COUNTY OFFICIALS MOVING

This company had made arrangements to take up the county warrants. When shown the article in the Express of Saturday that the company had gone into the hands of a receiver, Judge Henshaw expressed the opinion that he guessed some other firm would take the warrants.

Actual work of tearing down and remodeling on the present courthouse building will commence about the 20th of February.

SPECIAL SERVICES AT PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Rev. T. R. Elder, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, Edna, Texas, arrived here Tuesday and Wednesday evening began a series of evangelistic services at the Presbyterian church. These services will be held each evening, except Saturday evening, from February 12 to 23 inclusive, with both morning and evening services on Sunday.

The series of services conducted by the Rev. Mr. Elder are being held under the auspices of the Synod's Committee on Evangelism, being one of similar meetings taking place simultaneously in different cities in Texas. The committee assigns speakers to the various churches taking part in these efforts, and the Rev. Elder was asked to fill the Sanderson engagement.

Rev. J. A. MacMillan, the local pastor, will direct the general activities of these services, assisted by committees from among the membership of the church appointed for special duties in connection with the meeting.

The services are conducted with a view to be of community interest and appeal. A cordial invitation is extended to each and all to attend.

COMMISSIONERS' COURT NEWS

The regular meeting of the county Commissioners' Court was held on Monday with all the commissioners in attendance. Much business was transacted at this meeting.

They allowed the regular bills and approved the regular quarterly reports of the various officers. Dr. P. F. Robertson was appointed county health officer. The following were appointed as election judges to serve for the next two years: In precinct 1, A. D. Brown, Earl Pierson, W. J. Ferguson and W. D. Hunter; precinct 2, W. R. House and Roy Barksdale; precinct 3, Albert Appel and J. C. Mitchell, while in precinct 4 Bustin Canon and R. E. Fred were appointed.

As it was the time of the year for the tax rate to be set or levied the commissioners set the rate at \$1.60 on the \$100 valuation as follows: County ad valorem, 25 cents; road and bridge (general) 15 cents; road and bridge (special), 15 cents; courthouse and jail, 15 cents; available road, 25 cents; common school district No. 1, 40 cents; school sinking fund, 25 cents.

Improved Uniform International Sunday School Lesson

(By REV. P. D. FITZWATER, D.D., Member of Faculty, Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.)

Lesson for February 16 JESUS HEALING AND HELPING

LESSON TEXT—Matthew 8:1-9:34. GOLDEN TEXT—Himself took our infirmities and bore our sicknesses. PRIMARY TOPIC—Jesus Healing and Helping. JUNIOR TOPIC—Jesus Healing and Helping.

1. Jesus Heals a Leper (8:1-4). 1. The dreadful disease (v. 2). Leprosy, the most loathsome and hopeless disease known, in the Jewish ritual, was regarded as a symbol of sin.

2. The leper's faith (v. 2). His cry was most pitiable, but his faith was strong. He fully believed that Jesus was able, but not certain that He was willing to heal him.

3. Jesus' power (v. 3). He put forth His hand and touched the leper, bidding the disease depart, and instantly the man was cleansed.

4. Jesus Heals the Centurion's Servant (8:5-13). 1. The disease (v. 6). The victim of paralysis is helpless and disqualified for service.

2. The centurion's humility (v. 8). He first sent the Jewish elders, and then his friends (Luke 7:3, 6), because he felt his unworthiness. The case of this servant was so grave that his master brushed aside his timidity and personally appealed to Jesus.

3. The centurion's faith (vv. 8, 9). He believed that if Jesus would but speak the word, his servant would be healed.

4. The wonderful power of Jesus (v. 13). He did not need even to see the helpless man, but only to speak the word and it was done.

5. Jesus Heals Peter's Mother-in-law (8:14, 15). She was sick of a fever. Jesus was invited into Peter's home to heal this woman. Upon entering the home He touched the hand of the patient and the fever left her, and she arose and ministered unto them.

6. Jesus Casts Out Demons (8:28-34). After stilling the tempest, Jesus crossed to the other side of the sea into heathen territory.

1. Met by two men possessed by demons (v. 28). These men were in a desperate condition (see Mark 5:1-17 and Luke 8:27). So fierce were they that no one could safely pass that way. They wore no raiment and no chains were strong enough to hold them.

2. What they knew about Christ (v. 29). They knew that He was the Son of God and that He had come to destroy the devil and his work.

3. Christ's power to deliver from the devil (vv. 30-32). The demons quailed before Him, not daring to dispute His power.

4. Jesus Heals a Woman With an Issue of Blood (9:20-22). 1. Her helpless condition (v. 20). She had been a great sufferer for twelve long years, not only from the disease, but at the hands of the physicians (Mark 5:26).

2. Her faith (v. 21). Her faith was so strong that she believed contact with the Master's garment would secure needed help.

3. Her confession (v. 21, cf. Luke 8:47). She thought secretly to get the blessing, but Jesus perceived that virtue had gone out from Him, and had her make a public confession.

4. Christ's words of encouragement (v. 22). He told her that it was her faith, not her touch that saved her.

5. Jesus Opening the Eyes of Two Blind Men (9:27-31). 1. Their persistence of faith (v. 28). These poor men had heard of the wonderful works of Jesus and desired to be healed.

2. The intelligence of faith (v. 27). They cried unto Him as the Son of David, which showed that they recognized Him as the promised Messiah. The prophet had foretold such to be the works of Messiah (Isa. 29:18; 35:5; 42:7).

3. The challenge of faith (v. 28). In reply to His challenge, they gave Him a definite answer.

4. The triumph of faith (vv. 29, 30). Their faith brought them into touch with the Lord of life who revealed His power by opening their eyes.

5. Heroes and Cowards Great occasions do not make heroes or cowards; they simply unveil them to the eyes of men. Silently and imperceptibly, as we wake or sleep, we grow and wax strong, we grow and wax weak, and at last some crisis shows us what we have become.—Canon Westcott.

BIG ROCKET POISED FOR SKYWARD TRIP

Inventor Hopes Eventually to Reach Moon.

Ayer, Mass.—The big brother of the sky rocket with which you used to celebrate Fourth of July is poised here for one of the most extraordinary flights in history.

Some time in the not far distant future, if all goes well, this 12-foot steel projectile will rise with incredible speed from a tower at Camp Devens on the outskirts of this quiet little town and nose its way skyward, seeking the secrets of altitudes never reached by a man-made device.

The rocket's noisy zoom into space will mark the latest step in a series of unusual experiments started twenty years ago by Dr. Robert H. Goddard, Clark university scientist.

Popular fancy has drawn a seemingly indelible halo of romance around Professor Goddard's rocket during the years that he has busied himself with his work in the rather prosaic atmosphere of a laboratory.

To Record Air Data. Even his insistent declarations that he has no lunar aspirations have failed to destroy the general belief that he hopes eventually to send his strange contraption to the moon.

Those who toy most fervently with this fascinating theory like to think that there will be a man inside the huge steel tube as it speeds over the 230,000 or more miles to its fanciful destination. No one appears to have given much thought to the rather knotty problem of how the man would get back to earth, once he had completed his journey.

But Professor Goddard protests that the paramount object of his experimentation at present is to obtain accurate data on meteorological conditions at various altitudes.

His big rocket is equipped with numerous devices for recording such information—devices which are intended to return to earth with the aid of a parachute attachment.

Test Rocket Noisy. Doctor Goddard has kept secret the exact method by which his projectile is propelled. It is understood, however, that the general idea is for a series of timed explosions to speed the rocket on its way, with a fresh blast expediting its flight as the power begins to wane.

At Auburn, near Worcester, several months ago, Doctor Goddard shot a rocket skyward. The scientist appeared well pleased with the outcome of the test flight but the attendant explosions alarmed residents of the countryside.

It was suggested by the fearful that recording devices carried by the rocket, in returning to earth, might smite a native. Doctor Goddard argued that the object which returned to the ground invariably landed only a short distance from the point from which the rocket had been loosed. Finally he compromised by transferring his experimental station to Camp Devens.

Company Plans to Get Lands for English Lads

Sydney, N. S. W.—A company is being formed to provide a scheme of land settlement for lads coming from England.

It will have the title, Little Brother Farm Settlement Ltd., and the prospectus has been issued. The company will acquire land within a reasonable distance of markets, suitable as a group settlement for intense culture, upon which Little Brothers who have been in the Commonwealth for not less than three years, and are in possession of a banking credit of not less than £200, may be settled under conditions to be determined by the board of management.

The scheme provides for the marketing of vegetables, poultry, pigs, etc. Land acquired by gift or purchase will be divided into suitable farmlets up to 10 acres. No dividends exceeding 6 per cent will be paid.

Seattle Stores Insects on Ice During Winter

Seattle, Wash.—Putting insects away on ice is a new use of the municipal cold storage plant here. To combat grasshoppers, caterpillars, crickets and moths, which annually cause heavy losses to farms and orchards in the Northwest, mantles, giant grasshoppers from Interior China, have been imported and are held dormant until spring, when they may be shipped and distributed in infested areas.

The mantis increases in size during its eating period of life until the normal growth of about four inches long is attained. Then it lays eggs and dies.

Police to Use Dictaphone to Block Cruelty Plea

Budapest.—In order to forestall claims of ill treatment by prisoners who, on being brought to trial after confessing their crimes to the police claim that confessions were extorted from them, the examination rooms of a number of Hungarian jails are to be equipped with dictaphones.

Flowers Used as Food in Oriental Countries

Flowers for food are virtually unknown in America, but in several parts of this wide world they play an important part as table delicacies. The Chinese, Japanese, Egyptians and various people of India eat blossoms prepared in several ways, says the Farm Journal.

In China, lilies are served as vegetables, boiled with pepper and salt, either in milk or water. Banana blossoms, dipped in vinegar are almost a staple of diet during their season.

In northern India a cake is made from the aromatic flowers of a local shrub. They are mixed with butter and a coarse sugar before baking. Many other such recipes, startling to the foreigner, are to be found in northern Africa and that vast stretch of the world lying between the Mediterranean and the Pacific.

Brushing Ship Hulls

An Australian company has introduced in England an ingenious method of cleaning the outside of the hull of a ship. The invention has been in successful operation for a number of years in Australia, and has been tried at Southampton and Plymouth.

The apparatus is mounted upon a suitable frame, which can be suspended from the side of a boat. It consists of a cylindrical brush about 5 or 6 feet in length, held in a framework which also supports an electric motor and a propeller. The purpose of the propeller is to keep the brush pressed against the side of the ship. The case carrying the apparatus contains also a four-cylinder motor directly coupled to a dynamo. The current produced serves to raise and lower the carrying frame as well as to drive the propeller and brush.

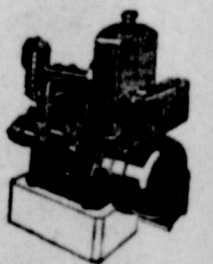
BERKELEY FENCE BILL INTRODUCED
