QUARANTINE STATION ESTABLISHED HERE

A quarantine station was established in Sanderson Wednesday of this week. The station was established to prevent the pink boll weevil worm from entering the east and southeast Texas cotton districts. All tourists who are eastward bound are stopped and their baggage inspected. All day coaches on the passenger trains will also be inspected.

Quarantine stations have also been established in Pecos, Brewster, Presidio, Hudspeth, El Paso, Ward and Reeves counties.

The worst infected area is the Laguna district in Old Mexico, in that district practically all the cotton crop has been destroyed by this worm.

R. E. McDonald, chief Entomologist of the State Department of Agriculture, was here a few days this week inspecting this station.

At present Lee A. Cook of the State Department of Agriculture is in charge of the local station. Mr. Cook states that the Federal Department of Agriculture will soon have a man here to help with the inspection. The station has been established just west of the Western Filling Station.

The Commissioners Court of Terrell county met in regular session on Monday and remained in session two days. The following business was transacted:

Voting precinct No. 5 was done away with and put in voting Precinct No. 2.

Ordered the County Judge to have the jail repaired.

Ordered that county convicts be worked on the streets under the regulation of the law.

Ordered that the county should not pay board bill for prisoners against whom no complaint has been filed.

Ordered all bills be paid and warrants drawn for same.

Approved the County Tax Assessor's rolls. This roll shows one of the largest valuations for Terrell county in a number of years. The total valuation is \$3,081,917.00.

ROMANCE OF WORDS

"HABERDASHER" THROUGH Swinton, who can usually be relied upon for the accuracy of his investigations into the antecedents of words, declares that "haberdasher" is derived from the German "Habt ihr das?" and is based upon the fact that a haberdasher is expected to keep nearly everything in his store, if almost certainly dates back even further to the days of the barbers' or neckcloths, a combination of the words "beard" and "tache," meaning a covering. Chambers, in referring to the word, states: "Herdash was a name formerly used in England for a certain kind of neckwear, and hence a person who made and sold such neckcloths was called a herdasher. Gradually, however, there grew up herdashers of two kinds—those who sold small wares, such as buttons, tapes and other trifles which might be included in the old Norman term 'haperdash,' and those who sold hats. The latter being made of a substance known as 'habertas,' the syllable 'hab' was naturally prefixed to the word 'berdasher' and the name 'haberdasher' applied to anyone who handled articles of either class."

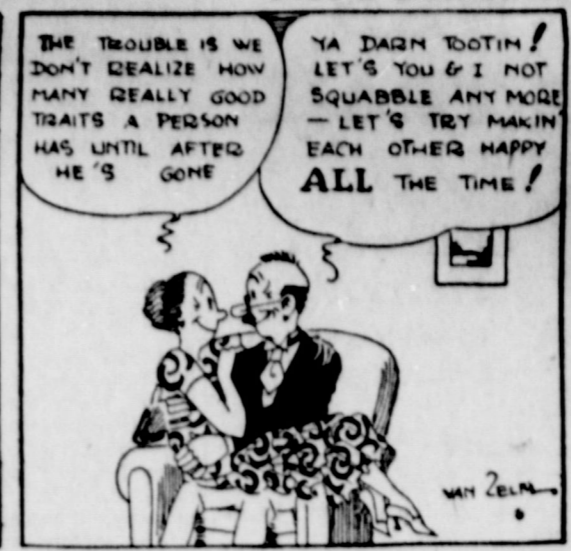

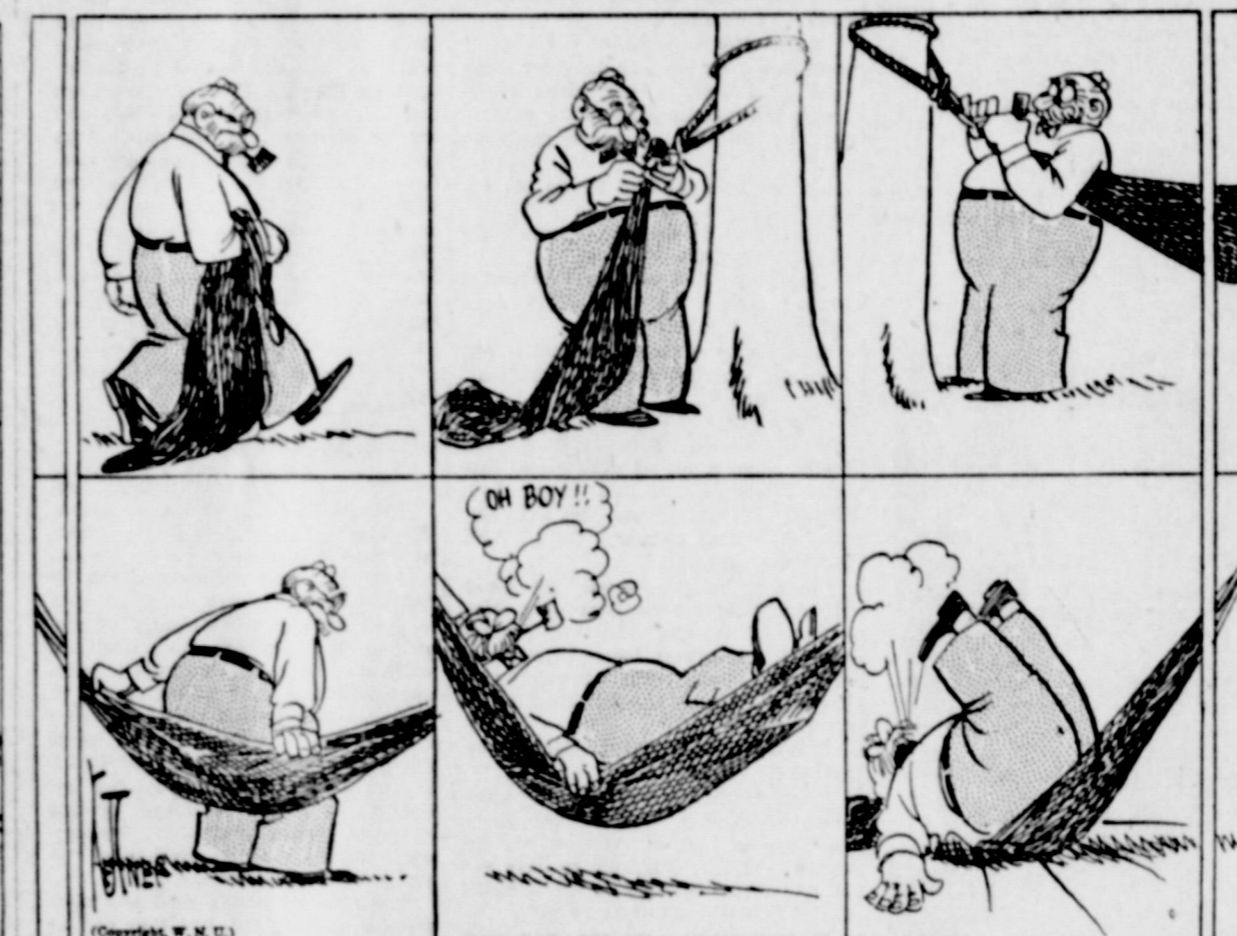
