Santa Fe Bridge Over Rio Grande Razed By Flames

PRESIDIO, Jan. 25 - American and Mexican authorities are investigating the fire which early Sunday virtually destroyed the Santa Fe Railroad's international bridge over the Rio Grande here. Officials on both sides of the river

expressed the belief the fire was

Twelve bents of the bridge on the Mexican side and 20 on the American were burned. The eight untouched were near the center of the structure.

The span was built in 1930 at a cost of approximately \$250,000. It closed the gap between the Santa Fe lines in Mexico and Texas. Decision in the injunction suit to test the state's cotton acreage law is expected this week. Many have expressed the opinion that the law will be invalidated. But whatever happens to it, it is quite possible that the farmers will follow their usual custom of planting whatever they think best. With about 26,-0000,000 bales of cotton on hand now, it is reasonable to believe that farmers are planning to raise feed and food, to give more attention to milk cows, hogs and poultry. And it's not going to be necessary to pass a law to make them do it.

Failure of the Texas legislature to reapportion the congressional districts so as to create three new districts allowed by the 1930 census leaves to Texas voters the job of filling the three posts of congressman-at-large. About 50 candidates have signified their intention of making the race. The contest is expected to develop into a real free-for-all race. 




