John Tippett Shot

John Tippett, a ranchman living near Sheffield, was shot by a Mexican late Monday evening.

The first news of the tragedy reached Sanderson about noon Tuesday in a telephone message received by Sheriff Harrell from Sheriff Barker of Pecos county. The description given of the Mexican by Sheriff Barker was as follows: About 28 years old, 5 feet and 7 inches high, thick lips and big teeth, wearing a white hat and brown pants, and carrying a rifle. All ranchmen in Terrell county should keep a close lookout for this hombre as it is reported he is headed in this direction. There is a reward of \$250 offered for him. His name is Juan Hernandez.

Although shot twice, Mr. Tippett is reported to be getting along fine.

Tuesday evening Sheriff Harrell scouted over the country west and north of town, while Deputy Sheriff Parsons searched the country in the neighborhood of Dryden. Near the Big Canon Ranch, Sheriff Harrell met Sheriff Barker who had been searching the territory between Fort Stockton and Big Canon Ranch. The two Sheriffs held a short conference, after which Sheriff Barker left for Sheffield and Sheriff Harrell returned to town.

At the present writing no clue as to the Mexican's whereabouts has been found.

PROCEEDINGS OF TEXAS LEGISLATURE

Many Measures Now Before Both the Senate and House.

Friday's Senate Proceedings. Austin, Tex.—The senate Friday adjourned until Monday to give committees an opportunity to consider bills. Senators Witt, Davis, Burkett and Wood of Williamson were appointed as a committee to count the vote for governor and lieutenant governor cast in the last general election and to make arrangements in behalf of the senate for the inauguration.

The senate adopted house concurrent resolution inviting Roy A. Haynes, national prohibition director, to address a joint session of the senate and house Jan. 27. The contingent expense bill, making an appropriation of \$40,000, and the mileage and per diem bill, appropriating \$125,000, were signed by the lieutenant governor in the presence of the senate.

Friday's House Proceedings. Austin, Tex.—House bills introduced Friday: By Mrs. Williams—Requiring physician's certificate for issuance of marriage licenses.

By Mrs. Williams—Making the mother's pension applicable in cases of women whose husbands are in asylums or penitentiaries as well as widows.

By Mrs. Williams—Increasing the number of compulsory school days per year to 140 and the age to 18.

By Baldwin—Making a physician's certificate necessary to issuance of marriage licenses.

By Jasper—Providing for return of pension warrants in case of death of pensioners.

By Pope—Extending time for construction of chartered railroads and branches.

By Abney—Providing the order of payment of fraternal insurance policies where a beneficiary is not named or has died.

By Satterwhite—Extending the life of the commission of appeals.

By Rogers—Increasing payments and lengths of periods under workmen's compensation act.

By Culp—Defining who are competent to make wills, excluding opium users.

By Stroder—Prohibiting the teaching of evolution in any institution supported by taxation.

By Sparkman—Making chicken theft felony.

Thursday's Senate Proceedings. Austin, Tex.—Bills introduced in the senate Thursday:

By Pollard—Providing that failure to redeem bogus checks within ten days after notice of check's worthlessness is given constitutes prima facie evidence of guilt on the part of the signer.

By Doyle—Broadening the scope of the nepotism law to prevent the "swapping" of relatives as employees by state officials.

By Doyle—Bill to reorganize the state ranger force, providing for five rangers from each senatorial district, or a total of 155 in addition to headquarters company. Rangers other than members of the headquarters company would be placed on reserve basis, to be called into active service only as needed and when needed from districts in section of the state where need is felt. Each ranger would furnish horse and saddle and would be furnished with arms and ammunition.

By Stewart—Providing that giving of a bogus check to a hotel, apartment or boarding house owner or operator constitutes violation of the law against obtaining valuables under false pretenses and embezzlement; making lack of sufficient funds to cover check so given prima facie evidence of guilt.

By Stewart—Amending present law so that where jewels or money are stolen from a hotel where vaults are kept for the purpose of protecting guests and notice of such is given, hotels are exempt from liability for value of articles stolen.

Thursday's House Proceedings. Austin, Tex.—Bills offered in the house Thursday included the following general measures:

By Shires—Authorizing counties to retain 90 per cent of automobile registration fees.

By Hull—Regulating sanitary condition of bakeries and prescribing uniform weights.

By Hull—Permitting the adoption of minors only as legal heirs.

By Hull—Requiring the publication of all city charters and amendments to them.

By Hull—Permitting financial corporations to enlarge scope of purchasable securities.

Forests Pay.

Twenty-eight states are about to have their treasuries enriched by sums from the United States government, which are derived by timber sales, grazing permits or other sources of revenue for the last year in the operation of the national forests. The sum aggregates about \$1,000,000. California, where the national timber lands last year returned to the government \$528,765, leads the list and will receive \$137,191 for the school fund and \$828,767 for national forest funds and trails. Oregon is second, while Idaho, Arizona and Colorado follow in the order named.

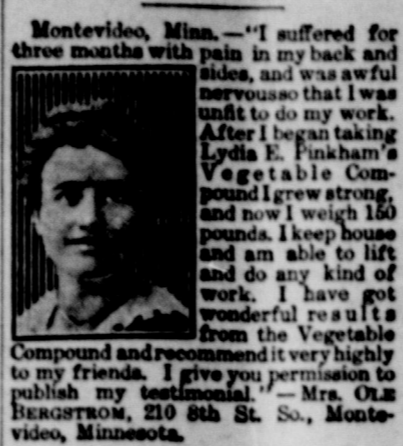

Texas News

There is now available in the general revenue fund of the state treasury \$168,897 and all warrants drawn against that fund up to and including No. 15699 will be paid when presented, State Treasurer Terrell announced this week.

The attorney general has approved the following bonds: City of Ennis, serials, 5 1/2%, \$60,000 school, \$50,000 hospital and \$35,000 water and sewer. Also \$48,000 Liberty County special road bonds.

The Troup State Bank of Troup, Smith County, has been granted a charter by the state banking board.

The midwinter business session of the Texas Press Association has been scheduled to be held in Austin Thursday and Friday, Feb. 8 and 9. This is the first midwinter meeting of the association has held and was ordered through the change of by-laws at the Denton meeting last June.

In its biennial report submitted to the governor, the bureau of labor statistics shows that among other industries covered in Texas, 297 dry goods stores report a total of 13,915 employees, 8718 of whom are females. Wages paid these employees during the year ending August 31, 1922, amounted to \$9,474,591.

It is estimated that an unexpected top crop of 2,000 bales will be gathered by Bell County farmers as a result of the mild weather that has prevailed. Most of the additional cotton comes from east of Temple, where some picking is still in progress. It will add \$300,000 more than anticipated to the value of the 1922 crop.

The winter drouth through which Central Texas is passing is distressing the farmers, who find their plowing seriously interfered with. Breaking the soil has stopped in many sections. There has been one general good rain this winter. Many oil drilling rigs are also shut down due to lack of water for steaming.

George Findlay Simmons has resigned as a member of the faculty of the University of Texas to accept appointment as chief office deputy in the state game, fish and oyster department and also to act as zoologist in that department. He succeeds Chief Deputy Tisdale, who has been connected with the department for some time.

Texas mines produced 600,000 ounces of silver in 1922, according to Charles W. Henderson of the United States geological survey, department of the interior. The Presidio mine at Shafter, which has been in steady operation since 1885, continued to contribute the bulk of the output. Several small lots of silver ore were shipped from prospects in the southwestern countries bordering the Rio Grande.

The second annual conference on education, citizenship and home welfare will be held at the University of Texas, Feb. 6-9, inclusive, according to a statement given out by T. H. Shelby, director of the bureau of extension. The conference is in response to requests of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, Texas Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teacher Associations and Texas League of Women Voters.

The railroad commission has authorized the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railway to apply a rate of 9c per 100 pounds on crude and fuel oil, in carloads, from Galveston, Texas City and Houston to Gulfhill. The rate authorized is not to affect rates to, from and between intermediate points, and not to be used for basing purposes in making through rates from other points of origin or to other points of destination.

The Williamson County commissioners court has ordered \$27,500 paid on estimates presented on work on the bridge over the San Gabriel at Georgetown, Circleville bridge on the Georgetown-Taylor road and the Taylor-Thorndale, Jarrell, Hutto and Liberty Hill roads. It is estimated that these constructions will be completed by March and ready for the use of the public. When completed a direct highway through Williamson County will give a short route through the Georgetown section on the Dallas-Fort Worth-San Antonio road.

The farmers of the Casa Blanca section have organized a broom corn association as a branch of the Texas Farm Bureau with the following officers: William Wiede, president; Frank Stepka, vice president; J. P. Heaton, secretary-treasurer; Messrs. Harris and Etheridge, field managers. About 250 acres have already been pledged and this amount will likely be increased considerably before planting time. This is the first time that broom corn has received attention from Jackson County farmers.

The attorney general has approved two issues of Bryan city bonds, serials, 5%, \$32,000 for paving and grading of streets and \$10,000 for remodeling of schools.

In a new cistern filter, shown in Popular Mechanics Magazine, water entering at the top from a downspout flows over a slanting screen, which allows leaves and coarse material to be washed out through an outlet near the top. The water with fine dirt passes down into a chamber at the bottom, and as the rain increases rises through an inner charcoal chamber and reaches the cistern through an interior pipe. When the rain ceases, the clear water in the charcoal chamber backwashes the sediment through a small hole at the bottom of the filter, which is constantly draining sediment at a loss of about 10 per cent of water.

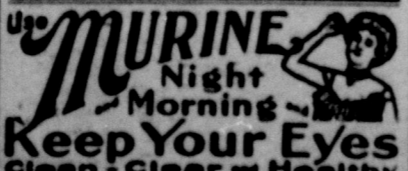

NEEDS OF TEXAS SCHOOL SYSTEM

Governor Addresses Legislature, Outlining Prospective Measures.

Austin, Tex.—Governor Neff addressed a joint session of the legislature Friday, called, as he said, at his own request, and plead for harmony and co-operation between the executive and legislative branches of the government, reminding the members that they are yoked together as co-workers for the people of Texas. He outlined part of his legislative desires and informed the membership that he would transmit messages shortly dealing with the various problems now confronting the state, such as law enforcement and prison matters.

Governor Neff's reception probably outvalued any similar occasion in the history of the Texas legislature. When the chief executive appeared shortly after 11 a. m. the entire assembly arose and cheered for several minutes.

Acknowledging the demonstration, Governor Neff declared that the body sought to honor the high office and not the man and that he had come to them to talk not as the administration leader but as one of the workers for the people. He declared that "we are yoke-fellows in the service of the state," and that there will be no "pet" measures suggested by him. He would have no personal representation in either body, he declared, and while he would outline other recommendations in later messages, he would submit them at their face value only.

Promising a message on law enforcement in a short while, the governor declared that three men were being killed in Texas every day and that he would fight the lawless element with his back to the wall.

"I am against raising the taxes of the land owners and others already overburdened," the governor said. "I am looking for new sources of wealth and untouched resources. And if we don't get the money for our schools and roads there, it will be just because you and I don't do it."

"With our state producing 10,000,000 barrels of oil monthly, the oil interests are not contributing to this government as they ought to. They are draining Texas dry. These interests and others taking out our natural resources ought to come like patriotic citizens and pay up gladly. But if they don't, I am in favor of the strong arm of the law going and getting the money for the boys and girls and the good roads."

Neff announced he will report in a few days on the work of the textbook board, which he said was created by the legislature and spends the people's money. He also indicated he will report on the Texas ranger force and their use in enforcing the open port law.

A message will be sent later on education, Neff said. In outlining what he wants in the way of educational legislation, the governor said that to purchase a first class educational system \$50 must be spent on every school child. He proposed that the state furnish \$25 of this and the local district \$25.

"But there's something more to providing for our schools than paying out money," the governor said. "Last year \$28,000,000 came into the treasury and \$25,000,000 was paid out in the name of education. I ask if the children received \$25,000,000 worth of education. We've been merely paying out money too long, and not paying attention to the educational system."

Texas must do something for its good roads system or lose \$32,000,000 of federal aid money, the governor said. He declared the building of good roads to be closely allied with education.

"Texas is building roads on the theory that her highways are county systems," he said. "The counties have voted \$100,000,000 to build roads, yet we have no system of state highways."

Discussing taxation, the governor said that the tax laws are so unfair and unjust they are nauseating. "The worst feature about our tax laws is that they do not collect taxes on one-half of our wealth," he continued. "Sure, we collect on the man who owns a farm. He has been bearing the bulk of the burden all these years."

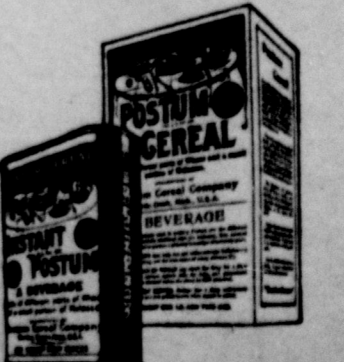

Of Interest to Stockmen

(The following letter is from the U. S.
 Bureau of Animal Industry, Washing-
 ton, D. C.)

Mr. E. W. Hardgrave,
 Sanderson, Texas.

Dear Sir—This office is in re-
 ceipt of a letter from Hon. C. B.
 Hudspeth, requesting that you
 be furnished information regard-
 ing treatment for "creeps" in
 cattle, with suggestions of treat-
 ment for a possible mineral de-
 ficiency in the feed of cattle in
 the vicinity of the Pecos Valley.

In marked cases of "creeps" there is gradual emaciation ac-
 companied by a depraved appe-
 tite. Muscular weakness is prom-
 inent, together with muscular
 tremors. The animal has a stiff
 laborious gait and there may be
 pain and swelling of the joints.
 Animals are subject to fractures
 of the bones of the limbs. Preg-
 nant animals or those nursing
 calves are more subject to the
 condition by reason of the fact
 that they require a considerable
 quantity of salts for themselves
 and for the nourishment of their
 offspring. The disease is thought
 to be due to insufficiency or total
 lack of certain minerals, princi-
 pally lime salts, in the feed and
 the treatment therefor consists
 in the use of feeds containing
 these minerals or in feeding the
 salts direct. Peas, cow-peas,
 cotton seed meal and wheat bran
 are rich in mineral salts. Cotton
 seed meal is one of the best feeds
 for the administration of mineral
 salts, but it should be fed care-
 fully as too large quantities of it
 are injurious to cattle. The lack-
 ing minerals may be furnished in
 the form of medicated licks if
 this is preferred to giving the
 above feeds. The morbid desire
 of the cattle to lick and chew
 bones and leather or wood may
 favor this mode of supplying the
 necessary medicaments. The fol-
 lowing formula may be employed:

Sulphate of iron, pulverized, 1
 part by volume; common salt,
 pulverized, 4 parts by volume;
 bicarbonate of soda, pulverized,
 2 parts by volume; calcium phos-
 phate, pulverized, 4 parts by vol-
 ume; plaster of paris, pulverized,
 4 parts by volume. Mix, moist-
 en and mold into bricks and place
 these in fresh pastures under
 shelter within access of the cat-
 tle. Ordinary quicklime dissolved
 in drinking water (lime water)
 will also be found efficacious in
 combating the disease and can be
 provided at slight expense. Lime
 water may be prepared in the
 drinking troughs by adding one
 pound of quicklime to every 250
 gallons of water, stirring from
 10 to 15 minutes, after which
 the limewater is ready for use.
 Animals must be furnished with
 limewater for some time before
 the desired effects can be noticed.

Dr. C. D. Marsh, of this bureau
 has been investigating the effects
 of poisonous plants upon animals;
 he suggests that "creeps" in
 cattle may be due to the eating
 of the leaves of shinnery oak.
 This is not yet proved but is still
 being investigated.

In response to your request for
 bulletins on cattle diseases, cir-
 cular 68 of this Bureau entitled
 "Diseases of the stomach and
 bowels of cattle," is enclosed.

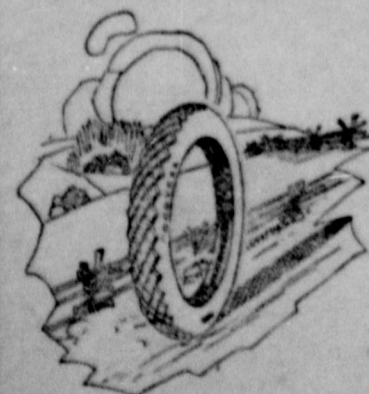
