ABSENTEE VOTING

BASEBALL NOTES

Base hits continue to fly from the bat wielded by Sparkie Adams.

Joel Skelton, from Philadelphia semi-pro ranks, is doing good work on the mound for Easton.

The Giants have signed outfielder Joe Connell and Pitcher Al Smith, both from Villa Nova college.

A. Bowen McConnell, shortstop, has been chosen captain of next year's University of Chicago baseball team.

Ed Wells of the Tigers has the reputation of being one of the slowest pitchers in the American league.

Richard "Red" Smith of Combined Locks, Wis., was elected captain of the 1927 Notre Dame baseball team.

Broader Outlook Will Reconcile Fundamentalist and Modernist

CONTROVERSY is a sure evidence of progress, and where there is no controversy there is no progress. There may be such a thing as a happy medium somewhere between the radical fundamentalist and the extreme modernist. A person may be a modernist regarding certain viewpoints and a fundamentalist in other beliefs.

A man is a fundamentalist when he regards the value of past experience, but no history is infallible. There is no original copy of the Scriptures; the meanings of words constantly change, and different translations of the Bible are made according to the interpretation of the previous translation by the new translators.

The future religion will consist in living according to the rules of Christ regardless of church denomination or doctrine.

I am a fundamentalist because of my regard for the historic past, of the great progress slowly made. I honor the great leaders. Things are not true because new. I don't want to repeat the follies of the past. I want to transmit the gains of the past. Creeds, ceremonies, rites are fallible evidences of experiences.

I am a modernist, because I hate no one who differs with me. I regard the possibilities of the future. Wisdom will not die with us. The old is not infallible nor true because it survived. The old was once new and had to fight its way. You need not be mentally shabby to be comfortable. I saw many good men mistaken. The future needs a deeper faith and larger vision. I know faith in Christ makes one better and needs no conservatory care. The first modernist declared: "I have yet many things to say."

Social and Political Ills Not to Be Cured by Laws on Statute Books

A common fallacy prevails that for every social and political ill which mortal flesh is heir to, a complete remedy may be found in some new statute. Sixteen thousand written enactments of diversified subject matter exist already in the United States for the regulation of the average man's conduct.

Laws which confer favors are always at the expense of the general public. Such laws give birth to groups, and encourage them to claim special consideration on the ground that it has been extended to others.

The "bloc" system is partly responsible for the almost total lack of public leaders of national influence. The group conflicts at Washington are proof that leadership in a large part is not national in character.

The country needs and must have a reinstatement of political philosophy. Public opinion is divided between Jefferson and Hamilton. The first challenged the right of original capital to control the government. The second championed the cause of the thrifty, the prosperous and successful.

Undoubtedly radical changes have occurred in the social system of the United States, resulting in confused conceptions of private responsibility and of public duty.

Press Called On to Lead in Matters of Common and Vital Interest

The development of the moral and industrial assets of the community it serves is one big part of a newspaper's business. In the Middle West the press has a common and vital interest in solution of the crime problem, in the working out of waterway projects; in adjustment of freight rates and competition of seaports, with their own rights, to a proper development of inland cities.

It seems to me that if we believe in the powers which we possess, and if we present a united front, we can change this crime situation in a comparatively short time.

Newspaper advertising is the greatest selling force in the world and the day is near when it will be dignified enough to warrant recognition as an exact science.

The civic and industrial problems, whose solution the newspaper shares, are a basis on which we can justify our right to command the respect of our public and thereby prosper in our advertising and circulation departments.

Eternal Human Life One of the Possibilities of the Future

Man, in his constant battle with nature, eventually will win out. Science already is lengthening the span of life, and within the next hundred years centenarians will become common. But I cannot say positively that men will live forever; I merely wish to point out that eternal life is not an impossibility.

The age when men will cease to die might have its inconveniences, but there is nothing in science or in philosophy inconsistent with the idea of eventual immortality of the body.

Death is a scheme of nature for making room for the young. But I suppose that if man ever conquers death, he will by that time cease to grow old and retain the vigor of youth.

There is approaching a "golden age" of art, literature and philosophy in America in the near future. This renaissance will compare with the age of Pericles in Greece, Montaigne in France and Shakespeare in England.

Woman Makes Mistake in Not Training Mate for Household Duties

One of woman's biggest mistakes is in not training men to be homemakers. Men should contribute to the social as well as the economic life of the home. They think they have to attend only to the money-making. They should feel obligated to make a social, moral and spiritual contribution. There is a serious difference in training.

Men have no sense of the home responsibility. Men should learn nutrition in school. They eat, don't they? They should learn the ethics of family life. I would suggest courses in the principles of clothing, shelter and the arts. I sometimes think the men would share the responsibility if the women would give them a chance.

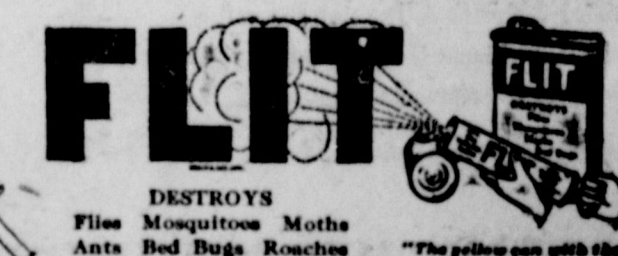

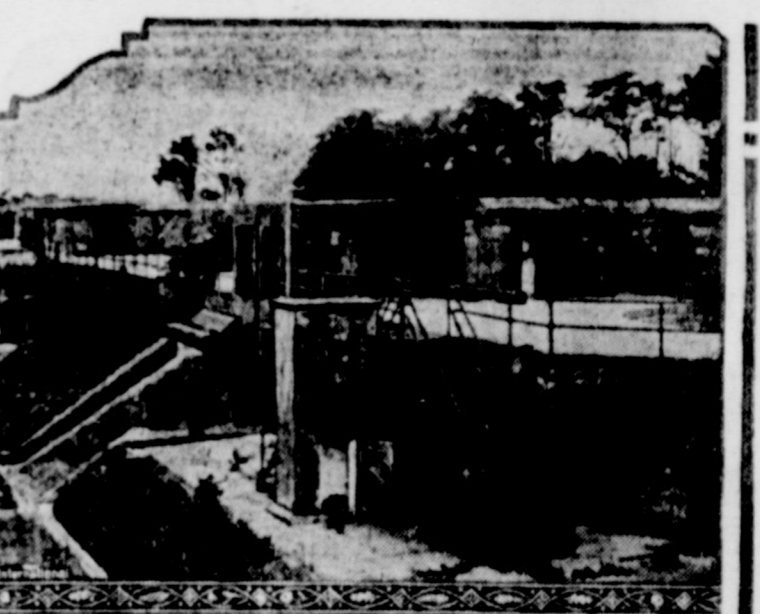

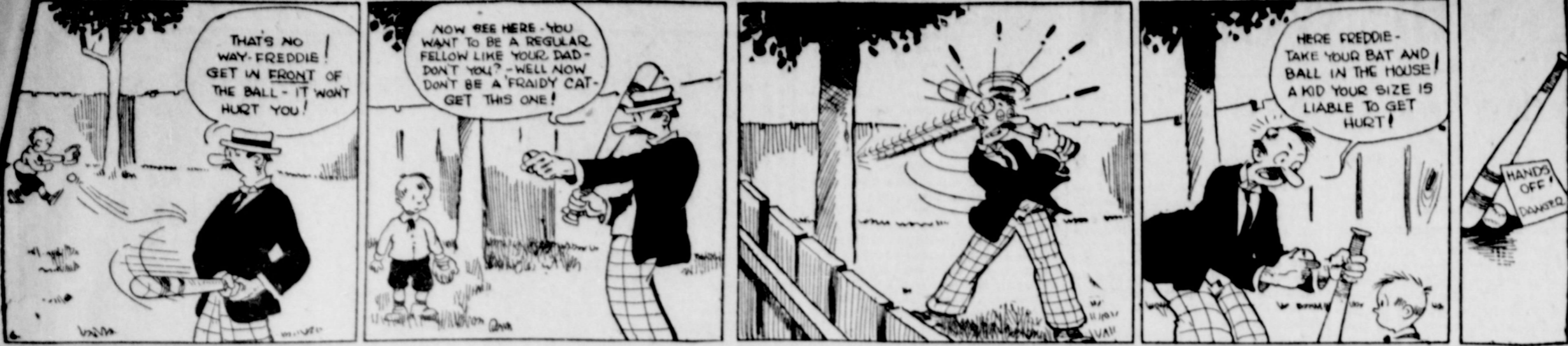
Mr. New Gets the Wyoming Flag

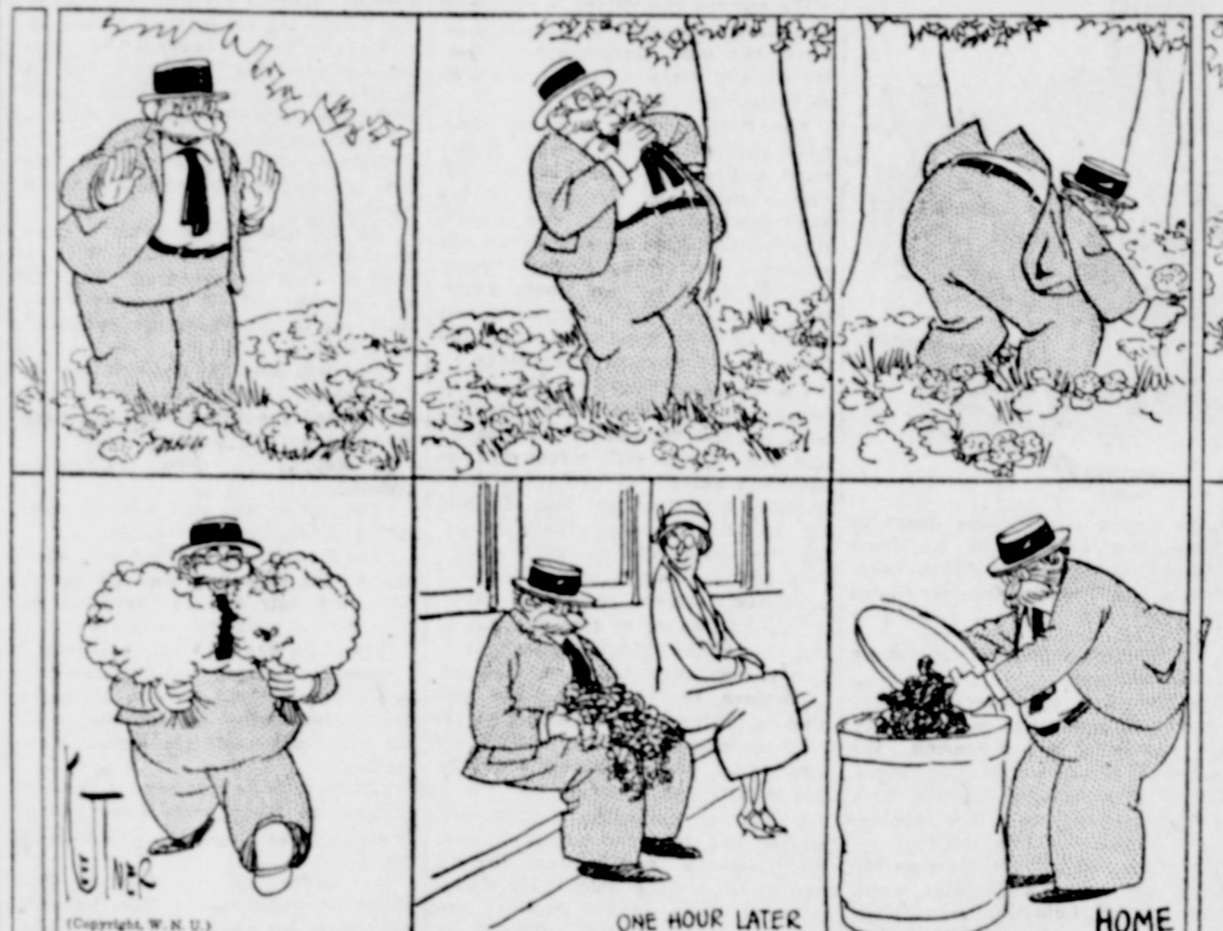

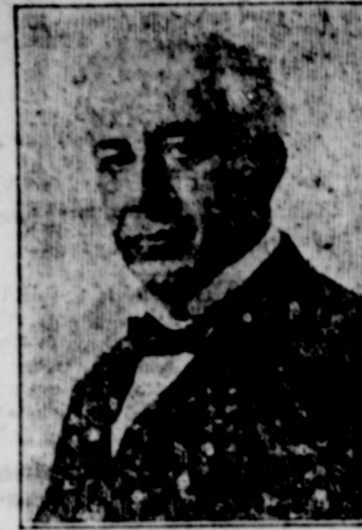

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

Senate Joint Resolution No. 9
A Joint Resolution relating to the amending of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners; providing for the supervision and management of the Prison System, under such laws as may be provided for by the Legislature.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 16, Section 58 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

Section 58. The Legislature shall have full power and authority to provide by law for the management and control of the Prison System of Texas; and to this end shall have power and authority to place the Prison System under the supervision, management and control of such trained and experienced officer, or officers, as the Legislature may from time to time provide for by law.

Section 2. The above Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held November 3, 1925, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "For the amendment of Article 16, Section 58 of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners." And all those opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "Against the amendment of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners."

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said elec-

tion and have the same published as required by law.

Section 4. The sum of \$5,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State, and not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

Senate Joint Resolution No. 7
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 and Section 46 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit officers of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States to hold public office in Texas.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor

of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States; except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States."

Section 2. That Section 40 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer, or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States."

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in November A. D. 1925, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional amendment permitting officers and enlisted men of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, and officers of the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the Organized Reserves of the United States, to hold other offices or positions of honor, trust or profit under this State or the United States," and:

"Against the Constitutional amendment permitting officers and enlisted men of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, and officers of the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the Organized Reserves of the United States, to hold other offices or positions of honor, trust or profit under this State or the United States."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

Senate Joint Resolution No. 10
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution providing for taxation of school lands owned by counties.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 6 thereof 6a, which shall read as follows:

Section 6a. All agriculture or grazing school land mentioned in Section 6 of this Article owned by any county shall be subject to taxation except for State purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1925, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "For the Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land privately owned," and "Against the Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county to the same extent as land privately owned."

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
