#### FOREST FIRE GUARD HAS LONELIEST JOB

#### Stays Long Periods in Isolated Tower.

Washington.-The lighthouse keep er, the prospector, the sheep herden have lonely jobs, but what is probably some towering mountain top in the cabin of his steel tower, surrounded for miles about by almost inaccessible weeks, often months, without seeing another human being.

Not all contact with the world, how ever, is lost, for by the very nature the economic pressure which is the basis of European rivalries. of his work he must be in daily and sometimes hourly telephone com nication with the ranger's or forester's headquarters. Equipped with the indispensable telephone, his maps, range finder, binoculars and meteorological instruments, the towerman keeps constant watch over the thousands of low him for the first telitale signs of neighborliness.

Is Poorly Paid.

The job of lookout, lonely and usually poorly paid as it is, nevertheless average in intelligence and fortitude to fill it. He must understand telephone line repair, must be able to read maps and know enough about triangulation to locate forest fires by taking their bearings, must be able to make temperature and humidity readings on a wet and dry bulb thermometer, and he must be able to cook his own meals.

Some states and the federal govern ment have employed women observers with good results. A woman lookout is quick to detect fires, accurate in locating them and definite when reporting them to headquarters. Where fire towers are situated near settle ments or farms, women will often be found "manning" them.

Towers Have Long Range.

These towers, the more modern of which are of galvanized steel, vary in height from 20 to 100 feet, though there are some even higher. When built on the highest peak of a moun tain range a 60-foot tower will usu ally permit a view of all the surrounding forest. In clear weather the observer may be able to see 40 mlles or more, but the average visibility is between 10 and 20 miles.

#### MOTHER AT GATE FOR SON'S BODY

#### Freed by Death After Thirty Years in Prison.

San Francisco, Calif.-Old Bill Son got out of San Quentin the other day. Bill had spent 30 of the last 37 years behind the walls of the "big ouse" across the bay.

He was freed by the only pardon they could give him-death. He died in the prison hospital, a broken old man of fifty-five years. That may not be old to those who can live with friends, sunshine and flowers, but it is very, very old for a man who has had only seven years of freedom since his eighteenth birthday.

And when they took Bill out the big gate, where he had seen so many thousands enter and leave, there was only one person there to meet him. It was his mother.

"Bill never was a bad boy-just a little wild," she told Warden James Holohan. She plans to bury him in Oakland, where she now lives. The

warden did not give her name. William D. Son first went to San Quentin in 1890. He had been sentenced for assault, and after serving a year and a half they let him go back to Mendocino county, from whence he came. In 1898 he went back from Butte county to serve a term for the murder of his mining partner. They let him out in 1909, but a year later he was back as a parole violator.

In his younger days Son was known as the "strong man of San Quentin," and tales of his strength are told by the old-timers. He was proud of his strength, too, and showed it to his such jinx days during which you'h mates in the jute mill, where he worked many years, by lifting huge routine sapped his strength.

His 30-year prison record was without a blemish. A "model prisoner" they called him, but that's all the good it did him. He had no friends on the "outside" pulling for him and no Star last January: one to believe in him except his mother, and she, unaided, couldn't do anything to sway prison boards to clemency for a "three time loser."

"He was in here so long I guess the world just forgot him," said the warden. "All the world, that is, except his mother."

RE you superstitious and do you believe that Friday, the 13th, is a jinx

Those who scorn the Friday the 13th superstition point to the fact that, if it were as unlucky as it is supposed to be, American history might have been vastly different from what it has been. For instance, away back at the beginnings of this republic a certain Friday, the 13th, turned out to be a lucky day instead of an unlucky one. For in October, 1776, King George the Third of England caused the issuance of a proclamation, calling for a day of prayer and fasting throughout the kingdom, intended to bring about the defeat of the rebellious American colonists, who on a certain day, in the preceding July, declared that they were "of right and ought to be free and independent" from the mother country. That proclamation, as printed in the London Gazette of October 30, 1776, reads as follows:

We, taking into our most serious consideration the just and necessary measures of force which we are obliged to use against our rebellious subjects in our colonies and provinces in North America and putting out trust in Almighty God, that He wil vouchsafe a special blessing on our arms both by sea and land, have resolved, and do, by and with the advice of our privy council, hereby com-mand, that a publick fast and humili-ation be observed throughout that part of our kingdom of Great Britain called Flack, a history student at King's col-lege, dropped a book on the toe of Friday the thirteenth day of December Dr. John Wesley Bready, American next; and so both we and our people historian, in the British museum readmay humble ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain pardon of our

There was once a famous Thirteen club, which used to smash a mirror before it sat down under umbrellas, thirteen at a table, on the occasion of its monthly dinners on the thirteenth, and there is no record that bad luck trailed any of its members and got them in bad. Several years ago thee Chicago couples were married on Friday, the 13th, at the 13th hour in cell No. 13 of the old convict ship "Success," which was then on exhibition in the Chicago river. Each bride carried a black cat and thirteen mirrors were broken at the time of the ceremony. So far as is known, all three of these marriages have suffered no disas-

trous fate. In an age of what we are pleased to term "enlightenment and progress," It is interesting to note how the superstition about the number 13 has survived when other superstitions seems to be going into the discard. The belief that this number is a hoodoo seems to be world-wide. In France, especially in Paris, no house bears that number. 




