Fireman Killed in Fall From Engine

It was a sorrowful crowd of friends that gathered at the depot Thursday when Southern Pacific train No. 101 pulled in. Word had reached here of the accidental death of J. H. Birdsley. Engineer A. V. Boyce, and J. H. Birdsley left Del Rio on passenger train 101 to Sanderson. Just before they reached Myers Canon No. 2, about 26 miles east of here, Mr. Boyce slowed down for a curve as well as to cross the bridge. Mr. Birdsley was thought to have been on steps looking at a wheel on the engine. About a mile from the bridge Mr. Boyce missed his fireman, he signaled for a flagman and backed up to the bridge. There, underneath the bridge was the body, badly mangled and crushed. It was put on the train, where, in charge of Mr. Qualtrough it was carried to El Paso.

Mr. Birdsley at the time of his death was 36 years of age. He entered the services of the G. H. & S. A. in January, 1913, as fireman and in September, 1917, he was promoted to engineer; and he has been working temporarily as a passenger fireman. He is survived by his widow, who was in Del Rio at the time of his death; his father and mother-in-law, of El Paso, a sister, Mrs. J. (Continued on last page)

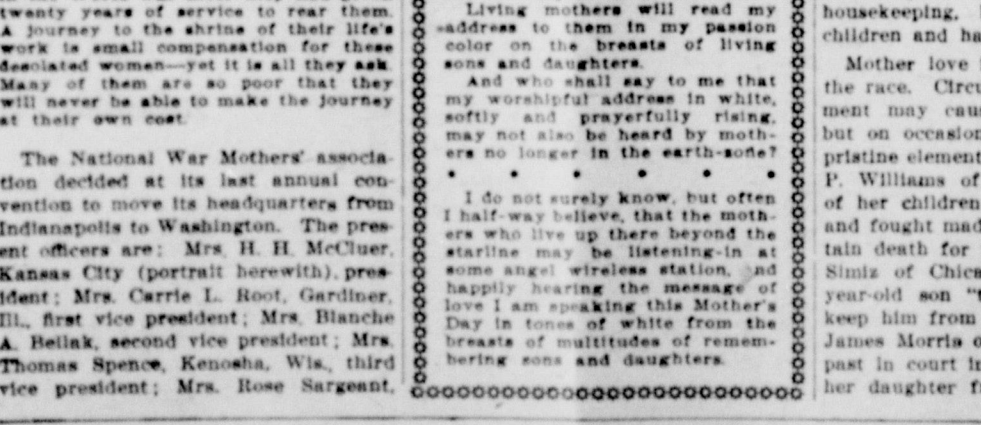
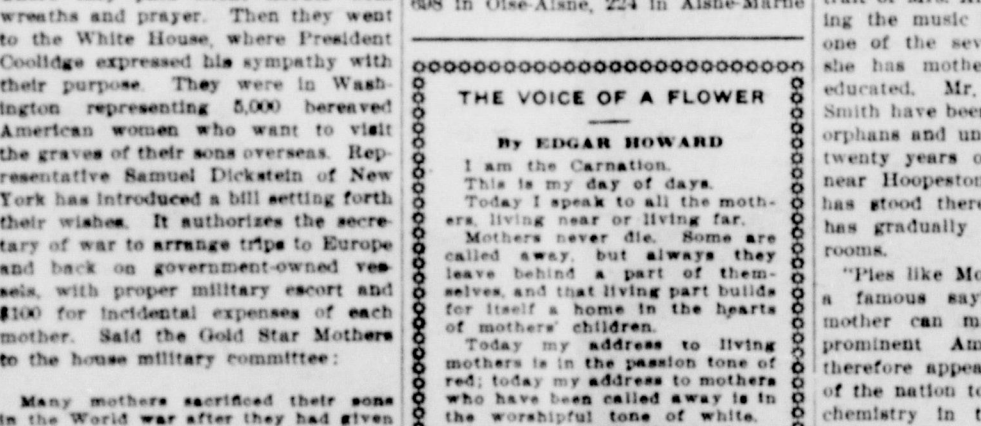
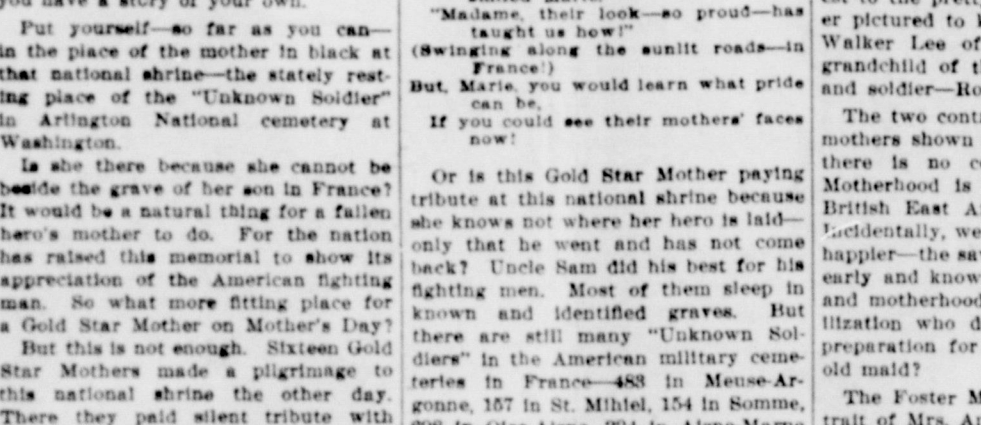
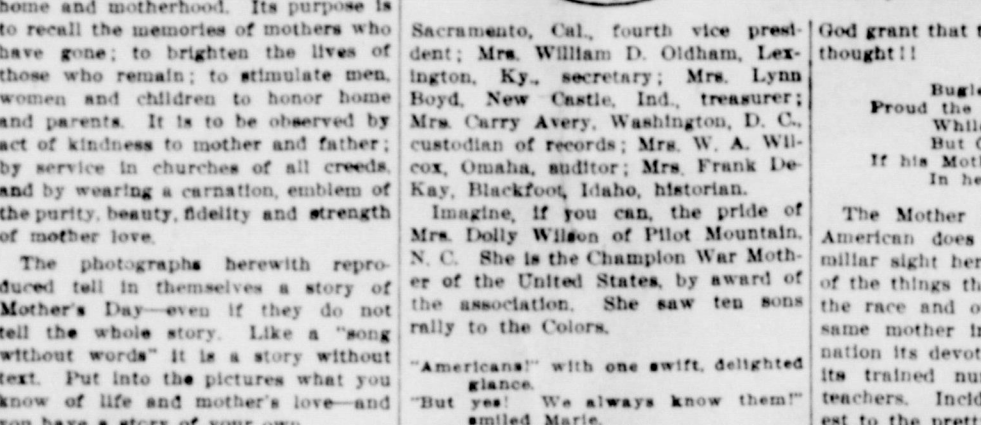
EVERY ITEM A NEWS ITEM Relating to the Latest Happenings of Interest Now Throughout the World.

WASHINGTON NEWS. President Coolidge announced to White House callers Friday his indorsement of the proposal that immigrants ineligible to citizenship be excluded from the United States. The conference report on the soldier bonus bill was ratified Friday by the senate. By a vote of eight to seven the house postoffice committee Wednesday rejected an amendment to the postal employees' salary bill to provide for a flat annual pay increase of \$400 for clerks, carriers, supervisors and inspectors. An amendment to the revenue bill authorizing examination of the returns under "rules governing inspection of public documents generally" was adopted Friday, 48 to 27. The annual naval supply bill, carrying \$275,000,000, was passed Tuesday by the senate without a record vote. The senate added about \$700,000 to the bill as it came from the house.

STATE AND DOMESTIC NEWS. Four persons were killed, several were injured and property damaged to the extent of approximately \$150,000 by an explosion and fire of undetermined origin at the Interstate Refinery Friday at Kansas City, Mo. With over 100 persons known to be dead, more than a score missing, approximately 300 injured, some perhaps fatally, the Southeast is giving relief to regions stricken last Monday and Tuesday by the worst high tension storms in its history. Tornadoes, descending with devastating violence upon widely scattered sections, caused damage estimated at \$10,000,000 in the States of South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, North Carolina, Virginia, Louisiana and Arkansas. The Louisiana board of pardons Wednesday denied a plea for clemency for the six Italians sentenced to be hanged May 9 at Amite, La., for the murder of Dallas Calmes. A total of 123 ships entered and 127 cleared from the ports of Galveston and Texas City, Texas, in April, according to the marine clerk at the Galveston customs house. The total movement is approximately the same as the movement in April, 1923. Three showgirls, world-famous milk cow, was shot and killed in Los Angeles, Cal., Wednesday after it was learned she was infected with the foot and mouth disease. Her owners recently refused \$50,000 for the cow. Wallace E. Hawley was sentenced to a year and a day in the penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$5,000, and R. F. Winborn was sentenced to sixty days in jail and to pay a fine of \$1,000 by Judge J. C. Hutcheon in federal court Friday at Houston, Texas. The jury had returned a verdict of guilty in sixteen counts against Hawley and in four counts against Winborn. They were charged with using the mails to defraud. Grain exports from Galveston, Texas, in April totaled 151,000 bushels, more than tripling the shipments for March. The twenty-fourth annual convention of the Texas Association of Baking Industry held its final session at Beaumont, Texas, Wednesday, closing with the election of officers and the choosing of the next convention city. Fort Worth was selected as the convention city in 1925. The officers elected included Herbert J. Schopp, Houston, president; George Schepps, Dallas, vice president; William Collmorgan, Lufkin, treasurer; William Schick, Beaumont, governor to represent the state body at the national meet. General Julian S. Carr, 79, former commander in chief of the United Confederate veterans, died at Chicago, Ill., Tuesday. General Carr was born at Chapel Hill, N. C., October 12, 1845. Luther Thompson, Jr., 5 years old, was reported fatally injured and seven other persons badly hurt in a tornado which wrecked eight dwellings in a sparsely populated suburb on the northern outskirts of Texarkana, Tex., Tuesday. The twister cut a path approximately 100 yards wide and nearly half a mile long. Warren T. McCray, who resigned Tuesday as governor of Indiana following his conviction in federal court Monday on charges of using the mails in furtherance of a scheme to defraud.

FOREIGN NEWS. A decree of amnesty for political prisoners was proclaimed Saturday at Constantinople. Alexis I. Rykoff, who succeeded Nicolai Lenin as premier of soviet Russia, has returned to Moscow from Berlin, where he is said to have been ill for some time, and resumed his duties. A regular air service between Roumania and France is being established. Argentina's corn crop, now being harvested, is the largest since 1914 and is estimated at 270,000,000 bushels or 34,000,000 more than last year.

Five prominent American women have therefore appealed to the housewives of the nation to promote the study of chemistry in the interest of better housekeeping, better food, healthier children and happier homes. 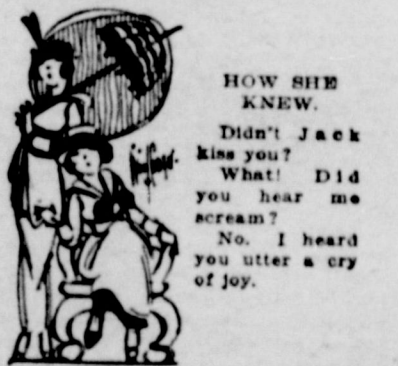
