mrs. Jarnagin died at the nursing home at 5:20 p.m. Tuesday after suffering an apparent stroke.

Officiating for the service will be Rev. Ron Pingelton, pastor of the church, assisted by Melvin Byrd, minister of the City Park Church of Christ in Floydada. Burial will be in Floydada Cemetery under the direction of Moore-Rose Funeral Home.

A native of Killeen, the former Ollivette Louisa Tankersley was born November 28, 1881. She and John Barton Jarnagin were married in Killeen in 1905. The family moved to Floyd County in 1917 and resided in Lockney and South Plains Community. Mrs. Jarnagin worked with her husband, who was postmaster at South Plains until his death in 1948. ## Hale Golf Player Of The Year

Floydada Country Club golf pro Richard Hale recently won the West Texas Chapter of the Northern Texas section golf tournament which was held at the Hillcrest Country Club at Lubbock.

Richard has been trying, to win this tournament for seven or eight years and finally succeeded, Richard said. "I was even par for the 54 hole championship, in this tournament that was made up of 50 Texas golf professionals."

Richard also won "The Texas Player of the Year" award. This award is based upon the professional's scoring average for Pro-Am competition for the year. "You have to play in three major events to become eligible for this award," Richard said. The events are North Plains Country Club Pro Membership at Dumas, The Gaines County Open in Seminole, the Plainview Pro-Am and the Hillcrest Chapter Championship.

Richard's scoring average was 69.3 for nine competitive rounds.

The 4-AA District Champions Floydada Whirlwinds go into bi-district competition against 3-AA champion Olton at 7:30 Saturday night in Plainview Bulldog stadium.

The Whirlwinds enter the game with a good two week's rest and with a spirit of revenge... they want to win the bi-district championship and they also want to make good on a 32-7 loss to Olton earlier in the season.

No doubt about it... the Whirlwinds are not the same team who lost to the Mustangs earlier. Now the Winds have an experienced quarterback in Jay Womack, big Leslie Soto is back in the line, linebacker Jay Lackey is back in the lineup and the entire team has a confidence they didn't have in the earlier game.

Then there's Kelvin Ratliff, who has learned how to take off with the ball and has now carried the ball almost 1600 yards this season.

Mickey Minnett and Donzell Minner are always threats... both are good runners and catch Womack's passes. Larry Jones has learned to crash right up the middle.

**ADVANCE TICKETS**  
There are no reserve seats available, but Floydada fans may buy general admission tickets at the high school... adults \$2.50, students \$1.50. Floydada has the home side of the stadium, the west side.

**OLTON MUSTANGS**  
The Mustangs, like the Whirlwinds, have a perfect district record and have lost only to Tulia 7-0 in the opening game of the season. Their strength lies in running back Glen Johnson, 5-11, 187 pound full back who seems to have a lot of durability. If Johnson isn't carrying the ball, the Mustangs' big quarterback Jimmy Parker, 6-2, 189 lbs. is able to fall right through the middle of the line for five or six yards. Parker is also a good passer. He likes to throw to Michael Franks, 6-1, 184 and Mark Stroebel 6-3, 167.

In last week's 33-12 victory over the Dimmitt Bobcats, Olton was ahead 19-16 in first downs, total yards 545-291 and behind in yards passing 114-125.

Dimmitt was in a 6-6 tie with Olton at halftime.

For comparison, Olton is probably a taller team, but the Whirlwind offensive line is a little heavier. The defensive lines are about the same weight.

Olton's Glen Johnson has been a starter for four years, Parker, Frank, J. D. Caudle, Ray Rodriguez, Kevin Workman and Mark Stroebel are all three year veterans.

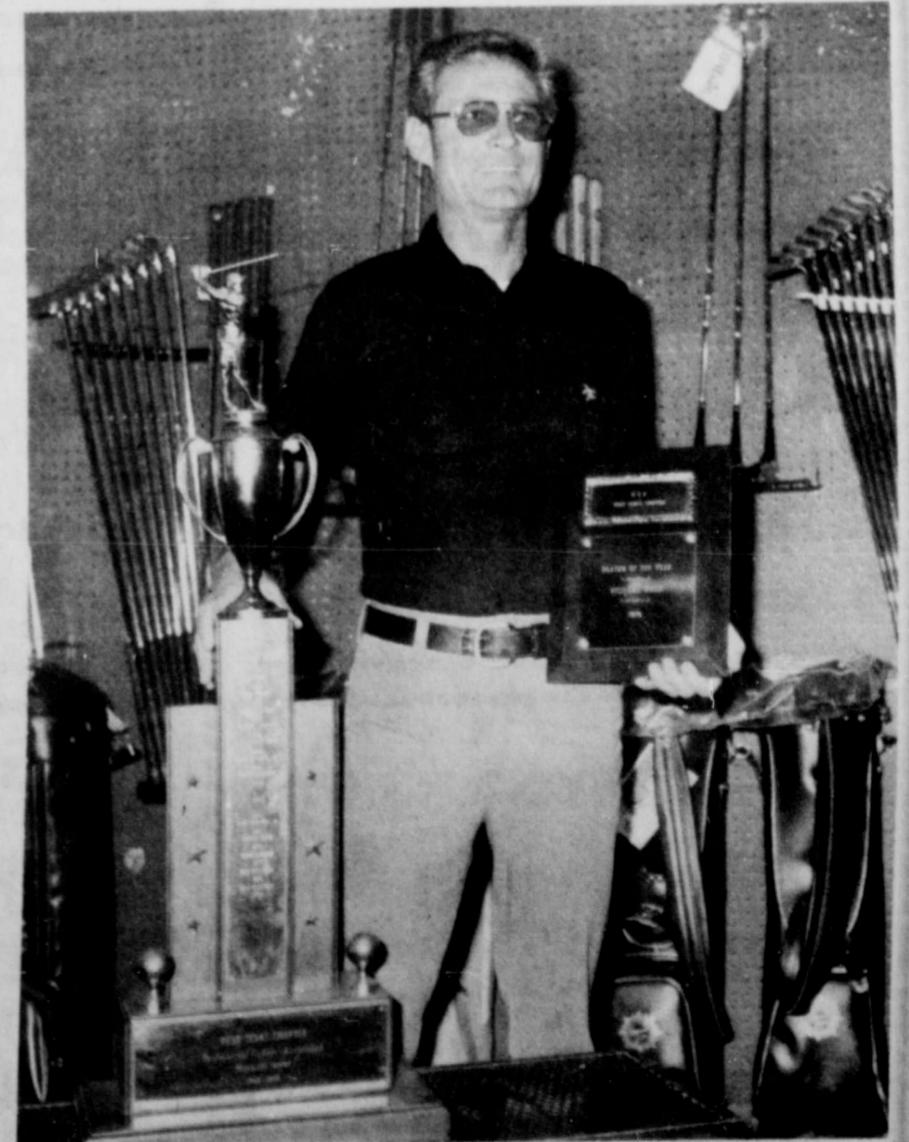

### Veteran Widows Purchase Homes With GI Loan

More than 400 widows of servicemen who died of service-connected causes and wives of men listed as missing in action purchased homes with loans guaranteed by the Veterans Administration during fiscal year 1975, Jack Coker, VA Regional Director, reported today.  
 The GI home loans were among 292,856, guaranteed by the VA during FY 1975. Included were 21 loans to wives of men listed by the

Department of Defense as missing in Southeast Asia.  
 More than 8.8 million veterans and eligible dependents have borrowed \$113.5 billion under the VA loan guaranty program since 1944. It was noted that entitlement was extended in 1950 to include unremarried spouses of veterans whose deaths resulted from military service during or after World War II.  
 The maximum GI loan is \$17,500. This is the amount

the VA will guarantee private lenders making loans to veterans for buying, building or improving homes. The VA guarantee permits loans without large down payments, required for conventional loans, to purchase homes with capital attracted by the guarantee. There is no requirement by the VA for a down payment by purchasing a home there a guarantee charge by the loans. There is no date on loan eligible veterans. 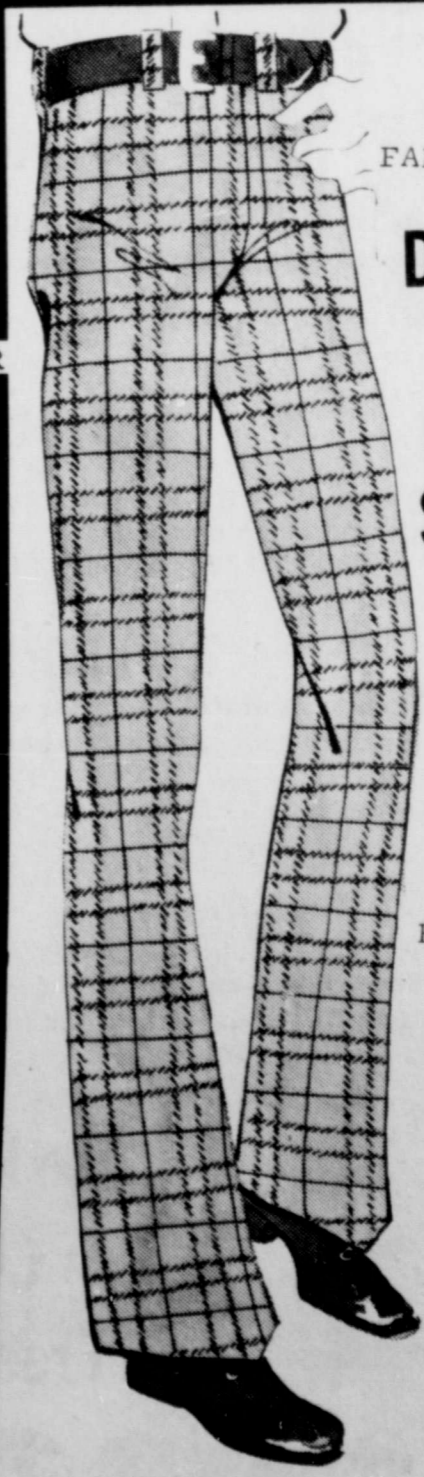

**Cattle Outlook Hinges On Grain Price**

**COLLEGE STATION** - Grain prices will have a big influence on the livestock outlook for this fall and next year, contends a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. Ed Uvacek points out that whether grain prices go up or down will affect both fed and feeder cattle prices.

"If grain prices stay high, the number of cattle placed in feedlots this fall will probably not be high enough to cause supply problems next spring and summer," says Uvacek. "That could mean higher fed cattle prices next year."

"On the other hand, if

grain prices ease down somewhat as the harvest season moves forward, placements will be large and fed cattle marketings by next spring and summer could be burdensome. This would, however, in the short run provide more strength for feeder cattle prices than if grain prices stay high."

Uvacek says that early fall sales of feeder cattle were much higher than summer levels and that even though fed cattle marketings will not be large, they will be up from recent levels. Many nonfed cattle will also be slaughtered during the next three months, and this could lower fed cattle prices, says the specialist with the Texas A&M University System.

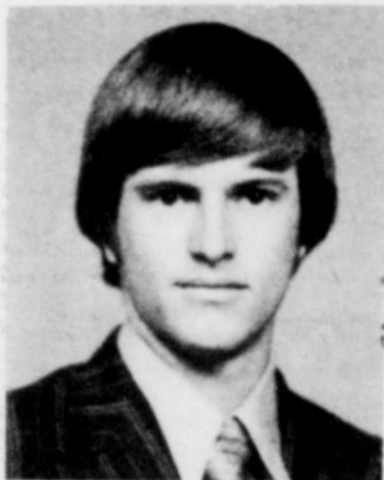

**United Nations Visited By Carol Cogdell**

STAUNTON, Va. -- On most college campuses nowadays, there is a lot of learning going on outside of the classroom. A good example is the recent trip to the United Nations by Mary Baldwin College students.

Accompanied by a political science professor, the students spent two days observing the United Nations "in action."

Perhaps the highlight of the visit by Mary Baldwin students was the visit to the Soviet Union's Mission, where representatives to the U. N. work closely with their advisors on upcoming issues in the General Assembly.

Students were allowed to ask questions of the two guides who welcomed them to the Soviet Mission. Commenting on their visit, Carol Cogdell, a sophomore at the Virginia woman's college, described the facility as "drab" and the security as "tight." She continued, "There were two guides who greeted us and the older one seemed to watch the younger one...it was all propaganda."

Miss Cogdell is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. M. Cogdell, Jr., of Lockney. She graduated from Floydada High School.

When asked a question by the professor concerning the Breshnev doctrine, the older guide informed the group that a doctrine, as such, did not exist. "Sometimes I felt like he was avoiding the questions," said sophomore Cindy Shuffelbarger; but summing up her experience as being very interesting and the advisors to the group as very nice. Although Miss Cogdell termed the visit interesting, she did say however, that "it made me realize how people in the Soviet Union are suppressed."
