**Man Found Unconscious.**

Last Thursday afternoon while riding east of town, Sheriff Joe Nance and Deputy Lee Cooke noticed a man walking up and down the railroad track near the Cochran ranch, two miles east of town. They did not pay much attention to him, thinking he was a hobo, Friday morning they were again near the same place and saw him in a creek bed gazing around. Becoming suspicious they walked up to the man and discovered that he was badly bruised and his face covered with blood, and he was delirious. They immediately brought him to town and had Dr. Robertson dress his wounds. The man was then questioned as to whom he was and where he was going, but no information could be obtained from him. Mr. Nance went back to where he was located and found where he had wandered, and it was not long before he discovered the man's coat and vest, which contained a gold watch, a traveler's accident policy in the name of G. W. Bagley, a letter from his wife in Indianapolis, Ind., and the address of his son, Charles Bagley, Madura, Cal., and also a railroad ticket to his home.

Saturday morning the stranger was taken to the Santa Rosa Hospital at San Antonio. Before leaving here he gained his senses and remembered everything with the exception of taking this trip. It is supposed that he was a passenger on train No. 110 Thursday, and that he failed to get on the train in time, and probably caught a rear car and either jumped or lost hold, falling from the train.

He was a man about 57 years old, well dressed and seemed to be well educated. His folks were wired about the accident.

**ENGINEER A. V. BOYCE DIES**

Word was received in the city Tuesday morning of the death of A. V. Boyce at his home in Del Rio, at 2:30 that morning. He was 68 years old. The funeral was held from the F. H. Doran chapel in Del Rio, Wednesday morning. The religious services were in charge of Rev. F. H. Stallknecht, pastor of the St. James' Episcopal Church in that city.

Mr. Boyce was born in Coryell County, Texas, but since early manhood had been in this section of the State. He went to Mexico more than 40 years ago, returning to Texas 39 years ago, and during the past 29 years had resided in Del Rio.

He was married in San Antonio in 1883 and was then working for the Southern Pacific and he had been in the service of the company since that time. He retired last spring and recently applied for a pension from the Southern Pacific.

Mr. Boyce leaves a widow and three children. Mr. Boyce had many friends throughout West and Southwest Texas.

**THREE WILDCATS WILL BE DRILLED IN TERRELL COUNTY**

Don Dillon and associates will start a wildcat test within ninety days on the Julian M. Bassett ranch in Terrell County which will be the first of three wildcat tests to be drilled by him on the ranch and all to be completed within eighteen months. The leasing of the ranch to Dillon was announced by Mr. Bassett Saturday. The ranch contains 400,000 acres and is sixty miles long from east to west and thirty-five miles wide from north to south. A little of the ranch is in Val Verde County and one of the tests will be in that county. The bulk of the ranch is in Terrell County, and north of the Southern Pacific Railroad.

Terrell County is in the Marathon Fold territory and the finding of oil in Crockett County which adjoins Terrell on the northeast and the Big Lake oil field in Reagan County on next north of Crockett all serves to add interest and importance to the new tests in Terrell County which will be almost the first wildcat tests in the county.

Dillon will move a rig from Lockhart to Terrell County at once and the first test will be started as soon as geologists have made the location and the derrick and rig can be put up. The three tests will be in widely separate parts of the ranch and a block of 20,000 acres around each test will be set off for Dillon and his associates. The rig being moved from Lockhart is a combination rotary and cable tool rig. One of the tests will be in the Val Verde County end of the ranch on the east and one in the western end of the ranch and another in the north central part of the ranch.

West Texas at this time is getting as much attention from the oil industry as any part of the State. Wildcat tests are everywhere and their number increasing. The finds in Reagan, Crockett and Upton Counties are partly responsible for the situation and unless some big field is brought in somewhere to overstock the market with crude oil it seems probable that wildcatting in that territory will continue to increase. It is understood that other tests on other parts of the Bassett ranch by other interests may be arranged for.—San Antonio Express.

**TWO MEN CHARGED WITH INTENT TO KILL**

Sheriff Nance made a trip to Dryden to this week to arrest Everett Miller and George O. (Tinker) Rutledge for shooting three shots at John Breg, while gathering cattle down on Indian Canyon. Examining trials were held here Monday and Tuesday and both men were placed under a \$750 bond each, to await the action of Terrell county grand jury in January on an assault and intent to murder charge.

**JOHN M. GRAY BUYS RANCH NEAR DRYDEN**

John M. Gray, who is now interested with E. K. Fawcett in a flock of sheep which is being ranged on land owned by Mr. Fawcett, about 85 miles distant from this city on the east side of Devil's River, has bought a 15-section ranch 20 miles north of Dryden, which is known as the Cackleburr Ranch.

It is the new owner's present intention to move to the Dryden property about December 1, or as quickly as a division of the stock owned by himself and Mr. Fawcett can be made, so it was learned this week.—Val Verde County Herald.

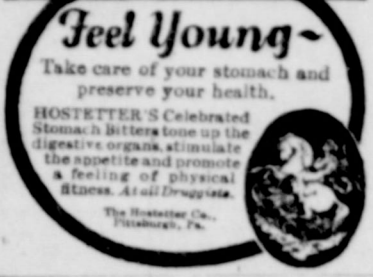

NEWS HAPPENINGS

What Has Transpired This Week the World Over.

AT THE NATIONAL CAPITAL Short Mentioning of Interesting Happenings From Day to Day Throughout the World.

WASHINGTON NEWS.

A mutually satisfactory settlement of the Italian debt is expected by President Coolidge. The executive's belief that Italy will fund its two billion dollar war obligations was expressed at the White House Friday after the president had conferred with Secretary of the Treasury Mellon and Senator Reed Smoot, members of the American debt funding commission.

Postal receipts for October for 59 selected cities, made public Thursday by the postoffice department, totaled \$32,459,042, an increase of \$3,370,179 over the same month last year.

Despite the fact that the United States has the most favorable conditions for developing commercial aviation, it is being far outstripped in this field by other nations, a special committee of engineering and business experts Thursday informed the commerce department.

Repeal of the income tax publicity law has been voted by the house ways and means committee. This action was taken Friday in the course of the committee's work in drafting a tax reduction bill.

Major General W. H. Hart, quartermaster-general of the army, has been appointed Director of the budget of an estimate of \$225,000 for reconditioning the Lee mansion in Arlington National Cemetery under congressional authority for restoration of the structure to its ante-bellum glory.

President Coolidge this year will follow the established custom of placing a wreath on the tomb of the Unknown Soldier on Armistice day.

Clarence G. Malstrom of Denver Tuesday was appointed assayer of the United States mint at Denver.

STATE AND DOMESTIC NEWS.

The protective quarantine which has surrounded 19 counties in South Texas for several weeks was lifted Thursday. The quarantine will continue for Harris, Galveston and Brazoria counties for several weeks yet. After 60 days from the last outbreak, which was October 15, a number of cattle will be placed in the worst parts of the infected area and if they do not contract the disease the quarantine will be lifted at the end of 21 days.

The school board's program of elementary school expansion and improvement was approved Tuesday by a vote of virtually four to one on the \$4,000,000 bond issue by the voters of the Houston, Texas, Independent school district.

Kewan, a village ten miles east of Corpus, Texas, was struck by a tornado Wednesday and the homes of Pete Cartwright, Ed Kelly, Nathan Kelly and Frank Johnson were completely destroyed.

The funeral of Mrs. Lucille Drew, widow of the late Sidney Drew, and one of the first film comedienne, was held here Thursday at Los Angeles, Cal.

Deficiency amounting to \$552,000 to fight the foot and mouth disease in Harris and Galveston Counties was ordered Tuesday by Governor Miriam A. Ferguson. The State Livestock Sanitary Commission made the request of the governor, who honored the request and sent the order to the controller's department.

A body recovered by divers Sunday from the sunken submarine S-61, has been identified as that of Henry Lee Crawford, radio man, of Ardmore, Okla.

Seven were killed and 25 children were injured when the Atlantic Coast Line's fast New York to Florida passenger train No. 81 crashed into a loaded school bus at a grade crossing Monday near Nabusta, Ga.

The public school of Wharton, Texas, were ordered closed Tuesday by the city health officer on account of prevalence of diphtheria.

FOREIGN NEWS.

The Russian telegraphic agency announces that the president of the central executive committee has commuted the 3-4th sentence passed earlier in July upon Dr. Karl Kindermann, Max von Dittmar, and Theodore Volscht, Germans, convicted of plotting to assassinate Trotsky, Stalin and other bolshevik leaders.

Efforts to breed silver fox in France are being pursued energetically.

Two American destroyers, the Coghlan and the Lamson, were sent Thursday from Alexandria, Egypt, to Beirut as a precautionary measure.

Upon its re-opening Tuesday the French senate validated the election of M. Caillaux, finance minister in the first Poincare cabinet, as senator for Sarthe.

General Michael Prunse, Russia's young war minister, who died Saturday at Moscow after an operation, was buried Tuesday in the revolutionary martyr's cemetery before the historic Kremlin, with impressive ceremonies.

ONLY UNASSISTED TRIPLE PLAY IN 1925

Made by Glenn Wright, Shortstop of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

The unassisted triple play made its rare appearance in 1925, after the year 1924 had gone into the records without one in the major leagues. Glenn Wright of the champion Pittsburgh Pirates was the hero of this baseball novelty. It happened on May 7 in a game with the Cardinals and did not show again this year. The rarity of Wright's feat may be gathered from the fact that there were only seven three-play killings in the majors in 1925—six in the National and one in the American—and Wright's unassisted play was one of the seven.

Wright turned the trick in the ninth inning. With Cooney on second and Hornsby on first, Bottomley lined to Wright. He touched second, retiring Cooney, who had started for third, and then he touched Hornsby, who had dashed for the keystone sack.

The Phillies and the Cubs each engineered two triple plays. In neither case did the same player appear both times. The Robins were the victims of a triple play on three occasions, Pittsburgh, St. Louis and Boston were the other victims in the National league. The New York Giants executed one, a lengthy affair, in which the ball passed from Jackson to Gowdy, to Groh to Jackson, to Kelly and finally to Terry for the third put-out.

The Sewell brothers, Luke and Joe, and Spurgeon turned in the only triple play in the American league, the Athletics being the victims.

The triple play records follow:

June 13—Jackson, Gowdy, Groh (Philadelphia) vs. Brooklyn. June 29—Carlson, Sand and Hawks (Philadelphia) vs. Brooklyn. September 22—Adams, Naylor, Grimm and Hartnett (Chicago) vs. Brooklyn. American League: August 25—Spurgeon L. Sewell and J. Sewell (Cleveland) vs. Philadelphia.

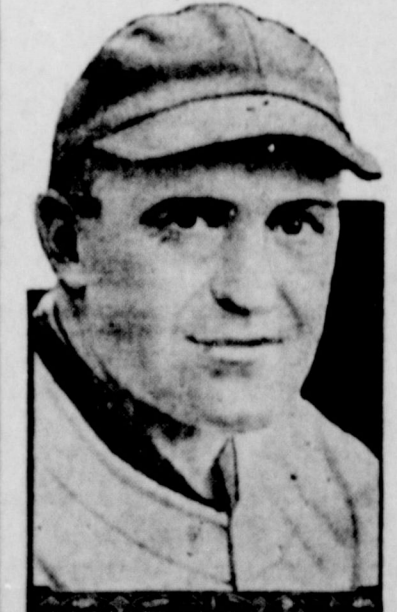
Before the baseball season ends the football season begins and by the time it ends the basketball season has begun. There is very little time to devote to the ordinary interests and occupations of life.

Dazzy Vance of Brooklyn gets first choice as pitcher, with these following in the order named: Johnson, Washington; Coveleskie, Washington; Rommel, Philadelphia Americans; and Yde, Pittsburgh.

Cochrane of the Athletics is first choice for catcher, with Ruel of Washington and Hartnett of the Cubs next.

The utility men for the all-America 1925 squad are: Infield, Kelly of the Giants; outfield, Cuyler of Pittsburgh, and pitcher, Harberry of Washington.

LATE FARM NEWS

(By S. C. Moyle, Editor of Extension Service Publications, A. and M. College of Texas.)

WITH TEXAS COUNTY AGENTS, Nacogdoches County.

On the 6th of September some sixty or seventy truck growers met at the court house and organized "The Nacogdoches Truck Growers' Association" for the year 1926. The purpose of this organization is to get enough acreage for carlot shipments of truck crops. Monthly meetings will be held the first Saturday in each month to push this project.

Brazos County.

Farm Engineering.—Terracing and drainage are engaging the attention of more and more farmers throughout the county, more individual calls having already been made on the county agent than would be possible to answer. Conference of farmers from various communities was held on September 19 to devise plans whereby help in terracing could be carried to a greater number of farmers. Many plans were considered, among them being the selection, by the people of some field or farm for demonstration to which all interested farmers might go and learn use of farm level and some of the principles of terracing.

Nueces County.

As a result of preliminary drainage and level work in the river district in the Bluntzer community, we have now under way in this community a state reclamation project. Assistance has been given to the farmers and engineers now in charge of the project, which is progressing nicely.

Another real service to local dairymen was the making of arrangements with Mexico buyers to buy and ship out scrub dairy cattle unprofitable for economical milk production. These cattle are being replaced by much better stock from Falfurrias and Kingsville herds. We were able to get prices ranging from \$8 to \$12 more for this scrub stock than paid by local butchers.

Williamson County.

Farm Engineering.—We have quite a number of successful irrigation projects in operation this year. They have brought in large dividends in truck, feed crops and cotton this year. Much new interest has been created in this line of work.

Kaufman County.

We have one irrigation project developed to the extent that we have about six acres in truck this fall and will possibly have twenty next spring. We have all the water we need, supplied by springs. No pumps are used. Two other surveys were made for reservoirs for a possible irrigation plan, but found that it was not practical.

Galveston County.

Dairying took most of the field time this past month. All regular work was called off, but a great deal of assistance was rendered the farmers in making up records of productions and costs in order to have something to present the appraisers of the cattle which were condemned due to the foot and mouth disease. At this time it is thought that about half of the dairy herds in the dairy section will have to be killed to stop the disease. Three of the five herds on which records have been kept by the agent are already underground. The disease has also killed the value of most of the agent's work on this line.

Bad as it is, it may be a grand opportunity to set together these dairyman who intend to go back in the business and get into the county some real good foundation stock. At the present time it is not known how long it will be before the men will be allowed to restock the dairies.

San Augustine County.

Small irrigation plants are becoming popular in this county. One new plant was installed this month. There were already four irrigation plants in San Augustine County. The success of the farmers owning these plants has led three others farmers to have their farms surveyed for the same purpose. On all these farms the plan is to pump the water from spring branches and creeks with small rotary pumps. In most cases the stream had to be dammed up with earth dams to secure a sufficient amount of water to irrigate from one to four acres of land.

Harris County.

The Harris County Milk Producers' Association has succeeded in getting the price of whole milk raised to 85 cents per pound of butter fat. Under their agreement with the milk distributors the producers will take care of any surplus milk, whether seasonal surplus or that created by any other cause. This should have a tendency to stabilize the price, both to producers and consumers.

Washington County.

Thirteen demonstrations in terracing eroded farm lands were given during the past month. The meetings generally were well attended and farmers of this county are taking a great deal of interest in soil conservation. Excellent results have been obtained from the terracing done here during the past several years, which is regarded as the most outstanding piece of extension work now being conducted in Washington County.

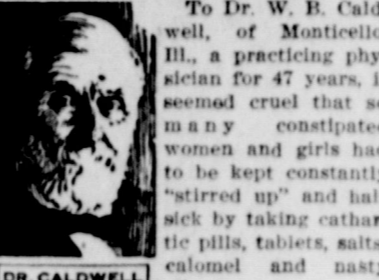

#### Recuperating From Drouth.

Texas will never cease to be a wonderful state. Two months ago a large part of the state was seriously suffering from the effects of a long drouth. The rains came too late for the cotton crop.

But in time for the grass to spring up and for fall feed crops to mature. The fields are covered with oats and rye and the stock are again sleek and contented. Business men report that business is "as usual" and that people have apparently forgotten the long drouth.

About the only noticeable depression is in the auto trade, for many people who might have been buying new cars are using their old ones another year.

Not Voting Road Bonds.

About the only topic of general conversation in Austin now, aside from the weather, is about road matters and road contracts. The rumors, investigations and revelations cast a gloom over the public that is worse than a drouth or a prolonged rainy season. No one knows what to expect next and the people are appalled about all the talk of waste and extravagance in the expenditure of their taxes. The effort has been to stop the voting of bonds for road building, with the result that road building progress in Texas will be seriously checked. When confidence in those entrusted with public expenditures is destroyed or weakened, progress stops, not knowing which way to turn. Let us hope that the beleaguered atmosphere in Texas official life may soon be cleared.

Hotel Rest Rooms for Customers.

Leading "dry goods firms at San Antonio and Dallas are doing some thing that might be tried to advantage by chambers of commerce or other organizations in smaller places. They are sending letters to select lists of customers telling them that when they come to the city they will find a room at a certain hotel ready for their use during the day without charge and without reference to whether they make purchases from the store. A card is enclosed that entitles the holder to all the courtesies of the hotel for the day at any time the party may be in the city.

Public rest rooms are usually cheerful places and expensive to maintain. Those who go there often have a feeling that the rooms are semi-charity institutions. Why not arrange with the local hotels to have rooms available during the day for the free use of those whose standing entitles them to such courtesies? The cost should not be great, and it would be good advertising for the hotels and for the towns showing this interest in out-of-town customers.

Personal Appearance an Asset.

We all know that it makes a person feel better to "droll up" a bit. The women do not put on finery and use cosmetics solely to please the men, but largely to please themselves. They have learned the value of personal appearance better than the men, although very few men fail to respond in better feelings to the influence of good clothes and attractive personal appearance. Every one knows that good clothes are a valuable business asset. Very few can get themselves in a proper state of mind for work without putting on their "Sunday clothes."

Dr. J. G. Springer, superintendent of the Austin State Hospital, says he has found that most women with mental ailments respond to "beauty parlor" treatment, even when they are unresponsive to every other appeal. Often the most dejected and downcast become smiling and happy after beauty treatment. You owe it to yourself to look your best.

Band Music in Texas.

Fourteen bands from neighboring towns gathered at Lufkin, recently and gave a massed band concert. A few years ago such a thing would have been impossible, for there were not many more than fourteen brass bands in Texas. Now every town of any consequence and most country communities have good bands, taught by competent directors. Music dealers find that their best business is in band instruments and band music. Music in whatever form it appears evidences the culture of a people.

The Texas Pecan Crop.

Texas pecans are now being gathered and marketed. While the crop is short in some localities, the yield in the state is said to be about the average. Pecans are growing more in favor everywhere as a food and as a substitute for meat. Prices are becoming more stable and more in line with prices of other food products. Texas is destined to become as noted for its pecans as for its cotton, for pecans can be successfully grown in all parts of the state and in every kind of soil.

Civic Clubs and Service.

Civic clubs are being accused of praising themselves too much—of self-boasting. While there may be much of the "look-at-us" attitude in the methods of some of the clubs, they are showing the churches that to serve God one must serve his fellow-men.

Community Lines Lost.

Automobiles are fast destroying the imaginary lines that once divided town and country and separated communities from each other.

## Pup Couldn't Digest Big Feast of Nails

Hop, Skip and Jump, each a four-month-old pointer dog, found a bag of nails while they were playing under the counter of Max Goldman's store, 95 West Houston street, swallowed the nails, and began indicating that they did not well. Goldman took them to a hospital for animals.

There Dr. Alfred W. Meyer, M.D., on Skip, removing a pound of nails from his stomach, but Skip. The surgeons then operated on Hop, and in his interior found 558 wire nails, each an inch long; one three-inch nail, two long pieces of bent wire and a stone as large as a plum. Hop recovered from the operation and probably will get well. Doctor Meyer explored Jump, X-ray pictures having shown the presence of nails.—New York Herald-Tribune.
