THE WORLD OVER

Interesting Items of Present Important Happenings.

EVERY ITEM A NEWS ITEM

Relating to the Latest Happenings of Interest Just Now Throughout the World.

WASHINGTON NEWS.

Rivers and harbors improvements estimated to cost \$31,000,000 were approved by the house rivers and harbors committee Friday.

The senate Wednesday passed the soldier bonus bill.

Major General Henry T. Allen, former commander of the American forces on the Rhine, Wednesday urged the senate foreign relations committee to report the bill authorizing an appropriation of \$10,000,000 for German relief.

House republican leaders informed President Coolidge Friday that the house was approaching conclusion of consideration of constructive legislation and that so far as that body was concerned, congress would be able to adjourn June 1.

A proposal that the senatorial committee investigating the election of Earl B. Mayfield hold sessions at centralized points in Texas during July and August will be made to the committee when that body meets May 5. No immediate decision is anticipated, but it is confidently predicted that before adjournment of congress the members of the committee will see the necessity and economy in such a step and comply with the request.

The house Tuesday passed Senator Sheppard's bill allowing the use of buildings on the government reservation at Fort Crockett, Galveston, by El Mina Shrine Temple for members of ten Southwestern Shrine temples, which are to hold their convention and joint ceremonial there Aug. 4 to 14.

The House Monday passed the senate bill providing for issuance semi-monthly of cotton reports by the department of agriculture and for their publication simultaneously with the gaining reports of the commerce department.

An extra appropriation of \$1,500,000 to combat the foot and mouth disease was approved Monday by the senate and California representatives discussed quarantine regulations with the department of agriculture.

The senate Bureau bill carrying pension increases for veterans of the war of 1813 and the Spanish Mexican and Indian wars was passed by the house Monday.

Ambassador Hanihara of Japan in another note to Secretary of State Hughes Saturday expressly disavowed any intent to threaten the United States in his recent "grave consequences" note protesting against the enactment of a Japanese exclusion law by congress. Replying to this note Secretary Hughes declared he had never construed the words "grave consequences" to be a threat, the construction put upon them by members of congress. The exchange of notes was regarded in diplomatic circles at Washington as having appreciably eased the crisis over congress' action in writing the exclusion provision into the immigration bill.

STATE AND DOMESTIC NEWS.

Mrs. Rebecca J. Fisher of Austin, Texas, was elected president of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas at the closing meeting of the annual convention at San Antonio, Texas Thursday. The next convention will be held in Navasota.

Eight or more persons were killed, two injured, probably fatally, and others injured severely as the result of cyclones and windstorms which swept over Texas and Oklahoma Friday night and Saturday morning.

Houston's city tax rate was reduced from 1.52 1/2 to 1.175 on the \$100 valuation by a vote of the city council Saturday.

Harry K. Thaw was declared sane Tuesday at Philadelphia, Pa., by the jury that had been hearing testimony to determine his mental condition. The jury declared him fully capable of looking after his estate.

Hearing on the application to reduce live stock rates in Texas was set Friday by the Texas railroad commission for June 18.

Six hundred quarts of liquor, three men, three horses, and a boat were captured in raids made on the Mexican border at Rio Grande City, Texas, Saturday and Sunday by customs officers, rangers and immigration officials.

The international bridge and ferry connecting Brownsville Texas, with Matamoros, Mexico, is again permitted by authority from Mexico City to remain open all night.

The state railroad commission will not pass on the merits or demerits of the International-Great Northern-Gulf Coast Lines merger. This decision, previously forecast, was made formally Saturday in the issuance of a statement by the state commission accompanying a formal denial of the protestants' motion for the commission to make a recommendation to the interstate commerce commission in the matter of the application of the Gulf Coast Lines for authority to purchase the capital stock of the International-Great Northern.

With a maximum airline distance of 1100 miles, a scant 73 miles less than the American record, W. T. Van Orman, pilot of the balloon entered by the Goodyear Tire and Rubber company of Akron, O., with C. K. Wollam as aide, won the most remarkable air classic ever held in America which was brought to a close Friday. Van Orman landed at Rochester, Minn. Captain H. E. Honeywell piloting a balloon under the banner of the Kansas City Co-operative club, and with Captain T. E. Boudinot of Kelly Field, as his aide came second with an established airline distance of 1050 miles made when they landed at Sanborn, Minn., at 8:30 a.m. Friday Major Norman W. Peck, pilot, and Lieutenant William A. Gray, aide of the S. D. 14, army balloon, nosed the Detroit Aviation Society contestant out by about 20 miles for third place. All balloons started from San Antonio, Texas.

The promise of efforts to bring about another world conference to attempt further limitation of armaments was given by President Coolidge in an address Tuesday at the annual luncheon of the Associated Press in New York City.

Eight persons, bitten by a mad dog at Pittsburg, Texas, arrived at Austin Saturday at the State Pasteur Institute to take preventive treatment against rabies.

FOREIGN NEWS.

Fire destroyed an orphanage on the southern outskirts of Vienna, Austria, Thursday and 34 children were burned to death.

The Japanese cabinet has decided to convene an extraordinary session of the diet June 25. The session will continue three weeks.

Marie Corelli, English novelist, and author of a score of popular romantic tales, died Monday from heart trouble at her home, Stratford-Upon-Avon, England.

In a duel with swords at Naples, Italy, Wednesday, between Vincenzo Nitti, son of former premier Nitti, and Giulio Francesconi, Nitti was painfully wounded in the right arm.

A severe earthquake shock, lasting for one minute and 25 seconds, rocked Mexico City and the plateau region of Mexico shortly after one o'clock Monday afternoon. Slight material damage was reported from various points affected by the tremor.

The capture, court martial and execution of General Manuel Diezgu, second in command of the revolutionary army movement in Western Mexico, was confirmed Monday by official advice to President Obregon at Mexico City. A similar fate was meted out to General Manuel Garcia Vigil, former governor of Oaxaca, who joined with General Fortunato Maycotte in the De la Huerta revolt last December.

At the beginning of 1924 Berlin had a population of 4,004,900, according to official statistics. This is 15,000 less than a year ago.

The American charge d'affaires Saturday recognized in writing the new republic of Greece. The Belgian minister took similar action.

MANY MEXICANS SEEK ENTRANCE

Laredo, Tex.—Mexican and American officialdom turned this week to the problem of excluding a large percentage of 30,000 Mexican families of the laboring class who are massing at the border cities in preparation for immigration to the United States in search of employment.

For the United States Secretary of the Interior Hubert Work has issued instructions that the strictest regulations shall be enforced in admitting the immigrants, while on the Mexican side officials have notified the executives of the National Railway lines to do everything in their power to hinder and avoid transporting would-be immigrants. This in the hope that the difficulties encountered would dissuade many of the dissatisfied ones from leaving their homes.

Literature also has been printed hurriedly and is being distributed in the larger centers and at railroad stations pointing out the risks the travelers will assume in coming to the United States. The difficulty of obtaining work is shown, together with the many inconveniences if the workers find themselves stranded in the United States without money, work or friends.

A portion of the literature also is given over to discussion of the strictness of the American immigration regulations and official notice is served that those entering the United States clandestinely will receive no help from Mexican consulates. Despite these efforts hundreds of families are arriving in the Eagle Pass and Laredo districts, declaring they are tired of turmoil in Mexico and propose hereafter to make their homes in the United States.

Big Road Bond Election. Logansport, La.—A million-dollar road bond issue was voted on in De Soto Parish, and passed by the proper majority vote of three to one. The road building program includes a model gravel road direct from this place to Shreveport and also one to Mansfield.

Revolution in Honduras. San Salvador—Only two American marines were killed in the clash in Honduras, according to advices reaching San Salvador Friday.

Barnes Brothers Set Odd Record

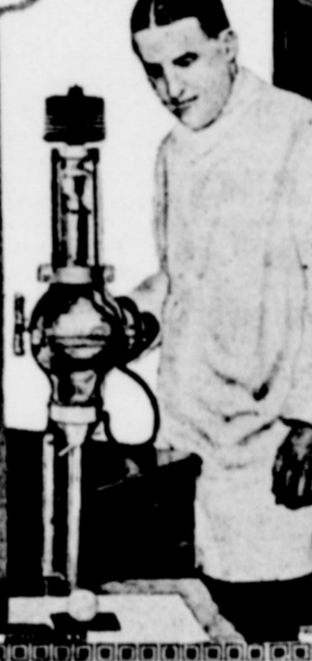

Joe (Lumber) Price, the home-run king of the Appalachian league, who had a try-out in the International last year, will probably go to Charlotte of the Sally league.

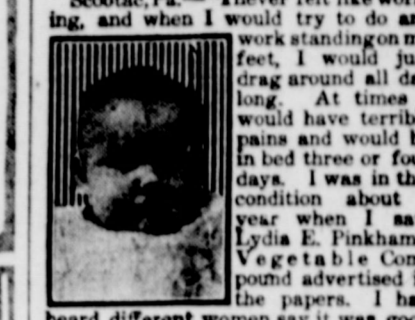

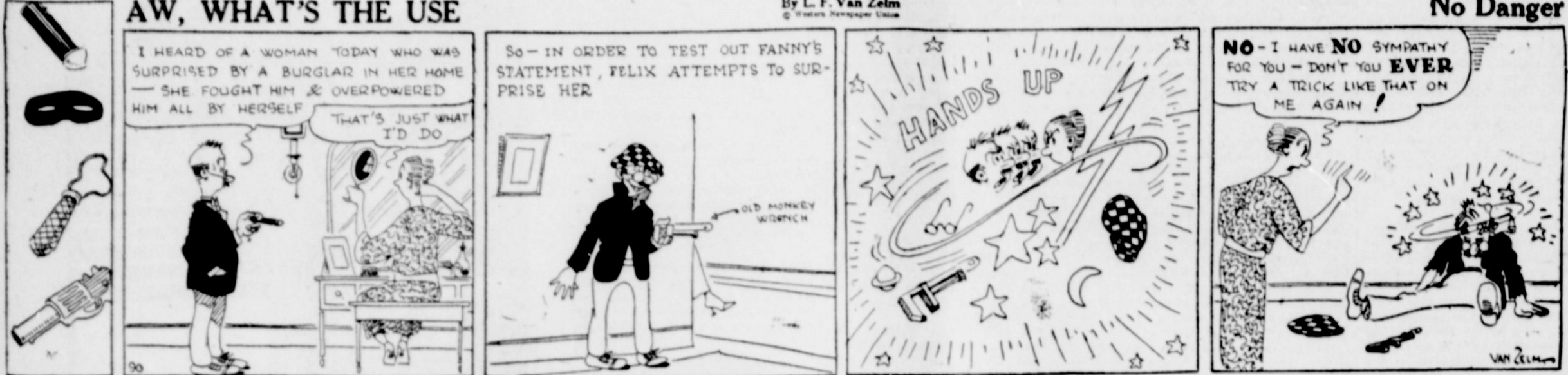

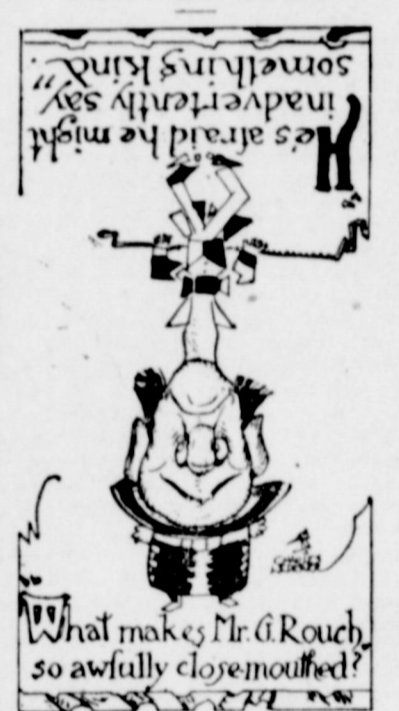

LIVE STOCK NEWS

HOG-PROOF GATE IS HANDY CONTRIVANCE

It is common practice to run hogs in the same field as cattle. To allow the cattle the liberty of passing into adjoining fields and at the same time prevent the hogs from doing so, a special kind of gate is required. Two types of such gates, that have been found very effective, are shown in the illustration. Figure 1 shows a gate consisting of two wide planks, one nailed to the gate post and the other arranged parallel to it, with a space of about 2 feet between them. The second plank is nailed to strong stakes that are securely driven into the ground. The hogs can climb over this plank because they can approach it at right angles, but cannot get over the other because the second is so close. A hog (this has been proved many times) will usually climb over the first plank into the chute and run along it back into the yard, thinking apparently, that it has accomplished its purpose.

An equally effective gate which involves the use of an old hot-water tank, is shown in Figure 2. It is drilled in the center at each end for

a heavy gas pipe or iron rod, which is also passed through the gate posts as indicated, allowing the tank to rotate freely. The hog can get on the tank as indicated but the moment the hind legs are clear of the ground the weight on the tank causes it to turn and the hog promptly returns—a rather provoking situation for the hog, but it works.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

Often Happens Teeth of Young Pigs Are Harmful
Frequently when sows carry their pigs beyond the usual period of gestation, it will be found that the pig's teeth have made an abnormal growth, and often the teeth are discolored. This has led to the common saying that "pigs born with black teeth never do well."

These teeth are often long and sharp and prick the tender udder of the dam when the youngsters are sucking. This causes the mother great pain, and usually results in the dam refusing to allow the pigs to suck. It also causes sore udders, which soon become infected, this in turn causing severe trouble and often results in spotted udders.

The hog breeder should watch the young litter for symptoms of pigs with such teeth. Immediate steps should be taken to remove the trouble as soon as it is detected.

Save Lambs and Increase Profit From Farm Flock
"Save the lamb and increase the profits from the farm flock," should be the slogan of every flock owner at this season of the year. From now until the lambs are ready for market a little extra feed and care will be money well spent. Ewes that were in good condition at breeding time and have had good care should produce a large percentage of strong, vigorous lambs, with additional feed and care, from now until the lambs are ready for market.

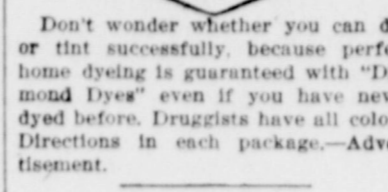
The ewe should have dry, comfortable quarters. The shed or barn should be clean, dry, well ventilated and arranged to avoid the ewes crowding through the doors and around the feed racks, as crowding will, a great many times, cause injury to the unborn lamb and in many cases cause death to the ewe. Exercise is an essential as feed.

Plan to Prevent Horns
Horns are prevented from developing by thoroughly rubbing a stick of caustic potash upon the dampened skin over each horn button when the calf is less than one week old. Apply lard or vaseline freely around the horn button. Wrap an end of the caustic pencil with strong paper to protect the fingers. Keep caustic out of calf's eyes.—Dr. A. S. Alexander.

Frozen Silage Is Safe
Feeding frozen or moldy silage to dairy cows or feeding steers is a harmless practice. At least this is the opinion of dairy husbandry officials at Iowa State college, although feeding this kind of silage in considerable amounts may cause the cows to scour or go off feed for a few days. Other than this, the officials say, there are no harmful results from feeding moldy or frozen silage. Extreme care, they say, must be exercised in feeding any kind of silage to sheep or horses.

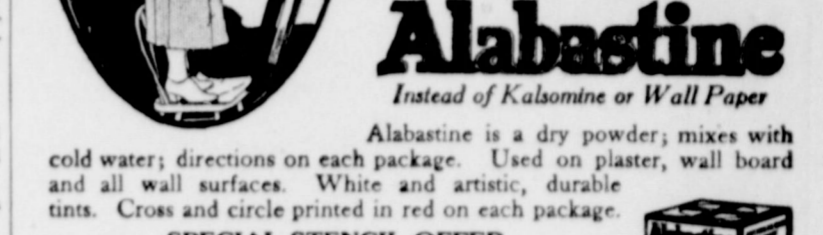

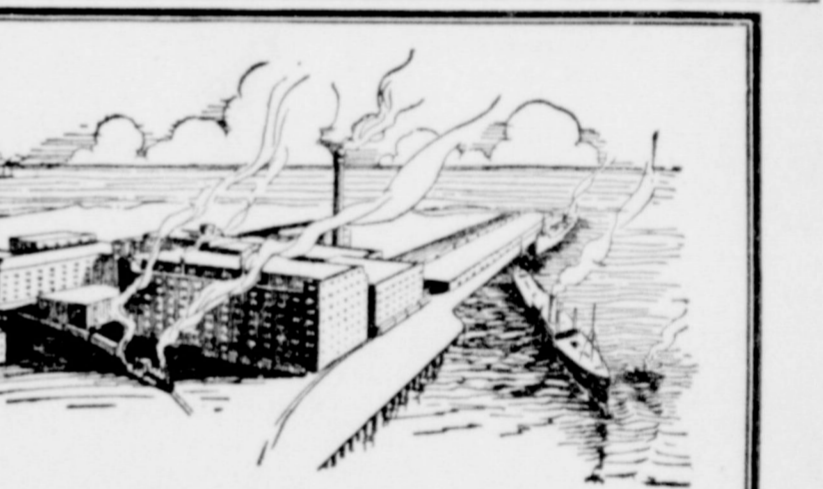
