Woman Says General's Son Supervised Job.

Lexington, Va.-The burial of "Trayeler," Gen. Robert E. Lee's war horse, was described here by Mrs. Margaret Letcher Showell of Letcher avenue. who, as a twelve-year-old girl, was one of the eight persons who made up the funeral cortege.

Mrs. Showell contradicts the common belief that "Traveler" was merely "pushed over the cliff" after his

Mrs. Showell explained that a large hole was dug for Traveler's grave. The floor of this hole was covered with boards and borse was dragged onto this flooring. The carcass was then covered with time and the sides and a top were fitted to the planking in the bottom of the hole, thus enclosing the horse in a sealed wooden casket,

"Gen. Custis Lee himself spread Traveller's blanket over him before the top was placed on the box," Mrs. Showell said. "Custis Lee was as fond of Traveler as his father had been. He was very cad as he walked away from the grave."

In 1907, funds to have the skeleton of Traveler mounted, were donated by Joseph Bryan of Richmond. The skeleton now stands in a glass case in the pasement of Lee Memorial chapel on the campus of Washington and Lee university.

French Rail Mileage

Second in Europe Paris.-The system of French railroads covers 41,727 kilometers, and it

is the most important in Europe after that of Germany, which covers 53.550 kilometers. The English railway system, which follows these two, has only 31,550 kilometers and that of Italy 16,500.

In point of view of intensity of traffic, France has 1,470,000 kilometric tons; Belgium, 3,175,000; Germany. 2,063,000; England, 1,970,000, and

However, from the point of view financial receipts, gross receipts from the capital in France reach 28 per cent, while in Germany and in England they are only 20 per cent; in Switzerland, 14 per cent and in Italy. 12 per cent. Thus the net profits are higher in France than in other coun-

Other statistics show that it requires four and one-half months of work to pay the salaries of French railway personnel, two and one-half months to pay maintenance expenses. two months to pay state taxes, one month and one-half to pay interest to debenture and bondholders, one month to settle fuel bills, and fifteen days to pay depreciation debts. It only requires a few hours of work for the different companies to pay shareholders and directors.

Centennial of Turbine 1930; Inventor Ignored


Paris, France.-Next year, 1930, will be celebrated the centennial of the invention of the hydraulic turbine. Fourneyron, the marvelous French savant, is so much ignored in connec tion with the turbine that most of the best known encyclopedias have neglected to mention his name. Amer lcan engineers themselves only recognize that he had the merit to perfect and generalize the use of the turbine. This in itself seems worthy of recogaltion by the entire world.

It was another engineer, also a Frenchman, Marcel Desprez, who was the buffalo, the passenger pigeon and the first to realize the transport of the great auk. electrical energy, invention without which that of Fourneyron would be only of use in regions where waterfalls abound. Like most other inventors. Desprez died poor, unhonored and unsung.

Alcohol From Sugar Used in Brazil Motors

Rio de Janeiro,-"Azulina" is the name which has been given to a new motor fuel much used in the state of Pernambuco. Its producers are a group of sugar manufacturers who have visualized the economic possibilities offered by an alcoholic motor fuel and who have formed a corportion to exploit "azulina."

This is basicully a mixture of ether and an alcohol derived from case sugar, the residue of which are uspfor that's just the thing we have ally thrown away by the sugar mills in Pernambuce and other states.



HEN recent press dispatches carried the news that a New York woman, Mrs. Tillie Hart, who for four months had withstood the siege of a wrecking crew seeking to tear down her home to make way for a \$25,000,000 apartment house, had at last.

capitulated and allowed the house to be demolished, there was one good reason why the story was more than merely a local New York news item. For the disputed building has rightfully been called "the birthplace of Santa Claus" because in it more than a hundred years ago Dr. Clement C. Moore wrote a famous Christmas poem in which for the first time the American Santa Claus was described. his mode of traveling was pictured and the lavishness of his glying was made known. That poem was "The Night Before Christmas," which every American has recited or heard recited at some time or another. And for that reason the news that "the birthplace of Santa Claus" was to be wiped out

of existence had nation-wide interest. Quite aside from his fame as the author of "The Night Before Christmas," Doctor Moore was a notable His father, Bishop Benjamin Moore, the second Protestant Episcopal bishop of New York and the third president of Columbia university, assisted at the inauguration of Washington and administered the last rites to the dying Alexander Hamilton after the fatal duel with Aaron Burr. Clement C. Moore was graduated from Columbia university in 1798 and was a professor of Hebrew and Greek in the General Theological seminary from 1821 to 1850. He was a prolific writer, one of his literary productions bearing the imposing title of "Observations Upon Certain Passages in Mr. Jeffer-

son's Notes on the State of Virginia Which Appear to Have a Tendency to Subvert Religion and Establish a False Philosophy." However, his most Important work, the one at least upon which he believed his fame as a scholar would be secure, was "A Compendius Lexicon of the Hebrew Language." He little realized that future generations of Americans would remember him better as the author of what he was accustomed to call "a silly poem," the authorship of which he refused to acknowledge for a long

time before Christmas in 1822, Doctor Moore wrote for his children a Christmas poem and they were delighted with the rollocking tale, as other children, not only in this country but in many other lands, have been ever since. A daughter of Rev. Dr. David Butler, rector of St. Paul's church at Troy, N. Y., who was a piece of Doctor Moore, was a Christmas guest in the Moore home and made a copy of the poem in her album. The next year she sent a copy of it to the Troy Sentinel and it appeared in that paper, prefaced by a note from the editor saying he did not know who had sent it. By the next year it had appeared in many other newspapers and magazines and within a few years it had found its way into the schoolbooks. By this time inquirles were beginning to be made as to its authorship and eventually Doctor Moore. none too well pleased that his "silly poem" was so well-known whereas his scholarly "Compendius Lexicon" attracted little attention, except from other scholars, admitted its authorship and gave the autographed original manuscript of the poem to the New York Historical society.
