DEPOSITORY BANKS WILL REPAY STATE

There Will Be Due Approximately \$1,000,000 On Or Before December 31.

Austin. Tex - It now transpires that of the approximately \$1,000,000 of state funds tied up in depository banks, which obtained an extension within which to repay the state, not one dollar of it belongs to the general revenue or to the school fund. A statement to this effect was made Wednesday by State Treasurer Terrell. The \$1.000,-900 belongs to various other state unds, of which there are quite a num-

It was further announced by the the time for these banks to repay the state funds because of the possibility of the next legislature repealing the present law, which authorized such ex-

None of the extensions go beyond December 31 and a number expire before that date. Most of them will be able to repay all or part of the state's money, Mr. Terrell said. Some will

"Our policy," declared Mr. Terrell, will be to hold these applications in beyance until the legislature can inicate its policy, either by repealing he present law or permitting us to take further extensions. R.R. LABOR BOARD ON "LIVING WAGE" PLEA

Board Declare Idea Communistic.

Chicago, Ill.-Attacking the theory of the "living wage" as a basis for de termining the wages of railroad workers, the public and railroad groups of the United States railroad labor board an opinion made public Monday delared that such a course "if carried to, its legitimate conclusion would wreck every railroad in the United States and if extended to other industries would carry them into communistic

The opinion in the form of a reoinder to a dissenting opinion filed by K. O. Wharton, labor leader in the reof maintenance of way employes two cents an hour, declared that if the employes were granted a 72 to 75 cent minimum wage for common labor with corresponding differentials for other classes, an increase of 125.7 per cent in the nation's railroad wage bill would be necessary. This opinion, he said, would add \$3,112,952,387 to the annual payroll, bringing it to \$5,589,445,993, which would mean, it added, an annual deficit to the carriers of \$2,241,639,518.

Even if the 48-cent minimum wage requested by maintenance of way mion men were granted and corresponding changes were made for other classes of employes, the opinion said an increase of 50.45 per cent in wages would be necessary, adding \$1,249,390, 994 to the annual wage bill of the roads, bringing it up to \$3,725,884,540, thus forcing the carriers to face an annual deficit of \$378,078,125.

The phrase "living wage" was term ed in the opinion as "a bit of mellifluceive the unthinking."

Mr. Wharton's dissenting opinion, and the supporting opinion in reply are attached to the formal decision increasing the pay of the maintenance of way employes 2 cents an hour, establishing minimums ranging from 25 to 37 cents. The United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employes and order affecting 400,000 men in abeyance last July after the board had reduced wages pending a request for an increase based on the contention that A man may be as old as he feels, living had advanced and wages in other industries had been raised.

When the case came before the board, the maintenance of way employes asked the board to subscribe to the principle of the "living wage" pased on a budget of what was rejuired for an average family of five persons to live in health and reasonable comfort. A majority of the board refused to subscribe to this principle. asserting that the transportation act calls for establishing a "just and reaonable" wage and that a just and reaonable wage was in effect a living

The maintenance of way organization asked the board to establish minimum rates of pay of 48 cents an hour o replace rates then in effect ranging rom 23 to 35 cents. After a deadlock lasting several days the board made public its decision handed down Sunday increasing rates of pay 2 cents an hour and adding about \$20,000,000 to the railroad payroll.



PROPER MANAGEMENT OF CAR

Running Expenses May Be Reduced by Making Stope Gradually-Also Start Slowly.

When making a stop, close the throttle and withdraw the clutch at a momentum to carry the car forward intil a very slight pressure on the brake brings it to a standstill. Constantly practiced, this little saving will subtract a nice margin from the running expenses. In accelerating, do so gradually, as the engine then uses the entire quantity of fuel fed it, whereas in quick acceleration it gets more than it can employ for the moment.-Farm

PROPER CARE OF REAR AXLE

Lubrication and Correct Adjustment Are Most Important-Avoid Excessive Use of Oil.

The two most important items in the care of the rear axle unit are proper lubricating and correct adjustment. The unit includes the differential, axle shafts and their housing The gears comprising the differential must turn continuously in oil, usually a very heavy kind, but too much oil should not be used as the excess may work along the axie shafts to the brakes and cause slipping.

You Auto Know

That if the car stops dead in the road the first thing to doafter looking to see if there is a sufficient quantity of gas, oil and water-is to crank the engine, taking care that the gears are in neutral. If the engine turns over hard, this indicates trouble with either the lubricating or cooling system. If it turns over fairly easily, it is not necessary to search for troubles along either of these lines.

The next point to be taken into consideration is that of compression. This can be determined by opening the petcocks on all the cylinders save one and turning the crank two revolutions, noting if there is a resistance during one-fourth of the revolution the two complete turns. Each cylinder should be tested in this manner and, if one is very weak, the trouble will generally be found in the exhaust valve, or in the inlet valve. The vacuum system leading from the gasoline tank should next come under suspicion and finally the ignition system and the spark plugs should be examined, remembering that, after all, the trouble may lie in such a "triffe" as a loose or wet wire or a speck of dirt in the carburetor. 

FASCISTI NOW IN **CONTROL AT ROME**

Benito Mussolini, the Fascists Leader, Names Members of New Cabinet.

Rome.—The triumphant entry of Fascisti troops into Rome Thursday was the apotheosis of Italy's bloodless revolution. Old Romans who witnessed the entry of the soldiers of the King of Italy into the capital of his newly welded kingdom on September 20, 1870, wept for joy and vowed that October 31, 1922, will forever mark a great epoch in Italy's national life. For today she has been saved from

The younger generation, which in a few days accomplished this tremendous change in Italy's political aspect, will look back upon their youthful leader, Benito Mussolini, as those veterans with dimmed eyes Thursday recalled Garibaldi! Rome.-Fascismo now governs all

Italy. With completion of his cabinet Tuesday Benito Mussolini had rigorously carried the first objective of the fascisti's program-selection of only such men of the highest technical competence.

"Not a ministry, but a government," he had promised a great throng earlier in the day and the personnel of his cabinet, overwhelmingly fascisti, indicates his intention to make that government tunill the ideals of fas-

Thus is completed one of the most amazing "bloodless" revolutions in nodern history. Twenty-four hours ago thousands of fascisti, armed and well supplied with ammunition, were concentrated at the gates of Rome and other strategic points, ready to act on a signal from their leader. But King Victor Emmanuel, overruling the Facta faction, which insisted that a state of iege be declared, summoned Mussolini and asked him to form a government. At this moment revolution, possibly civil war, was averted.







Year's Budget Stresses Relief and Services at Home and Overseas.

MILLIONS FOR VETERAN AID Over \$3,000,000 Allotted to the Disabled-Foreign Work Lessens.

Washington.-Expenditures totaling \$0,739,872.47 for carrying through its program of services and relief during the fiscal year in the United States and overseas are authorized in the budget of the American Red Cross, effeetive July 1, 1922. This total is \$2. 735,975 less than the expenditures for the last fiscal year, when disbursements reached \$12,475,847.69, it is announced at National Headquarters in a statement emphasizin; the necessity of continued support of the organization by enrollment during the annual Roll Call, November 11-November 30 thelusive. This total for the budget is exclusive of the large financial operations of the 3,300 active Red Cross Chapters, which, it is estimated, will more than double the total.

War Veterane Have First Call First call on Red Cross funds is for the disabled ex-service men, of whom 27.487 were receiving treatment from the Government on June 1 last. 
