R. E. Moore's test No. 1, Arnold, situated about 28 miles northwest of this city encountered high grade gravity oil last week in Pecos County at the depth of 1,215 feet. It is reported that this oil is 40 gravity or better. The well is temporarily shut down waiting for storage tanks to be constructed. As soon as the storage tanks are completed the well will be tested and probably deepened.
