AIRPLANE ACCIDENT AT SANDERSON

Last Sunday morning five planes left Kelly Field for Tucson, Arizona, to join in the search for Col. Francis Marshall and Lt. E. L. Webber, missing since Thursday, December 7th. One of the planes piloted by Lt. W. L. Carson, fell 40 miles west of San Antonio, near Medina Lake. He was not injured. Another plane carrying Capt. W. T. Hays, commanding the squadron, and Buck Weaver, mechanic, formerly stationed at Sanderson, crashed at the aviation field here at 4:15 Sunday afternoon, going through two fences before coming to a stop, damaging both wings of the plane and otherwise smashing it. Luckily neither of the men were hurt.

The other three planes of the five leaving Kelly Field piloted by Lts. E. S. Selzer, R. H. Clark and W. L. Wheeler passed through Sanderson about 8:30 Sunday afternoon arriving at Ft. Bliss that evening at 6:30.

The damaged plane remained here to make repairs until Tuesday. After all repairs being completed they continued on to Ft. Bliss, en-route to join the other planes in the search of the missing officers near Tucson, Arizona.

At the time this was written no trace of the missing officers had been found.

IS STILL A MYSTERY TO CHEMISTS

Men of Science Have Not Yet Discovered the Real Nature of the X-Ray.

It was in 1895 that Prof. Conrad Roentgen, the famous German physicist, announced the discovery of the fact that if a current of electricity be passed through a certain kind of glass bulb, from which the air had been exhausted, the resultant "light" (so called in spite of the fact that it is not apparent to the eye), would penetrate the flesh and other solid substances and reveal objects on the other side. For want of a better name to give to this disturbance of the ether, Professor Roentgen called it the X-ray, "x" being the accepted symbol for an unknown quantity.

The real nature of the X-ray is still undiscovered. The ray itself is generated by a battery, the wires of which are connected with two electrodes, one of which is a concave disc of aluminum and the other a flat disc of platinum. The current is then discharged through a glass vacuum tube and produces the ether disturbance which renders flesh or clothing semi-transparent, while glass, metals, bones and mineral substances are generally opaque to it.
