Know Your School

(That patrons may have better opportunity of really knowing their school this column will each week be given over to school news. It is the desire of the school executives that the patrons become better acquainted with the faculty, school methods and school aims.)

The school cafeteria catering to the school children and teachers who desire hot lunches, opened Tuesday noon of this week in the home economics room. The lunchroom was opened last winter for the convenience of the Dryden children who ride the bus. The cafeteria, under the supervision of Miss Bonnie Cox, home economics instructor, accommodates approximately thirty persons every noon. A hot lunch of vegetable soup, sandwiches, pie, cocoa or milk is served cafeteria style at the minimum cost of 25 cents.

Arrangements for a Christmas program put on by the children of the Sanderson Schools at 8 o'clock Thursday evening, December 19, in the high school auditorium have been completed. Sept. E. J. Brannan announced yesterday. A Christmas pageant portraying the birth of Jesus will be one of the main features of the program. The musical talent for the entertainment will be drawn from the Girls' Choral Club, the Junior Boys' Glee Club, and the Senior Boys' Glee Club, who are now practicing Christmas carols under the direction of Misses Louise Noble and Martha Robinson, choral club directors. School will be dismissed for the Christmas holidays Friday evening, December 20, and work will again be resumed Thursday, Jan. 2.

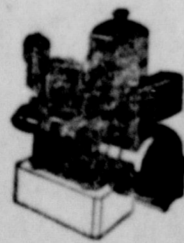
