



PASTURING GEESE

ON CLEAN RANGE

As General Rule Fowls Are Given Freedom of Field.

The raising of geese has not been specialized like duck raising, for the reason that geese secure most of their feed by grazing. For this reason, geese are raised on most farms in comparatively small flocks. These facts are the principal reasons why geese raisng offers an opportunity for most farmers to add another source of income to their spring poultry raising. Geese may be pastured at the rate of 60 head to an acre, but, as a general rule, they are given free range. This is satisfactory so long as they are not numerous. However, if a large flock of geese is pastured on the regular pasture the live stock will not relish the pasture on account of the se manure on the grass. Ordinarily, the number of geese raised on any one farm are not numerous enough to cause any trouble from this source.

Geese do not require a great deal of attention. After the first two weeks they are able to look after themselves if given a good range. The principal food of geese is grass, supplemented by insects and other low forms of animal life. If suitable range is not accessible it is not advisable to go into

The floor of such houses should be of earth. This should be covered with straw and renewed often enough so that it will be dry. A thin coating of sand often proves helpful in keeping the house dry.

Geese mate more successfully after they are two years of age than when mated earlier. This is more true of the females than of the males. Occasionally yearling geese will produce fertile eggs, but they cannot be depended upon. Small, undersized geese should not be used for breeding purposes. On the other hand, extra large, coarse geese are not as satisfactory as those of full development, but not so coarse. With most breeds the gander will mate with from three to four





FAMOUS GEYSERS ARE ACTIVE AGAIN

Yellowstone Park Wonders Back to Life.

Washington.-After eight or nine years of comparative quiet, unusual activity is new being displayed by two of the largest geysers in Yellowstone National park, the Glant and the Glantess, according to reports recently received at the Department of the Interior.

The Glantess, which played only once during the summer of 1928, has played twice ithee the beginning of the present calendar year, with 22-day interval. During the second eruption it played for over four hours. The period during which water was erupted lasted only about 50 minutes, the rest of the four hours being given to steam and chough accompanying water to form a fine mist coming down.

From these two eruptions it is hoped this geyser is coming back to activity. The average height of the Giantess eruptions is from 200 to 250 feet. Until recent years it has usually played two or three times a season.

The Glant geyser, which used to play every eight or ten days, during the last few years extended the time between eruptions to a month or more and last summer and the year before only played at night when tourists were not able to see it. It also has played twice so far this year, at one time throwing water to a height of 180 to 200 feet for a period of 62 minutes. Sometimes the Glant throws its water as high as 250 feet. Until the advent of the new geyser in the park the Giant has been classed as the greatest existing geyser since the old Excelsior, which played out in 1800.

The new geyser, which as yet has not been given a special name, suddealy broke out last July. It appears to have continued activity without interruption through the winter, although close observations have been impracticable under winter conditions. Its crater, which resembles that of the old Excelsior, mensures 90 by 140 feet. Its tube may be measured to a depth of 74 feet below the surface, one foot deeper than that of the Glant. During the latter part of the past summer it erupted once in every ten to fourteen and one-half hours, the period of eruption lasting from four to six hours. It has been estimated that about 700,000 gullens of water are thrown out in one of its four and onebalf-hourd-uptle-s.
