HE underlying strain of pessimism in modern life casts the shadow of its interrogation mark athwart our path. In America as well as in the Old world, it finds utterance in a succession of notable writers. Poe, Mark Twain, Henry Adams, Jack London, Edgar Lee Masters, Theodore Dreiser, Sinclair Lewis, Sherwood Anderson and Eugene O'Neill express in varying degrees a somber sense of

During the last few weeks an epidemic of suicide among the young has redirected attention to this undercurrent of despair

Disquieting evidence of widespread nervous instability is revealed by the statistics of mental disease. Insanity is growing at a rate greatly exceeding that of the increase of population.

Symptomatic also is a prevalent cynicism, which flouts ideals, deeral tendency to plant more feed this rides marriage, decries those concerned for progress and is skeptical of the deeper emotions. The yearning of those distracted souls who seek refuge from themselves in Oriental mysticism evidences the malaise of which is a considerable increase over our time. And is not the forced note of our very optimism revealing specially the religious optimism that seeks to blind the sufferers to their ills by denying the reality of pain and evil?

The present wave of pessimism can only be attributed to the current trend of philosophy and psychology, and to neglect of spiritual qualities in a quest for material things.

AID IS ASKED FOR TORNADO STRICKEN

Governor Appeals to People of State for Funds for Rocksprings Victims.

Austin, Tex.-Declaring that "a greater calamity has never visited a town in our state," Governor Dan Moody Friday issued a stirring procla mation, appealing to the citizens of Texas to contribute funds for the relief of tornado-stricken Rocksprings.

"We as Texans," says the official document, "do not care to appeal to those beyond our borders for relief of the distresses of our neighbors and friends within our borders, and I believe that the citizens of Texas will come to the rescue of these people in

The governor also urged that the mayor of each city and the county judge of each county within the state assist in the organization of local committees to solicit funds, to be sent as speedily as possible to the relief of the West Texas town.

The proclamation recites the destruction of public and private improvements of Rocksprings, stating that surveys of the territory have estimated the property loss at figures, ranging from \$600,000 to \$1,500,000.

"But the material loss sustained in this respect is by no means the most shocking and harrowing. In the space of a few minutes the irresistible forces of nature separated whole families from the fireside. The young and the old alike were the victims of storm. Parents lost their children, and young children were left without

either father or mother. "The condition is one which, from investigations made, indicates that the people of Rocksprings are in desperate need of assistance. Funds will be needed to take care of children whose parents lost their lives and whose property was swept away in the

day and the best proclamation of that fact is the ecstasy of song which greets him on an April morning. For this is pre-eminently the month of birds as it is the month of wildflowers.

Some of our birds are with us the year round. A walk through the woods in winter, when the bare branches of the trees and the absence of green vegetation tells us that Mother Nature is sleeping, will reveal to us an astonishingly large number of birds, if we take the trouble to make a list of the different species we see. There are the bob white and ruffled grouse, the various species of hawks and owls, the crow, the horned lark. several species of sparrows, finches, the cedar waxwing, the chickadee and the nuthatch, all listed by most ornithologists as "permanent residents," not to mention a varied assortment of winter visitants. The plumage of most of them is somewhat drab and dull, in keeping with the spirit of winter, but it is relieved by such flashes of color as the bright blue of the blue jay and the brilliance of the cardinal's
