



Mother and the Girls Were the Only Real Victors in the World War

By WILLIAM ALLEN WHITE, in Designer Magazine.

ET US consider the home, particularly the American home, of this new decade. Wherein does it differ from the same home twenty, thirty, forty years ago?

The answer is obviously in machinery, convenience, laborsaving comforts, emancipating luxuries. The thing which this decade is doing for women, in America at least, is physical in its outward expression. Machines are liberating the physical body of women from the toil that their mothers and grandmothers had to know. The hours of service not merely for women in industry, which have been steadily decreasing for two decades, but for women in the home, are growing shorter all the time. Wires and tubes are bringing service which once was back-breaking and knuckle-racking and eye-straining upon the mother and wife and sister. The modern home is designed with wisdom and love. Women are being physically emancipated today. But emancipated for what?

No one who looks at the world can doubt seriously that the new liberty is in many cases transgressed by considerable abuse of license. Smoking among women is a gesture with which they indicate their freedom. The cigarette, the occasional more or less surreptitious d-n, the latchkey to sister's bachelor-girl apartments are the overflowing froth upon the brimming cup of women's freedom. It is thus that woman scoffs cynically at her past. Soon the froth will dissolve and the cup will brim without it.

For woman is coming into a new relationship in western life. With physical emancipation she is getting wider spiritual latitude than she ever had before. She is seeing, examining, questioning, challenging the good and evil of the world. And if she blinks and giggles and is a bit frivolous, it is passing hysteria which will soon leave her calm and unafraid, unabashed and free.

The war, so far as boundaries are concerned, so far as indemnities and reparations go, has left victor and vanquished unsatisfied. The armies of men on both sides were the losers. Mother and the girls were the only real victors in this war. They came out freer than they went in.

"The Problem of Crime Is Now the Problem of the Adolescent Child"

By JUDGE ANDREW A. BRUCE, Northwestern University.

The curse of the American administration of the criminal law is our politics, our spoils system, the fact that the underworld has a vote as well as the upper world, and above all the short tenure of office of all our public officials. Our government, to a large extent, is a government by greenhorns. Our frequent elections, and the necessity of begging for votes, make our politically elected and controlled police officers and magistrates unwilling to enforce the law, and they are looked upon as servants and inferiors and not as the agents of a superior government.

We headline crime everywhere in our newspapers and picture it in our playhouses and in our theaters. We have made it a familiar thing. We have been living in an automobile age, in an age of social display. Parents have set the pace, and their boys and girls have followed them.

We need reverence and contentment more than we need a reformed criminal code. We need God more than we need the law. The problem of crime is now the problem of the adolescent child.

American Nation No Higher Morally Than Western States of Europe

There Are Only Five True Tastes: Sour, Alkaline, Sweet, Bitter, Salt

By PROF. D. FRASER HARRIS, in Conquest (London).

We have only the following true tastes: Acid, or sour; alkaline, or soapy; sweet, bitter and salt. Vinegar is sour, baking powder is soapy, sugar is sweet, quinine is bitter and salt is saline. Anything in addition to these that we may perceive in regard to what we take into the mouth belongs either to the group of the odors, to that of contacts, or to that of sensations of heat and cold. In other words, nerves of taste, of smell, of touch, and of heat and cold are all involved in what we call "tasting" anything. If you are asked what the taste of an apple is like you would reply, "Oh, well, just its own taste, the taste of an apple." But there is no such taste; an apple must be sweet or sour; what we call the "taste" of the apple is its flavor or smell, which can be perceived before the fruit is taken into the mouth at all.

"As the Result of the Commercial Application of Scientific Inventions"

By ALDOUS HUXLEY, in Vanity Fair (New York).

The really great simplifications of our mental life, it is asserted, have been brought about "as the result of the commercial application of scientific inventions." The results of this excessive facilitation are, first, an atrophy of the artistic, musical and dramatic faculties of those who accept their amusements ready made; and, second, an increase of boredom. There is nothing nowadays corresponding to the peasant art, the folksongs, the traditional plays and mummings of the past. The talent which produced these things lies latent; ready-made standardized entertainment has effectively prevented it from expressing itself. But ready-made art can never be as completely satisfying to a man as the art he makes himself. The cinema, the gramophone, the wireless are distractions; but they do nothing to satisfy man's desire for self-assertion.

HUDDLE SYSTEM IS EASY TO USE

Coach Got Novel Idea From Sports Scribe.

A sports reporter from a Chicago newspaper was responsible for the in troduction of the so-called huddle system in basket ball being used successfully by Coach Maury Kent at Northwestern university this season.

The system, which has attracted considerable attention among authorities of the game and which is quite likely to be adopted widely by coaches, was brought into existence by a reporter who saw the novelty of such

Coach Kent had been using the huddle for the past several years in practice games between the first and second teams where both sides used the same plays and were familiar with the hand signals. The sports scribe watched the Pur-

ple cagers in practice one afternoon just before the opening of the present season and saw the huddle being used by the opposing fives. He asked the purple mentor whether he planned to use the system in the regular games. "Sure! Why not?" said Kent, who later declared that he hadn't given the idea any thought, but when t was suggested by the reporter he saw no reason why it wouldn't work

The system calls for no radical de parture in the playing of the game. Yet it gives the team employing it a simple method of calling its plays, both on the offense and defense. During its brief existence at Northwestern the huddle has proved its value and will be continued, according to Coach Kent, who originated it.

"We find that the huddle has co up to expectations," declared Coach Kent. "It is easy to use and is more accurate than the former method of hand signaling. Contrary to popular belief it functions even when the opposing team gets the tip-off. It enables a team to vary its defense more rapidly and more surely."





FARM ITEMS

(By S. C. Hoyle, Editor of Exten-sion Service Publications, A. and M. College of Texas.)

Club Work.

During this month we have been busy re-organizing the clubs throughout the county. Fifteen good sized clubs are now well under way and ten smaller ones are getting started off right well advises O. B. Rollins, assistant county agent of Bexar County. We have a total of twentyfive club leaders and assistant club leaders. Some of these are very active, and very much interested in the club work. On the last Saturday in January a club leaders luncheon was given by the Chamber of Commerce, and though not all club leaders attended, those who did come were so cheon club. The second meeting was held Saturday, March 22nd, at which time twenty club leaders were in at-

In addition to our regular local club leaders, we have now a county poultry club leader and a county pecan project club leader. Both of these will be of great help in the club work. We have distributed selected seed corn to a little more than 100 boys, the seed being of the following types:

Reids Yellow Dent, Giant Yellow Dent, Hoffman Yellow Dent, Yellow Shoe Peg, Thomas Prolific or White Dent, Early White Dent, Leguna Corn and June Corn.

We have also distributed grain sorghum to eight boys, and a half pound package of pecans to each of ninety boys. These pecans and this corn have been, and is now being planted. The ground is in fair condition for planting corn at the present time, but is beginning to get a little dry.

We have about fifty club members already started in poultry club work. About thirty more are enrolled but have not yet started on the projects. We hope to get some more of them under way next month.

Twelve Jersey calves are in the hands of boys now, and about five are calling for calves. We will try and get some of these delivered during the coming month. With the help of our very efficient club leaders and advice from our county agent, the club work is progressing better than ever in this county.

Home Demonstration Council.

The Home Demonstration Council held a rally of all home demonstration club women at San Benito on February 20. Miss Horten was with us for the occasion, advises Miss Kate Adele Hill, county home demonstration agent, Cameron County. Six of the seven home demonstration clubs were represented at the meeting. Rev. F. M. Davis of San Benito, spoke on the fundamentals of the American home, and Miss Horton spoke on qualities of leadership. A musical program was also given, after which the council served refreshments to those who were present.

The year book committee, composed of the presidents of the clubs, and chairman of the program committees, met on February 13th, and made plans for the county year book, which we hope to have published by April 1. The council is functioning more efficiently as time goes on.

Poultry.

Mr. Glazener conducted a series of poultry schools in five communities, February 23 and 24, advises Miss Kate Adele Hill, county home demonstration agent of Cameron County. The round table discussion proved that there is a definite interest in poultry in Cameron County. Five demonstration flocks have been established as a result of poultry schools. Thirtyfive club girls are now taking poultry as their projects. A poultry tour is planned for the first week in June, to visit the demonstration flocks, under the supervision of both the farm and home demonstration agents.




