

and muscles in trim. Where such a method is practiced the animal, accustomed to daily handling and control, foes not become unruly and hard to manage. Furthermore, he is groomed at least once daily when in use.

Unfortunately for the horse business, the common practice in stallion management is to put the horse in a shed, out of sight and hearing of other horses, where he is fed at irregular intervals and seldom groomed at all. Even though a small yard is sometimes provided, it is very often so filthy as to be more of a damage than an advantage.

No horse, however sound, can stand such treatment long without injury. A good, vigorous stallion needs at least six miles' travel daily or its equivalent in work.

The amount of feed to be given de ends upon the exercise given, the co lition of the horse and his ability to make use of the feed he gets.

The Kansas experiment station suggests the following as good combinations:

1. Oats, timothy or prairie hay. 2. Oats four parts, corn six parts, ollmeal one part, timothy or prairie

3. Corn seven parts, bran three parts, olimeal one part, timothy or prairie hay.

STEER SHOULD BE DEHORNED

Animals Fatten Faster and Sell Bet. ter-Work Is Easier When Calves Are Young.

Steers usually fatten faster and sell better if dehorned. Calves can be dehorned any time after weaning, usually in the cool months when there are no files. The work is easier when the the door softly closed. But the fact calves are young; a neater job can be done; the shock is not so great and the calves are easier to handle. The aim should be to take the ring of skin off with the horn to prevent a stub growing out. A little pine tar over the wound helps to stop bleeding and keep away files. Clippers do good work with all young cattle and are quicker and more humane than the saw. If the clippers are kept sharp they will handle any ordinary horn without crushing it, though it is not as easy to cut close to the head as with the saw.



International Conference to Strike at Production of Opium at Its Sources

By DR. R. S. COPELAND, U. S. Senator From New York.



The consumption of opium, from which most of the drugs branch, is amazing. Records show that 730,000 pounds were consumed in one year, equivalent to 6 grains to every man, woman and child in America. We need only between 30,000 and 50,000 pounds for legitimate purposes.

An international conference to strike at the opium production at its source is the surest, swiftest and, in fact, the only effective step to be taken to stop the narcotic drug evil.

I am in favor of the President of the United States calling such a conference at the earliest possible moment. Without all important nations participating in such an agreement the plan would not be effective. And in striking at the evil at its source the plan should include restriction of the acreage devoted to ish debt of \$4,604,000,000 over a term the growth of the poppy in such countries as China, India, Persia and of sixty-two years at reduced interest,

In addition, the United States must limit use of narcotics in this country. The government must supervise rigidly their manufacture and must limit the sale of such drugs to properly licensed drug stores and only on the prescriptions of reputable physicians. The United States further must prohibit exporting narcotics and stop smuggling of these same drugs back into this country.

There is a vast distinction between alcohol and drugs. An alcoholic, deprived of alcohol, is a dishrag. He is insane only while he is using it. A drug addict becomes insane as soon as drugs are taken from him. An addict will plan and execute a crime so atrocious that it cannot be conceived by sane persons.

In our New York list we found that about 10 per cent of the addicts were operators of vehicles. No wonder people are killed. I would recommend that no license be issued to any driver without proper physical examination to make certain that the applicant is not a user of drugs. I feel sure that this would reduce automobile accidents.

The Ice-Covered Antarctic Continent the Fourth Largest in the World

By WILHELM FILCHER, German Explorer.

The north polar region consists mainly of water. The Antarctic is chiefly land. That is one reason why the latter demands much more interest than the former. Another is that explorers have agreed that there lies a new continent. The shore of this huge stretch of land is near or within the polar region, that is to say, in a latitude corresponding to Drontjem, Norway, and Thomsoe in the northern hemisphere. This new continent has, according to present calculations, an area equal to that of Europe and Australia. It would therefore be the fourth largest continent of the world.

The great new land has high mountain chains and in the interior extensive high plains covered by an ice shield from 300 to 600 feet in thick- tached and the consequent raising of ness. The "inland ice" shows great gulfs and glaciers. The only visible landmarks are rocks and mountain ridges penetrating the cover of ice.

On both the Pacific and the Atlantic sides of the continent there are deep bays. On the Pacific side the Ross sea penetrates the land in a shape like the contour of France. On the Atlantic side the Weddell sea penetrates the land. The area of this sea is as large as the Baltic, the Black and the North seas.

College is a good place for a man who wants to work, but, unfortunately, there are very few of this type nowadays. Yet, if a man wants to succoed it is not necessary for him to go to college. He will broaden himself without it. We have enough lawyers, doctors and literary men. Also we have many \$100,000 jobs with no one capable of filling them. The main for success, in my estimation, is ambition with a will to work.



Heat and cold have very definite influences on the carburetion of gasoline.

Gasoline is a volatile liquid and easily vaporized under the influence of heat, being less susceptible with s ence of cold. Thus a cold inrush of air through the carburetor will relows that the carburetor must be adjusted to give a stronger or richer mixture when starting the motor under cold weather conditions.

The only part of the electrical equipment influenced by the cold is the battery, which provides both the power to rotate the starter and the current which induces a spark at the plugs. When called upon to rotate the motor by means of the starter the battery sets free all its stored-up energy to be used without restraint. 

FARMERS BUY LARGE PART OF FOODSTUFF

Survey Shows That 30 Per Cent Is Brought in by Railroads.

More Prosperous Sections Seem to Purchase More Than Those Isolated - Smallest Volume of Home Production Is in East.

"My baby was very nervous and (Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Farmers should grow more of the food they consume and buy less of food produced outside their immediate locality is the consensus of opinion of 25,000 farmers in all parts of the country recently questioned on the subject by the United States Department of Agriculture. The survey showed that of the food consumed by farmers and their families 70 per cent is produced locally, and nearly 30 per cent is brought in by railroad. In the judgment of the farmers 79 per cent of the food they consume could be economically produced locally.

In a general way the survey indicated that the more isolated farmers produce more of their foodstuffs than the less isolated, and that the more prosperous sections seem to buy more than the less prosperous. The thought back of the survey was that inasmuch as high freight rates have had a tendency to reduce the prices of products which farmers sell, and to increase the prices of the things they buy, they might economically produce more of their home requirements and thus become less dependent upon the railroads and the outside world.

MUTTON SUPPLY FOR MARKET

Production Expected to Be Many Thousands of Pounds Over Fig. ures Given for 1922.

Sheep feeding is booming and will result in the production of many thousands more pounds of mutton chops this year. Almost a third more sheep were in feed lots on January 1 than were there at the same date in 1922, according to government estimates. The largest increase in operations was in the irrigated region of the West, though the corn belt shows a gain of 14 per cent over 1922 feed ing. Relief in financial conditions among farmers is considered largely responsible for this increase, which will put the country back on a 1921 basis in mutton production.



SOY BEANS WILL STAND MOISTURE

One of the Best Forage Plants Among Legumes and Exceeds Others in Yield of Seed.

PREPARED SOIL IS ESSENTIAL

Application of Fertilizer on Fertile Land Usually Is Not Profitable-Crop is Greatly Benefited

The soy bean is one of the best forage plants among the legumes and it exceeds any of the others in yield of seed, says W. C. Etheridge of the Missouri College of Agriculture, It does not require a particular kind of soil. It will withstand a great deal of moisture and succumbs only when water stands on the land for a considerable time. On the other hand it is decidedly drouth-resistant.

For its best growth, the soy bean requires better preparation of the land than is necessary for cowpeas, because it cannot compete with weeds and grass so well as cowpeas.

Fertilizer Not Profitable . The application of fertilizer to the soy bean crop on either fertile or highly fertile land usually is not profitable.



But on poor land good returns will nearly always follow a light application, 100 to 150 pounds per acre, of acid phosphate; or a light dressing, 5 or 6 loads per acre, of stable manure, There is seldom any profit in applying commercial nitrogenous fertilizers to from the air through the aid of nitrogen-gathering bacteria on its roots.

favorable depth. For a crop planted in rows three feet apart—the best method where a seed crop is desired—15 to 20 pounds of seed will be required to the acre. A broadcasted or drilled crop-for hay -will require 60 to 90 pounds to the

FEEDING BEES SUGAR SIRUP

Extra Precaution Must Be Taken to Prevent Little Insects From Drowning.

When it is necessary to feed bees in winter, extra precaution must be taken to prevent them from drowning. Pour sugar sirup into a shallow dish or pan and cover with a cotton cloth large enough to drop over the edge of the dish. This allows the bees to crawl over the surface without being given a bath or drowning in the strup. Set the dish on the frames and see that the cloth is loose enough to settle to the bottom as bees use the sirup.

OVERCROWDING CAUSES ROUP

Dipping Affected Fowl's Head Into Common Cattle Dip is Most Successful Cure.

Prevent roup by not overcrowding birds. In treating individual cases, best success has been obtained by taking a gallon strup can, into which put a tablespoonful of the common cattle dips. Dip the affected bird's head with mouth open, into this solution Be sure to hold the bird's head down ward while so doing. This treatment thoroughly disinfects the head parts both inside and out. A second treatment may be necessary.
