

Total gross receipt taxes of \$4,114,-280 were collected by the state for the year ending Sept. 30 last, according to a statement issued this week by the state controller's office. The figures have just been compiled. The amount collected the previous year was \$3,574,486. Over \$3,000,000 of this year's tax is represented by that from oil wells, an increase of almost a million dollars.

The last 30 days has proved more productive to the custom officers and rangers at Laredo than six months previous to that time. Bad roads and rainy weather were probably in a sense responsible for the smugglers and bootleggers going into the business on a wholesale basis and it has been a period of harvesting for the officers, speaking from a liquor point of view. During the last two weeks more than 3000 bottles of tequila valued at probably \$15,000 was confiscated by the government agents, together with some six cars, 30 horses and 15 riding saddles. One seizure alone resulted in obtaining 1680 quarts of tecuila.

The commissioners' court of Lee County at its regular January session authorized County Judge Bowers to execute contract with the state highway department for the maintenance of 72 miles of designated highways in the county for the first six months of the year. Fort Worth, Tex.-Texas is becoming a Jersey-producing state, but is making the mistake of shipping out too much of this dairy stock and shipping in too much butter and milk products, according to J. E. Boog-Scott, chairman of the live stock sanitary commission of Texas.

He urger that more Jerseys be kept in the state and that milk and milk products be produced in greater quantities to make the state self-supporting.

Oklahoma got the largest quota of Jerseys from Texas, as 4740 head were shipped there. Kansas was second with an importation of 3832 head of Texas Jerseys. Mexico received 563 and Cuba 171, while among the various other states importing Jerseys from Texas were the following: Louisiana

Texas-bred Jerseys are comparatively free of tuberculosis, according to Boog-Scott, who asserted that test charts on file in his office show less than 1 per cent of the 12,892 head tested had tuberculosis.




