M. A. Black Seriously Hurt

On Monday afternoon, November 22nd, M. A. Black, farmer living three miles north of Friona, was seriously injured between four and five o'clock, when a tractor with which he was working tipped over and caught him under the steering wheel. Wednesday Mr. Black's condition was reported to be decidly Worse

Mr. Black was alone at the time and about 200 yards from his house and the highway, but had the nerve and the presence of mind to free himself from his position and walk to the house and signaled a school bus driver, on his return trip, who left his bus and got Mr. Black's car and brought the injured man to the local hospital, where he was given first aid treatment

X-ray views disclose the fact that several ribs were broken, some both in the back and the breast; one lung was deflated and the clavicle was torn loose from its connection with the scapils. The injury is pronounced as very serious, but the physicians see no reason why he shall not fully recover.

Mr. Black was using his tractor for the purpose of packing ensilage into a trench silo, and n attempting to back the engine n at the end, one of the wheels ailed to enter the pil, but connued along the edge and the ther wheel, sinking into the soft sllage allowed it to tip over.

Don't you think we ought to?


