Mr. N. R. Crozier, superintendent of schools, Dallas, was unanimously elected president of the Department of Superintendence of the National Educational Association at the Atlantic City convention, February 22-25. He succeeded Mr. Frank Cody of Michigan. This is the first time that a Texas man has held the position. In fact, it is the first time that a southern man has held this position. It is evident that Texas has learned how "to put her foot forward" in educational circles. Mr. Crozier as chief executive of the Department of Superintendence will probably bring more recognition to Texas than any one group. Texas educators has been able to achieve in the past several decades. No doubt he will cause some of our eastern contemporaries who have been making in the glamour of their educational reputations to take notice.

When southern industry comes to the front to tower in the limelight as does southern education. Then the south will really realize its independence.

If there is any phase of national life in which this master thinker, Hoover, is not interested, the American press has discovered it. COMMISSIONERS COURT NEWS

The regular monthly meeting of the commissioners court was held on Monday of this week with all the commissioners being present.

At this meeting they accepted the resignation of W. J. Banner as sheriff and tax collector and Lee Cook was appointed to fill out the un-expired term. Mr. Banner's resignation will take effect just as soon as he makes his annual report and has it approved which will be about the 15th of April.

The regular bills were allowed and paid at this time. The Commissioners also ordered that a 3 foot fresno be purchased.

They passed an order authorizing the erection of a public dipping vat for livestock and this will be located on the railroad property near the stock pens, the county having been able to secure an easement on this property. This vat will be constructed in the near future and will conform to the specifications and blue prints as approved by the State Livestock Sanitary Board of Texas.

The erection of this vat is going to mean much for Sanderson and Terrell County. In fact soon it will be the headquarters for the finest of stock that will be shipped in here for sale to the surrounding territory. It will help all local ranchman for they will be able to now dip their livestock and not go to the expense of having to erect private vats.

French Nation Shown as Great Landowner

The greatest landowner in France is the French state. It possesses palaces, castles, mansions, buildings of all kinds, and forests—besides roads, ports, railways. A record of all its properties, just drawn up, reveals a total value of \$3,800,000,000. The castle and park of Versailles are estimated at \$240,000,000. Fontainebleau is much cheaper, \$4,280,000, and its wonderful forest is worth only \$2,000,000. Also, the lovely castle of Azay-le-Rideau, in Touraine, is entered in the inventory for the ridiculous sum of \$20,000. To make up for that, the Louvre, in Paris, with its immense, palace and the Tuilleries garden, comes up to the sum of \$200,000,000.

But the French administration refused to assign any monetary value to certain monuments, such as Notre Dame de Paris and the Arc de Triomphe, which symbolize a glorious past, or to the war cemeteries in foreign countries, under the French flag, where lie the children of France who sacrificed their lives for justice and liberty.—Washington Star.



To Link Europe and Asia

Spain wishes to be permanently joined with the land of her traditional enemies, the Moors, by the longest tunnel in the world—20 miles from end to end and 1,500 feet below water surface at the midpoint. Spanish engineers have discussed in their societies this proposed bond between Europe and Africa, and a preliminary shaft has already been sunk. Although the straits are only eight miles wide at their narrowest point, it is impossible to build a tunnel there because of the great depth of the channel and the presence of rock too hard to bore. Further explorations of the consistency of the rock are to be made from the shaft by means of sound waves.

Lesson for March 16

THE PARABLES OF THE KINGDOM

LESSON TEXT—Matthew 13:24-32.
GOLDEN TEXT—The kingdom of God is not meat and drink, but righteousness and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost.
PRIMARY TOPIC—The Whole World for Jesus.
JUNIOR TOPIC—The World for Christ.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—What Our Religion Means to Us.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—What Christianity Means to the World.

The things set forth in these parables only apply to the church in the measure that they permeate that body by virtue of its being formed within this period. It should be observed that they set forth the "mysteries" of the kingdom.

I. The Wheat and Tares (vv. 24-30, cf. 36-43).

1. The sowers. The sower of the good seed is the Son of Man (v. 37), and the sower of the tares is the devil (v. 39).

2. The growing crops (v. 26). There is a striking resemblance in the growing crops. The chief peril of the devil is that he transforms himself into an angel of light (II Cor. 11:14, 15).

3. The harvest (v. 30). There comes a time when the fruit of the crop shall be gathered. The separation is made by the angels under the direction of the Son of Man. For the tares there is a furnace of fire. For the wheat there is the Lord's garner.

11. The Mustard Seed (vv. 31, 32). 1. Its unimportant beginning (v. 1). It begins as the least of all seeds. Not only was Christ, the King, of humble parentage, but His disciples were unlettered fishermen. Likewise, through the centuries, not many wise and not many noble have been called.

2. Its vigorous growth (v. 32). Though small in its inception, the work inaugurated by Christ has become mighty in power.

3. Its lodging capacity (v. 32). The birds which find lodgment in the tree do not represent the children of men who find safety and salvation in the church, but the predatory beings who have found shelter in the church, though they are no part of it.

III. The Leavened Meal (v. 33).

1. The meal in Scripture means something nutritious and wholesome. It was used in one of the sweetest offerings which typified Christ (Lev. 2:1-3 R. V.).

2. The woman. The woman is the administrator of the home. Her responsibility is to take the bread provided by the head of the home and prepare and distribute it to the children. It means then that the woman, the administrator, has introduced false doctrine and thus corrupted the children's bread.

3. The leaven. In Scripture, leaven is invariably a type of evil (Ex. 12:15; Matt. 16:6, 12; I Cor. 5:6-8; Gal. 5:8, 9). It means that in this age the truth of God would be corrupted by worldliness and unbelief.

IV. The Hid Treasure (v. 44).

1. The field (v. 38). Christ's own interpretation makes this the world.

2. The treasure. The treasure means Israel (Pss. 135:4, Deut. 7:6-8).

3. The purchaser. No one but the Son of God had sufficient resources to buy the world (John 3:16).

4. The purchase price. This was the precious blood of Jesus Christ, God's beloved Son (I Pet. 1:13, 19).

V. The Merchantman Seeking Pearls (vv. 45, 46).

1. The merchantman is Christ. The Son of Man has come to seek and save that which was lost (Luke 19:10).

2. The purchase price. Christ impoverished Himself (Phil. 2:6-8) to purchase the one pearl of great price (Eph. 5:25).

3. The pearl of great price. This is the church (Col. 1:18).

VI. The Dragnet (vv. 47-50).

1. The sea. The sea in Scripture denotes peoples or multitudes (Dan. 7:3; Rev. 17:15).

2. The dragnet. The dragnet cast into the sea means the sowing of the seed by the Son of Man.

3. The dragnet drawn to the shore when full means that when God's purpose for the present age is full, account will be taken of the results.

4. The separation made by the angels. This will take place at the end of the age.

5. The destiny of the bad fish. The angels shall sever the wicked from among the just, and shall cast them into the furnace of fire where there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth.

SAMOANS USE NOVEL WAY TO ROPE SHARKS

Natives Lead Fish to Boat, Then Lasso It.

Pago Pago, Samoan Islands.—Perhaps in no other place in the world is shark fishing the sport it is some few miles out from Pago Pago.

No harpooning, spearing or trolling here. The old Samoans would refuse to take you to the shark fishing grounds if you dropped a hook. They have their own method. In a large outrigger canoe the good-natured Samoans set out from Pago Pago bay in the afternoon. On the way they offer solemn prayer that many sharks will appear and that their catch will be heavy. It is a religious rite with them.

A tin of salmon is emptied in the water—juice and all—as the first morsel to lure sharks. A stout stick is run through a hole in a half coconut shell and made fast. As a native thumps it up and down in the water a heavy, chugging sound is made which aids in attracting fish.

Native Offer Prayers.

A 75-foot line about the thickness of a man's thumb is put out. It has a piece of wood attached near the end and a good-sized chunk of decayed meat is fastened on for bait. The piece of wood keeps the bait very close to the surface of the water. The other end of the line is made fast to the boat.

If sharks fail to appear the natives offer further prayers. Excited cries of "afe afe" break the quiet of the tropical waters as a school is sighted. It is the native word for "come on" or "welcome." Soon a shark heads for the bait, but the native at the line draws it in just rapidly enough so that the meat is kept a bit ahead of the fish. A shovel-nosed shark cannot snatch it in one gulp without turning over on its back, hence it is quite a simple thing for the man at the line to lead the shark to the boat.

The fun begins when the shark approaches the boat. Seated beside the native at the line are two others; one with a heavy, hempen noose and the other with a stout 5-foot pole. The line is pulled in rapidly and the bait raised out of water just before the shark reaches the boat. As the shark snatches at it a native slips the noose over the shark's nose and head and draws it taut back of the dorsal fin. The fish virtually has been lassoed.

Quite a Battle.

A 9 to 12-foot shark can do considerable kicking and fighting—almost sufficient to swamp or upset the boat. The native with the stout pole places it against the shark's mouth and as the fish opens its jaws the pole is rammed down its throat. The enraged shark puts up a tremendous battle but it quieted somewhat when its head is split open with a hatchet. A heavy club also is brought into play and later the shark is split open just above the tail and gradually bleeds to death. Sometimes they have been known to fight for several hours.

The natives find certain parts of the shark quite tasty and the return of a successful hunt often is the incentive for a feast among the Samoans.

Many of the young Samoans know nothing of this exciting sport, but the old men are past masters at it. Judge James Wilkes Foxall of West Chester, Pa., who is attached to the American naval base in charge of legal matters at Pago Pago, is one of the few white men who ever accompanied the natives on a hunt. He characterizes it as the "most exciting of sports."

Do You Want Boy or Girl? Try Algebra

Berkeley, Calif.—The sex of children no longer may be a matter of guesswork before birth, according to Dr. Herbert M. Evans, chairman of the department of anatomy at the University of California.

In a paper made public, Doctor Evans, famous as the discoverer of vitamins E and F, contended that the long hidden secret of sex determination had been discovered.

"If an X mates with a Y, the offspring will be a boy," Doctor Evans declared. The problem now, he added, is to ascertain whether you are dominated by the factor X or Y.

Sex of a baby, Doctor Evans said, is determined during the period of fertilization and the presence of one of two microscopic chromosomes is the determining factor.

Designating one as X and the other as Y, Doctor Evans explains that within a group of 48 chromosomes of a germ cell, a pair of minute germs will control the sex of the child.

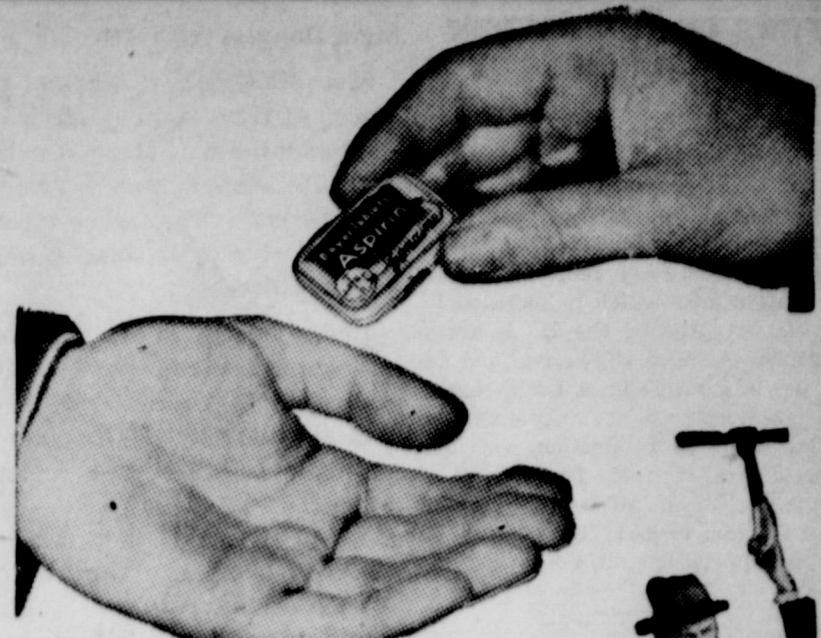
Thus the algebraic formula for sex determination is: XY equal male; XX equal female.

Whether the factors of X or Y are more dominant in some persons than in others is not revealed in the report, but it is presumed research is being carried out to determine the pre-terminance of X or Y and learn a method of selection.

Doctor Evans points out there are 48 chromosomes in both men and women. In the female there two X chromosomes and in the male there is one X and one Y.

NEWS OF THE DRYDEN AIRDROME

The Dryden airdrome is maintained by the U. S. Army and has five men on duty at all hours. They take care of the visiting aircraft that comes this way. There is a radio broadcasting station here which is operated by the signal corps of the U. S. army. Weather messages and arrival and departure of aircraft is sent and received. Two men are on duty with the signal corps in connection with the meteorological station. The purpose of this is to give out all weather information in order to keep flyers posted as to atmospheric conditions.

It has been heard that private Fredrick Geisler who was taken to the base hospital at Fort Sam Houston several months ago will return to this station within a few days. Private Donnal O'Conner who relieved private Geisler will return to Kelly Field upon the arrival of private Geisler.

Private Henry Mooney of this station spent a few days last week visiting friends at Fort Clark.

Lieut. Eppright, pilot, with three mechanics in a bombing plane arrived at this station from Kelly Field to get an engine and return same to Kelly Field. The return trip to Kelly Field was made in 2 hours and 5 minutes. Under normal conditions it requires about three hours.

Lieut. Larson and Captain Jervey from Kelly Field stopped at this station and re-fueled. Lieut. Larson and Captain Jervey left Kelly Field and flew direct to Fort Stockton and made a few pictures from the air and then departed for this station. After being re-fueled they departed for Kelly Field. The return trip for them was made in one hour and 35 minutes. They were fly-

ing a Douglas Aircraft.

Messers Garther, Farless and Ruso of Houston, each flying a Curtiss Robbin Cotton Dusting Aircraft, stopped and re-fueled at this station. They were enroute to California to do some dusting over fruit trees.

Lieut. Percy, pilot, with mechanic, and Lieut. Baxter, pilot, with Lieut. Daley and Sergt. Waugh, pilot, with Chaplain Olson, each pilot flying a Douglas Aircraft from Brooks Field stopped at this station and re-fueled. They later departed for Fort Bliss and returned the following day.

Lieut. Foster, pilot, and Sgt. Richerson as passenger made a early morning visit to this station. Lieut. Foster left San Antonio at 6:30 and arrived at this station two hours and ten minutes later and after being re-fueled departed for Marfa.

Lieut. Hicks, pilot, and Sgt. Bishop, flying a Curtiss O-11 Aircraft from Fort Sam Houston stopped and re-fueled at this station. They later departed for Johnson's ranch to remain several days. While there they will take pictures from the air.

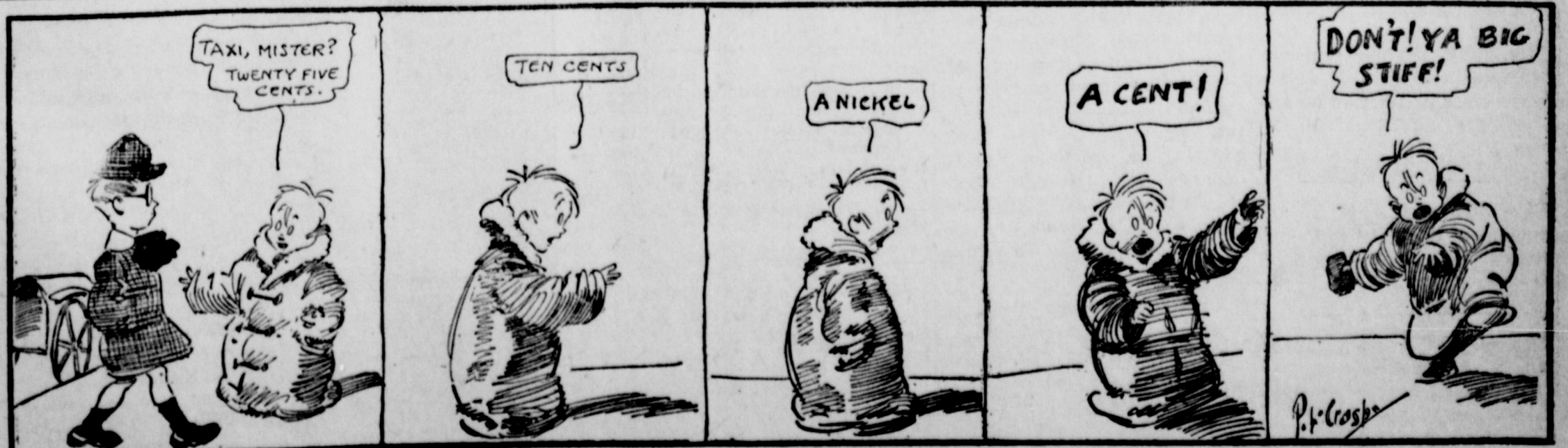
