





A check for \$779,000 has been received by the state treasurer from Bexar county as that county's tax re-

A contract has been let for the construction of ten miles of state highway between Chenango and the Fort Bend County line.

The state board of education has purchased an issue of \$25,000 school house bonds of Eagle Lake independent school district.

The attorney general has approved \$25,000 of bonds of Fort Bend County road district No. 7, serial, bearing 51/2 per cent interest.

Cotton handled for members last season totaled 181,595 bales, and the coming advance will bring the average price realized to 25 cents per pound to the growers, it was stated.

The annual meet of the Wharton County Interscholastic League will be held at El Campo Friday and Saturday, March 21 and 22. Schools of the county have been divided into three classes.

Insurance company occupation taxes are coming into the office of John M. Scott, state insurance commissioner, at the rate of \$100,000 a day. This department collects about \$2,000,000 a year in fees and taxes.

Wheat conditions in Texas are better for this season than in many years previous, according to H. B. Dorsey secretary of the Texas Grain Dealers Association, who has just completed a survey of the wheat raising sections.

The Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association on March 25 will distribute \$5,360,970 to members as advance on the past season's cotton crop, bringing the amount distributed to date to \$23,186,866, the association announced

The American Association of Petroleum Geologists will assemble at Houston for a three-day convention March 27, it was announced this week. More than 500 delegates from the United States, Canada, Mexico and some foreign countries are expected.

The water supply of the city of Crockett is said to be among the very | Druggists sell millions of packages of best in the state, considering the population of the town. The enormor water supply of Crockett is pumped by electric power from three wells, ranging in depth from 400 to 500 feet. The depth of the wells give purity to the water, which is found in water bearing sand and is filtered through the sand in which it is found.

Road district No. 5 of DeWitt county voted a bond issue of \$135,000 at a special election Saturday by a majority of 567 to 63. This bond will be matched by the state and federal highway de-Witt county.

Willacy county, on the north of Cameron county, has called an election for \$250,000 worth of road improvement bonds for the construction of a hard surfaced highway from Sebastian, at the Cameron county line, north to the Kenedy county line, through Lyford and Raymondville. The plans call for a 20-foot concrete shoulder and tarvia surface road.

Deposit of \$200,000 of University of Texas endowment funds in 180 depositories throughout Texas is illegal, according to the state board of education, which has asked the attorney general for a ruling on whether this money could be converted into state bonds. The statutes provide this money must be converted into either state or federal bonds bearing 5 per cent interest, only the income to be used.

Members of the state park board on a tour of Southwest Texas have unanimously voted to accept the site of 132 acres lying just north of Beeville and offered to the state by its owner, John R. Scott. Scott made a reduced price on the property and the people of Beeville guaranteed conveyance to the board without it costing one dime to the public. This is the first acre ever acquired by Texas for recreation pur poses, through the battlefield of San Jacinto and a few others are owned as state shrines.





Cereals Remaining on Farms March 1 In Excess of 1923 Supplies

Houston, Tex.-The holdings of cereals remaining on Texas farms on March 1, with the exception of corn, were in excess of the 1923 supplies. it is reported by H. H. Schutz, statis-Corbett twenty-four. Both in percentage of the crop and in in Texas were above last year's, but in the United States as a whole wheat alone of the five principal cereals fell below the farm reserves of 1923.

Again, as last year, only four-fifth of the corn crop of the state was of merchantable quality. The percentage of last season's crop remaining on farms was 29%, or slightly below that of 1923 and the 10-year average, but in quantity it is 27,968,000 bushels-the smallest since the low reserves of the spring of 1919. Ordinarily 6% of the Texas corn crop is shipped out of the counties where grown, but it averaged only 5%, or 4,822,000 bushels, this season as compared with 7%, or 8,021,000 bushels, during the one preceding. It was necessary to import an unusually large amount of corn this year.

It is estimated that 7% of last year's wheat crop remained on Texas farms on March 1; this represents 1,146,000 bushels, or 546,000 bushels more than a year ago, but considerably below the 10-year average. Shipments out of the counties where grown constituted 60% of the crop; this percentage is 2 points above that of 1923 and the same as in 1922. 

FEEDING BRED EWES DURING THE WINTER

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Winter management of the flock of breeding ewes has a very important relation to the returns from the flock. The feeding, says the United States Department of Agriculture, should be such as will produce the most vigorous lambs and at the same time keep the wool in good condition. Leguminous hays, straws, and cornstalks usually form the main part of economical win ter rations. Clover, alfalfa, or cowpea hay, if of good quality, may be used as the sole feed until near lambing time, from three to three and a half pounds being sufficient for ewes weighing less than 150 pounds. Oat and wheat straw are better than rye or barley straw. Timothy hay is not good sheep feed.

Such succulent feeds as roots or silage are desirable in keeping the ewes in good health. The use of sllage will often materially reduce the cost of the ration, but sliage cannot safely be used without any hay. Only silage from well-matured corn should be used for sheep, and caution should be exercised to guard against feeding spoiled, frozen, or moldy silage. It is not advisable to feed more than three pounds per head daily of this feed.

For bred ewes, roots, particularly turnips, should be used sparingly until after lambing. Each of the following rations suggested by the sheepmen of the department contains approximately the amount of the various nutrients required daily for ewes of from 120 to 145 pounds in weight:

(1) (2)
2 lbs. alfalfa or 2 lbs. alfalfa.
cowpea hay.
2 lbs. corn slage.
2 lbs. corn stover
(amount eaten).
(4)

1 lb. oat straw.
2 lbe. corn silage.
4 lb. oil meal.
5 lb. corn. 2 % lbs. alfalfa. 2 lbs. silage.

Where the ewes can run on fall wheat or rye during the winter months, the pasture should be supplemented by some dry or concentrated feed. Silage or roots are not desirable when the pasturage is soft or green. One-half pound of cottonseed meal contains the daily requirement of protein for pregnant ewes. When price suggests the use of this concentrate, the other feeds should be of a carbonaceous character. One-quarter pound of cottonseed meal per day and a selection of other feeds will be better than a ration containing a larger amount of cottonseed meal.

Government Formula for

Worms in Infested Hogs The United States Department of Agriculture recommends for worms in hogs: Charcoal, 1 bushel; hardwood ashes, 1 bushel; salt, 8 pounds; air slaked lime, 8 pounds; sulphur. 4 pounds; pulverized copperas, 2 pounds Thoroughly mix the lime, salt and sulphur; then mix with this the charcoal and ashes. Dissolve the copperas in a gallon of water and sprinkle over the whole mass, mixing completely. Store in a barrel under shelter. Keep some in a shallow trough constantly

before the hogs. Dr. A. L. Shealy of the Florida College of Agriculture, says that worms ome from eggs taken into and hatched the digestive system of hogs. Some of the worms are at times carried from the intestines to other parts of the body. The kidney worm is an example of this type. After this worm gets the kidneys, no drug can reach it. Filthy hog wallows should be avoided as they are fruitful sources for worm eggs. When a pasture becomes infested with eggs, change to another and plow the infested one deeply.

Pen Breeding Is Favored by Indiana Hog Expert

The hog man often wonders whether the extra bother of keeping a boar confined and putting each sow in for breeding is worth while as compared to the easier and less expensive methed of pasture breeding. "Observation on many farms shows that the sows produce enough more pigs from pen breeding to make this the better practice," says John Schwab, Purdue's swine extension man.


