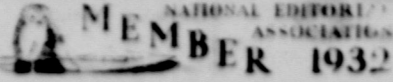

ECONOMIC HIGHLIGHTS

Happenings That Affects the Dinner Pails, Dividend Checks and Tax Bills of Every Individual. National and International Problems Inseparable From Local Welfare.

According to R. G. Dun and Company, stability in many branches of industry is more sustained than at any time in the past three years. A survey by Standards Statistics indicates that, while trade outlook for the immediate future is irregular, a number of major lines are strengthening. It is interesting to note that food products are making a much better showing than industry in general.

The belief is widely expressed that a clear-cut legislative program at Washington would probably do more to initiate trade activity than any other single development at the moment. The present congress has created the impression in business that almost anything may happen, thus forcing industry to be extremely cautious.

The Boston News Bureau observes: "All of the factors now at work may make for further shrinkage in purchasing power, but it brings into closer readjustment the various factors that will ultimately make for stability. And the more rapidly investment confidence is strengthened the sooner will the processes of financial revival be stimulated."

The index of farm prices reached a new low on January 15th, standing at that time at 51 per cent of the pre-war averages. (A year ago the index was at 63 per cent.) Eggs took a drop larger than the seasonal conditions warrant. On the other hand, small advances have been recently registered by apples, horses, wheat and cotton.

Continued severe weather, coupled with damage to crops from other factors, plus a favorable export situation, gives rise to the hope of substantial improvement in wheat prices later on. Qualified observers also foresee the possibility that within the next year domestic consumption of wheat may balance production, thus eliminating the need for foreign markets to absorb our surplus.

It is held that the farm mortgage situation, while bad, gives no cause for the hysteria that has been sweeping over the country in recent weeks. Foreclosures for the present year, if they increase in the same proportion as in 1932, will total about 267,000. This is only 4.3 per cent of the number of farms in

the country. Another favorable sign is that insurance companies and banks have been following an extremely liberal policy in the matter of farm mortgages, only foreclosing when no other course is possible. The present acuteness of the situation is, also, mainly sectional.

Great interest is expressed in Roosevelt plan for providing jobs. It is to be a huge experiment, and is expected to give employment to 200,000 men in the Tennessee Valley alone. It includes: Reforestation, creation of flood control basins, reclamation of fertile bottom lands for agricultural use, etc. Mr. Roosevelt believes that the entire project will be self-sustaining, and can be financed through bonds.

Recent reports on major industries show: RAYON—Leading viscose producers reported booked solid for March. January shipments at new high for that month for several concerns.

MEN'S CLOTHES—Prices low, improvement in sales expected. STEEL—Production increased. Manufacturers feel turn for better has taken place.

OIL—Ability of California oil industry to stave off price collapse this year, in spite of internal strain and breakdown in Midcontinent markets, source of much comment.

RUBBER—Price cuts emphasize intensely competitive situation within the industry. Tire buyers can fill their needs below cost.

FARM EQUIPMENT—Manufacturers realize that special inducements to farmers must be made to maintain present trade position.

Budget increases of about 10 per cent have been registered by Congress. The greatest increase, of \$120,000,000 was for the executive office and independent establishments. Other marked increases were reg-

istered by the departments of agriculture, interior, postoffice, war, commerce, with decreases by the treasury, state, justice and labor. Is this the way economy pledges to the taxpayers are to be kept?

Mexican crop outlook better than last year, as is retail trade. Outlook slightly improved in India, Bolivian and Cuban situations unfavorable. In most countries abroad there has been little change in any direction of late.



RECIPES AND MENUS
By Department of Home Economics

DENTON, Feb. 23.—Cheese constitutes a valuable addition to the dietary. It supplied protein in a concentrated form as well as fat and vitamins in appreciable quantities.

The misunderstanding about the digestibility of cheese which used to prevail can no doubt be traced to the fact that formerly cheese was eaten as an addition or accompaniment to other foods which were already to rich in themselves.

Cheese can also be rendered indigestible by overcooking. Intense heat hardens the protein so that it is almost impossible for the digestive juices to break it down. It should always be cooked at a modern temperature to be digestible, or protected from the high heat of the oven by layers of other materials such as thin slices of bread or layers of crumbs.

Crisp water cress, celery, lettuce served with a dressing or with salt alone, or simple fruit salads make good combinations with cheese dishes. Cheese, whether raw or cooked is likely to be soft, and so should be served with the harder kinds of bread. Brittle cookies, too, seem more suitable than rich soft cakes or puddings for the dessert in such meals. Menus such as the following are served at lunch or dinner:

Italian macaroni and cheese, raisin bread, orange and water cress salad, baked apples, sugar cookies, cocoa.

Cheese fondue, toast, celery, boiled potato, fruit salad, string beans, crisp cookies, coffee.

Clear Soup, Boston roast, baked potatoes, buttered cabbage, lettuce salad, apple jelly, rye bread, peach shortcake, tea.

Tomato bouillon, croutons, nut and cheese roast, browned potatoes, biscuits (thin and crisp), beet salad, rice pudding, cream, tea.

RECIPES

Italian Macaroni and Cheese: 1 c macaroni broken into small pieces, 2 qt. boiling salted water, 1-2 onion, 2 cloves, 1 1-2 c tomato sauce, 1-2 c or more of grated cheese. Cook the macaroni in the boiling salted water with the onion and clove, reheat in tomato sauce, and serve with grated cheese.

Cheese Fondue: 1 1-3 c stale soft bread crumbs, 1 1-2 c grated cheese, 4 eggs, 1 c hot water, 1-2 t salt. Mix water, bread crumbs, salt and cheese; add yolks well beaten; into this mixture cut and fold the egg white beaten stiff. Pour into buttered baking dish and cook 30 minutes in moderate oven. Serve at once.

Boston Roast: 1 pd. c kidney beans or its equivalent, 1-2 pd. grated cheese, bread crumbs and salt. Mash beans. Add cheese and sufficient bread crumbs to make into a roll. Bake in a moderate oven, basting occasionally with butter and water. Serve with tomato sauce. This dish may be flavored with onions, chopped and cooked in butter and water.

Nut And Cheese Roast: 1 c cottage cheese, 1 c bread crumbs, 1 T butter, 1 c chopped nuts, 2 T chopped onion, juice of 1 lemon, salt and pepper. Cook onion in butter. Mix and bake.
