EAGLES VICTORIOUS OVER ALPINE

Boys Fought to the Finish in the Last Game of the Season

Thanksgiving Day was a great day for Sanderson High School athletics. After watching the high school girls slaughter the Alpine high team by a 34 to 3 score sport followers were furnished with another Sanderson victory over Alpine when the Eagles defeated Alpine Bucks in a scrappy football game to a score of 6 to 0.

Alpine won the toss and received, and Newton kicked off 55 yards, the ball rolling over the goal line, which gave the Bucks the ball on their own 20 yard line. After three attempts to gain the necessary 10 yards, Alpine was forced to kick and the Eagles gained possession of the ball for the first time on the 50 yard line. By a series of line bucks on which Landers, Grigsby and Morgan all ripped off gain after gain, the Eagles carried the ball to within 4 yards of the goal, and Jansa was called back from center and plunged over for the touchdown. A bad pass from center was probably the reason for falling on the try for point, as Newton's delayed kick was easily blocked.

For the remaining three periods neither side was able to score. Alpine could gain nothing thru the Eagles' line, and neither fake nor pass could gain for them any yardage of note. In this period Alpine seemed to get off to a bad start, as the backfield would juggle the ball so as to insure failure of the play. The Eagle backfield apparently made gains at will thru the line of the Bucks, and time after time brought the ball down the field to within scoring distance, only to fail in the final punch to add to their score. Throughout the entire game the Bucks only made a few first downs, while the Sanderson crew made many, being forced to kick only once. The inability of the Alpine line to hold the onslaughts of the Sanderson backs in check, enabled the Eagles to keep the ball in the enemies territory most of the time, and a costly fumble or two aided in keeping the Eagle score down. Not once during the entire game did Alpine threaten to score.

Victory in this game was due in a great measure to the splendid defensive game of the Eagle line. Time and again an Alpine play would be broken up behind the line of scrimmage. Every man in the line from wing to wing contributed to an airtight defense and Alpine's stellar backs, Allen and Carter, could make no headway.

Outstanding players for the Eagles were Grigsby and Jansa on the offense, and Landers, Mitchell and Jansa on the defense. These men played a game which Sanderson will remember. But neither can we overlook the stellar playing of K. Harrell, tackle, playing a defensive end. Newton played with his usual consistency and Franklin deserves mention for his return of punts. Morgan handled the team with few miscues, and instilled fight into his team on every play.

Great credit belongs to the girls and other rooters for the support rendered the team from the sidelines. Football in Sanderson is a new thing, but already the entire community is backing this sport to the limit, and only thru such can Sanderson hope to compete with the larger towns of this section. At the first of the season the doubters said it couldn't be done, but 14 boys started and most of these had never seen a game before, after starting six weeks later than everyone else, were able to either the end of the season to either.

FIRST SHORT WOOL SALE FOR THE 1925 FALL SEASON

A fraction over 39c a pound is the peak price paid for the first short wool of the 1925 fall season in Texas," states the San Angelo Standard. "This was learned unofficially Wednesday after March Bros., of San Angelo, Tuesday afternoon sold their season's accumulation, totaling almost 100,000 pounds to Henry D. Allen of Philadelphia, representing Charles J. Webb Sons' Company of Philadelphia.

The sale followed the first sealed bid offering of the season in the State by the Wool Growers' Central Storage Company here, in which all bids on 450,000 pounds were rejected, resulting in the calling off of the auction. Bids received by the Wool Growers ranged from 23c to a fraction over 39c, it was understood. It was the consensus of opinion among sheepmen in San Angelo Tuesday that the producers generally will hold for 40c or better. The average price received by March Bros. was above 36c.

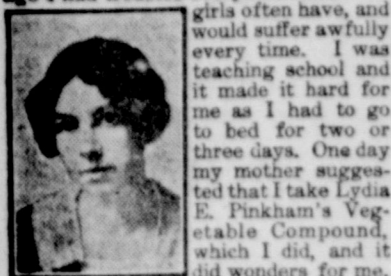

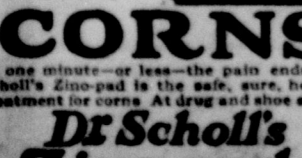

NEWS HAPPENINGS

What Has Transpired This Week the World Over.

AT THE NATIONAL CAPITAL

Short Mentioning of Interesting Happenings From Day to Day Throughout the World.

WASHINGTON NEWS.

Captain Paul Foley was exonerated Friday by the Shenandoah naval court of inquiry of Mrs. Margaret Ross Lansdowne's charge that he sought to sway her testimony. The court held that Captain Foley, its former judge advocate, was not guilty either of seeking to cause false testimony to be offered before the court, or of seeking by "improper means to influence" the widow of the Shenandoah commander.

Taking one of the most drastic steps since the reorganization of the federal prohibition enforcement began last April, the treasury Thursday revoked, effective December 31, every outstanding alcohol permit issued under the federal prohibition law. Simultaneously, a sweeping investigation was begun to determine whether any or all of the permits should be renewed.

The postoffice at Marysue, Liberty County, Texas, will be discontinued November 30, the postoffice department has announced.

The drafting of legislation to change the crop reporting system of the government in a way that would prevent speculation on the cotton exchange has been undertaken by Senator Harris, democrat, Georgia, a former director of the census bureau.

Charles D. Lawrence of New York has been appointed as assistant attorney general.

Nineteen vessels were sold by the shipping board in individual sales to different companies last week for a total of \$1,599,000. All require certain repairs which are to be made at the expense of the purchasers.

Rapping the United States shipping board for its refusal to "go along" with President Coolidge, Secretary of Commerce Hoover Tuesday made public what is regarded as the administration's merchant marine policy. Hoover declared the government must get out of the shipping business as quickly as private operation can be established.

STATE AND DOMESTIC NEWS.

The American Road Company Friday confessed in the court at Austin, Texas, the state should recover from it \$600,000 excess highway profits; that it contracts with the highway commission should be canceled; that its permit to do business should be perpetually canceled and that it should pay costs of the suit brought against it by Attorney General Dan Moody.

The State Highway Commission meeting scheduled for November 23 in Austin has been postponed to the regular meeting December 14, according to letters addressed to county judges and commissioners courts, by Eugene T. Smith, secretary of the commission. The postponement was made because of the litigation involving the highway commission and because no important business is set for that date, it was announced.

George R. Terrell, commissioner of agriculture, Friday estimated the Texas cotton crop at 3,980,000 bales for 1925, as compared to 4,851,000 bales for 1924.

With the election of W. L. Stark of Austin to the presidency and the selection of Dallas as next meeting place, the Texas Hotel Association closed a two-day convention Tuesday at Galveston.

FOREIGN NEWS.

Alexandra, the dowager queen of Great Britain died Friday from a heart attack. The well-beloved queen mother, widow of the late King Edward, died at her country home at Sandringham, where she had been in retirement for more than a year due to ill health. Queen Alexandra, who would have been 81 had she lived until December 1.

Druse and Bedouin rebels are reported to have captured the village of Morj Ayun, on the Palestine frontier. The defenders of the village, 1000 Lebanese volunteers, are said to have surrendered.

The soviet government has ordered 300 motor busses from European manufacturers.

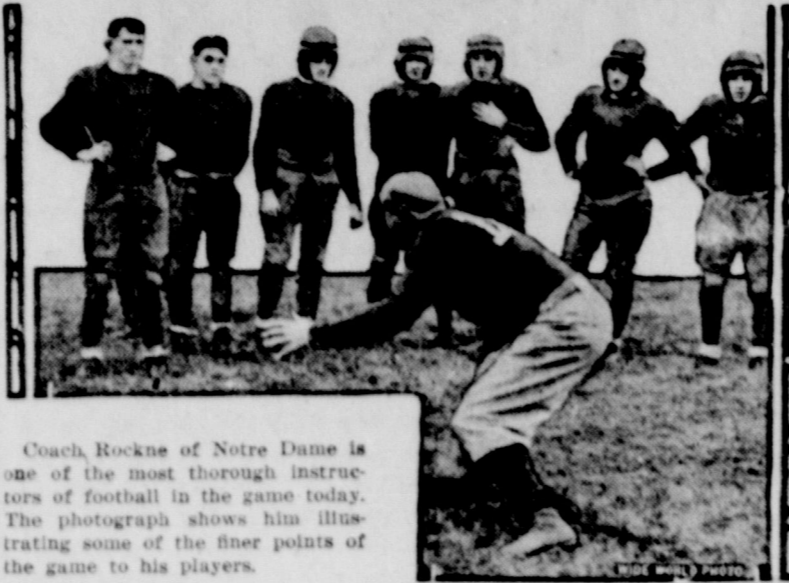
Thirteen of the American aviators who have been fighting Riff rebels in Morocco as part of the sultan's air forces, returned to France Friday.

It is announced that the soviet textile syndicate purchased in the United States during the year ending October 1, \$44,000,000 worth of cotton.

The Italian government gave official recognition to the movement to raise by popular subscriptions of \$1 each, a sum of \$5,000,000 annually for the payment of the American debt by an authorization issued to all post-offices in Italy Thursday to accept individual and group contributions.

Austen Chamberlain's motion for ratification of the Locarno security pact was carried in the house of commons in London Thursday, 375 to 13. A labor amendment to Mr. Chamberlain's motion was defeated, 332 to 130.

Mike Kelly, coach of the Central high school football team of Washington, D. C., discussing Rockne's system of coaching the Notre Dame players, said a few days ago: "Smartness on the field and individual superiority over opposing players seem to be the characteristics of his players. Speed and deception in his plays, aimed at the weaknesses of the opponents as they are disclosed to a smart quarterback, make any team he coaches a much-feared aggregation. Possessed of keen analysis, a daring imagination and a wonderful liking for the game of football, as well as a sportsman's regard for the ethics of the game, Rockne is a credit to the school at South Bend."

Drake University's New

Stadium for Athletics

Drake university's new \$230,000 athletic stadium will not be as large as many similar structures in the United States, but has a number of unusual features. Among them will be a glass-enclosed press stand with a capacity for 64 men. There will be room for 25 telegraph wires and six telephones.

The stadium will have 25 entrance ramps and will have a capacity of 18,029 persons. Board seats laid on top of concrete, with numbers burned in to indicate reservations, are so constructed that a spectator can obtain a splendid view of any part of the field from any quarter.

The stadium covers eight acres, and incloses a quarter-mile track, a 120-yard straightaway of eight lanes and a regulation football field.

While the capacity is limited to 18,029, the foundation is so constructed that additional decks can be added without difficulty, and it is the intention of the school's athletic authorities eventually to increase the number to 30,000.

Find Oarsmen Efficient

as a Power "Machine"

A novel test recently made at Yale university has shown the trained oarsman to be a more efficient power machine than a steam engine or gasoline motor.

The test was conducted to determine the amount of energy used by the trained racing oarsman in propelling his craft. It was shown that approximately one-quarter of the power went directly into the force that moved the boat. The driving power of motors, it is said, generally registers amounts below that figure. It was also disclosed, through the use of special apparatus, the average oarsman, during a contest, will breathe about 3,600 cubic inches of air a minute. Other interesting facts revealed were that in the early part of a race the average oarsman produces almost four horse power and that his consumption of body fuel is equivalent to that in approximately a half-pound of sugar.

LATE FARM NEWS

(By S. C. Hoyla, Editor of Extension Service Publications, A. and M. College of Texas.)

WITH THE COUNTY HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENTS.

Lynn County.

Two of our club girls went to Dallas and attended the Club Girls' Educational Encampment. They were thrilled with it. Wish we could have sent one from each community. All year we have tried to get our people to see demonstration work as something more than a local affair. A few have realized it.

The thirty-four ribbons we won at Lubbock and the seven we won at Dallas have done more to encourage club work than could have been done by a year's talking. In short, we believe in fairs and exhibits.

Scurry County.

Corn Canning.—Something over one thousand cans have been canned as a result of two demonstrations.

Kitchen Contest.—Twenty-six women have already entered Kitchen Contest and most of these kitchens have been judged.

Remodeling Dresses.—Sixty-three have been remodeled and two dress forms made.

Victoria County.

Mrs. James R. Sarlls of Wood Community exhibited two of her hook rugs at the county fair this fall and sold both of them. She is now taking orders and selling all she can make. The prices ran from \$5.00 to \$10.00. This is the result of a demonstration given the club of that community about two years ago.

Mrs. Sarlls will use her money for improving her home.

Harris County.

When the county health nurse weighed the pupils of the Post Oak School and found a member underweight, the teacher and parents immediately got busy. The school board agreed to build a kitchen. One corner of the porch was boarded up for this so that the children could reach it without going out in bad weather. Cupboards were added with wide, hinged sides which could be let down to form counters for serving.

The Parent Teachers' Association purchased a stove and arranged for milk to be delivered to the school each day to be sold to pupils at cost.

Miss Baker, who is principal of the school, realized that it was necessary for the pupils themselves to be taught the principles of an adequate diet. She is a member of a woman's home demonstration club, so she immediately asked the county home demonstration agent to help her. At the time there was neither a girl's nor woman's club in the community.

First the agent went out to meet with the girls, giving them a demonstration of "the protective diet." The girls were so enthusiastic, they organized a club that afternoon of sixteen members and the next week the mothers met with the girls to learn something about balancing the diet. As it is a truck growing community, strictly, there is a shortage of milk and eggs in the community, and the use of milk and eggs in the diet is being stressed.

Of the sixteen girls enrolled in the club, eight are taking dairying as a productive project, in order to correct the family diet.

Johnson County.

"The day was cold and dark and dreary, it rained and the wind was never weary," but we canned a cow weighing 500 pounds when dressed. This was done at the home of Mr. Hazlett in the West Liberty Community. Ten were present for this demonstration. There were sixty-four cans of steak, forty cans of chili, eighteen cans of hash, ten cans of soup and six cans of roast, making 144 cans in all. Fifty pounds was salted down for immediate use and fifty-five pounds were packed.

Cooke County.

Six community fairs and exhibits were held this month preliminary to the county fair.

In the county fair, sixteen communities entered community booths. Thirteen women's clubs were represented and five girls clubs taking part and in most cases sponsoring the community booth.

Navarro County.

A great deal of canning has been done this month in communities where in the spring, we were able to give beef canning—at Bryan there are three cookers and sealers, Rural Shade five cookers, Blooming Grove one. The club members at Bryan have canned three beaves for themselves and three for other ladies, and Rural Shade has done as much.

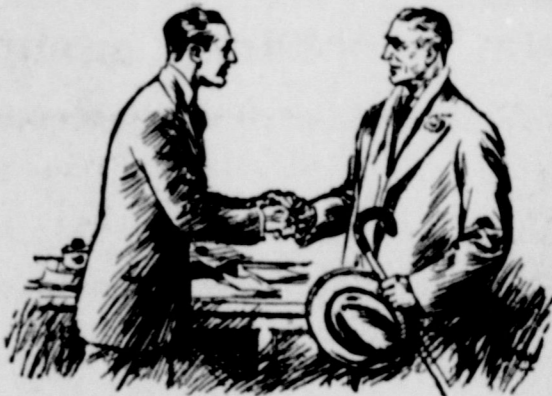

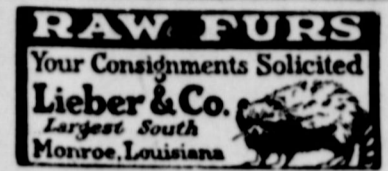

Too Much Centralization.

This is not a political column, but it is hard to refrain from saying that the National Congress is showing too much disposition to meddle with affairs that are the business of the states only. The latest attempt to dictate the inheritance tax policies of the states and to share in those taxes is going a little too far to be pleasing to Texans. Little by little the states have been deprived of their right to self-government and more and more the government is being centralized in Washington. Bureau after bureau has been created solely for sticking noses into the affairs of the states and for creating sentiment favorable to governmental policies. There is no wonder that Texans are assembling to express their dissatisfaction at the trend of affairs, and it is likely that many other states will have similar meetings.

If the Government Will Permit. Numerous railroads are anxious to make extensions in Texas to aid in the development of the territory being opened up, and new railway enterprises are seeking permission to organize and build into some sections. They are only waiting to see if Washington is going to allow the development of Texas to proceed along lines that capital is seeking to go. The idea of the national government is that it must keep capital from doing injury to itself even if the people do suffer for lack of railway facilities. Railway competition must be eliminated as it rates and no territory regardless of the price the people must pay. The government occupies the anomalous position of opposing trusts with its right hand and sustaining them with its left.

Fascination of the Circus.

All the opposition that can be mustered can't keep the people away from the circus and the circus parade. There is less change from year to year in the circus than in anything else that is making any progress at all, but the public doesn't seem to care. There are many old people who insist that the circus of their childhood days was far better than the modern five-ring affair, but still they hurry to the call of the callopie. The modern auto will never take the place of the circus horse; natural history museums will not supplant the circus menagerie; the sheep carnival must stand aside for the still cheaper side-show.

It is hard to account for the drawing power of the circus and the circus parade. Poor and rich alike account circus day as one of the outstanding holidays of the year and take equal pleasure in the age-old antics of the clowns and the trained pigs. But who would have it otherwise?

Texans Are Great Organizers.

It is doubtful if any people the world over can beat Texans in starting or organizing and dropping them. In Texas almost anybody can start some kind of an organization, but only a few organizations are started with enough impetus to keep them going. About the time that something apparently good gets on the way to securing results its organizers seem to be attracted to something new and go after that with an enthusiasm that lasts only long enough to see it started.

I would be specific, but I might wound the feelings of too many people, for most of us are guilty alike. We are too easily attracted from the thing we are doing to something that from the outside looks better. If you doubt this, stop and look at yourself a minute, and think of the dozens of things either of community service or your private affairs that you have started and that have stopped themselves.

Is Politeness Disappearing?

I do not want to appear a croaker, but sometimes I fear that politeness may soon be a lost art. In fact, even now the courteous, polite gentleman is likely to be regarded as an old fogy, who has not kept up with the times, and some women appear to think that it was never intended that women should be polite—that brusqueness and independence go hand in hand. The ordinary social conversation of today is lacking in that gentleness and consideration that once was found wherever people of good breeding met.

It is claimed that people are far more cultured than they were a few decades ago, and certainly the young people have a greater store of general and specialized information, but if we are lacking in those finer ideals that seem inseparable from culture, is our present day culture an improvement or not? Often I am forced to think it is not.

Would Reinstating the Mustache.

A Methodist bishop at a recent conference urged the men to grow mustaches so that they might be distinguished from the women, stating that that is about the only distinctive evidence of his sex that man has left which the women can not usurp.

A Nation of Smokers.

The man who does not smoke is at a disadvantage in any public gathering now. Whenever men gather for business or pleasure, the first thing done is to light up cigars, cigarettes and pipes and fill the place with a smoke screen that defies thought for those who are not habitual users of tobacco. There was a time when the presence of ladies afforded some protection to the non-smoker, but since the women—or some of them—have taken up smoking, the smoker seems to think that all of them should at least enjoy second-hand tobacco smoke.

Lifelike Roses



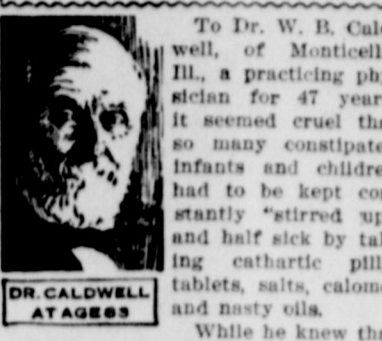

"Isn't it remarkable the lake is frozen only up to Five-Mile Point and there are three miles of lake beyond where it is not frozen at all?"

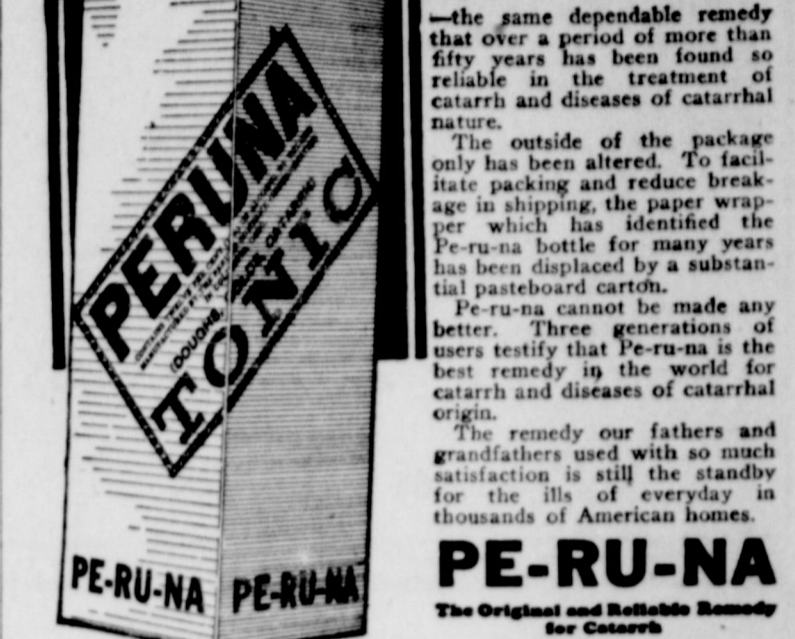
The member of the ice family who was going to make nice ponds for hockey playing had them all in readiness for the first of the New Year.

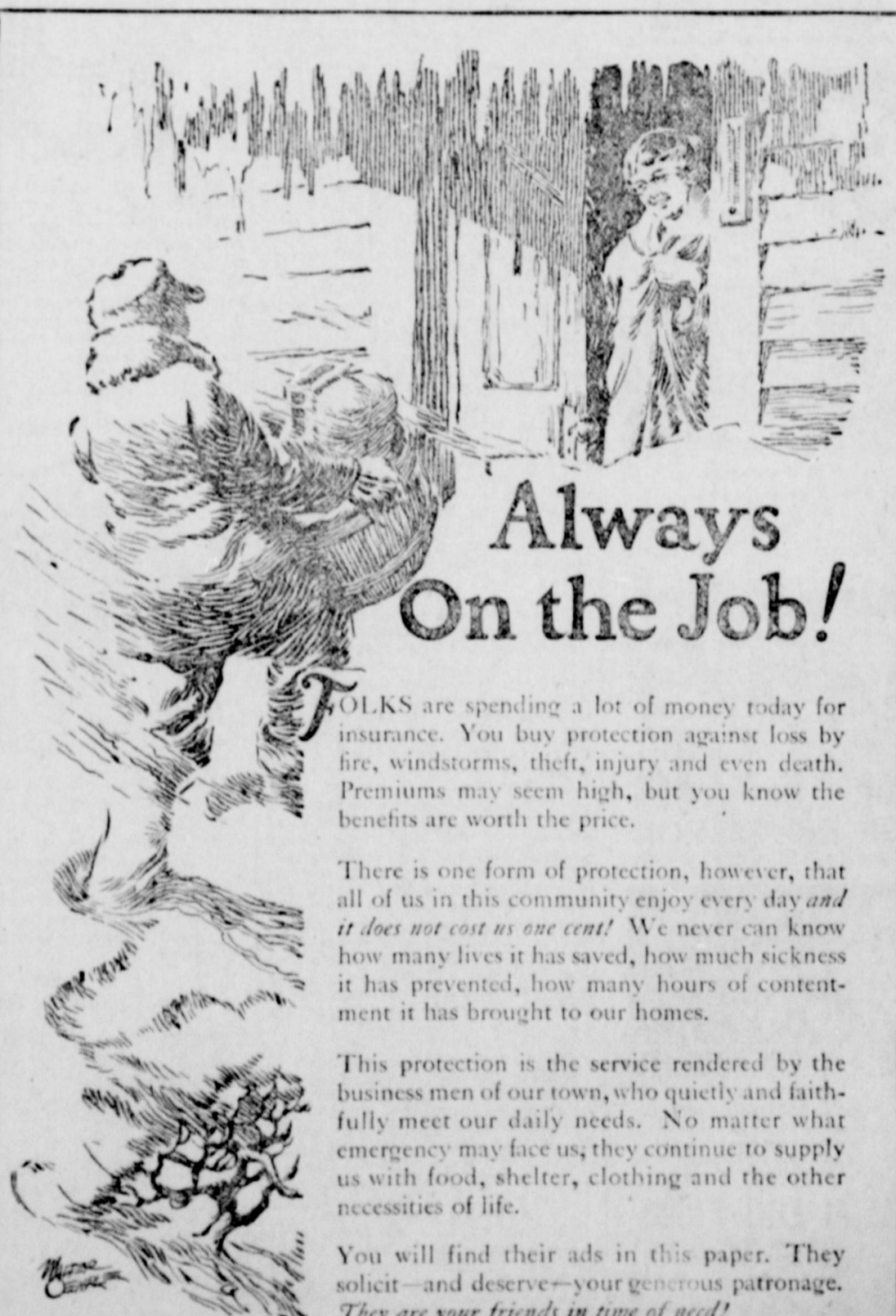
