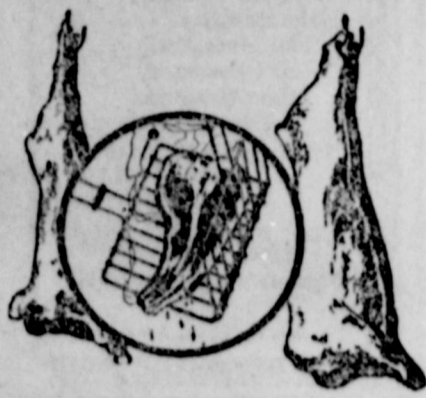

OIL CATCHES AFIRE ON PASSENGER ENGINE

Thursday evening an east-bound passenger train No. 102 pulled in the yards to fill the engine tank with oil, in some unknown manner the oil caught on fire and immediately all the waste oil around the engine and on the ground went up in flames. For awhile it looked as though it might result in a serious fire but with several streams of water poured on it the flames were soon smothered and was brought under control. T. B. Moseley, east end passenger firman, was up in the engine cab when the fire broke out and in jumping off he wrenched his ankle and was taken to 102 to Del Rio for treatment. Several men received minor burns in the excitement.

There was one advantage in a railroad company having all steel coach equipment, as there was no possible danger of the coaches catching on fire Thursday evening.

MEXICAN KILLED AS AIR TANK BLOWS UP

Last Monday morning, about 8 o'clock Andres Gonzalez age 40, a Mexican laborer working for L. Luckie, was instantly killed when a compressed air tank blew up and the flying piece struck him in the face. Lee Luckie was on one side of the air tank using an air drill, drilling a hole to place dynamite in and the Mexican was on the other side about 25 feet away, when for some unknown cause the air tank blew up and the larger part of the tank blew towards the Mexican hitting him in the face, while the cap of the tank blew within 2 feet of Luckie's head and landed about 150 feet in the canyon.

The finding of the Justice of the Peace was accidental death. Communications from his folks in Del Rio advised them to bury him here and the funeral was held Tuesday morning.

"CHEVON" IS NAME FOR GOAT MEAT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 24.—Hereafter, if the efforts of a number of organizations and individuals have the desired effect, goat meat will be designated by a special name which will be comparable to pork, beef, and mutton. The name selected by the goat raising interests in the Southwest is "chevon". In reply to requests for a proposal of this new name, the United States Department of Agriculture has stated that there seems to be no reason why this name should not be adopted and generally applied to the meat of this domestic animal, and it, therefore, approves the name "chevon".

The word "chevon" was created and adopted, after long consideration of many suggestions, by organizations representing the principal Anglo goat producing region. It was made by combining parts of two French words, "chevre" meaning goat, and "mouton" meaning mutton. In other words, "chevon" means goat mutton.

The above will be welcome news. The goat men have fought a long time for this recognition and to B. M. Halbert of Sonora is due considerable credit for the success.

Mrs. E. W. Hardgrave, wife of a Terrell county ranchman, has the distinction of being the one who submitted the name of "chevon" and having that name adopted by the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association.

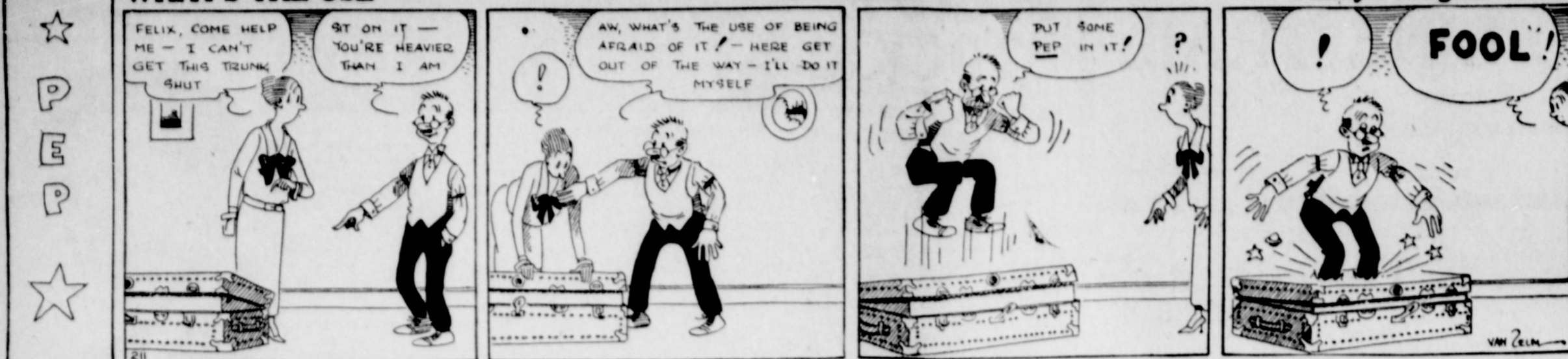

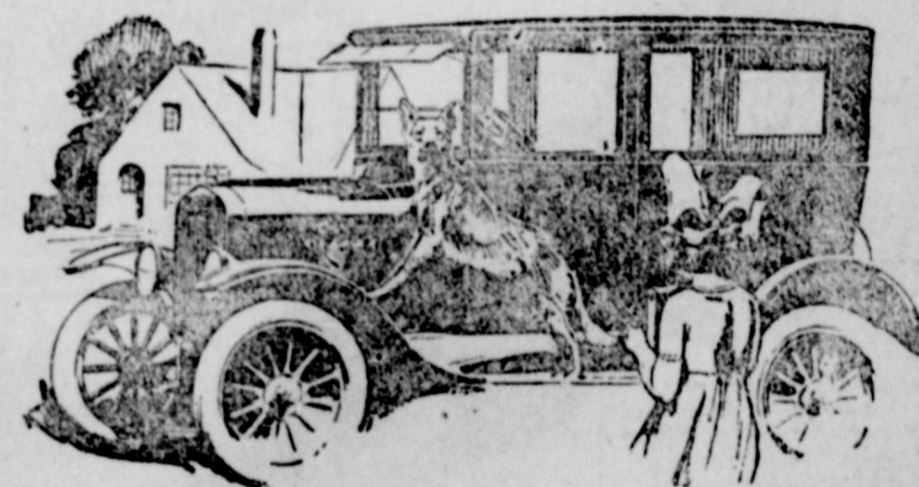
