**PROMOTED AND MANAGED BY KING AND BUCK**

On June 15 and 16 Sanderson opened her gates to the crowds who thronged in to the rodeo. For two days the calendar was turned back, the years were wiped out while the old West, that is fast fading away, came back to life.  
Roping, riding, bull-dogging and racing filled the days and the dances lasted far into the nights. Business was practically suspended while the park was crowded to its capacity with the crowds watching the exhibitions of skill unequalled before.  
Cowboys reigned supreme for two days in the little city between the hills. Ropes whirling, dust rising, horses bucking, shouting of crowds, and bawling of cattle all mingled to wipe out the present day of commercialism and bring back the old days when the West was young and cowboys were kings of the range.  
The big rodeo opened Monday morning with a long parade of cowboys and girls led by Louie Gravey riding a wild cow who was built along wild lines and specialized in thrills for the spectators who lined the streets.  
After the parade reached the park the show opened. First on the program "Red" Hawkins announced "Shorty McCrory riding Blue Goose," and "wow" here he came through the gate and the show was on. It was continuous with no tiresome waits between.  
Some of the best ropers of the state participated in the rodeo. Some who need special attention were Grover King, Emmett Buck, Boy Babb, Walter Babb, Willie Banner, A. Harrell, Howard Westfall, Allan Holder, Hiram Harris, Homer Laney, Clyde Meadows and Wilson Banner.  
Bode Owens and Howard Westfall gave exhibition roping with their trained horses which were ridden without bridles. "Shorty" Celsoe, of White Creek, Wyo., and Pecos Pete staged a bucking broncho contest. "Shorty" McCrory rode bucking, backing Billy, from Bronchoville, and he rode him bareback. Louie Cravey rode the wild mule while the crowds cheered him to an echo.  
Boy Bab was the artist with the rope who held the attention of the crowd both days. He roped Mexican style using a sixty foot rope. He never missed a throw during the two days. Mr. Bab is a horseman who showed his appreciation of the horses he rode and it was a treat to watch him ride and rope. It was due to his skill that no accidents occurred during the show.  
Monty Corder and Walter Bab were the two competent and conscientious judges of the riding contests.  
Harry Sharp, Max Bopusch and Sam Murray were time keepers. Max Luckie loaned the goats for roping. They were Mexican goats built for speed and not for mohair and most of them had a race horse skinned on the start. The best bucking broncho was owned by Joe Kerr. Other owners of bucking horses were Max Luckie, Matt Turner, Ed Downie, Monty Corder and Perry Kinman. Ed Downie furnished the cattle for roping and riding.  
Jim Harkey of Sheffield owned the winning race horses and the managers appreciated his bringing them over. Mr. Harkey raises good horses.  
Some of the best horses used were broken and owned by Grover King. Hoote, the beautiful (Continued on last page)
