Sterling was winner in the election here carrying in every precinct and receiving a total of 255 votes while "Ma" Ferguson received only 98 votes. At Dryden, Precinct 2, the selection of a governor was on a fifty-fifty basis, Sterling and Ferguson each receiving 29 votes. Terrell led in this county for Railroad Commissioner 6 year term and for the 4 year term Railroad Commissioner, Ernest O. Thompson led the ticket. William Pierson, for Justice Supreme Court received more votes than his opponent H. E. Hickman. In the Congressman at Large race winners in this county were: Place 1, Geo. B. Terrell; Place 2, Cyclone Davis, and Place 3, Joe Burkett.

Much interest was held in the election and the voting was steady all day in this precinct.
