



Now the 'Winds have an experienced quarterback in Jay Womack, big Leslie Soto is back in the line, linebacker Jay Lackey is back in the lineup and the entire team has a confidence they didn't have in the earlier result.

Fhor there's Kelvin Ratliff, who has learned how to take off with the ball and has now carried the ball almost 1600 yards this season.

Mickey Minnett and Donzell Minner are always threats. both are good pumpers and catch Womack's passes. Larry dones has learned to crash right up the middle.

If Johnson isn't carrying the ball, the Mustang's big quarterback Jimmy Parker, 6-2, 189 is hable to fall tight through the middle of the line for five or six yards. Parker is also a good passer. He likes to throw to Michael Franks, 6-1, 184 and Mark Stroebel 6-3,

In last week's 33-12 victory over the Dimmitt Bobeats, Olton was ahead 19-16 in first downs, total yards 515-291 and behind in yards passing 114-125.

Dimmitt was in a 6-6 tie with Olton



Veteran Widows Purchase

Homes With GI Loan

More than 400 widows of servicemen who died of service-connected causes and wives of men listed as missing in action purchased homes with loans guaran-teed by the Veterans Administration during fiscal year 1975, Jack Coker, VA Regional Director, reported

The GI home loans were among 292,856, guaranteed by the VA during FY 1975.

Included were 21 loans to

Department of Defense as missing in Southeast Asia. More than 8.8 million

veterans and eligible dependents have borrowed \$113.5 billion under the VA loan quaranty program since 1944. It was noted that entitlement was extended in 1950 to include unremarried spouses of veterans whose deaths resulted from mili-

tary service during or after World War II.

The maximum GI loan is \$17,500. This is the amount

the VA will guarantee private lenders making loans to veterans for buying, building or improving homes. The VA guarantee permits loans without large down payments, required for conventional loans, to purchase homes with capital attracted by the guarantee.
