Cotton in Natural Colors

#### Failure of Humanity to Find Real Happiness, Indictment of Christianity

By REV. DR. HENRY DARLINGTON (New York), Episcopal.

F THOMAS A. EDISON'S birthday statement that he did not know any one who was really happy is a correct quotation, and if Mr. Edison is only partially right, what a judgment on 2,000 years of Christianity! One of the great things that Jesus sought to give us was happiness, joy and peace. And yet how few of us are realizing that God meant us to get the most out of life.

This we are failing to do, I believe, because of four joy-killers that loom all too large in the average person's mind, the product of overemphasis on material values. First among these joy-killers we may place the Puritanical ideas and distorted sense of sin that too frequently make people feel that to enjoy themselves would in itself be wrong. They think that anything that is pleasing must be bad.

Worry is the second of life's great joy-killers-worry over things not worth considering. Jesus preached against worry. In one of the modern translations we find Him saying, "Don't let these fear-thoughts get the better of you.".

Our third joy-killer is the ceaseless urge of this age which seems to be prodding us on and on. Here in America we seem to think that unless a man is working his finger nails off, there is something wrong with him. We seem unable to relax, to sit content on a beach and listen to the music of the waves.

Jealousy, bringing us all sorts of unnecessary temptations, is the fourth joy-killer.

#### Typical American and Christian Governed by Ideals Not Appetites

By REV. DR. JOHN McDOWELL, Presbyterian.

Character is the only foundation upon which we can build a republic. Conscience, not science, is the only adequate basis for a democracy. To speak of our American ideals with no reference to American religious faith is a thin and shallow interpretation of the nation's soul. A nation can exist without religion, but it cannot live without it.

The present situation in America creates and deepens three compelling convictions.

First-There is no hope for Americans apart from the Kingdom of God. No new political system, no new educational system, no new industrial system, no new social system apart from the Kingdom of God can ever save America.

Second-There is no hope for the Kingdom of God apart from the Christian church. Other institutions will help the church, and for their help we are profoundly grateful, but not one of them will take full and primary responsibility for bringing the Kingdom of God-the kingdom of righteousness, peace and joy-into the life of America. The school will not take it, the college will not take it, the legislature will not take it, congress will not take it, the court will not take it, the public press will not take it. If the Kingdom of God is to come into our American life, the Christian church must take primary and full responsibility for bringing it in.

Third-There is no hope for the Christian church apart from an efficient, consecrated leadership and membership which possesses the following qualities: vision, knowledge, conviction, co-operation, sacrifice and character.

#### Fault of Modern Education That It Gives No Clue to Significance of Life

By REV. S. M. SHOEMAKER, New York

Our education today gives us so much knowledge and so little wisdom, so much sophistication and so little maturity, that when we have run the gamut of exciting sensations and exhausted the possibilities of such life as we know, our souls are like rags wrung out, like squeezed

It is a most baffling and uncertain time. The old anchors and moorings are gone. The assurances which science and the new liberty held out to us have not materialized. The animal existence which gives free rein to the instincts does not invariably lead to liberty, but often to worse enslavement than before. The intellectual life of investigat ing and learning, is high and fine, but it gives no clue to the signifi-

It was Jesus' personality throughout the centuries that has compelled men to follow Him, and although His presence is no more visible on the earth His appeal to youth has grown even greater. The mark He has left upon history has been only a white mark. Many crimes have been committed in the name of His religion, but they were faulty human mistakes in application. Jesus himself has only exercised a beneficent and enpobling influence upon men and the world. Such a one, standing in front of the moral and spiritual vanguard of humanity, has a right to call each of us, and expect us to take up like men, and not run and evade like cowards.

#### Better Than Monetary Assistance Is Aiding Needy to Help Themselves

By REV. C. EVERETT WAGNER, New York.

Those who need help should be taught to help themselves rather than receive momentary assistance by flinging out gifts of money. When sympathy runs wild by performing deeds for those persons who have aroused it, the recipient is harmed more than he is aided. In this way parents are frequently the worst enemies of their children. Individuals hand out money for relief instead of finding a permanent job for the unemployed.

Thousands of people will reach down in their pockets in the distress of thousands that are out of work, but they will not invoke the principle of trying to aid people to assist themselves by agitating for the establishment of state and federal employment bureaus. When they know an aged couple in want they satisfy their own emotions and sleeping consciences by giving temporary assistance instead of helping to create a social order which acknowledges a collective responsibility by passing old age pensions in the various state legislatures.

The last individual which the church can aid is the one who comes to it expecting the institution to do everything for him. That frame of mind is helpless in a constructive method. The first individual which the church should aid is one who really wants a chance to have that opportunity to do so.

#### Drop in Meat Eating

The average American ate about 5 pounds less meat last year than he did the year before, and 8 pounds less than in 1926, a summary prepared by the Department of Commerce Indicates.

There has been a steady decline in the amount of beef and veal consumed, while pork has climbed but insufficiently to balance the loss in beef products. Lamb and mutton have held about even. Beef consumption has dropped from a per capita figure of 63.6 pounds in 1926 to 51.7 in 1928, while pork has risen from 65.7 to 73.9. Lamb and mutton have stood at approximately 5% pounds and veal has dropped from 8.2 pounds to 6.8 pounds.

#### SOCIAL LIFE RUN BY RIGID RULES

#### Washington Hostesses Must Watch Their Step.

Washington.-Hostesses who come into this capital city with the new administration are certain to find that their social knowledge, however extensive it may be, is not adequate to take care of every situation likely to arise during their stay.

Occasions of ceremony in the national capital follow certain rules and regulations, ignorance of which often brings humiliation; and indifference to those rules calls down stern criticism upon the offender. Indeed, it is the wise newcomer who

acquaints herself with the rules. By so doing she will not only simplify life for everyone, but will also save herself much embarrassment. Washington is different from Euro-

pean capitals in this respect. On the continent when statesmen are dined and feted, there is a "protocol" which assigns to every one his or her relative rank, and does so with the official sanction of the government.

No such court of appeals exists in the capital of this country. There are available in the State department certain rules and regulations. The department, however, refuses to be quoted as an authority and supplies no written lists.

It is up to the individual to do the proper thing.

And the proper thing to the uninitiated at times presents a real problem. Foreign ambassadors and ministers are not, as Lincoln is said to have been: "Willing to follow anyone who wants to precede them." They represent their country or their rulers, whose dignity they are responsible for upholding in their own persons. To use the words of a clever and distinguished ambassador; "Since the Good God made us so that we cannot get through the door at once, there must be precedence."

Each year Washington sees men come here in official positions of great importance. They represent sovereign states, each one proud of its dignity. An affront to them is an affront to those states.

Thus the wives of Washington offi-

clais are faced by conditions not duplicated anywhere. And they soon come to know that knowledge of the rank of officials at dinners is necessary, not merely in giving entertainments, but even in attending those given by

Under the treaty by which the tribe was given the reservation, the government, "in view of their wretched and impoverished condition," agreed to move the Quapaws to their new home and to furnish them live stock, farm implements, firearms and other equipment.

Nothing except hay was produced on the tribe's new land. White men leased it paying the Indians a pittance. The town of Quapaw sprang up and became the greatest hay shipping point in the world for a time. The Indians cared nothing for the hay, the land or much of anything else. They wanted to fish and hunt and be left alone.



#### MAY REACH MOON. THINKS CURTISS

#### Aviator Sees Planes Making Trips Some Day.

Miami, Fia.-Glenn Curtiss, famous aviator, father of commercial aviation and builder of the airplane products which bear his name, said that man will some day reach both the moon and the planet Venus. During an interview, he was asked: "What are the probabilities of interplanetary communication? Do you believe man will ever reach the moon and possibly the planet Venus?" "I think the time will come when

man will fly from this earth to the moon," Mr. Curtiss replied. "It is not impossible. Anything man thinks of can eventually be made to come true.

"The weird stories we read recently concerning plans to fly to the moon are no harder to imgine than Jules Verne's exploits were when he wrote them more than three decades ago. And a good percentage of his predictions have come true. Around 40,000 feet is about as high as man has gone.

"The vehicle to carry a man to the noon will have to be extremely strong. It must carry enough oxygen and food to last him the entire journey. The biggest part of the feat will be navigation and it will take another Lindbergh to stay on the course to reach he objective."

Mr. Curtiss has made Miami his permanent home, having established a factory, two airplane bases and a flying school here.

#### All Living Plants Have Nerves, Says Scientist

London.-A theory that trees resemble human beings insofar as they are attracted and repulsed by the presence of human beings is put for-

ward by Herbert G. Longford. "It has been reserved to scientists of the present generation," he says, "to conceive and produce instruments of marvelous delicacy, proving by the production of visible record that all living plants have nerves which respond to electric ! shock, to heat and to cold-as do ours-and a throbbing pulse which varies naturally-as does our own-during times of wakefulness and sleep.

#### Student Farms Bring Profit to Indian Boys

Chilocco, Okla.-Individual student farms, once considered a foolish experiment, have solved the problem of raining youthful Indian farmers.

Nearly forty Indian boys now cultivate separate tracts, ranging from sixty-three to seventy-five acres a plece, at the Chilocco Indian Agricul-tural school. Four thousand acres are under student cultivation.

Lawrence E. Correll, superintendent, aroused interest by telling the Indians the ground held "buried treasures." Each boy assigned a tract of ground averages \$200 profit annually-one quarter of what he produces.

Younger boys are allowed to cultivate smaller tracts. The school either buys the grain for its own use or sells it at the market.

The Chilocco school's venture has been adopted as a model by Indian schools throughout the country.




