GEOLOGISTS TO MAKE TRIP IN **BIG BEND AREA**

Includes Students From U. of T. And College Of Mines

AUSTIN, Texas, May 12. More n fifty geologists will make a eld trip under the auspices of the est Texas Geological Society into e Big Bend region, starting from darfa, May 14. Dr. E. H. Sellards, rector of the Bureau of Economic leology of The University of Texwho is familiar with the remote egion that is to be visited will seras chief guide and the assistant will be J. F. Hosterman, district cologist for the Amerada Petrolum Corporation. Besides active members of the profession who will make the trip, several geology students of The University of Texas and the Texas College of Mines at El Paso, and professors of these institutions will take part in the expedition. The camp of the expedition will be located at Mc-Guirk's Tank, situated on the circular Solitario Mountain dome, 70 niles south of Marfa and witin a lew miles of the Rio Grande. There are parts of the Big Bend region which have been but little explored and it expected that much geological information of interest and ossible value may be obtained. The trict is situated in the extreme lower part of the Big Bend, and recently there has been unusual activity in prospecting for cinnabar ore in that region. It is from this ore that quicksilver is obtained. The entire region possesses special interest to geologists. The expedition Ranger Captain Townsend will be accompained by a typical chuck-wagon which will carry the food supplies and provide the meals.

The benediction was pronounced by Rev. Griffith.



This includes three wellbalanced meals which are sufficiently rearishing to satisfy the appetite without eating between meals. All food which could be bought in bulk was purchased in this manner and each day's portion carefully weighed and estimated.

Each meal was serded in the most attractive style in the manner of a three or four course meal. Common foods were made more appealing in this manner. A typical day's menu included:

Is the milk he drinks a breeding place for germs?

It is unless kept in a temperature of 50 degrees or lower. In temperatures above 50 degrees, tiny germs, called bacteria, which are present in small numbers in all milk, multiply with amazing rapidity. Hundreds of microscopic germs become thousands, then millions, within the space of a few hours.

If you use electric refrigeration, ADJUST THE TEMPERATURE CONTROL FOR MIDSUMMER OPERATION.
