## BESSIE SHARP REMOVED TO S. A. HOSPITAL

### Doctors Testify That Her Life Is Threatened By Disease

(Special Correspondence)  
DEL RIO, March 21. — Bessie Sharp slated to go on trial here in the April term of 63rd District court for the poisoning of her husband a year ago, was removed to State Hospital at San Antonio yesterday afternoon on a writ of habeas corpus granted by Judge Joseph Jones.

The order for removal to San Antonio came after the filing of findings by Dr. J. R. Middlebrook and Dr. H. B. Ross, county health officers, that she was "afflicted bodily and mentally with a disease that threatened her life."

Members of the sheriff's department were ordered to turn her over to officials of the State Hospital at San Antonio, where she will be held until time for her trial in the April term of District Court here. Mrs. Sharp has been in county jail here since the last term of District Court in Sanderson, Terrell County, when a venue change was granted on defense motion. A previous hearing in Sanderson had been continued upon defense motion.

### Insanity Trial Sought

Granting of the habeas corpus writ here Sunday is expected to pave the way for defense attorneys filing their third petition for an insanity hearing to supplant the murder trial. Two previous motions for insanity hearings were overruled by Judge Jones.

Telefus Sharp, Big Canyon ranch hand in Terrell County died of strychnine poisoning. At the time of her arrest, Mrs. Sharp is alleged to have confessed administering the poison so that she might be free to wed Willie Burleson, another Big Canyon ranch hand.

Removal of Mrs. Sharp to the State Hospital Sunday marked the woman's second visit to that institution at the hospital shortly after her arrest on a charge of murder, following an operation. Returned to Sanderson from the hospital, the woman staged a brief hunger strike when denied bond.

## EXTERMINATE GOAT LICE

Lice were satisfactorily exterminated on 2200 head of goats in a demonstration covering seven Meador county ranches last year by use of a sulphur dip as worked out by the Sonora Experiment Sub-Station, according to Frank N. Newson, county agent. Two dippings ten days apart were made in cattle dipping vats slightly changed so that the goats could be thrown in from the side of the vat and held in the solution one-half minute. It was necessary to get every goat rounded up to insure good results. The method is based on the fact that the lice do not live on the ground.

## NEW TRANSPARENT WRAPPING MATERIAL MADE BY COTTON

Of interest in Texas and every other cotton producing State is the announcement that after a year and half of experimentation, cotton is being successfully used in the manufacture of a transparent wrapping material that will compete with cellophane, manufactured by a secret process from wood pulp.

Cotton cellulose acetate is the basic process in the new material, by which a brilliant clarity, folds easily around corners and withstands the action of water without softening or distortion. Another advantage claimed is that it does not become brittle in extreme cold nor discolor under high temperatures.

## DIES IN FIRE

Soon after a west bound freight train, in charge of Conductor C. L. Sims, left the local yards of the T. & N. O. here Tuesday afternoon, a bundle was seen thrown from a box car and about the same time a negro left the train. Special Agent Enley, who was on the freight got off and investigated. The bundle was found to be a leather coat inside of which was four pair of men's black oxfords. W. L. Barler, Custom Officer, placed the negro under arrest and lodged him in the county jail. He denied owning the package or knowing anything about it. He told officers that it was thrown from the car ahead of the one he was in and that he left the train as he did not want to get into trouble.

Further questioning by officers on Wednesday and Thursday did not bring out any definite clues. Local officers as well as Mr. Enley are endeavoring to find out where the shoes and coat were stolen from but so far have not been successful.

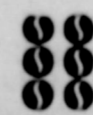

Supper: milk toast, milk to drink, apple sauce.

Breakfast: Steamed apricots, and cream of wheat with top milk, toast, milk to drink.

Dinner: Sunshine mountain, baked potato, lettuce sandwich, apricot gelatin, animal cookies, milk to drink.

Mid afternoon lunch: Milk to drink, graham cracker.

Supper: Steamed (and warm)

mashed potatoes, corn flakes, milk to drink.

## RECIPES

Orange Fluff: 2 eggs, 2-3 c sugar, honey or brown sugar, 1 t grated orange rind, 1 c orange juice, 2-3 c cooked rice or wheatena, 1-2 c seeded raisins or chopped dates. Method: Beat egg whites stiff with 1-3 c of the sugar. Beat egg yolks and add all other ingredients, folding in egg whites last. Bake in a moderate oven for 30 minutes. The top should be a golden brown. Serve with cream or milk.

Sunshine Mountain: Pile the serving spinach in a mound on the plate and sprinkle grated egg yolk over the top.

Potato Soup: 1 qt milk, 4 t butter, 1 t salt, 2 medium sized potatoes, 2 t finely chopped onion. Method: Cook the potatoes and onion in just enough water to tender them. Mash to a pulp. Scald the milk, add butter and salt. Add the potato pulp to the scalded milk and serve at once with a sprinkle of minced parsley on top.

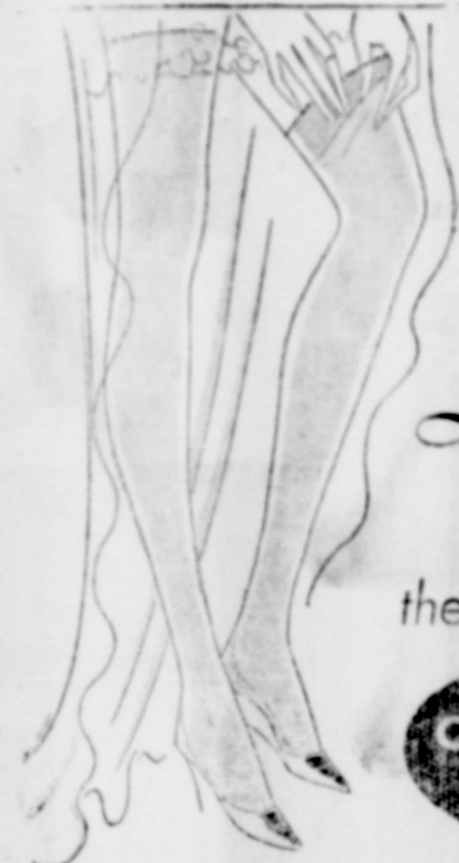

influence national legislation and is seeking to abolish the R. O. T. C., the C. M. T. C., and to cripple the National Guard by preventing the finances necessary to conduct drill periods and encampments.

"The 25,000 patriotic speakers," Mr. Cook asserted, "are to be mobilized as the Legion's counter movement to overcome the army of professional pacifist speakers who are taking every opportunity, and making inroads, to address schools and colleges in their campaign to weaken America's national character."

#### Alpine Man In Race For Representative

E. E. Townsend of Alpine, former Texas ranger, U. S. customs officer and for six years sheriff of Brewster county, announced this week that he will make the race for representative in the state legislature from the 87th district, composed of Brewster, Terrell, Val Verde, Kinney, and Maverick counties.

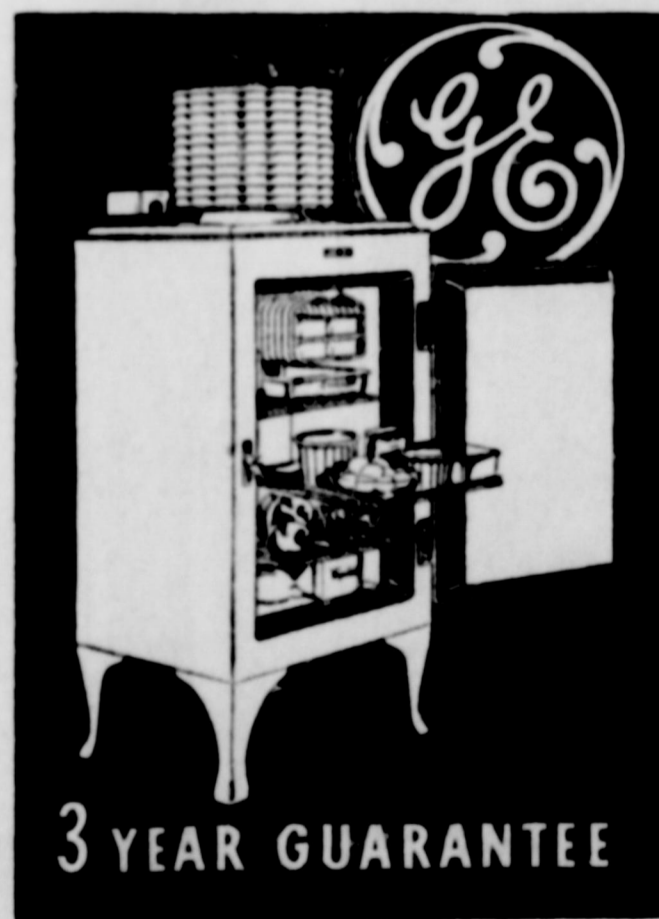
