The Time for Them Will Soon Be Here Prepare Prize-Winning Exhibits.

The time for community, county and State fairs will soon be here. The time to win the prizes is during the period of preparation. The first essential of a prize winning exhibit is to have the highest quality of produce from which to select the samples to be shown. This requires much care in the selection of seed, cultivation of crop and harvesting. An other important point is for the exnium lists, and that he make his exhibits accordingly. When the premium list calls for a peck of wheat, exibit a peck of wheat; when it calls or a three-inch sheaf of small grain. show a three-inch sheaf. It is wise to take more than enough to the fair; then if some gets damaged and lost in the shipment, there will be sufficient to make the exhibit as called

The three important points are to know the variety, type and standards of each variety, and to know what constitutes excellence in each. Then select as nearly to this as possible It takes considerable study and observation to know these points, and for this reason it is wise to watch the judge as he places the different classes at the fair; also talk to your county agents and learn from the ollege instructors at the different short courses where judging takes place. It might be well at this time give an idea of the points that are onsidered in judging exhibits in agri-

ultural products which are as follows: Trueness of type, quality of the exhibit uniformity of the exhibit, ar rangement of exhibit. The ultimate purpose of agricultural products is for onsumption, either directly or indirectly by people. This makes it nec essary that marketing qualities be given prime consideration. 

DEMOCRATS NAME DAVIS AND BRYAN

Longest Convention in Political History Finally Concludes Its Labors.

103 BALLOTS ARE CAST

Nomination of West Virginia Man Is Accomplished After Smith and McAdoo Give Up-Meeting Lasts 14 Days.

Convention Hall, New York .- After a convention battle unprecedented in its stubbornness and its length, the Democratic party presents to the voters of the United States the ticket that heads this column. The Presidential candidate was not selected until 103 ballots had been cast, exceeding the 1864 record, which was 57 ballots, by 46 ballots.

Day after day, night after night. the deadlock continued unbroken with McAdoo leading and Smith a prisistent second. Stick to It on Fourth

Independence day came and found the delegates still in session, wearyeyed, almost apathetic, but immovable. Not all immovable, to be sure, for by that time many were running short of both money and patience and several hundred delegates and alternates left for home on July 3. Some of these deserters were recalled by 'telegraph. and steps were taken to finance those who were "going broke."

The Fourth of July session opened with "The Star-Spangled Banner," and every candidate's banner continued to wave. Augustus Thomas read the Declaration of Independence, and almost every delegate seemed confirmed in the opinion that his life and liberty depended on his voting as he had voted, and that therein lay his pursuit of happiness. Through ballot after ballot the count displayed the same deadly monotony. Then Tom Taggert created a diversion by readgood second and Meredith showed up ing a telegram from Senator Raiston withdrawing from the race-at least for the time being. Indiana thereupon gave McAdoo 20 of her votes and Smith 10. During the sixty-fifth ballot came a telegram from James M. Cox turning loose the Ohio delegation. So the Buckeyes gave their 48 votes to Newton D. Baker, which didn't seem to help matters, since scarcely anyone eise took the hint.

Friday evening the Smith forces brought forward two propositions, one that the candidates be invited to address the convention in executive session, the other that Smith, as governor of New York, be asked to come in and talk half an hour. Both were defeated by the McAdooltes, a twothird vote being required. The same fate met various attempts on Friday and Saturday, to cut off the low candidate on each successive ballot. 

OILMEAL AND CORN FAVORED BY SHEEP

Some sheep feeders have been reporting excellent results from feeding a quarter of a pound of linseed meal a day to lambs in the corn field. Losses have been small and gains very satisfactory so far as they could be estimated. Similar reports have been made by others feeding lambs in the dry lot, though not under circumbefore Friday morning. A motion to stances that allow a fair comparison. Some who have tried linseed meal feeding in the field have reported difficulty in getting the lambs to take it, says Chas. I. Bray, animal husbandry department, Colorado Agricultural college.

An explanation of the value of linseed meal with corn lies in the protein balance of the two feeds. A suggested reason for feed-lot losses from heavy corn feeding is that unused or unbalanced proteins may act as poi sons in the body. Proteins are complex compounds of simple substances called amino-acids, some of these be ing highly necessary. Feeds vary considerably in the proportions of aminoacids, contained, some proteins being entirely lacking in one or more of these necessary amino-acids. When this is the case, another protein must be added containing an extra supply of the missing amino-acids.

Now linseed meal proteins and corn proteins appear to supplement each other in this way. At the Wisconsin experiment station tests with young pigs in regard to utilization of proteins showed that linseed meal proteins used alone were only 17 per cent available and the proteins of corn and barley were only 22 per cent available. But when a protein mixture was made up of three-quarters corn protein and one-quarter linseed meal protein, the mixed proteins were 37 per cent available, showing the value

of each in supplementing the other. Alfalfa probably supplies most of the amino-acids needed to balance corn, which is one reason why alfalfa and corn makes such a good combination in lamb feeding. However, in lamb feeding trials by E. J. Maynard at the Colorado experiment station last winter lambs getting linseed oil meal in addition to corn and alfalfa, gained three pounds more per head, brought 40 cents per hundred more on the market and made 38 cents per head more profit than those on alfalfa and corn only.

Tankage Good for Pigs

on Rape and Blue Grass During the summer of 1920, they found at the Iowa station that it paid corn to pigs on either rape or blue alone on rape pasture gained only two getting tankage as well as corn gained 1.42 pounds per head daily and required for 100 pounds of gain 355 pounds of corn and 29 pounds of tank age. Each pound of tankage saved ' pounds of corn. On blue grass, the results on rape, a pound of tankage saving 7 pounds of corn.

Earlier experiments at the Iowa ste tion did not indicate such a decided advantage for tankage. It would seem, however, that even under the most un favorable conditions a pound of tank age should replace 3 pounds of corn on rape pasture or about 4 or 5 pounds on blue grass pasture.
