Surgical Operations of No Avail as Cure for Criminal Propensities

By DR. SHEPHERD L. FRANTZ, University of California.

OPERATIONS on the skull to remove the cause of crime are unwarranted medical practice. The supposition that a bony protuberance of the cranium or some malformation due to accident may press on the brain and be the specific cause of wrongdoing should be relegated to the limbo of phrenology or like pseudo-science. Surgeons of questionable ethical standards, with prospects of a high fee, have been willing to operate on a criminal, the purpose, in part, being to influence a trial court in the direction of leniency. In some cases of this sort the patient, profoundly influenced by so serious an operation on himself, has actually been led to believe that the treatment has cured him. Thus purely by suggestion he deserts the criminal life. To this extent only is the cranial operation of any value.

Latin-American Peoples Still in Fear of United States Aggression

By DR. L. S. ROWE, Pan-American Union.

The Monroe doctrine, instead of bringing the Latin-American countries into closer contact with the United States and instilling a spirit of mutual trust, has eliminated from the minds of Latin-American peoples all fear of aggression from any portion of the world but the United States.

Conscious of the great economic and political power that the United States has acquired, and recognizing that history contains no record of a nation who used without abusing a like degree of power, there is a constant question in the Latin-American mind.

The general attitude during the past twenty years has shown steady improvement, however, and the higher standards of American business and business men who are making permanent investments in Latin-America are contributing greatly to the increase in good feeling between this country and her southern neighbors.

Development of Intellect Goes Hand-in-Hand With Mankind's Pleasures

By PROF. EDWARD L. THORNDIKE, Columbia University.

Nowhere more truly than in his mental capacities is man a part of nature. Among the minds of animals, that of man leads, not as a demigod from another planet, but as a king from a race. Pleasure is a symptom of welfare. The function of intellect is to provide a means of modifying our reactions to the circumstances of life so that we may secure pleasure.

The intellectual evolution of the animal kingdom consists in an increase in the number, delicacy, complexity, permanence and speed of formation of such associations. In man this increase reaches such a point that an apparently new type of mind results, which conceals the real continuity of the process.

His instincts, that is, his inborn tendencies to feel and act in certain ways, show throughout marks of kinship with the lower animals, especially with our nearest relatives physically, the primates, such as the chimpanzee and gorilla.

American Labor on Far Higher Plane Than That of Europe

By LORD BUCKMASTER, Former English Lord Chancellor.

In the report of the British Trade union mission to the United States I have found four reasons for American industrial supremacy. These are: first, the spirit of co-operation and fellowship throughout the industry from the highest official to the man sweeping the floor; second, the willingness and eagerness of everybody to increase output; third, the fact that high wages in any one industry benefited industry everywhere; and fourth, the readiness of employers to scrap old machinery and to do everything in their power to use equipment that could give the greatest effect to human labor.

No one who has the most trifling knowledge of American industry can fail to realize the truth of what the mission reports. The condition of labor over there is easier than here—easier not by reason of shorter hours or of lessened labor, but by reason of the environment in which it is placed and the high standard of wages that it commands.

Time of Students Wasted Through Neglect of Proper Classification

By DR. GEORGE F. ZOOK, Prominent Educator.

American colleges and universities are illogical organizations which waste at least a year of each student's time because of failure to classify the students according to their abilities.

Boys and girls from all walks of life and of every variety of intelligence are being admitted without proper classification of the course to be pursued. We do a bad job of lumping them together.

It is the duty of the secondary schools to induce those who have the ability to do college work to attend college, and in some way to encourage those who do not to take special vocational work to fit them for earning a livelihood.

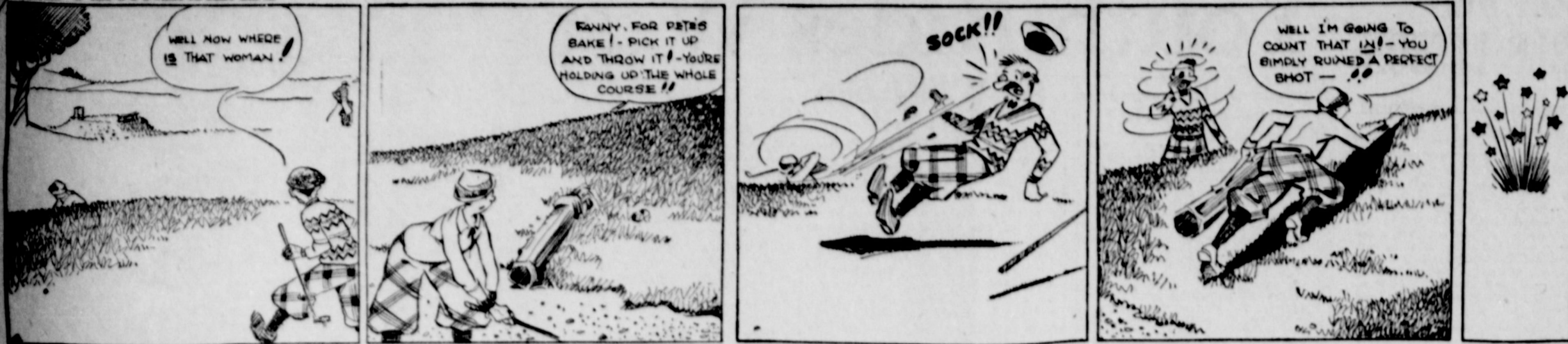

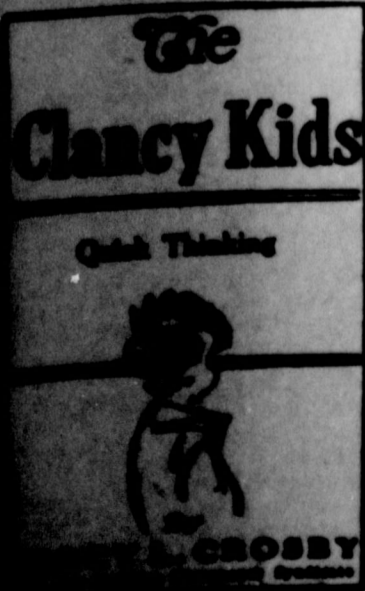

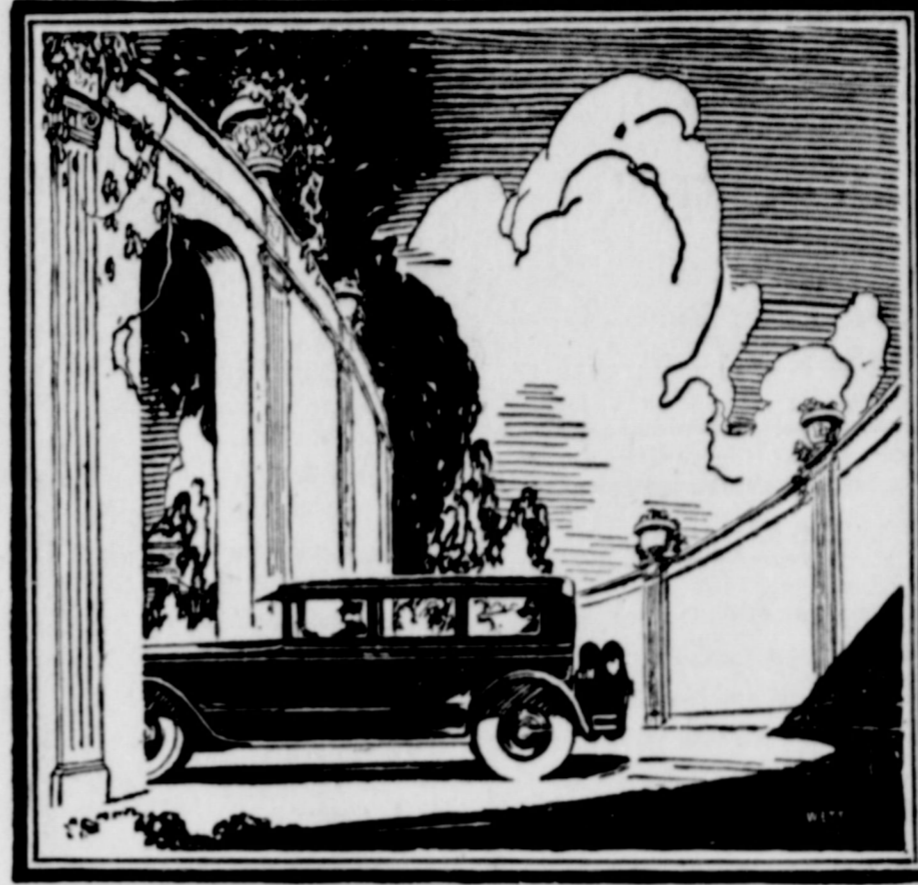

Galli-Curci Swayed by the Seer of Sweden
