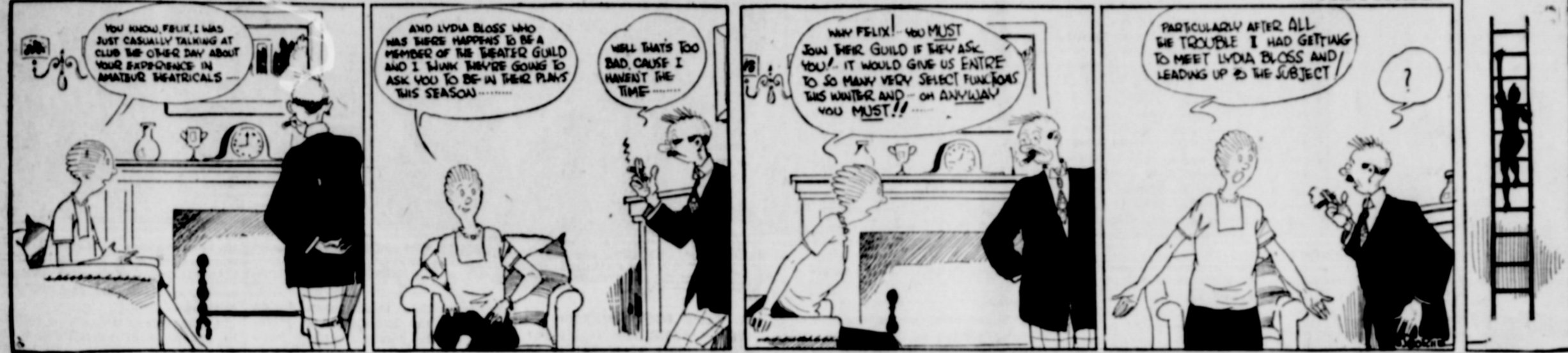

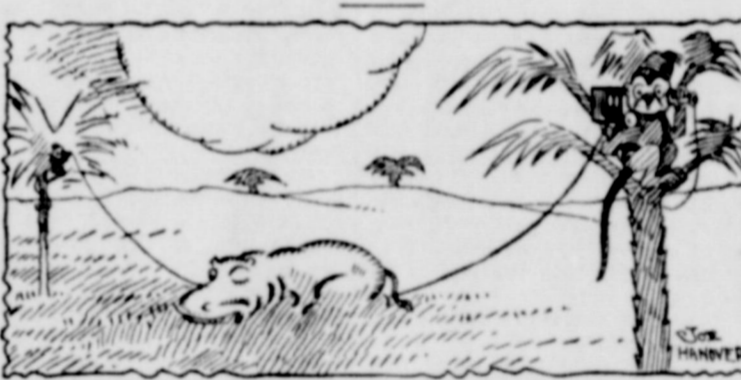

## PINTO STILL KING IN TEXAS CORNERS

**Sections Use Ponies for Fast Transportation.**

Dallas, Texas.—Railroad development in Texas has kept step in recent years with the state's march of progress in an agricultural and mineral way, yet so vast has been a last frontier of southwestern border counties that eight still await the steel rails that will bring to the region a fast and uninterrupted transportation it has never known.

The group where the automobile and pinto pony are still the only means of conveyance embrace an area fifteen times as large as Rhode Island, but the population in this undeveloped section is only one-seventh of that of Providence.

So great are distances from some of the cattle ranches that it is necessary to drive stock more than eighty miles to a railroad for shipment to packing houses or the feed lots of the corn belt.

Although much of the region still is largely in a pastoral state, due to the scarcity of rainfall and ownership of land in tracts too large for development, it is the center of the country's best wool and mohair area and the breeding ground for thousands of cattle each year. Oil resources have been developed in Crane county only, but land prices and bank deposits have risen rapidly since the World war.

Live stock values in Crockett county exceed those of any other county in Texas, and Edward county, one of the group, leads the country in the number of goats raised annually.

Transportation companies have watched with interest this domain and plans have been discussed for an extension that will connect at least four counties—Mason, Kimble, Sutton and Crockett—with the outside world. A road also has been proposed for Edwards county, but for several years Glasscock, Crane and Bandera probably will not witness what would be the novel sight of a locomotive rumbling across the region.

## Electricity Now Runs World's Oldest Clock

Rouen, France.—The world's oldest clock, built in 1380, today ticks by electricity.

Not only does electricity run the clock, but it also rings Rouen's historic curfew, "Cache Ribaud," which was instituted by William the Conqueror and which for nearly eight centuries has sounded at nine o'clock each night the warning to all to return to their homes and put out their lights.

For even the Rouen clock could not operate forever on its old machinery. The bulky wheels and weights ran the clock for more than 500 years before they recently collapsed under the strain and appealed for help.

So an expert in electrical works called in. He tore out the antiquated works and substituted a small, black box. This box now not only operates the clock, but also rings the curfew.

The clock has only one hand—never has had another. But the great copper dial bears minute graduations and the machinery causes the chimes to strike every 15 minutes, as well as on the hour.

## Attributes Long Life to Horizontal Position

Vienna.—A certain Dr. Julius Tichewr who recently died here at the age of one hundred nine, often declared that the secret of his longevity consisted in taking a horizontal position as often as possible during the day, and naturally, every night.

Whenever it was possible throughout the day, he would place his head in the direction of the North pole and the remainder of his body parallel to the meridian line.

The doctor affirmed that this position corresponded to the direction of the magnetic current running through the surface of the earth and thus permitted a kind of magnetism of the iron mass contained in the body.

## Connecticut Churches Tax Exempt 200 Years

Hartford, Conn.—The system of freeing religious bodies from taxation has rounded out two centuries in Connecticut and is beginning a third.

Church of England churches in the Connecticut colony were granted exemption for taxation in 1727. A few years later the Baptists and Quakers also were exempted.

It is now 220 years since provision was made for dissenters from the established church. The general court in 1708 granted permission for the Presbyterian system of church government to be used by churches that dissented from the Church of England.

## POULTRY

### FLASHLIGHT BIG AID IN CULLING

Shows Many Loafers Among Layers in Hen Flock.

Literally catching the loafers napping is an excellent method of culling the poultry flock, if the culling process is carried on from week to week. Extension specialists in poultry at the Ohio State university suggest that the weekly culling may be done very conveniently with a flashlight when the birds are on the roost at night.

Birds showing shriveled combs or molt, or having empty crops, should be culled. Absence of yellow pigment is one of the indications of a good producer, and it may be difficult, under a flashlight, to determine the coloring of the eyerings, earlobes, vent, beak and shanks. If there is doubt, the birds can be isolated and examined again by daylight. The heavy egg producers will have lost yellow color from the body parts mentioned. However, the color will return should the bird cease to lay.

In the low producer, the comb is pale, small and shriveled, the vent is yellow, shrunken and dry. Eyes are small and shrunken, turning in toward the beak. Shanks are yellow, round and full, the pelvic bones close together, hard and rigid. Space between the pelvic bones and the breast bone is shallow or full of hard fat. The skin is thick and underlaid with fat. The bird is generally narrow across the ribs and hips, and the body is shallow and round.

### How Much Does Pullet Cost Till Able to Lay?

The North Carolina State college has conducted several tests to determine the amount of feed required to start a Red, Barred Plymouth Rock or Wyandotte laying pullet. In one series of tests the entire animal feed was milk and in the other meat meal. In the case of the milk-fed pullets it required 20 pounds of feed from the time the pullets were hatched till they began to lay 21 weeks later. This feed cost 71 cents. In the meat meal flock, nine and one-half pounds of mash and five and one-half pounds of grain were used and the cost was 57 cents. Adding the cost of the chick, and other costs, the S. C. Rhode Island Red, Barred Plymouth Rock or White Wyandotte pullets just in lay would cost \$1.50 when milk fed and \$1.17 when meat meal fed. These pullets sell for \$2 each at laying time. If you have surplus milk, feed it to the growing birds.

### For Early Winter and Late Fall Production

With most ordinary flocks only 50 per cent or so of the flock is kept as aged hens, the other half being pullets, and the purpose of this is to provide for early winter and late fall egg production. Pullets, when hatched early and properly fed, will begin laying in October or November and lay quite heavily during this season of the year. Hens that are one year of age or older rarely begin laying before late December or early January. They do their heaviest laying during the late winter and early spring months. Therefore, to balance egg production it is necessary to have approximately half the flock old hens and half the flock pullets.

### Poultry Facts

- Birds that are not fit to be kept over as breeders should be disposed of at once.
- Moldy or spoiled feed is always dangerous. It causes loss of appetite, diarrhea, fungus growth in the "funnards," and often kills the fowls.
- Don't be afraid to feed oats, especially if you can get heavy white oats. They are a great poultry feed, unless too much hull and not enough kernel.
- If laying fowls lose weight, give them more grain. If they're lazy, heavy, and laying poorly, cut the grain down, so they'll eat more mash.
- Corn, also barley, if fed, should be given in the evening, because these feeds provide needed heat for the birds during cold nights on the roosts.
- Improve your flock next year by getting some good males to breed with them. Start right now to looking or writing around and locate some good ones.
- Turkeys will begin laying indoors, even in the late winter months, if they are well sheltered and given a good laying mash.
- There is plenty of room for more poultry meat and it pays to keep a flock of good meat fowls that have been bred for egg production.
- Don't think you have to keep Leghorns to get eggs. Any breed or variety can be bred for egg production. It is a matter of strain more than breed.

## Pay Roll Simple in Italian Rice Fields

A customary preliminary to harvest time, which begins in early September in Italy's rice-growing center surrounding the city of Alessandria, in the Piedmont, is that the farmers and peasants arrange for wages and other labor matters. Last year the respective syndicates of workers and growers reached an agreement based on "compensation by nature" or emolument in kind. No money to the worker; he shall be paid with rice.

Thus peasant lads from fourteen to fifteen years of age receive 17½ pounds of rice a day, those from fifteen to sixteen earn 23 pounds a day, and boys from sixteen to seventeen years get 35 pounds. Girls from fifteen to sixteen earn 20 pounds of rice for the eight-hour day, while the women's stipend is 20½ pounds.

Should a laborer insist on cold cash, the grower will be troubled with the necessity of utilizing his arithmetic. For he must take the number of pounds the worker is entitled to and multiply it by the current market price, which is about 3 cents a pound.

## Old Writings Found Shed Light on Past

From Rabat, Morocco, comes a report of the discovery of cuneiform writing dating back to the Sixth century before the Christian era. The MSS., tending to show that the Assyrians or the Medes conquered and colonized Morocco, has been found, it is stated, by Captain Odnot, a French explorer, 22 miles north of Fez, the sultan's capital. The inscriptions, which were discovered in subterranean galleries in the mountains, resemble in many respects the Babylonian writing found at Ur in Chaldea. Captain Odnot believes that the inscriptions prove that the Berbers were not the original inhabitants of Morocco, but that the modern Moors are the descendants of the Assyrians, Medes, and Persians and great warlike nations of Biblical times.

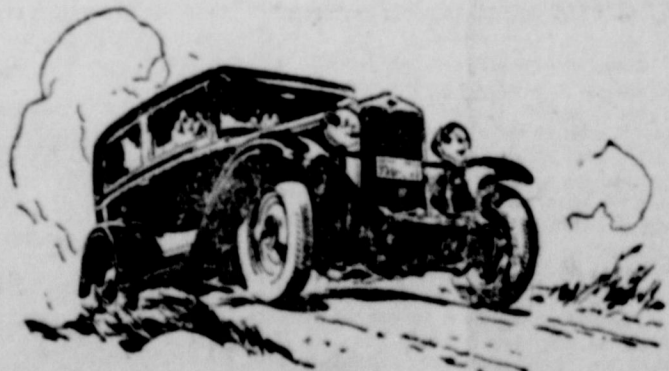

Sanderson, Texas, Jan. 15-29.  
It is unlawful for any person  
to operate or drive any motor  
or other vehicle upon the public  
highways of this State at a rate  
of speed in excess of 35 miles  
per hour. It is also unlawful  
for any person to operate or drive  
a motor or other vehicle within  
or through any town or village not  
incorporated within this State at  
a greater rate of speed than 20
