Know Your School

(That patrons may have better opportunity of really knowing their school this column will each week be given over to school news. It is the desire of the school executives that the patrons become better acquainted with the faculty, school methods and school aims.)

By way of experiment radios will be installed in a hundred Eastern rural schools, and results will be studied for several months. It is proposed to integrate radio broadcasting with the regular school work. Miss Mabel Carney, professor of rural education, Teachers College, Columbia University, will broadcast the lessons.

Your child knows the significance of American Education Week. Can you relate its purpose, and do you know what part you as a parent are to take in observing this week with the teachers and children of the Sanderson schools?

In order to acquaint the patrons and citizens of the town with the school's part in celebrating American Education Week, letters are being sent out today inviting all friends of the school to attend the programs given by prominent community educators and the school children from 3:15 to 4:00 o'clock at the high school auditorium Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday afternoons.

A nationwide radio program for American Education Week will go out over the National Broadcasting System Wednesday evening, November 13, at 11:15 EST with an all-star cast of speakers.

The making of productive citizens or character education is as much emphasized in modern school methods as any class work. Citizenship training has been introduced and developed in all curricula of the largest and best-known high schools.

Toward the provision of citizenship training in the Sanderson Schools, the Rotary Club has announced its plan of having as guests of the club two high school students for each Rotary luncheon. These students are given the opportunity to meet the business men and to converse with them on the foremost topics of the day of local, state, and even national importance.

Margaret Lattimore and Elmer Haas, both seniors, were the first guests of the club Wednesday noon at the weekly luncheon.

One of the newest educational trends now in practice in some of our best schools is the introduction of sight-saving classes into the regular class room procedure. The public is gradually coming to recognize the academic value of these classes.

STUDIES VOLCANOES' THROATS FROM AIR

Scientist Uses Planes to Make Observations.

Washington.—The use of an airplane to permit a scientific observer to look down the "sore throats" of active volcanoes, is one of the latest developments of aviation.

On the island of Hawaii, where the eruptions are feared, three navy seaplanes have been used for volcano inspection trips. Aboard one plane was the veteran volcano observer, Dr. Thomas A. Jaggar.

No monarch or President receives more careful attention than that given by Doctor Jaggar to the volcanoes of the Hawaiian Islands. While his fame rests largely on his practice in these American possessions, Doctor Jaggar is subject to call as consultant in the Aleutian Islands, Japan and other volcano centers.

His house on the lip of Kilauea gives the scientist the right to be considered a "bedside volcano observer" in practically constant attendance on his most chronic case. His instruments, especially his seismographs, have their fingers on the pulse of the volcanoes at all times.

As some eruptions have arisen to fever heat earthquakes became stronger and more frequent. The numerous earthquakes that have shaken Hawaii recently aroused fears of impending eruption.

Studied Mount Pavlof Area. During the summer of 1928 Doctor Jaggar led a National Geographic society expedition to the little-known Mount Pavlof volcano area in the Aleutian Islands, one of the most active volcanic regions in the world today.

On the expedition to the Pavlof area Doctor Jaggar found evidence of a four-and-a-quarter-year cycle of activity among the Aleutian cones.

"There are no more earthquakes or eruptions than there have been in the past," declared Doctor Jaggar, in a report to the National Geographic society. "But more and more people are living in congested areas, where disturbances inflict disasters now, whereas they would have passed unnoticed not so many years ago."

Hence the need for skilled observers to keep tab on dangerous volcanoes.

How one eruption prediction saved thousands of lives and much property, was reported by Doctor Jaggar, in a communication to the National Geographic society, on the eruption of Sakurajima, Japan's greatest volcanic convulsion within historic times. The Hawaiian specialist was an eye-witness of the last phases of this eruption.

Although 20,000 people were living on the tiny island center of destruction a few days before the disaster, the volcano killed no one.

"The remarkable record of life-saving in the Sakurajima eruption," wrote Doctor Jaggar, "was partly due to good luck, but also to the instinct of the people, to the wisdom of the government, and to scientific societies."

Hopes to Learn More.

To determine whether earthquakes, more common in the United States than volcanoes (Lassen, in California, the only active cone), have a close relation to volcanoes, has been one object of Doctor Jaggar's study.

"It is only a question of time," Doctor Jaggar continued, "and of additional observations at several volcanoes, for science to learn more about earthquake portents than anyone dreamed of 50 years ago."

"The late honored Professor Mori was a martyr to science in the Tokyo earthquake. He devoted all the later years of his life to studying the relation of earthquakes to active volcanoes in Japan. He found that volcanoes were keys to the earthquake problem. He had almost reached the point of unlocking the mystery. All honor to his memory, and may science take up the key where he laid it down."

Detroit to Use Planes to Check Up on Taxes

Detroit, Mich.—In an effort to discover thousands of dollars' worth of taxable property which has escaped assessment in the past, a contract for an aerial photograph of the entire city of Detroit was recently awarded to a flying service.

It was believed that the aerial photographs when pieced together will show up houses, garages and other real estate which has never been surveyed by the assessors.

Several weeks will be required for the work, and the air snapshots will be used in conjunction with new maps being completed by the assessing department.

Keen-Eyed Indian Caddies Are Popular

Banff, Alberta.—The keen eyes and passiveness of the Indian braves are proving the ideal combination for caddies at this Canadian resort. Members of the tribe of Stoney Indians, many of them old braves, are employed as caddies. Their ability to see balls driven for great distances has won them popularity among golfers. Caddy masters say they have not yet lost a ball. A topped shot never brings a snicker, nor do they ever speak unless spoken to. Chief Sitting Eagle, descendant of famous warriors, is one of the best liked of the Stoney Indian caddies.

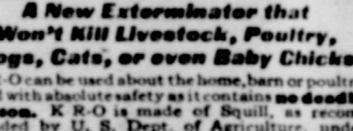
The Boss Judge Olvany, the political leader, at a farewell luncheon—he was about to sail for Europe—was talking about political bosses.

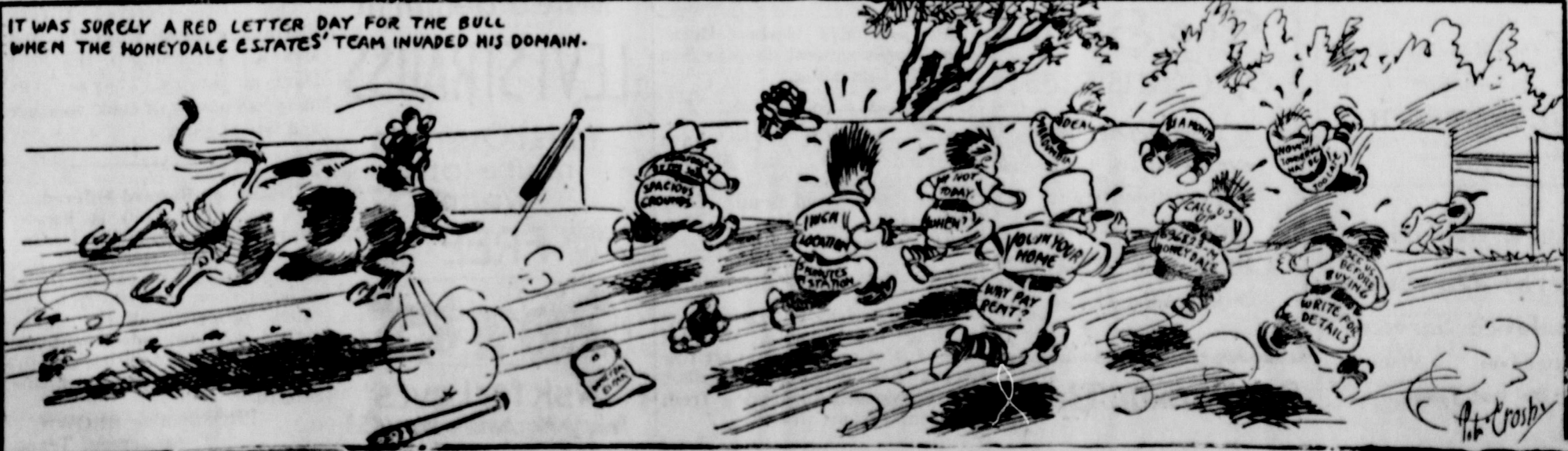

200 American Dialects

The Federal Reserve bank, realizing suddenly that this is a nation and not a pawn shop, reduced the discount rate from 6 to 5 per cent. Perhaps it will influence professional money lenders to suspend for a while the orgy of usury.

New Jersey, first among the states, has absolutely wiped out the gypsy moth.

Governor Lamm and the state agricultural department are to be congratulated on a fine achievement. More money than Wall Street could lose in a dozen panics would be saved if science could eliminate agricultural pests, boll weevil, corn borer and the rest of the army.

Excellent news comes from Florida as to the success of that state in dealing with the Mediterranean fruit fly. It has been a costly battle, but worth the money and trouble.

Samuel Insull and other big employers following the example of Julius Rosenberg, supply money to protect employees from losses in stock speculation.

Henry Ford wouldn't agree with that idea. Two years ago when the writer mentioned certain stocks in which there were bound to be heavy losses, Ford said: "Of course. But that's the only way people can learn."

Whether it is wise not to let nature take its course in gambling as in other things, is questionable.

Senator Nye of North Dakota wants Wall Street and "all speculation stifled." What's more, he wants a ready-made by February 1.

That's a short time for so big a job.

The Malay, in his breed-clout, bets on cock fights. The proud red Indian piles up his shirt and blanket, bets them on a pony race, standing in dignified nudity.

Two ways of getting something: one is to work, the other to gamble. Ninety per cent of human beings prefer the gambling way.

That will be changed a good deal later than February 1, 1930.

From Pocomtoco Hills, where John D. Rockefeller is enjoying life at the age of ninety, came a statement that to the distressed was like a drink of cool water in the middle of Sahara!

"My son and I have, for some days, been purchasing sound common stock. We are continuing, and will continue, our purchases in substantial amounts at levels which we believe represents sound investment values."

Mr. Rockefeller, who has given away \$750,000,000 to science, education and fighting disease, rarely makes any public utterance. His statement about the purchase of stocks by himself and his son is his first public statement on business since 1911. It will do more than anything else could have done to restore confidence.

Those purchases, of course, will probably enable Mr. Rockefeller to give away another hundred millions. Everybody knows that his purchases are based not on a desire for profits, but to restore confidence and prevent unnecessary loss to millions.

Doctor Greet teaches English to girls at Barnard college, and proves, with the phonograph, that there are 200 American dialects between the two oceans, the Great Lakes and the Gulf.

At least, all Americans understand each other.

It is not so in France, where a peasant from Brittany cannot understand another from the Midi.

The number of American dialects reminds you of a beautiful poem about the soldiers each remembering a different name, but "All Sang Annie Laurie."

Americans may speak 200 dialects, but they all understand each other when they talk about the dollar, which is a sort of national "Annie Laurie."

You will be glad to hear that the Federal Reserve board says the Wall Street earthquake is over, public fears calmed.

It may be permissible to remark that, while the earthquake is still fresh in many minds, that gambling is dangerous.

And it isn't necessary. There are other, better ways of making a living in the United States. In addition to which gambling is NO WAY to make a living.

It used to be said, "Wise man, take your profits." That has changed to "Wise man, take your losses," meaning, don't sell in a panic and regret at leisure.

Two more great oil fields have been found, one in Texas, one in Kansas. And it is called "a misfortune harmful to the price of oil stocks."

It ought to mean general satisfaction, proving the limitless wealth of this country. Unfortunately, oil companies and government combined have not learned to protect oil resources and prevent criminal waste.

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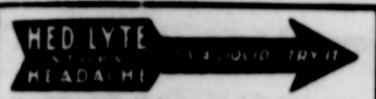

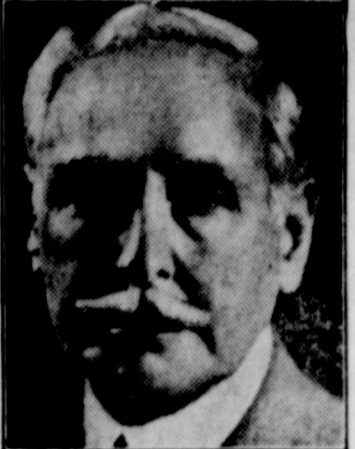

DISTINCTION FOR TEXAS P.-T. ASSOCIATIONS

(Editorial in San Antonio Express, Sept. 26, 1929.)

Texas Parent-Teacher Associations last year ranked first in bringing about medical and dental examinations of school children. That highly creditable record was revealed when National Congress of Parents and Teachers officers and directors lately met in Chicago with State presidents to formulate a program of activities for this school year. Reports then showed that Michigan, Ohio, Missouri and Iowa ranked below Texas in the order named.

The school clinic—with its periodical health-inventory—is an all-important phase of the welfare work which the parent-teacher organizations are doing in co-operation with other civic and philanthropic agencies. By revealing and correcting physical defects, these clinics repeatedly perform the seeming miracle of transforming a dullard into a bright pupil. They have helped assure to the child coming under their care the birthright of a sound mind in a sound body.

The movement lately has been extended to benefit the pre-school children. Every child in the land is entitled to all the assistance which science can afford toward safeguarding its elemental rights to health and happiness and the unhindered unfolding of its personality. The earlier in life such help is extended, the more effective it is likely to prove. The Parent-Teacher Associations can perform no more valuable public service than this, and they are to be congratulated upon their excellent record.

Unfortunately, the picture has another side: Texas is still outside the Federal Registration Area because it largely has neglected to record its babies' births. That is an important function from both an humanitarian and a legal viewpoint. Complete vital statistics are essential to intelligent planning of campaigns to reduce infant-mortality, and to other public health activities. The agencies that are seeking to repair Texas' oversight would welcome all possible co-operation in creating the indispensable public sentiment.

The above was handed us by Mrs. Loehausen, president of the local Parent-Teacher Association and was an editorial appearing in the San Antonio Express of September 26th issue.
