BIG CROWD HERE FOR RODEO

Sheep And Goat Raisers Endorse U. S. Probe Of Boston's Wool Dealers

KERRVILLE, June 10.—Members of the executive committee of the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association of Texas, in quarterly meeting here Thursday, voted unanimously an endorsement of the Federal trade commission's investigation of the Boston wool dealers and their trade association.

Speakers afterwards urged that the probe be exhaustive and the 30 members of the committee who voted pledged "the aid of the association in every way possible" in helping the Federal commission to determine if there exists a combination in the wool trade "in restraint of trade." The matter was taken up in connection with recent receipt by T. A. Kincaid, president of the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, of a letter from the commission asking that group's opinion of the charges, which as yet has not been formally preferred.

Paroled Convict Surrenders To Officers Monday

Roy Snoderly, self styled escaped convict, seemed disappointed Tuesday morning when the sheriff's office here received a wire from the warden of the state penitentiary at Anamos, Iowa, from which Snoderly claimed to have made his escape, stating that the man was out on parole and was not wanted.

Snoderly first surrendered to E. P. Bradford, merchant, at Pumpville after being put off a freight train there early Monday afternoon. Bradford notified Val Verde County officers who were unable to come after him. He then turned the supposed fugitive over to deputy sheriff Lee Haines, of Dryden, who was attending the rodeo at Pumpville. Haines brought him to this city and turned him over to sheriff Lee Cook who immediately wired Iowa officials.

About 25 years of age, Snoderly apparently tired and hungry, seemed anxious to go back to Animos. He claimed that his mother, who lives in Davenport, Iowa, had written him advising him to come back and give himself up to the officers.

NEW TEST WELL TO BE DRILLED IN THE COUNTY

San Antonio Company is Granted Permit To Put Down Test

It is reported that the Peerless Oil and Gas Company, of San Antonio, one of the largest independent companies has been granted a permit by the State to drill a test well in Terrell county, to be called the Blas Benavides No. 1.

The location of this test well, which will be drilled about 14 miles south of this city will be 1320 feet from the South and East lines of Section 90, Block D-10, T. C. Ry. survey.

The McPhee well, 6 miles east of Dryden in this county, has not as yet resumed drilling.

A Gala Night in Old Mexico, with typical Mexican entertainment and music to the soft strains of native orchestras, will be featured on the night of Sunday, July 2, as one of the major events.

The monster celebration, commemorating the 50th anniversary of Del Rio, is sponsored by the Del Rio and Villa Acuna Chamber of Commerce.

It is anticipated that thousands of people will attend the six-day fun fiesta on the silvery Rio Grande.

RANGE DROUGHT IS RELIEVED BY GOOD SHOWERS

Narrow Strip Along The Border Gets Most Of Moisture

Ranchers are jubilant here this week over a slow, steady downpour of rain which started falling early Wednesday morning and continued intermittently throughout the day.

Heavy rains, earlier in the week, were reported Tuesday north and west of here, with the canyons running in some parts of the country. Good rains were reported Tuesday extending from Del Rio south to Eagle Pass, east to Brackettville and the Carta Valley and Double Tank sections.

The rains will greatly benefit range conditions generally in this section, and especially will put out feed for late spring lambs.

A total of 51 inches of rain fell in town and Thursday morning clear skies were prevalent once more with the temperature cool and a good breeze blowing from the east.

70,000 POUNDS OF 12 MONTHS WOOL IS SOLD

Sealed Bid Sale Held Here Thursday of Last Week

In a sealed bid sale held in this city last Thursday by the Sanderson Wool Commission Company, who offered 160,000 pounds of 12 months wool, only 70,000 pounds were sold. Several buyers representing Eastern firms were present and offered bids.

The seventy thousand pounds sold here brought prices ranging from 22 3/4 to 25 1/2 cents and bids were rejected on about ninety thousand pounds.

Buyers who purchased were: Charles Angel, representing Halliwell, Jones & Donald, Boston; Jack Allison of Adams & Leland, Boston; E. Woodward of Draper & Co., Boston; L. M. Murphy, representing Eisemann Bros., Boston; and D. E. Hughes buyer for the firm of Studley & Emery, Boston.

Previous to the sale there had been shipped on consignment 315,000 pounds of wool to Eisemann Bros., of Boston and 175,000 pounds to Studley & Emery of Boston.

TIMES EARLY THIS WEEK

The Times is being published one day ahead of schedule this week on account of the big Rodeo which opens Thursday morning and continues through Friday.

Two men identified by United States Customs officials as Willie Woods and Clifford Dopson, two of the 11 convicts who escaped the Kansas state penitentiary at Lansing on May 30, were captured at 7:30 o'clock Saturday morning on the highway between Rocksprings and Junction.

The men were placed in jail at Junction after a gunfight in which Customs Officers J. A. Tilley and W. E. Kilborn narrowly escaped with their lives.

The men submitted to arrest when accosted on the road, Tilley informed The Evening News over telephone, but while the officers were enroute to the Junction jail with the men they suddenly produced pistols and opened fire.

Tilley said Woods fired point-blank at Kilborn and missed. While the officers grappled with Woods his companion produced a pistol and fired several shots. None of the bullets took effect.

The officers found three pistols and a shotgun in the car, which fitted the description of the machine stolen by the fugitives in St. Louis shortly after the prison break.—Del Rio Evening News.

Congress Approves Coinage Of Texas Centennial Halves

WASHINGTON, June 10. (AP)—The Senate bill to authorize issuance of half dollars for Texas to commemorate the hundredth anniversary of the independence of Texas was passed in the House today and sent to the president.

AUSTIN, June 10 (AP)—Coinage of new half dollars for Texas' one hundredth anniversary was proposed as a part of the plan of the American Legion Texas Centennial committee to erect and equip a mammoth memorial museum.

In order to finance such a project, the committee requested Texas members of congress to introduce the coinage measure. Congressman Wright Patman introduced a bill in the House for 1,500,000 silver 50-cent pieces and Senator Tom Connally submitted a like bill in the upper branch.

The centennial committee made plans to sell the coins for \$1 each which, it was estimated, would result in a net profit of \$750,000, all of which would be used to perfect the museum. In the museum the department offices of the American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary would be housed.

The memorial was planned as a gift by the legion to the state of Texas as an enduring contribution to posterity.

Tentative provisions called for a museum in which compartments would be arranged for every post and every county of the state and where articles of historic value, trophies, relics and specimens of animal life would be assembled.
