I have heard several expressions on my last week's dissertation, about proper and improper books, for public libraries. Most of these expressions agreed with me fully, while others conceded that I was probably correct in my views, but that they had not given the matter sufficient consideration to make a definite statement.

Well, of course, all that suits me just fine. That is for those who have their minds made up about the matter, to agree with me, and for the others to be taking it under consideration, or doing their own thinking and waiting to arrive at their own conclusions.

That still suits me, for that is just what I think every individual should do in all matters where there is likely to be a difference of opinion, and if these, who are as yet undecided, should decide to disagree with me, I shall most surely hold no vindictiveness against them for so doing. It is said that John Nance Garner, 32nd vice-president of the United States, who had his 80th birthday Monday, is in favor of every man reaching his own conclusions and his own confusions. Mr. Garner, according to what I read in the papers, also stated that there has been too many statements by too many people.

The above statements of Mr. Garner, have brought me squarely up against my own theory, that of due consideration and arriving at my own conclusion. The statement—of the words, "Conclusion" and "confusion," compatible? That is will they fit in together so that the condition produced by one is a part of or the result of the other? As I see it now, that is not necessarily the case, but may be so under certain conditions. It is, at least, a syllogism, having a major premise, a minor premise and a conclusion, which, to me means a degree of truth, a degree of error and a conclusion, either right or wrong.

In fact this is getting into water too deep for me, and though you might not suspect it, the above cogitations were absorbed by me as a result of attending Sunday School, Sunday morning, at which class wherein I was lodged, spent a possible half hour in serious discussions, suggestions and proposals, induced by the introduction of views of some people relative to the merits of certain religious movement that is being promoted and encouraged in my own home town, and toward which I feel quite friendly.

Thus I find myself continually being confronted with deep and perplexing questions, all brought about by the mere difference in opinion of people of both high and low estate. But by the high and mighty in intellect, these—so to speak—petty figments of the imagination, or perversions of thought, are easily accounted for with a few high-sounding oratorical flourishes, or innuendoes as being inconsequential and therefore unworthy of further attention. But to the less exalted intellect such as that of a street corner philosopher, such things become of almost vital concern.

I do not know just what the objects of the above mentioned religious move may be, but I can easily see that there is possibilities of great good for the

cause of religion, by the move being accepted and perpetuated or supported by people of all religious faiths, and anything that may cause people of all faiths to understand the attitude of all others, as well as their own, can not but be of decided benefit to the religious life of the religious world.

I cannot help but think that a more concerted study and better understanding of the creeds of the various denominations of the Christian Church would terminate in a better mutual good. It is estimated that there are about 207 million of adherents to what is commonly known as the Protestant church, and these are divided into an estimated 200 to 400 cliques, factions, or, what are more freely referred to as denominations.

I understand that all these sects base their own particular or peculiar religious views upon their interpretation of the Holy Bible, yet all are proclaiming themselves as Christians, and following the true precepts of Jesus the Christ. How can these things be? If all of these various beliefs are based upon the facts gleaned from Holy Writ, then, to my mind, the Bible must be the most obscure in its meaning and the hardest of interpretation, of all the books published and is, therefore really standing in its own light. I do not think so.

Now, just one more paragraph in regard to this thing which we call religion and salvation, and that is, if all mankind is condemned to an eternity in a condition commonly referred to as "hell," a condition of eternal torment, why is poor little man, oft proclaimed as the highest of God's creation, doomed to become the most unfortunate of all living creatures, and so obstinate about his salvation, that some before the congregations each week, and frequently more often than that, and beg and plead, and exhort and implore their hearers to accept a free means of salvation from this eternal torment? Is it on account of the inherent stubbornness of mankind, or is there a fault in the manner in which this free salvation is being presented?

This business of being a street-corner philosopher, is not all that it is cracked up to be, and one often finds his philosophy questioned, which, of course, brings on hours of depression and days of despondency, but in my case it is not so bad after all, when all things and conditions are taken into consideration, for I have several advocates to whom I may go for comfort and encouragement, among whom are George and Floyd and George and John, although John frequently takes issue with me and grabs one end of the "Bone of Contention" and for awhile leads me an unenviable life, but we always get back right through a compromise or an alibi. But such is life, and it is but seldom that we learn of one who is anxious to exchange it and take chances for a better one.

### Immanuel Lutherans To Dedicate New Parish House Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving Day 1948 will be a special day of joy for the members of Immanuel Lutheran Church. On that day the congregation will dedicate its new parish house in a special service of Thanksgiving.

After the singing of the hymn "Now Thank We All Our God" and a brief prayer spoken by the pastor, the assembly will march in procession into the new building and the remainder of the service will be conducted in the auditorium. Pastor E. W. Lichtsinn will deliver the dedicatory address.

The building is in the shape of a "T", centered between the church and the parsonage. The overall length is 58 feet, the width measures 38 feet at the west end, 26 at the east. The auditorium including the stage and two small dressing rooms measures 46 x 26 feet, and has a seating capacity of 125 people. Two rooms are provided for small classes or committee meetings. Other rooms in the interior include a large kitchen with built-in cabinets, two rest rooms and a spacious vestibule. A north entrance to the auditorium and a west entrance into the vestibule are provided from the sheltered concrete porch.

The building is of white stucco with green trim. Interior walls and ceiling are covered with white Textone over sheet rock. The floors are of pine and the woodwork is finished in a natural color. All the rooms and the auditorium are equipped with fluorescent lighting fixtures, and the building is provided with a Butane heating system. One hundred steel folding chairs have been purchased for the auditorium. The total cost together with the furnishings is \$8500. Mrs. Oscar Lang, of Friona was the architect; the carpentry work was contracted by Mr. Dan Lacey of Friona.

### Is Of White Stucco

The exterior of the building is of white stucco with green trim. Interior walls and ceiling are covered with white Textone over sheet rock. The floors are of pine and the woodwork is finished in a natural color. All the rooms and the auditorium are equipped with fluorescent lighting fixtures, and the building is provided with a Butane heating system. One hundred steel folding chairs have been purchased for the auditorium. The total cost together with the furnishings is \$8500. Mrs. Oscar Lang, of Friona was the architect; the carpentry work was contracted by Mr. Dan Lacey of Friona.

Immanuel Congregation was organized in 1910 at which time the church and parsonage were constructed. Each of these was remodeled in 1945. Immanuel Church is a member of the Texas District Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. The present membership of the congregation is 70 souls. To provide for the Christian education of people of all ages, the following Sunday School and Bible Classes are organized: a Beginners Class for pre-school age children; a Primary Junior, Intermediate and Senior Class for children in the first eight grades of school; a Junior Bible Class for high school students, taught by the Sunday School Superintendent, Melvin Sachs, and an Adult Bible Class taught by the pastor of the church.

We cordially invite the people of this community to come and join us for any service, and to come out any time to view our new Parish House.

### M. A. Black Seriously Hurt

On Monday afternoon, November 22nd, M. A. Black, farmer living three miles north of Friona, was seriously injured between four and five o'clock, when a tractor with which he was working tipped over and caught him under the steering wheel.

Wednesday Mr. Black's condition was reported to be decidedly worse.

Mr. Black was alone at the time and about 200 yards from his house and the highway, but had the nerve and the presence of mind to free himself from his position and walk to the house and signaled a school bus driver, on his return trip, who left his bus and got Mr. Black's car and brought the injured man to the local hospital, where he was given first aid treatment.

X-ray views disclose the fact that several ribs were broken, some both in the back and the breast; one lung was deflated and the clavicle was torn loose from its connection with the scapula. The injury is pronounced as very serious, but the physicians see no reason why he shall not fully recover.

Mr. Black was using his tractor for the purpose of packing ensilage into a trench silo, and in attempting to back the engine in at the end, one of the wheels failed to enter the pit, but continued along the edge and the other wheel, sinking into the soft silage allowed it to tip over.

### Danger of Sleeping In Room With Gas Burning Is Sounded

AUSTIN.—With the advent of cold weather each year in this state, several deaths are usually reported, resulting from asphyxiation by gas fumes in improperly ventilated homes or sleeping quarters.

Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a warning in this respect, emphasizing that it is never safe to sleep in a tightly closed room with a gas fire burning. Even if there are no gas leaks, the air soon becomes vitiated and unfit to breathe.

"When occupying a room in which gas is burning, be sure always to have at least one window or door open, to admit fresh air," Dr. Cox said. "If the weather is too cold to permit leaving an open window in the room occupied, then play safe by opening a door into an adjoining room, where a window can be opened."

"Occupying a room heated by an open gas flame, and at the same time keeping the room tightly closed, may prove disastrous the very first time it is tried," Dr. Cox said. "It is better not to risk it even one time. Always be sure that your room has plenty of fresh air, but make doubly sure when you have a gas fire burning," he added.

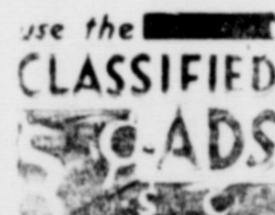

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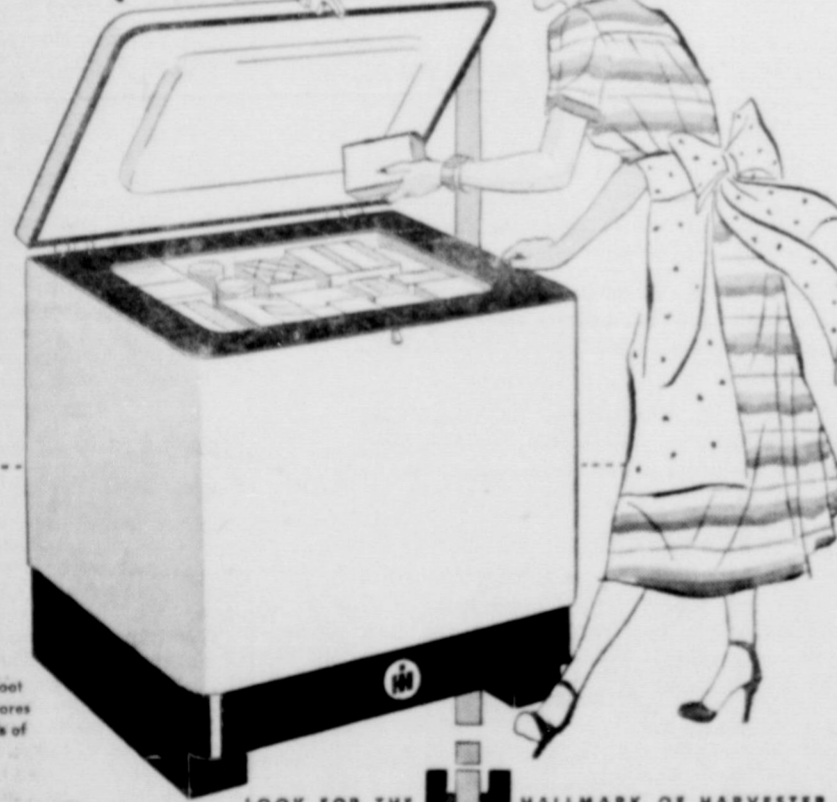

AUSTIN.—The seventieth annual convention of the Texas State Teachers' Association in Dallas November 25, 26, 27, is expected to set an all-time record for attendance.

It is estimated more than 15,000 teachers will spend the Thanksgiving holiday period attending general sessions and special meetings.

In addition to three general sessions, teachers will have an opportunity to attend fifty-three sectional meetings and twenty-three breakfasts, luncheons and dinners. Every phase of education of interest to Texas teachers will be thoroughly examined at the seventy-six special meetings.

Dr. W. R. White, president of Baylor University, Waco, will preach the sermon at the Thanksgiving service Thursday morning, which opens the convention.

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## "Re-Education Of Japan" Provides Pioneer Study Club Program Topics

## Feeding Of More Grain To Cows Is Recommended

COLLEGE STATION — This fall and winter it may pay Texas dairymen to feed their cows more grain. Of course, it's a good idea for dairymen to always feed their cows well, says E. G. Gibson, extension dairy husbandman of Texas A & M College. Give them all the good roughage they will eat and feed them more grain, especially the higher producing cows.

This year, there is a rather special situation. Texas has had a long drought but in some places light sprinkles are trying to put an end to it. With labor still a problem, the high prices for meat have caused a cut in the size of dairy herds. Gibson says that farmers now have about four percent fewer milk cows than a year ago. And if the total milk production is going to meet the big demand that customers are calling for, then dairymen will have to get more milk from the cows they have.

Gibson says that up to a certain point, each pound of grain added to the ration will boost the milk production a little higher. He points out that how much extra grain they get depends on how much they are getting now, and on the local price of grain compared to the price of milk.

In line with this idea of more grain for the cows, Gibson says the present butterfat-feed ratio for 1948 of 25.7 pounds of feed to one pound of butterfat compared to 20.5 pounds of feed to one pound of butterfat in 1947 bears out the possibility of feeding more grain under the present conditions.

This butterfat-feed ratio means just this—at present prices, 1 pound of butterfat will buy 25.7 pounds of grain. And last year 1 pound of butterfat would buy only 20.5 pounds of feed. So that's an increase in the butterfat-feed ratio of 5.2 in a year.

There are large supplies of feed grains, and prices are more favorable now to heavy feeding than during the early summer. Research shows that when cows are fed 30 percent above the standard level, the average cow produces just four-fifths of a pound of milk for each pound of grain fed. And when you get to feeding up to 30 percent above the normal level, the average cow produces only half a pound of milk for each extra pound of grain, says Gibson.

That gives some guide in feeding grain more milk. It's just the old law of diminishing returns go to those of our neighbors who so faithfully aided in subduing the flames.

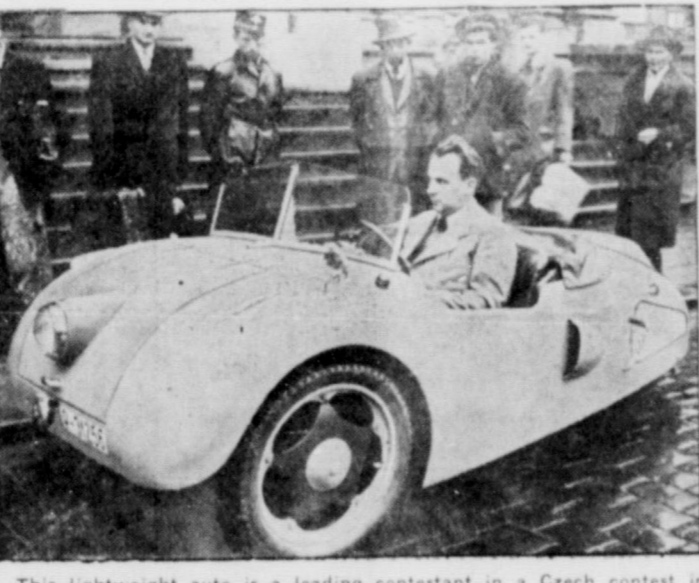

Mrs. George Messenger entertained her Sunday School class Sunday and carload drove to Hereford in the afternoon to attend the First Baptist Church BTU meeting.

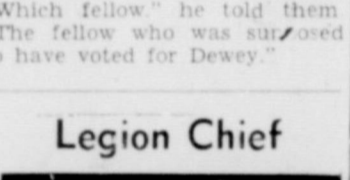

Christmas seals for 1948 have been sent out by the National Tuberculosis Association from state headquarters in Austin. They arrived by mail Monday, first day of the drive which will last until December 25.

The seals will brighten Christmas card envelopes, packages and letters to aid the tuberculosis campaign. The pictures on the seals depict a blonde six-year old boy in red pajamas sitting before the fireplace awaiting the arrival of St. Nick on Christmas eve. From the mantle three empty stockings dangle before the blazing hearthfire.

Barry Bart of South Kent, Conn. was the designer of the seal. He conceived the idea after watching his young nephew await the arrival of Santa Claus.

The perforated sheets containing 100 seals are to be sent to all hundred Hereford people either to purchase or re-sell. Unlike the cancer and infantile paralysis drives which have committees in each community, the tuberculosis association has only the one state headquarters, to which all contributions are mailed.
