San Angelo Gets Livestock Loan Bank; Branch Is To Have It's Own Organization

SAN ANGELO, Aug. 20.—This city today was awarded an independent agricultural credit corporation specializing in livestock loans, according to dispatches from Washington. A San Angelo man will be president of the unit here, the manager will be a local man and a group of West Texans will compose its board of directors.

Immediate formation of eight regional credit corporations to inaugurate a program of feeder livestock loans was announced yesterday by the Reconstruction Corporation, Associated Press dispatches from the nation's capital said.

Fort Worth was awarded the main office with branches of equal standing provided for San Angelo and Houston. For all purposes the San Angelo unit will work directly under Washington with all of the officers and directors San Angelioms and West Texans.

Realizing that livestock loans should be made in the livestock country a Board of City Development committee organized here recently and secured endorsement of San Angelo for a livestock bank from many important persons and from a number of cities and organizations.

A committee composed of Duwain Hughes, member of the advisory board of the Dallas unit of the R. F. C., J. Culbertson Deal, manager of the San Angelo Board of City Development and Houston Harthe, has been in Washington a week presenting San Angelo's claim for the livestock branch here. Their success was announced yesterday.

Congressman R. E. Thomason of the 16th district rendered valuable assistance in the battle for San Angelo, and Bob Jackson, Thomason's secretary, stayed with the San Angelo committee the entire week of negotiations. Delegations from every large city in the state were in Washington on the matter of location of these important credit corporations.

Summer Class At University To Finish Monday

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 25.—Approximately 400 graduates will participate in commencement exercises to be held by The University of Texas Monday evening, August 29, in Gregory Gymnasium, according to announcement of Registrar E. J. Mathews. No formal commencement address will be made in accordance with a precedent set a number of years ago by President H. Y. Benedict upon his accession to office. Because of the extremely large number of candidates of degrees, aggregating between 600 and 700 in June and 350 and 400 in August, several hours are required at each commencement for them to cross the platform and receive their certificates of graduation. In view of this fact, it has been deemed advisable to dispense with a lengthy commencement address, the president instead delivering a few words of commendation and advice to the graduates prior to conferring on them their respective degrees. No exception will be taken to this rule this summer.

The baccalaureate services will be held on Sunday evening, August 28, with Dr. Frank L. Jewett of the Texas Bible Chair preaching the sermon.

BIG HILL DUDE RANCH TO HAVE RODEO; RACES

Two Day Rodeo-Race Meet To Be Held 7-8th Of September

W. A. (Tex) Alexander) Banner who is manager of the Big Hill Dude Ranch located on the Fort Stockton Highway 7 miles northwest of this city has announced Wednesday and Thursday, September 7 and 8 as the days for the Annual Fall Roundup and Rodeo and Race Meet to be held at the Highland Park.

Two full days of rodeo and race events has been mapped out by Mr. Banner and on the first day a barbecue will be held at noon. The racing events will be held each morning at 10 a. m. and horses from San Antonio, Honda, Castorville, San Angelo, Ozona, Ft. Stockton and Marfa will compete in the races. Also there will be horses from the Diamond C and Big Hill Stables. There will be a 300 yd. Roping Horse race, 1-8 mile colt race under 2 yr. olds; 1-4 mile free for all race, and 3-8 mile free for all race.

Each afternoon a full program of rodeo events, steer team tying contest, bronc riding, bull dogging, steer riding, wild cow milking, calf roping, novelty race, goat roping, exhibition riding and calf belling contest will be held with many of the best performers in the country taking part in these events.

Purses for both the horse racing and rodeo events will be one hundred per cent entrance fee with the entrance fee in all events to be \$5.00 with the exception of the goat roping which will be \$3.00.

Each night X Brooks and his orchestra from San Angelo will furnish music for dancing which will be at the C. A. C. Hall in this city.

On July 31, a small rodeo and race was held at this ranch and it was the best yet. A large crowd is expected to attend as the Big Hill Dude Ranch has already become well known despite the fact it has not been in existence very long.

Spud In Monday On Test Well Near Dryden

The test well which is being put down on the McPhee lease on the Kerr ranch south of Dryden by Marion Briggs and associates was spudded in on Monday of this week and by Wednesday the crew had reached a depth of 10 feet or more. The rig was completed on last Saturday and final details were completed that day so that spudding in was the first thing Monday.

The test well will be No. 1 Kerr 330 feet from the south and west lines of section 15, block D5, M. K. T. Ry Co. survey.

The well is located 9 1-2 miles west and two miles north of the well that was drilled several years ago by the Southwest Oil Company and known as Folsom No. 1. It is 16 1-2 miles east and four miles south of the William's well No. 1 Sowden which was abandoned at a depth of 3,128 feet.

There is only one active test in Terrell County at the present and that is the Bates-Felps test, H. H. Sides' No. 1, about seven miles south-east of Sheffield.

Very much favorable reports by well known geologist have been given on this test well location that has been started and Marion Briggs who is putting down the test is a successful oil man and much interest is now prevailing in this county as to the possibility of oil being found.

FLYING BOUDOIR BROUGHT DOWN AFTER 196 HOUR

Mrs. Thaden Collapses In Landing; Mrs. Marsalis In Good Shape

VALLEY STREAM, N. Y., Aug. 22.—Appearing trim and fresh as when they took the air, even to manicured fingernails, two 24-year-old housewives brought down their "flying boudoir" late today with a new women's refueling flight endurance record of 196 hours, five minutes and four-fifths seconds.

Appearances were deceiving, however, for Mrs. Louise Thaden, ominously silent while her companion, Mrs. Frances Marsalis, laughed and joked with the crowd, suddenly collapsed. She was removed to a nearby home and her condition later was reported as not serious.

After more than eight days of monotonous wheeling over the Curtiss Airport, they made a perfect landing a few minutes after 5 p. m. Their flying time was checked by four watches and was expected to be accepted as an official record in about one week.

Too Much Oatmeal. "We enjoyed every minute of it, but we got too much oatmeal. Believe me, Stewart and Johnnie were sure a big help," said Mrs. Marsalis. Stewart Reese and John Runger were the crew of their refueling plane.

Large bouquets of flowers were presented to them and Mrs. Marsalis obliged the cameramen.

About this time attendants became aware Mrs. Thaden had not uttered a word. She was unable to walk and had to be carried to a

MEXICAN SLAYS WIFE AND THEN TAKES OWN LIFE

Parents Had Engaged In Argument Son States

Felipe Zirgen, 36, shot and killed his wife then committed suicide Saturday evening about 9 o'clock as the couple with their six children were en route to Sonora from the Thompson ranch, 12 miles north of the city.

Zirgen and his wife, Elvirza, were quarreling, according to the oldest son, who said when he remonstrated with his father that Zirgen pulled a gun from his holster and shot the woman twice in the head and once in the arm. He then ordered the children to get out of the car and start walking toward Sonora, after which he shot himself, according to the boy's testimony offered in the inquest conducted by Sheriff O. E. Conner of Eldorado.

Zirgen and his wife were buried in the same grave Sunday afternoon at Sonora.

Zirgen was said to be one of the youngest shearing captains in Texas and well known over the State.—Del Rio Evening News.

BUSINESS IS STILL ON UPWARD TREND

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 25.—Several favorable trends were noticed in financial circles during July, according to Dr. J. C. Dolley, financial editor of the Texas Business Review, published by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

"The most important financial developments of the past month have been the continuation of the marked rise in bond prices, a sharp recovery in stock prices which has carried over into the first two weeks of August, a material improvement in certain commodity prices—notably, cotton, sugar, livestock and silver—and a probable improvement in business psychology," Dr. Dolley said.

BIG SPRING, Texas, Aug. 22. (AP)—The West Texas Press Association in convention Saturday denounced illegal voting and resolved to assist in preventing such irregularity in Texas elections hereafter.

"Inasmuch as illegal voting in the first Democratic primary this year the association calls on its member newspapers to denounce this practice and assist the citizens in preventing its repetition," a resolution adopted on the issue said.

The association decided to give "hearty and continuing to closer attention to the movement looking to closer attention to public expenditures, with the ultimate aim of reducing the tax burden." The West Texas Chamber of Commerce was commended for its initiative in "this vitally important undertaking."

It was agreed that the best interests of West Texas would be served by merging the West Texas Heart O'Texas and Panhandle Plains associations.

The association declared in favor of redistricting the State in order that West Texas "may secure the representation it is entitled to in the legislative and Congress by growth in population since the last redistricting.

"All other factors being equal, our member newspapers will not support candidates for State or National offices where the records show they have opposed our redistricting program in the past," a resolution on this subject said.

Regarding the economic situation the association came to the conclusion that "the major cause of our trouble has been reckless and stupid injection of government into private business to such an extent, that in many industries and instances private business has almost been destroyed by paternalistic competition, which is contrary to our fundamental American ideal that the people should support the government, instead of the government supporting the people."

It was resolved that the association go on record as favoring a return to the ancient doctrine that the Nation be governed least is governed best, and that the government should be made responsive and amenable to the public will.

San Angelo was selected as the 1933 convention city. Plans were made for a joint session with the Heart O'Texas Press association next year.

Ralph Shuffler, publisher of the Odessa News-Times, was elected president of the association. Max Bentley, managing editor of the Abilene Reporter and News, was elected vice president. Miss Trena Miller of Rotan was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

Wendell Bedichek, managing editor, was appointed chairman of the board of directors. Charles A. Guy editor and publisher of the Lubbock Avalanche and Journal, the retiring president, automatically became a member of the board for a one-year term. Other directors were holdovers serving two and three years terms.

THE SANDERSON STATE BANK

H. J. R. No. 26. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 3a, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 3a. When an election is held by any county, or any number of counties, or any political sub-division of the State, or any political sub-division of a county, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State and which may or may not include towns, villages or municipal corporations, or any city, town or village, for the purpose of issuing bonds or otherwise lending credit, or expanding money or assuming any debt, only qualified electors who own taxable property in the State, county, political sub-division, district, city, town or village where such election is held, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

H. J. R. No. 6. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 1-a be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to read as follows: Article VIII—Section 1-a: Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for State purposes; nothing herein shall apply within those counties or other political subdivisions now receiving an exemption of State taxes, but upon the expiration of such period of remission this Section shall become applicable within such counties and political subdivisions.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

H. J. R. No. 21. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 14 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 14. There shall be elected by the qualified electors of each county at the same time and under the same law regulating the election of State and County officers, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes, who shall hold his office, for two (2) years and until his successor is elected and qualified; and such Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall perform all the duties with respect to assessing property for the purpose of taxation and of collecting taxes as may be prescribed by the Legislature."

Sec. 2. That Section 16, of Article 8, of the Constitution of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 16. The sheriff of each county in addition to his other duties shall be the Assessor and Collector of Taxes therefor; but, in counties having ten thousand (10,000) or more inhabitants, to be determined by the last preceding census of the United States, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall be elected to hold office for two (2) years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

S. J. R. No. 28. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article 16, be amended by adding thereto another Section, Section 60, which shall read as follows:

"Section 60. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to authorize a Texas Centennial, commemorating the heroic period of early Texas history, and celebrating a century of our independence and progress, to be held at such times, places and in such manner as may be designated by the Legislature of Texas."

That the Legislature of Texas be authorized to make appropriation for the support and maintenance thereof; provided, that this authorization shall not be construed to make appropriations for any other future exposition or celebration of any kind or character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1932.

S. J. R. No. 26. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 11, of Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended by a vote of the people by virtue of Senate Joint Resolution No. 7, passed at the Regular Session of the 42nd Legislature, be, and the same is hereby amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 11. In order to enable the Legislature to perform the duties set forth in the foregoing Section, it is hereby declared that all lands and other property heretofore set apart and appropriated for the establishment and maintenance of the University of Texas, together with all the proceeds of sales of the same, heretofore made or hereafter to be made, and all grants, donations and appropriations that may hereafter be made by the State of Texas, or from any other source, except donations limited to specific purposes, shall constitute and become a Permanent University Fund. And the same as realized and received into the Treasury of the State (together with such sums belonging to the Fund, as may now be in the Treasury), shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties of municipalities, or in bonds of any city of this State, or in bonds issued under and by virtue of the Federal Farm Loan Act approved by the President of the United States, July 17, 1916, and amendments thereto; and the interest accruing thereon shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purpose declared in the foregoing Section; provided, that the one-tenth of the alternate Section of the lands granted to railroads, reserved by the State, which were set apart and appropriated to the establishment of the University of Texas, by an Act of the Legislature of February 11, 1858, entitled, 'An Act to establish the University of Texas,' shall not be included in, or constitute a part of, the Permanent University Fund."

Sec. 2. Said proposed amendment shall be voted on by the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

H. J. R. No. 24. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 13 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Sec. 13. Provision shall be made by the first Legislature for the speedy sale, without the necessity of a suit in Court, of a sufficient portion of all lands and other property for the taxes due thereon, and every year thereafter for the sale in like manner of all lands and other property upon which the taxes have not been paid; and the deed of conveyance to the purchaser for all lands and other property thus sold shall be held to vest a good and perfect title in the purchaser thereof, subject to be impeached only for actual fraud; provided, that the former owner shall within two years from date of the filing for record of the Purchaser's Deed have the right to redeem the land on the following basis:

- (1) Within the first year of the redemption period upon the payment of the amount of money paid for the land, including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs paid plus not exceeding twenty-five (25%) per cent of the aggregate total;
- (2) Within the last year of the redemption period upon the payment of the amount of money paid for the land, including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs paid plus not exceeding fifty (50%) per cent of the aggregate total."

Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1932.

H. J. R. No. 12. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 55, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 55. The Legislature shall have no power to release or extinguish, or to authorize the releasing or extinguishing, in whole or in part, the indebtedness, liability or obligation of any corporation or individual, to this State or to any county or defined subdivision thereof, or other municipal corporation therein, except delinquent taxes which have been due for a period of at least ten years."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments at the General Election in 1932.

H. J. R. No. 1. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas should be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to-wit:

- First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.
- Second: Idiots and lunatics.
- Third: All paupers supported by any county.
- Fourth: All persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exception as the Legislature may make.
- Fifth: All soldiers, marines and seamen, employed in the service of the Army or Navy of the United States. Provided that this restriction shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps."

Sec. 2. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps."

Sec. 3. That Section 40 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time, more than one Civil Office of emolument, except that of Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States; or retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any Election: General, Special or Primary, in this State when otherwise qualified."

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next General Election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

H. J. R. No. 5. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 7, of Article 11, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Article 11, Section 7. All counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are hereby authorized upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon at an election called for such purpose to levy and collect such tax for construction of sea walls, breakwaters, or sanitary purposes, as may now or may hereafter be authorized by law, and may create a debt in evidence thereof. But no debt for any purpose shall ever be incurred in any manner by any city or county unless provision is made, at the time of creating the same, for levying and collecting a sufficient tax to pay the interest thereon and provide at least two per cent (2%) as a sinking fund; and the condemnation of the right of way for the erection of such works shall be fully provided for."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, A. D. 1932.
