

heap Rates to Farmers' Short Course.

The indications are that the seventeenth annual Farmers' Short Course o be held at College Station, August 2-7, will be the greatest in the history of the Short Course. The railroads are an important factor in the success of the Short Course, and while they have always given enthusiastic co-operation, yet this year they have taken an early start and are announcing their arrangements in time for their information to reach every section in Texas and give the farmers and their families ample time to make necessary preparations for an annual outing of pleasure and instruction. Mr. H. H. Williamson, state agent, Extension Service, A. and M. College of Texas, has received the following letter from W. C. McCormick, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific Lines, which is self-explana-

"Dear Sir: "At conference Texas General Passenger Agents, Shreveport, April 8th. it was our pleasure to arrange for rates to Farmers' Short Course Congress, College Station, August 2-7 next, fares to be same basis as prevailed last year, that is a cent a mile from all points on 'Southern Pacific Lines' to be sold daily July 31st to August 4th inclusive, final return limit August 9th.

"The I. and G. N. joined in this cent a mile arrangement while other lines will use same basis as last year, that is, two-thirds of the one way fare, minimum selling rate in each instance to be \$1.50; in all cases, fares to be constructed and added to so as to end in naught or five."

Wealth of University.



There is good rea son to believe that the University of Texas will in time be one of the wealthiest schools in the world. Perhaps its grounds and build-ings at Austin are worth now about \$10,000,000. The in come from oil is now approximately

\$3,000.000 a year, and it is thought that this represents but a small part of what the oil income will be when the university lands are developed as they will be in time. No one would be surprised if oil income should reach ten or even twenty times its present proportions. Geologists say that the potash on university lands may prove even more valuable than the oil With all this wealth in prospect the

university is what is ordinarily called "hard up." It hasn't the money for erecting buildings that are much need ed, and it can't use its oil money for buildings, but must be content to use the income from that money when in vested in bonds. The regents are trying to find a legal way to pledge the oil money as security for money with which to construct the buildings now most needed, and the university still must depend on legislative appropriations for the payment of salaries.

Texas Centennial Director.

Jesse H. Jones of Houston has co sented to become director-general of the proposed Texas Centennial. Mr. Jones is perhaps the greatest struc tural builder of Texas or the South west. At present he has several immense buildings under construction in New York, in Houston and in other cities. As a business executive he has few superiors. He is a man of im-mense fortune and has the confidence of the business world. His opinions financial affairs. With his committe of 100 men and women carefully se lected from all over Texas with a view terest ably represented and with magnitude to attract people from all parts of the world.

An early start should be made in order that there may be ample time for the best preparation it is possible to give a movement of such enormous magnitude and that the wealthiest deliberation may be given to every undertaking, and then there must most persistent work until the effort is crowned with success. The Sesqui-Centennial at Philadelphia has made the mistake of hurrying into an exposition without being prepared and Texas should be able to profit from the nistakes of all others that have preceded it with great expositions.

Anti-Prohibition Arguments.



SURPRISE gift, one of the most munificent ever received by the state school, has lifted the University of Texas overnight from near the bottom of the ranks to pre-eminence among American universities in astronomical research.

The \$1,400,000 bequest of William J. McDonald of Paris has provided for the finest and best-equipped observatory in America, easily outranking those noted government observatories among the snow-covered peaks of the Rockies, where contributions of transcendent value to the science of astronomy have been made.

The William J. McDonald astronomical observatory in Texas will stand, not only as an enduring memorial to the man who gave his wealth for science and education, but as a beacon luring scientists, research workers and students not only from all Texas and from every state in America, but from every civilized nation of the globe. It will open the way for thousands of students, in the years to come, to gain here that fornia Fig Syrup." The second observatory branch will be placed on some of the high peaks of the Davis mountains in west Texas. Several of these peaks are more than a mile high, two or more of them exceeding 9,000 feet. This will be the research branch, manned and used by noted research workers.

"Scrappy Culture" Denounced as Menace to American Education

By DR. GLENN FRANK, President Wisconsin University.

Universities today are running away from the vast load of rapidly increasing unrelated knowledge, and in the elective system are "taking a coward's refuge is unrelated specialization."

Liberal education all over the world is in a dire plight, suffering from structural overloading, and finding it difficult to carry the burdens of its own creation and the increasing complexity of curriculum.

Professors today are much in the position of one man trying to stack the hay pitched to him by six, and being buried under it.

Thus the elective system was born essentially a strategic retreat from new knowledge they were incapable of assimilating. It has turned universities into intellectual department stores or specialty shops, or intellectual cafeterias. You know the fate of a man who goes into a cafeteria with no advance knowledge of dietetics.

The elective system to a great extent is necessary, and the possibility of reaction to an ironclad curriculum would be worse. But some measures must be taken against the obvious scrappiness of culture brought about by specialization, and to prevent the university from becoming a multi-

Intense specialization is 90 per cent inevitable in the modern world, but there are dangers. Specialization, usually considered the foe of culture and the friend of science, has dangers also for science.

I can imagine generation after generation turning out scientific workers with narrower and narrower outlook, incapable of conceiving those broad flights of imagination which have made possible every epochal

The classics have been killed by classroom pedants, who have forgotten literature in being absorbed in the minutiae of their specialty.

How can we protect specialists against fragmentation of background? It is a national issue of the first magnitude to protect the safety and sanity of the social order. Universities must be a real training ground for political and industrial statesmen who have perspective as well as

The nations are very absurd in their suspicions of one another. Each one, until it learns better, thinks all Europeans are dishonest. 
Giant Turtles a Nuisance


