MANY ATLANTIANS MOURN THE DEATH OF MISS KETCHAM

Miss Genevieve Ketcham, one of Atlanta's most brilliant and beloved young women, died Saturday evening at a private sanitarium after an operation had failed to save her from an attack of acute appendicitis.

The passing of Miss Ketcham will bring sorrow to innumerable Alantians who knew and loved her as a singer of remarkable talent and artistry and as a friend of the finest characteristics. Magnetic, charming, unaffected and accomplished, Miss Ketcham unconsciously exerted a most happy influence in church work, in social circles and in the musical

Atlanta had been Miss Ketcham's home since girlhood. As contralto soloist at the St. Marks Methodist church she ranked with the south's foremost vocal-She was identified auspiciously with the inauguration of radio broadcasting in the south and won national recognition both by her splendid voice and by her winsome personality when representing Atlanta at the world's first exposition in Chicago.

Miss Ketchum was twenty-foor years old. She is survived by her mother, Mrs. R. M. McCraney, 104 Park drive; her sister. Mrs. C. F. Dieter, and by her brother, Harry Ketcham, of Sand o'clock at the First Christian hurch. -Atlanta Journal.



Representatives of a survey conducted for the Texas Congress of Mothers were at Nacogdoches for a few days, making a survey of some 20 schools in Nacogdoches County, to ascertain the time lost by pupils from schools, and the studies pursued by pupils of different ages. When the survey is finished in Nacogdoches County, similar surveys will be made for a like number of schools in Brazos, Taylor,

Washington and Hill counties. The county judge of Madison County has notified County Judge Moore of Houston County that Madison Coupty is ready with its part of the money to construct a bridge across the Trip ity River where the San Antonio road crosses. Houston County is asked to put up \$10,000, with an equal amount from Madison. The state highway commission has agreed to complete the ost of the bridge. The formerly timbered states that have exhausted their lumber forests without renewing forest growth and are now paying a huge freight tax on lumber secured from distant sources have learned the leason and are providing ample funds to again make idle forest land producive. In recognition of this situation the last legislature provided by resolution that the governor shall appoint a forestry committee of eleven members, two to be selected from the senate, two from the state at large. The resolution directs this committee to make a thorough report on forestry conditions in Texas and to outline for the benefit of the thirty-ninth legslature a constructive state forestry

Cotton ginned in Smith County prior to November 14 amounted to 33,719 bales, as compared to 25,698 bales gin-

ned to the same date last year. The approximate value of the butter produced in Jefferson County is \$5,290 annually. Poultry nets the raisers of the county \$25,000, while vegetables and fruit lead with about \$60,000 a year, according to the county agent's figures. More than 103 members of boys and girls' clubs are divided as follows: Poultry, 72; pigs, 12; corn 11, and rice, 8. Three boys, members of the Rice Club, were winners on rice at the state fair last year. Sixteen rural schools are in the county, while at Beaumont and Port Arthur there are eight and five schools.





TICK ERADICATION **PROGRESS SHOWN**

Records of 35 Counties of State Show Only 459 Infested Premises.

Fort Worth, Tex.-Nearly 118,000 farms and ranches in South Texas have been cleared of fever ticks through tick eradication campaigns of county commissioners courts and the live stock sanitary commission of Texas in co-operation with the bureau of animal industry, according to records of the work for the last fifteen months.

Status records for thirty-five counties in South Texas, which are in good condition at the present time, show only 459 infested premises in the counties, whereas July 1, 1922, fifteen months ago, when the tick eradication campaign in South Texas began, there were 117,866 quaranteed premises.

Among all countles doing final tick eradication work there are 3,303 herds of 64,547 head of cattle quarantined and this time last year there were 4,902 herds of 113,917 head of cattle quarantined. This record shows 1,600 less quarantines in the final cleanup area than there were last year.

Aside from the record of thirty-five picked counties, the most significant figures are shown in the systematic tick eradication area, where there were 5.504 herds of 96,812 head of cattle quarantined in at this period last year and now there are only 1.815 herds of 18,912 head of cattle under quarantine. This shows 3,769 less quarantines and 77.900 less infested cattle.

Despite the fact that there has been concerted effort in a small area in South Texas to stop tick eradication. Chairman Boog-Scott points out that the work has been going forward rapidly. There are a few men in some counties which are in good condition, he declared, that are opposing tick eradication tooth and nail. Others in counties which have falled to do the proper tick eradication work are fighting the work of the commission and doing all in their power to hinder the administration of the tick eradication

"The live stock sanitary commission of Texas is appealing to every cattleman in the state who has realized good from tick eradication and who understand that it is imperative for us to get rid of the fever-carrying tick stock to support the tick law now people. with their very best efforts," Boog-Scott said.

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
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AMERICA INVITED TO PARTICIPATE

Formal Inquiry Into Germany's Condition Authorized by Commission.

Paris .- Allied circles believe the reparation commission by its action Friday paved the way for the United States to participate in an expert exmination of Germany's position. The ommission decided to appoint two expert committees, one to examine eans of balancing Germany's budget and stabilizing her finances, and the other to look into the question of the capital exported from Germany and levise ways of getting it back.

The resolution appointing the com mittees mentions no limitations to the cope of their inquiry further than to state that it will be held under the terms of article 234 of the treaty of Versailles. The allied representatives believe that under these circumstances the American government may find the latitude given the committees sufficient to afford all the necessary opportunity for useful work.

Adoption of the resolution, which was by unanimous vote, was the result of a compromise in which both the French and British made concessions and the text was drawn up after a long consultation in such a way as to allow them to withdraw from the uncompromising activities previously edging and tiny ribbon flowers. Wide maintained without giving ground for a point-de-esprit, with flowers at the shout of victory from either side.

The crux of the compromise was other pretty headplece. the decision to leave aside for the moment all the controversial phases of the reparation question and to take up first the most urgent need-the renovation of Germany's finances—and next the question of getting hold of he enormous balances Germany has abroad. It is hoped that when these subjects have been thoroughly examined the allies will have found a basis upon which they can agree in regard to other features of the reparation problem such as the method of payment by Germany and the amount that is finally to be demanded of her.

American participation in the comnittee is regarded by the allies as essential though it is not thought the American delegates must necessarily e officially nominated by the United States government. If objections are still found in Washington to the scope of inquiry there is strong hope that he American officials will at least be willing to suggest the names of a leadng financial authority and a leading anker for each committee.

The resolution is regarded in itself as an invitation for the United States to come into the investigation. It is the opinion among reparation delegates that no special invitation will be ssued, since the reparation commission is not situated so as to treat of-

icially with the governments. The commission will probably be eady to propose the names of the nembers of both committees by the end of next week. They will be the most eminent authorities available in each country. The committee on baiancing the German budget probably will meet first in Paris and afterward in Berlin, while the committee on exported capital may meet in London, where a considerable part of the German foreign balance is deposited.

In recognition of this situation the last legislature provided by reso lution that the governor shall appoint a forestry committee of eleven mem bers, two to be selected from the senate, two from the state at large. The resolution directs this committee to make a thorough report on forestry conditions in Texas and to outline for the benefit of the thirty-ninth legislature a constructive state forestry

Cotton ginned in Smith County prior to November 14 amounted to 33,719 bales, as compared to 25,698 bales gipned to the same date last year.

The approximate value of the butter produced in Jefferson County is \$5,200 annually. Poultry nets the raisers of the county \$25,000, while vegetables and fruit lead with about \$60,000 a year, according to the county agent's figures. More than 103 members of boys and girls' clubs are divided as follows: Poultry, 72; pigs, 12; corn 11, and rice, 8. 



TICK ERADICATION

Records of 35 Counties of State Show Only 459 Infested Premises.

Fort Worth, Tex.-Nearly 118,000 farms and ranches in South Texas have been cleared of fever ticks through tick eradication campaigns of county commissioners courts and the live stock sanitary commission of Texas in co-operation with the bureau of animal industry, according to records of the work for the last fifteen

Status records for thirty-five coun ties in South Texas, which are in good condition at the present time, show only 459 infested premises in the counties, whereas July 1, 1922, fifteen months ago, when the tick eradication campaign in South Texas began, there were 117,866 quaranteed premises.

Among all counties doing final tick eradication work there are 3,303 herds of 64.547 head of cattle quarantined and this time last year there were 4,902 herds of 113,917 head of cattle quarantined. This record shows 1,600 less quarantines in the final cleanup area than there were last year.

Aside from the record of thirty-five picked counties, the most significant figures are shown in the systematic tick eradication area, where there were 5.504 herds of 96.812 head of cattle quarantined in at this period last year and now there are only 1,815 herds of 18,912 head of cattle under quarantine. This shows 3,769 less quarantines and 77.900 less infested cattle

Despite the fact that there has been a concerted effort in a small area in South Texas to stop tick eradication. Chairman Boog-Scott points out that the work has been going forward rapidly. There are a few men in some counties which are in good condition, he declared, that are opposing tick eradication tooth and nail. Others in counties which have failed to do the proper tick eradication work are fighting the work of the commission and doing all in their power to hinder the administration of the tick eradication



AMERICA INVITED TO PARTICIPATE

Formal Inquiry Into Germany's Condition Authorized by Commission.

Paris .- Allied circles believe the reptration commission by its action Friday paved the way for the United States to participate in an expert exmination of Germany's position. The ommission decided to appoint two expert committees, one to examine means of balancing Germany's budget and stabilizing her finances, and the other to look into the question of the capital exported from Germany and levise ways of getting it back.

.The resolution appointing the comnittees mentions no limitations to the cope of their inquiry further than to state that it will be held under the terms of article 234 of the treaty of Versailles. The allied representatives believe that under these circumstances the American government may find the latitude given the committees sufficient to afford all the necessary opportunity for useful work.

Adoption of the resolution, which was by unanimous vote, was the result of a compromise in which both the French and British made concessions and the text was drawn up after dear faces during the coming year. long consultation in such a way as to allow them to withdraw from the unhout of victory from either side.

The crux of the compromise was other pretty headplece. the decision to leave aside for the moment all the controversial phases of the reparation question and to take up first the most urgent need-the renovation of Germany's finances-and next the question of getting hold of the enormous balances Germany has abroad. It is hoped that when these subjects have been thoroughly examned the allies will have found a basis pon which they can agree in regard to other features of the reparation problem such as the method of payment by Germany and the amount that s finally to be demanded of her.

American participation in the comnittee is regarded by the allies as esential though it is not thought the American delegates must necessarily e officially nominated by the United States government. If objections are still found in Washington to the scope of inquiry there is strong hope that the American officials will at least be willing to suggest the names of a leadng financial authority and a leading banker for each committee.

It is understood the British would have preferred to participation of a German representaive, but that they gave way on that oint in exchange for elimination of are had insisted upon, limiting the

The committee on balancing the German budget probably will meet first in Paris and afterward in Berlin, while the committee on exported capital may meet in London, where a considerable part of the German foreign balance is deposited.


