NEW POSTAGE RATES GO INTO EFFECT APRIL 15

All first class mail unchanged except post cards. Post cards printed and sold by the P. O. Department remain the same 1c each, all other post cards 2c each.

Third class mail embraces all miscellaneous printed matter, books and merchandise weighing not more than 8 ounces. The rate of postage is 1 1/2c for each 2 ounces of fraction thereof, except that the rate of postage on books, catalogs, seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions and plants, not exceeding 8 ounces in weight shall be 1c for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof.

Fourth class mail embraces all miscellaneous printed matter, books and merchandise weighing more than 8 ounces. The rate of postage is by the pound and unchanged, except that a service charge of 2c is made for each parcel. Any parcel post package having in addition to the above postage 25c in stamps affixed and bearing the words "Special Handing" written or printed above the address and near the stamps will be given the same expeditious handling as first class mail.

The registry fee is increased from 10c to 15c for articles indemnified at \$50 or less and remains the same 20c for articles indemnified at not more than \$100. Return receipts may be secured for both registered and insured mail upon payment of 2c.

Condensed Items of Interest to Our Readers.

GLOBE ENTIRELY CIRCLED

Important News of the Week Gathered for Busy Reader—State, Domestic, Foreign.

WASHINGTON NEWS

President Coolidge has reached no decision on the appointment of a new ambassador to Germany, it was said at the White House several days ago. The president has several names under consideration.

Senators Sheppard and Mayfield of Texas a few days ago personally extended to Secretary of the Interior Work and Secretary of Labor Davis invitations to attend the Houston meeting of the United States Good Roads Association on April 26. Invitations to attend were extended to the two cabinet members from the mayor of Houston, the Houston Chamber of Commerce and Governor Trinkle of Virginia, head of the Bankhead Highway association. Secretary of Agriculture Jardine is also to be invited to attend the meeting.

STATE AND DOMESTIC NEWS

Election of officers for the ensuing year and the selection of Austin, Texas as the convention city for 1926 concluded the two-day convention of the Poster Advertising Association of Texas and New Mexico there recently.

Aid for Texas rural schools, as provided for in the rural aid act passed by the senate recently, would henceforth be apportioned on a per capita basis of scholastic population, with the county as a unit. The Wood substitute adopted for the Wallace house bill carries an appropriation of \$1,500,000 yearly for the biennium.

Texas a few days ago moved a notch nearer a new primary election law superseding the Terrell law which has been in force more than 10 years. The senate passed Senator Berkeley's measure offering an entirely new primary system. The vote was 15 to 12. The bill provides for only one primary instead of two, as at present. The primary for all parties would be held the same day, the third Tuesday in July.

Liberty County will begin work soon on its \$500,000 concrete road program for 1925, according to W. C. Young, county engineer. "Seven and one-half miles of concrete will be laid at each end of the county. This will bring the road from the Harris County line to Dayton and from the Jefferson County line about half way to Devers. The remainder of the road to Devers will be surfaced with shell or gravel this year."

Control of the St. Louis Southwestern Railway Company has been acquired by the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railway Company. Charles Hayden, chairman of the Rock Island, announced recently. Acquisition of the Cotton Belt system, Mr. Hayden said, had been accomplished by the Rock Island and interests friendly to the road obtaining a dominant interest in the stock of the St. Louis Southwestern Company.

Total shipments of fruit and vegetables from the valley through the past week stands at 4925 cars, as against 3563 cars at this time last year, although it is predicted that the lead will not hold throughout the season. The greatest increase in single shipments this year over last year is in citrus, a total of 340 cars moving to date, as against 195 cars last year. There also is a large increase in mixed vegetables, the figure this year standing at 1594 as against 676 at this time last year.

FOREIGN NEWS

Eight handbills held up the La Barra train at Arbol Grande recently and robbed it of \$9000 belonging to the Pierce Oil Company. The money was being taken to the oil camp to pay off the workers there.

Dr. Wilhelm Marx, former Germany chancellor, and last month chosen premier of Prussia, was re-elected to the premiership a few days ago, receiving 232 out of 443 votes cast in the diet. Doctor Marx resigned late last month after failing to obtain a vote of confidence.

To solve the problem of double taxation the council of the League of Nations, which opened its 29th meeting at Geneva the other day, voted to appoint a commission composed of United States, South American, German and Polish experts to study the question.

\$4,338,294 in Exports.—Exports from the Sabine district during the month of February were valued at \$4,338,294, with imports amounting to \$443,540, according to the United States customs reports, here.

Confirmed as Envoy.—The senate the other day confirmed the nomination of George H. Ransome as ambassador to Mexico.

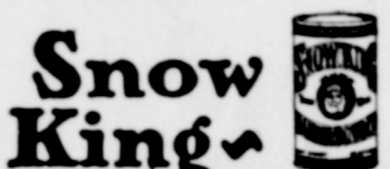

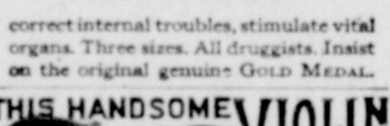

GENERAL FARM NEWS

(By S. C. Hoyle, Editor of Extension Service Publications, A. and M. College of Texas.)

Pure Bred Sires Increase Production.—Some months ago the United States Department of Agriculture put out the following data relative to the value of the pure bred sire in dairy herds:

"There are twelve states (one-fourth of the forty-eight states that have in use an average of 51 per cent of pure bred dairy bulls). The average yearly milk production for the twelve states is 4,065 pounds of milk per cow. The second twelve states have an average of 30 per cent of pure bred dairy bulls in use on the herds and the average yearly milk production is 3,375 pounds of milk per cow. The third group of twelve states, nineteen per cent of pure bred dairy bulls and an average yearly production of 2,761 pounds per cow. The last group of twelve states boasts of only 12 per cent of pure bred dairy sires, and an average yearly milk production of only 2,087 pounds of milk per cow."

Texas is classed in this last group and is just about an average with the twelve. The question is, how are we going to get up into the next production class? One would generally say that it must be by getting a better class of cattle, and to get these cattle we must do it largely by the use of pure bred sires.

Texas has approximately a million cows that are classed as dairy cattle; cows that are kept for the milk they will produce. These dairy cows require the service of about 20,000 bulls. If 12 per cent of these bulls are now pure bred, we have in use 2,400 pure bred dairy sires. If we were to attempt to step up into the next class with 19 per cent, we would have to add to those already in use, 1,400 pure bred bulls. To place into service in the state 1,400 additional pure bred bulls looks like a large task, but it is one that is not beyond accomplishment except for one reason, and that is, that the breeders of the state cannot supply the necessary bulls. Bulls have been placed in the herds of the state at the rate of about 500 per year for the past three or four years and the available supply is not quite exhausted.

Let everyone interested in better dairy cattle try and place a pure bred bull or two and see if this year we cannot find a new home for every bull the breeders have for sale.

Better bulls produce a better grade of cows, a better grade of cows will be handled and fed better than the poor quality animals, and more production makes more profits.

Rodent Control.—Several counties of Texas are applying themselves in earnest to the control of various rodents. Especially was this true in regard to jack rabbits during the month of February. In two drives held, where the rabbits were driven to a center and killed with clubs, farmers in Hansford County killed a total of 1,500 jack rabbits.

In one drive in Midland County 2,500 rabbits were killed. This county is placing chief reliance on the use of poison, estimating the number of jack rabbits killed by this method during February at 29,000. Midland County has also distributed three tons of prairie dog poison.

The prairie dog is also being poisoned in Ochiltree County. The method used in killing the dogs in this and other counties is by the use of poisoned grain, prepared under the direction of the United States Bureau of Biological Survey.

Gophers do a great deal of damage to growing sweet potatoes in some sections. They make unsightly mounds, seriously reduce the carrying capacity of pastures, and they are a nuisance in terraced land, because of the water, following their runways, often cuts an opening across a terrace. Farmers in Houston County are undertaking by poisoning and the use of traps, to destroy these pests on their property.

Oldham and Potter Counties report grasshopper eggs in great numbers. In Wilbarger and Nolan Counties the county agents find grasshoppers hatching, and while the situation is not yet serious, they are making all preparations for an immediate fight if necessary.

Cut Worms.—Contrary to anticipations, the cut-worm appears to be rather prevalent in Anderson County they are attacking plants in hot beds and cold frames, and the county agent has advised control measures. In such case, or where found in garden or field, poison bran mash, properly mixed and applied, is fully effective.

Cut Ants.—Cut ants, the "agriculturists of the insect world," cut the leaves from various plants and do great damage. In Kleberg County, the county agent received a complaint in February that they were defoliating citrus trees, and made arrangements for destroying the ant town.

Tomato Pest Control.—In no other place does pest control show such outstanding results as in the garden or the truck farm. The county agent of Henderson County is planting a campaign of tomato pest control among the growers there, and has arranged for spraying demonstrations for insects and diseases to be held at such time as these pests attack.

Farm and Home Suggestions.—Before planning to increase production, make sure that the product can be sold.

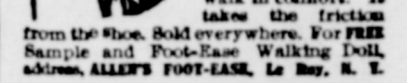

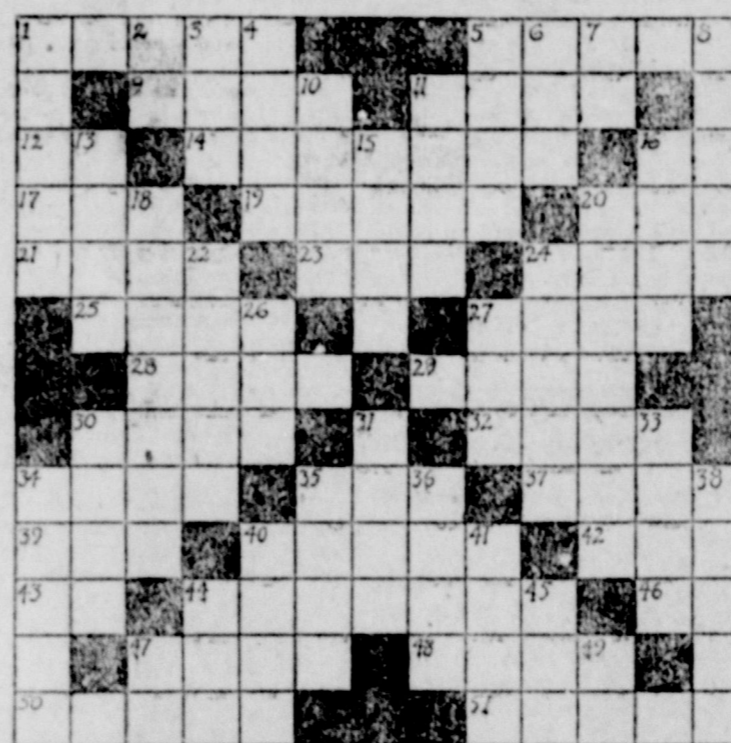

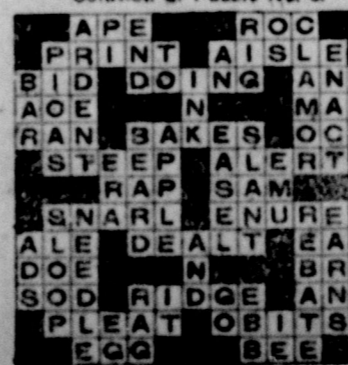
