### Soldier Shoots Self Accidentally.

Richard Allan, a negro truck driver for the Motor Truck Brigade of the 24th U. S. Infantry, shot himself accidentally with a 41-calibre Colts pistol, at about 6:45 o'clock Thursday evening, out at the aviation grounds.

The Motor Truck Brigade composed of about 25 trucks and a gasoline supply truck and an ambulance, are enroute from Columbus, New Mexico, to the Pecos high bridge and stopped here to distribute hay and other supplies for the cavalry regiment that is following them, enroute for Fort Clark.

It seems that the fatal accident occurred in this way: Richard Allan was dipping gasoline out of a tank, using a bucket for the purpose. In lifting the bucket it caught on the handle of his pistol and the pistol was jerked from the scabbard and fell and was discharged, the bullet (a 41-calibre) entering Allan's right side and passing almost through lodged near the left side. He was at once placed in an ambulance and taken to Dr. Robertson's office where he was given first aid attention and his wound dressed by the doctor.

At 6:10 Friday morning he was placed on No. 109 to be taken to the army hospital at Marfa, but died just as the train reached Marfa, about one hour after leaving Sanderson.

Allan's home was in St. Louis, Mo. Lieut. George Ferguson, who was in charge of the brigade said that Allan was one of the best soldiers under his command.
