## Sanderson High Wins District Championship

Sanderson High School safely tucked the district basketball championship under their belt when they defeated the El Paso High School bunch in the final game Saturday to the score of 29 to 14. Fighting in the strong wind and with the sand and dust in the air, the two teams put up a fight which the large crowd present is not apt to forget soon.

As a whole the meet was a success. Large crowds composed of people from over this entire section witnessed the tournament. Wind and weather were suitable for all the games except the last one, which was marred by the heavy wind that rose and filled the air with sand.

**THE FINAL GAME**—The game started with a rush, and the work of Harrell and Grigsby soon gave the Sanderson team the lead. The Border City quintet were never able to keep pace with their opponents during the first half, and when the whistle sounded, the score stood 8 to 4 with Sanderson controlling the larger figure. El Paso came back in the second half with a rally that gave a temporary lead of 12-19, while Sanderson seemed unable to score. Wilkins again showed his ability at looping the basket by making three field shots in this period. However, the Sanderson lads came back in the final quarter with a rush which the El Paso five could not stop. Though El Paso boys again displayed some good passing they were unable to ring the baskets necessary to bring up the score and the game ended in Sanderson's favor. Grigsby of Sanderson and Wilkins of El Paso tied for high point honors with four field throws each to their credit. Yancy, invincible guard of Sanderson, played true to form and was responsible in a measure for the low score of El Paso.

**FIRST PRELIMINARIES**  
Pecos Beats Barstow.  
The tournament started Friday morning when the Pecos quintet downed the Barstow five by one point, the final score being 18 and 17. Although hotly pursued by the Barstow boys, the game was practically always in the hands of Pecos. The first half was a walkaway for the Pecos cagers, who made eight points while the Barstow team made only three. The Barstow boys came back in the second half, making fourteen points, but still were unable to catch the lead the others had started in the first half. Both teams had few fouls called and displayed excellent sportsmanship.

**El Paso Wins over Fort Davis.**  
In the second game of the morning, the El Paso team downed the Fort Davis boys 42 to 14. With a large Davis following against them combined with lack of experience on an outdoor court, the El Paso boys were thrown off for quite a while. Some were hardly able to stand up. Fort Davis put up a game fight, but all was against them in the line of passing, for the ball was in the hands of the border city group most of the time. "Red" Ogden was the best man for the Davis boys, leading his team in every play. For the opponents, Peabody and Wilkins were the main performers, both passing and doing good shooting. Wilkins made 14 points and Peabody 16. Several fouls were called on the Fort Davis quintet while the El Paso boys made few, showing speed and good passing in the last part of the game.

**FIRST PRELIMINARIES- AFTER NOON.**  
Marfa-Marathon  
Friday evening found the Marfa boys matched against the Marathon group, the former winning by a score of 13 to 9. The Marfa team did not seem to exert themselves, for Knight did most of the work for his team. Several fouls were called on both sides, but the game was on a whole clean. Pulliam, little stout forward, starred for Marathon, while Walker at guard was also a main cog of their passing machine.

At the end of the first half the score stood 8 to 6 in Marfa's favor, and the final quarter found five more added to Marfa's count with Marathon gaining three more points.

**Clint Eliminated**  
The second game of the evening was one of the best games played up to the time. Sanderson and Clint, both coming with good reputations fought to put each other out of the

race, with Sanderson finally winning 26 to 13. The score does not indicate the hard battle that took place, for it was only in a final rally that the Sanderson cagers were able to get such a lead. The game started hot and furious with Clint taking the lead. Then the lead went from one side to the other, and the half found the score 10 to 6 in Sanderson's favor. The second half was more of a walkaway, for the boys from the upper Valley could not break up the passing game of their opponents, while Yancy at guard for Sanderson played an airtight game, seemingly getting every ball that came his way, and allowing very few shots at the goal. At the same time Grigsby and Morgan managed to ring up several beautiful shots. Armstrong for Clint went down several times for a shot but failed to make a goal, and his team-mates were unable to score effectively. The game ended with Sanderson ruling supreme over the Clint team, and favorites in the race for the title.

**SEMI-FINALS**  
Tigers Run Over Pecos  
The El Paso Tigers advanced to the finals by virtue of their victory over Pecos Saturday morning. The Paso City bunch came back better acquainted with the outside court and fashed a passing game that made their stock go higher in the eyes of the sporting fans. The Pecos boys put forth their utmost, but to no avail, for the teamwork of the Tigers could not be stopped. The Tiger game was characterized by the same dependence on pure basketball, good sportsmanship, even with the jeers of the crowd, as was manifested the morning before.

Wilkins made up for what he had failed to do in the game before and shot 19 field goals for his team, leading the scoring for any man in one game up to the time. Peabody played his consistent game at center, and the entire team was a smooth-working group. The Pecos five showed evidences of good coaching, and considering the great improvement of their opposers, they are to be congratulated for the showing they made. Davis played a good game for Pecos, making two of the four points for his team. The Pecos team failed to score in the first half, while the border city team made 18 points. The final score was 34 to 4 with the El Pasoans on top.

**Sanderson Defeats Marfa**  
The surprise of the morning came when the Marfa cagers gave Sanderson a fight for their lives, leading them throughout a great part of the game, but finally succumbing to the incessant attack of their opponents and losing the game by the score of 14 to 8. The Marfa boys started with a rush that swept the Sanderson team off its feet, and things looked uncertain for the heretofore favorites. After the leads having exchanged several times, the half found Sanderson leading 7 to 5. The five-man defense of the Marfa team was in good working order, while Yancy found more work to do at the guard position than he had experienced the day before. With Marfa leading by one point and only a few minutes left to play, the Sanderson boys suddenly snapped into action for an attack that netted six points and gave them a substantial lead over the Marfa cagers, who fought desperately to prevent Sanderson from scoring more at the last of the game. When the final whistle blew the score was 14 to 8 with El Paso stock going higher for the evening game.

Appreciation for the way in which the league tournament was handled was expressed by Coaches Coblenz, White, Bryant, and Brown Saturday evening.

"Although basketball is primarily an indoor sport, and should only be played inside, the tournament has been satisfying to us in every way," Mr. Coblenz of El Paso declared. "If Sul Ross gets its new gym, it will certainly be an improvement," he added.

**To Play District 18 Winners.**  
Sanderson and the winner of the San Angelo district will meet before February 27. This promise to be as hard a game as the El Paso game. Grigsby, Jansa and Harrell, Sanderson and Wilkins and Peabody, El Paso, were chosen on the all district team.
